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SHAMPOO ABUSE

Heaped Upon a Noted Englishman for His Open Atonement.

Wm. Ed. Robertson, the L.R.S.M., M.K.C.P.I., of the Royal Navy of England, has gotten into professional trouble for writing the following open letter to the editor of the London Family Doctor:

"I believe it to be the duty of every physician to acknowledge the receipt of money whereby sickness can be prevented, and it is for this purpose I write to give my experience on the subject of the use of shampooing."
