The Restless Age

"I wish Jackie would sit still for five minutes," you say, ignoring the "why" of his activity. Do you remember, when he was a baby in his crib, how you delighted to see him lie on his back and kick? How strong this exercise made his little limbs, so that he walked before the neighbor's boy of the same age ! And yet now you want him to be quiet. Do you forget that he must still keep on the go to develop the little muscles and become a big, strong laddie? Do you forget that his creator made him thus active with a purpose?

"But," you say, "I shouldn't mind his being so active, if he were not always getting into mischief." Ah ! there's the trouble, and there's the opportunity ! If Jackie is blessed with energy and imagination, let us not repress, but guide, those qualities.

Some children's days are made up of "don'ts :"—"Don't make such a noise, Billy!"—"Don't slide on the polished floors!" —"Don't breathe on the window panes !" until poor Billy is liable to develop into a disobedient, rebellious, sullen child, alienated from mother and others in authority, or into a passive boy without initiative or spirit of independence. Thus, not only is his physical growth hampered, but his moral being is warped by repression.

Let us give positive requests, not negative commands. While we must not let Billy continue to scratch the floor and soil the window panes and become a selfish, heedless fellow, yet we can avoid the "don'ts" by suggesting something right for him to do, so that the wrong thing may never present itself to him. Utilize his love to help and let him sweep and polish ; notice that he tires of ordinary toys and abuses or discards them, and substitute something he can make-pictures to cut out with pointless scissors, empty spools, boxes and strin, to make into carts, plastecine on the oilcloth-covered table where he can develop his imagination, and his finger muscles to his heart's content. Perhaps mother has a headache and wants quiet. Let him pretend to be the nurse or doctor and tiptoe softly about.

Again, let us remember how difficult it is for the child to get our point of view, and, therefore, try to get his. One day he romps and mother smiles and shares in the fun. An hour later he makes the same noise, and she is vexed. Baby is asleep, but he has failed to realize this. What was right one moment was apparently wrong the next. Let us put ourselves in the child's place; let us grownups play more with the children, that we may understand them better and that they, in turn, may feel our sympathy and cooperate with us, and thus become helpful boys and girls, loving to think and do for others. It may mean sacrifice of other things, but what is more important than to train up in the way they should go the little ones whom Jesus, in His brief, busy life on earth, found time to caress and bless?

Our Lessons for This Quarter

They begin with a wonderful day—the day that Jesus talked with His loving disciples for the last time on earth, and, while He talked with them, was taken up out of their sight. Then follows the story of a still more wonderful day, when, with a sound as of a rushing mighty wind and with tongues of fire upon each of them, the Holy Spirit from heaven came upon these same disciples.

Peter was the leader of the disciples, and through the new power which the coming down of the Holy Spirit gave him, three thousand people were brought to believe in Jesus in one day. That is Lesson Three. Lesson Four tells how that same Spirit of God makes *us* glad and happy children of the heavenly Father.

Peter makes a man instantly well and strong and able to walk, who had been a helpless cripple all his life. Then he tells the people that it was by the power of Jesus Christ that he had done this wonderful thing. The people rejoice, but their rulers are jealous and angry and forbid Peter and his friend and helper, John, to speak about Jesus any more. They reply that they must do what God tells them to do, and not what men tell them. These are Lessons Five and Six.

Lesson Seven, from one of Paul's letters, teaches that, like Jesus, we should be very humble and should help others all we can. Lesson Eight tells how the Christians of Paul's time and Peter's, did help one another. Lesson Nine describes the choosing of seven men who were to take special charge of aiding those who were most in need of help.

The first of the three closing Lessons tell how one of these seven men was put to death because he was so brave and faithful; the second calls the roll of a host of holy men and women whom wicked people tortured and killed, but whom God welcomed to His blessed, heavenly home; whilst the third and last Lesson of the Quarter gives the story of how a traveler from a far country learned about Jesus.

The teacher and the scholars and the mothers will enjoy all this Quarter's Lessons.

The Child's Prayer

The eight-year-old voice was very serious and determined, and the mother, who was slowly and painfully acquiring the lettingalone virtue, went quietly away.

How about the formation of childish habits and all the rest of it? How about obedience? How about a great many things which later proved entirely negligible? But the mother held herself to the policy of keeping out, and the problem solved itself, as children's problems, unhurried and unnagged, have a fashion of doing.

The fourth night the child was found sobbing distressfully. "Mother, I want to say my prayers."

"Very well, dear, I will wait."

"But, mother, I can't."

"Why not ?"

"Because I don't know how, mother. I don't want to say just 'Now I lay me,' and 'God bless.' It aches inside with the things I want to say, and I can't say them. I'm bigger now and I want to say bigger things."

Swiftly the mother's mind traveled to the

far-off days, to the immature, loving disciples, with their great spiritual longings and their inability to put them into words. "Lord, teach us to pray," was no glib utterance. The answer, "After this manner pray ye," was tenderness and comprehension itself.

When the beautiful, simple story had been told as the child could best understand it, she was comforted in part. "Our Father' is too big for me, mother. I don't know what all the things mean. That was for those big disciples. I'm glad they had to be helped, though. I don't feel so ashamed about it."

Almost startled by the magnitude of her privilege, trembling for fear of failure on this untried ground, the mother formulated for the listening child the simple petitions which she could follow, which touched the interests of her own life.

And slowly the child has been taught to pray for the things she desires, child-wise, but reverently, comprehendingly.

THE COMING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

THE LESSON RETOLD

The people who go from one place to another to tell others about Jesus are called missionaries, which means people who are sent on an errand. The missionaries' errand is to tell about Jesus. We are to hear in the lesson how God gave the very first missionaries power to preach and teach and heal in Jesus' name. The twelve men whom Jesus had trained to be His apostles or messengers had watched their dear Jesusbeing taken up into heaven, and then they had sorrowfully gone back to Jerusalem to wait there, as Jesus had told them to do, till God sent the Holy Spirit upon them.

It was the harvest time. The wheat had

been cut with big, hooked knives, called sickles, and the people gathered in Jerusalem from all parts of the country to go to a great service at the temple, called the Feast of Pentecost. At this great feast they praised and thanked God for giving them the wheat harvest. The feast lasted several days, and every day crowds walked up the hill to the temple, each bringing his offering with him.

One day, at the time of this feast, Jesus' apostles and other followers of Jesus had met together in Jerusalem. There were a hundred and twenty in all. One disciple named Matthias had been chosen to take the place of Judas, who had betrayed and forsaken Jesus. While

they were all talking to one another, suddenly they heard a sound like a mighty, rushing wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. Then, like tongues of fire, flames darted down and rested upon the heads of the disciples.

What did it mean? It meant that God was keeping His promise. This was the coming of the Holy Spirit. He gave the disciples power to speak in many tongues, or languages. The people who had come from many different countries heard them speak about Jesus, each in his own language. This greatly astonished those who heard. They could not understand the wonderful power which God had given to the Christians. Neither can we understand it, but we know it was God's Holy Spirit within them that made them able to do it.

THE LESSON RETOLD

In our last lesson we saw how Jesus sent His Holy Spirit upon His followers, and how very much astonished the people were when they heard them speaking in many different languages? "What a lot of strange words they are speaking ! They must have been drinking wine and do not know what they are saying," said some.

Then up stood Peter, one of the apostles, and said, "No, these people have not been drinking wine. It is the Holy Spirit that has made them able to speak in many languages, so that they may tell those belonging to all nations about Jesus."

Then Peter went on and preached quite a long sermon to the people who, as we have seen, were gathered there in Jerusalem at the great harvest feast of Pentecost. He told them that long, long ago God had sent a message by Joel, one of His prophets, telling the people that very strange and dreadful things were going to happen in the world before Jesus would come back to earth, but all who worshiped Jesus would be saved. Peter told them all over again the wonderful story which you have heard so often, all about Jesus being put to death on the cross and coming to life again and going back to heaven and sending His Holy Spirit upon His messengers, and being made Lord and ruler over all the heaven and the earth.

When Peter had finished his sermon, the people were very much frightened. They ran after the apostles crying, "What shall we

do ?" "What shall we do ?" Peter told them if they wanted to become Jesus' friends and heipers, they must first repent, which means be sorry for their sins, turn away from them and ask Jesus to forgive them. They must be baptized with water as a sign that they had given themselves to Jesus, and then God would send His Holy Spirit upon them also. For God's promise to send the Holy Spirit was to them all and to their children, and to those far away, to everybody who should hear God's promise and ask for this gift. And many, many of the people that day gladly listened to Peter's words, and were baptized by the apostles, as our ministers now baptize little children, and sometimes big people too.

These new followers of Jesus were true to their promise and turned away from sin and learned from the apostles all that Jesus had taught them. All the followers of Jesus kept close together and shared everything they had with one another. The rich ones sold all they had and gave part of the money to the poorer ones, so that all had enough. They spent their time in worshiping God in His temple and going from house to house telling about Jesus. They were glad hearted and tried always to do what was right, so all the people loved them, and every day many others joined with them. In this way Jesus' church kept growing larger and larger.



THE LESSON RETOLD

Our lesson to-day is not really a story, but part of a letter which was written by the apostle Paul, who was the greatest of all the messengers of Jesus. Paul wrote this letter to the followers of Jesus who lived in the great city of Rome, which was in a country far away over the sea from Paul's home at Jerusalem.

Perhaps you would like to hear how Paul happened to go to Rome. The Jews who hated Jesus, hated Paul, also, and tried to put him to death, but the soldiers from Rome who had charge of Paul's country at that time, saved Paul from death by putting him in prison and taking care of him. Paul asked them to send him to Rome so he could tell his own story to Cæsar, the emperor, or king at Rome.

So Paul and some other prisoners, guarded by Roman soldiers, started on their long journey to Rome. They sailed away in a ship with white sails, not at all like our great steamships. On the way a heavy storm blew up so that the ship was tossed about on the big waves, and at last was upset and Paul and all the others fell into the water. Those who could not swim had to cling to bits of board and pieces of the ship, and after a while they managed to get to the shore. Another ship came along, which took them to Rome. While Paul was a prisoner in Rome, he was allowed to live in a house by himself, with one soldier to guard him. The people were kind to him.

Lesson IV.

The Spirit of Life

Many people came to see Paul, and he taught them about Jesus. When at last he was set free and allowed to go away from Rome, he left many followers of Jesus in Rome. Paul often thought of them after he left them. He knew it was hard for them to be followers of Jesus amongst Jews and heathen people, so he wrote a long letter to them to cheer and help them.

Paul told them they must not forget that God had given them the gift of the Holy Spirit and God expects something in return. They must show their thankfulness to God by being pure, patient, unselfish, keeping from all bad things. They could not be good without help. God had given them a helper, who will keep them away from sin. The Holy Spirit will bring right thoughts and feelings into their hearts and minds, so that they will be really God's children and will have a right to the home in heaven with Jesus, God's Son, and a share in all things that their heavenly Father gives to His children. God said the Holy Spirit would give them life, and sinful wavs would bring death.

"All things work together for good to them that love God," Paul wrote to cheer these Christians at Rome. How pleased they must have been when they got Paul's letter, and how happy it must have made them to know that Paul was thinking about them !



12 And when Pe'ter saw it, he answered unto the people, Ye men of Is'rael, why marvel ye at this? or why look ye so earnestly on us, as though by our own power or holiness we had made this man to walk ?

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day two of Jesus' disciples, Peter and John, were walking up the hill to the beautiful temple of God at Jerusalem. Away in front of them they saw the white marble steps which led up to the gate which was called the Beautiful Gate, because it was made of beautifully carved brass which glittered in the sunshine. Beyond the gate, on the very top of the hill, they saw the gilded walls and pillars and root of the temple glittering in the glow of the sunset. Peter and John were going to the afternoon service at the temple.

As they came near to the Beautiful Gate they saw, sitting there, a beggar, a man who had been lame from the time he was a wee baby, and now he was forty years old. It is

the custom in Eastern lands for beggars to sit at places where crowds of people are passing, to ask help, and for many years his friends had carried this poor man every morning up to the steps of the Beautiful Gate. There he sat all day, holding out his hands for money to those who passed. Many kind people gave to him.

As Peter and John were walking up the steps, this lame man held out his hands and asked them to give him some money. Peter and John looked down at him, in a kindly way we may be sure, and Peter said, "Look on us." The man looked up expecting to get some money. Then Peter said, "We have no silver or gold to give you, but we will give

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He followed Peter and John into the temple, walking and leaping and praising God. The people in the temple heard the noise. They looked at the man who was shouting and leaping. They knew it was the lame man who had sat begging for so many years at the Beautiful Gate. They were filled with wonder at what had happened to him. The man who had been lame was clinging to Peter and John. He was so thankful to them for healing him. All the peop.e ran towards them to find out how this wonderful thing had happened.

Peter said to them, "Why are you so much surprised, and why are you looking at us as if we had by our own power or homess made this man to walk ?" Peter did not want the people to think it was their own power that had cured the lame man. He wanted them to know it was the Holy Spirit within them that had made them able to do this. The lame man had obeyed Peter's words and trusted in Jesus' name to help him, and God had made him well.

The people who saw how the lame man had been cured, gathered about Peter, a great crowd, and he preached to them about Jesus, telling them how He had come from heaven to be their Saviour.



Golden Text—Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong.—1 Corinthians 16: 13.



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8 Then Pe'ter, filled with the Holy Ghost, said unto them, Ye rulers of the people, and elders of Is'rael,

9 If we this day be examined of the good deed done to the impotent man, by what means he is made whole;

10 Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Is'rael, that by the name of Je'sus Christ of Naz'areth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, *even* by him doth this man stand here before you whole.

11 This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner.

12 Neither is there salvation in any other : for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.

13 Now when they saw the boldness of Pe'ter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Je'sus.

14 And beholding the man which was healed standing with them, they could say nothing against it.

15 But when they had commanded them to go aside out of the council, they conferred among themselves,

16 Saying, What shall we do to these men? for that indeed a notable miracle hath been

done by them is manifest to all them that dwell in Jeru'salem ; and we cannot deny *it*. 17 But that it spread no further among the people, let us straitly threaten them, that they

speak henceforth to no man in this name. 18 And they called them, and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Je'sus.

19 But Pe'ter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye.

20 For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard.

21 So when they had further threatened them, they let them go, finding nothing how they might punish them, because of the people : for all *men* glorified God for that which was done.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Our last lesson told us how the two apostles, Peter and John, saw a poor lame beggar at the Beautiful Gate of the temple and made him strong and well. The people were so eager and excited who saw the lame man made able to walk, that they crowded around Peter and John and listened to every word they said about Jesus. Many who heard, believed, and became followers of Jesus.

While Peter and John were talking to the crowds in the court of the temple, the temple officers whose duty it was to keep order, came to them and with them came some of the angry Jews who hated to hear Jesus' name spoken. "These followers of Jesus must not be allowed to preach in the temple. They must be arrested," they say. So they took Peter and John and sent them to prison.

Next morning, a meeting of the Sanhedrin, which was the great council of the Jewish church, was called. The Jewish priests and others belonging to the Sanhedrin were seated in a half circle around the floor of a large building. They were very excited and angry

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and were ready to order the two apostles of Jesus to be put to death.

Peter and John were brought from the prison by the guards, and were told to stand before this council while they questioned them. "By what power did you make the lame man walk?" Were they afraid to tell? No, indeed ! They stood up boldly and Peter told those angry Jews that it was by the name of Jesus, whom the Jews had put to death and whom God had raised from the dead. He was the one whose power had made the lame man able to stand before them and to walk.

"There is no other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved," Peter boldly said. There was a great whispering and talking and shaking of fists at Peter and John, but no one dared to touch them. They were ordered to be taken out of the room while the council should decide what to do with them. There was no use in saying that the apostles were telling lies, for everybody knew the lame beggar who had sat at the Beautiful Gate. Now he stood there, able to stand and walk. "We cannot keep people from seeing him and believing what has been done, but we must not let Peter and John and the other apostles preach about Jesus any more," they said, "or others who hear and see will believe in Jesus too." So Peter and John were called into the room again, and told that they must not preach any more about Jesus. Do you think they would obey this order of the Jewish council, or will they obey Jesus, who told them to go into all the world and preach the gospel to all nations, beginning first at Jerusalem? "Is it right to obey you rather than God?" Peter asks the council. "We must tell others the things we have both seen and heard."

The Jews could do nothing more to them, so they told them again they would be punished if they preached any more about Jesus, and then they let them go free. They did not dare to harm the apostles, for they had many friends amongst those who had seen the lame man healed and who believed the apostles' words.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Philippi was the name of one of the far away cities where the apostle Paul went to carry the glad news about Jesus. Paul started a Christian church there,—that means a church of the worshipers of Christ—and then he went on to tell the good news to other cities.

One day a letter came to the followers of Jesus who lived in Philippi. The people there were called Philippians. This letter was from their friend the apostle Paul. How eager they were to hear what Paul had written to them ! The letter did not look a bit like our letters. It was written on a long strip of paper or parchment and rolled around a wooden roller. They gathered close around their leader while the letter was being read to them. This letter from Paul was full of kindly remembrances of his visit amongst them, and of loving messages and good wishes. But Paul had something more than that to say to them. He told them that he would be happy if he knew that they were all getting on happily together and living as Jesus would like His followers to live.

Paul told them to remember that God had given them the beautiful life of Jesus for a "copy." Jesus was full of love. They should love one another. They should not be quarrelsome nor proud nor selfish. They must not try to be first in everything. Perhaps some of them wanted to be leaders. They must give others a chance to be leaders. Sometimes. They must not think only about themselves, but they must also think about helping others.

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Humbled and Exalted

Some of their neighbors might be poor or sick or lonely. They must go to see these and do what they can to help them. This is what Jesus would do.

For, although Jesus was God's Son and greater than any one on earth, He was not proud. He did not try to be master. He tried to serve others as a servant would. He became like the people on earth in every way. He knew how it felt to be tired and hungry and homeless. He knew what it was to have people angry at Him and trying to do Him harm. He knew what it was to be mocked and laughed at and ill-treated. He knew what it was to suffer pain and death on the cross. He did all this because it was the will of His heavenly Father that He should suffer all these things. He was obedient to God in all things, as we should be also.

But it was only for a little while here on earth that God, allowed Jesus to be treated in this way. God took Him back to heaven and there He is now in His glory, ruler of heaven and earth, king of kings and lord of lords. He is mightier than the mightiest. God has highly exalted Him and given Him a name which is above every name.

When we hear the name of our king, we rise to show him honor. Paul said some time all over the world people will bow their knees when they hear the name of Jesus to show that they honor Him, and "every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

32 And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul : neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own ; but they had all things common.

2 And kept back *part* of the price, his wife also being privy to it, and brought a certain part, and laid it at the apostles' feet.

3 But Pe'ter said, Anani'as, why hath Sa'tan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and to keep back *part* of the price of the land?

4 Whiles it remained, was it not thine own? and after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? why hast thou conceived this thing in thine heat? they hast hou has not lied unto men but unto God

thine heart? thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God. 5 And Anani'as hearing these words fell down, and gave up the ghost : and great fear came on all them that heard these things.

THE LESSON RETOLD

In those days long ago when Jesus' church was in its beginnings, there were many poor people in it who were not earning enough money to buy the things that they needed. But Jesus' followers were willing to help one another, and many of those who had houses or lands sold them and gave the money to the apostles to be used in helping the poor. If one needed food he was supplied with it. If another needed clothing, he got what he needed.

A man named Joses, or Joseph, who was also called Barnabas, was born on the island of Cyprus, many miles away from Jerusalem. Barnabas had come to Jerusalem, where he had heard of Jesus and had become His follower. He owned a piece of land, and when he learned to love Jesus he wanted to help Jesus' followers, so he sold his farm and took the money he got and gave it to the apostles.

Our story also tells about two other followers of Jesus, a man and his wife. The man's name was Ananias, and the wife's name was Sapphira. They owned a farm, too, and sold it as others of Jesus' followers had done.

When the man paid the money, Ananias looked at it and thought : "This is a good deal of money for us to give to the apostles. I'll just give part of it and not say anything about it to any one but Sapphira. I'll tell her."

So Ananias took part of the money and

gave it to the apostles, but Peter knew what Ananias was doing. He said, "Ananias, do you know what a wicked thing you are doing ? You promised to give all you had and now you are keeping part of this money. It is Satan who has put it into your heart to do this wicked deed. You are telling a lie to God !"

When Ananias heard Peter's words he was dreadfully frightened. He shook and trembled and turned pale and suddenly fell to the ground on his face, dead. Great fear came upon all the people who saw and heard this. Some of the followers of Jesus lifted up the body of Ananias and carried him away and buried him.

Soon after this, Sapphira came into the room where the apostles were. She did not know what had been happening. Peter asked her, "Sapphira, tell me whether you sold that land for so much?" and she told a lie, and said, "Yes, that is what we sold it for." Peter said, "You and your husband have agreed to tell this lie. See how God has punished him ! The men are just coming back from burying him and they will bury you also." And she fell dead, and they buried her by her husband.

Great fear came upon all the people. They knew that nothing can be hidden from God. Many wished to join the apostles, but were afraid of the Jews. Sick ones were brought to the apostles to be healed, and they healed them all.

Acts 6: 1-7. Study Acts, ch. 6. *Scripture Memory Verses, Ex. 2: 1-4. **Golden Text**—Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ.—Galatians 6: 2.



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1 And in those days, when the number of the disciples was multiplied, there arose a murmuring of the Gre'cians against the He'brews, because their widows were neglected in the daily ministration.

2 Then the twelve called the multitude of the disciples *unto them*, and said, It is not reason that we should leave the word of God, and serve tables.

3 Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business.

4 But we will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word.

5 And the saying pleased the whole multitude : and they chose Ste'phen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Phil'ip, and Proch'orus, and Nica'nor, and Ti'mon, and Par'menas, and Nic'olas a proselyte of An'tioch :

 $6\,$ Whom they set before the apostles : and when they had prayed, they laid *their* hands on them.

7 And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jeru'salem greatly; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The last lesson told us about good Barnabas selling his land on the island of Cyprus and giving the money to the apostles, and we also heard about Ananias and his wife Sapphira, who also sold some land and only gave part of the money to the apostles and then told a lie about it, and God punished their wicked lie by causing them to be put to death.

The apostles were very thankful to receive the money given by the wealthy followers of Jesus for the use of those who were poor. The money was used very carefully, to provide for the needs of all their number; but as they went on preaching and teaching so many people became followers of Jesus that it was very difficult work to look after them all so that no one would be forgotten or overlooked. The apostles did their best, but grumbling was heard. Now some of the Christians in those days spoke Greek, while others spoke Hebrew, and a dispute arose between these two classes of people. The cause of the dispute was this. Amongst those who received help from the apostles, were widows, who had no one to earn money for them. The Christians who spoke Greek, complained that their widows did not get as much as the widows of those who spoke Hebrew.

So the Greek-speaking Christians began to grumble, and when the apostles heard of it, they called a meeting of the church and said to them, "We are busy preaching and teaching. We have not time to look after the poor people ourselves; some one else must take charge of that part of the work." So they asked the members to choose from amongst them seven good, kind, wise men

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The Seven Helpers

who should take charge of this work.

This pleased all the people, and they chose seven men. The apostles laid their hands upon the heads of these men and prayed that God would bless and help them. In this way the seven were set apart for their new work.

One of these seven men was Stephen. Full of faith and power, he did great miracles and wonders among the people, and many people, and even some of the priests and ministers of the Jews, became followers of Jesus.

Some of the leaders of the Jews began to dispute with Stephen, but he was able to answer all their questions. They called men who said they had heard Stephen speak words against Moses and against God. This stirred up the people and the elders and the scribes of the Jews. They took Stephen to be judged by their council, and men were brought there who told lies about Stephen. They said that he had spoken against the temple and against the Jewish law. "Why, we heard him say that Jesus of Nazareth shall destroy the temple and change the laws which God gave us through Moses," those angry enemies of Stephen said, as they shook their fists and stamped about.

While they were talking, all the men in the council were looking at the young man Stephen. There he stood ready to tell them what he meant by all that he had said and done. How brave and noble he was ! His face was like the face of an angel, because God's Holy Spirit was in Stephen's heart and shining through his face.

THE DEATH OF STEPHEN

March 5, 1916

Acts 7:54 to 8:3. Study Acts 7:1 to 8:3. *Scripture Memory Verses, Ex.2:5, 6. **Golden Tert**—Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give the the crown of life.— Revelation 2:10 (Rev. Ver.).



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54 When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they gnashed on him with *their* teeth.

55 But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up stedfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Je'sus standing on the right hand of God,

56 And said, Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God. 57 Then they cried out with a loud voice,

57 Then they cried out with a loud voice, and stopped their ears, and ran upon him with one accord,

58 And cast *him* out of the city, and stoned *him*: and the witnesses laid down their clothes at a young man's feet, whose name was Saul.

59 And they stoned Ste'phen, calling upon God, and saying, Lord Je'sus, receive my spirit.

60 And he kneeled down, and cried with a loud voice, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. And when he had said this, he fell asleep.

Ch. 8:1 And Saul was consenting unto his death. And at that time there was a great presecution against the church which was at Jeru'salem; and they were all scattered abroad throughout the regions of Judæ'a and Samar'ia, except the apostles.

2 And devout men carried Ste'phen to his burial, and made great lamentation over him. 3 As for Saul, he made havock of the church, entering into every house, and haling men and women committed *them* to prison.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The last lesson told us about the seven helpers whom the apostles had chosen to look after the poor people amongst them. Stephen, you remember, was one of these helpers. Our last story told us about the Jews bringing Stephen before the council to be judged. When they got through telling their stories against Stephen, the high priest asked him, "Are these things so ?"

Then Stephen stood up and made a grand speech, telling them of God's goodness to them, and of their wickedness in killing Jesus and in fighting against the Holy Spirit. This only made them angrier. They shook their fists at Stephen, and would have killed him at once if they had dared. He stood calmly looking away beyond them up to God and heaven, when suddenly there opened out before him a heavenly vision, or picture, in which he saw the great brightness of God's presence and Jesus standing at the right hand of God ready to comfort and help him. It was all brightness and glory and beauty there. God was allowing Stephen to get a glimpse of heaven, for God knew that soon Stephen would be in that beautiful home with Jesus, whom he loved and served.

The Jews would not listen to another word from Stephen. They called out and made a great noise so his voice could not be heard. They covered their ears with their hands so they would not hear him speak. With wild cries they ran at him and drove him out of the city and picked up stones and threw them at

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him. The crowd stood looking on and cheering them. We are told the name of only one young man who was helping them by standing and taking charge of their garments, which they threw at his feet when they started to run after Stephen. We shall hear more about this young man Saul, so we must not forget what we have just learned of him.

Stephen's enemies caught him and pushed him over a steep hill and threw stones at him till he died. The light of heaven was shining in his face and a prayer was on his lips, begging Jesus not to punish these men for what they were doing to him.

Stephen surely copied his master Jesus in this, for Jesus prayed God to forgive His enemies who were putting Him to death on the cross.

We call Stephen the first Christian martyr, because he was the first of Jesus' followers to be put to death for preaching about Jesus.

A little band of friends carried the dead Stephen and buried him. They mourned bitterly over the sad ending to the life of this brave, bright, young Christian.

The Jews would not allow the followers of Jesus to do any more preaching in Jerusalem. That young man Saul was one of the worst enemies of the Christians. He went into their churches and drove them out, and went into their homes and seized their men and women and put them in prison, and in every way tried to make them give up their faith in Jesus, and when they would not do so, they were beaten and ill-treated.

Many of the Christians fled from Jerusalem and went to live in other places, and those who were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching about Jesus.



THE LESSON RETOLD

To-day's lesson is about faith. Do you wonder what that word means? It means believing in something or somebody that we do not see.

If your father were away from home and wrote a letter telling you he would be home that night, you would believe that he would come. That is having faith in your father. When we believe what our heavenly Father tells us in the Bible, that is faith in God. When we believe what Jesus tells us, that is faith in Jesus. We heard last Sunday about Stephen, who was stoned to death because

he had faith in Jesus and taught others to have faith also.

The Bible tells us about a great many people who had faith in God and were able to do wonderful things because God helped them.

Gideon was a great soldier. He conquered enemies of God's people Israel, because he did what God told him to do. Barak is another soldier who through faith in God conquered enemies.

Samson prayed for strength, and God made him so wonderfully strong that he was

able to push down the pillars and walls of a house and kill his enemies.

Another warrior, Jephthæ, was able to conquer his enemies.

David, the shepherd boy, was able to kill the giant Goliath because he asked God to help him. We are told, also, of a little baby boy Samuel who came to his mother because she prayed that God would send him.

Daniel prayed, and God closed the mouths of the lions in the den so they did no harm to Daniel. God also kept the flames in the fiery furnace from harming Daniel's three companions.

Two sisters, Mary and Martha were crying because their brother Lazarus was dead, but they had faith that Jesus could bring him back to life. Jesus called him back to those dear sisters

The Bible also tells us about many people who bore crue! treatment because they had faith in Jesus

Many had to hide in dens and caves in the mountains to get away from those who were trying to kill them because they stood up for Jesus.

These have all gone on before us into heaven. The apostle Paul says our life is like a race. We are trying to reach a goal. This goal is heaven. Paul tells us to lay aside every sin that would hinder us from winning the race, and to keep our eyes on Jesus who, for the joy that was set before Him, bore the suffering and shame on the cross, and is now at the right hand of God the Father in heaven

THE LESSON RETOLD

After Stephen was stoned to death, the followers of Jesus had to go away from Jerusalem because the Jews were cruel to them. Some went to one place and some to another. Everywhere they went they scattered the news of the Lord Jesus.

Philip was one of the seven helpers who had been chosen to look after the poor. He went to Samaria and preached about Jesus. The people believed, and there was great joy in that city.

One day God sent an angel messenger to him saying, "Philip, I want you to go away along the road that goes from Jerusalem to Gaza." Perhaps Philip wondered why he should be sent away from Samaria and told to go along that lonely, desert road, but he did not ask why. Our story tells us "he arose and went."

As he was walking along wondering what new work God had for him to do, he heard the noise of travelers coming behind him. He looked around and saw a very fine chariot, or carriage, and a guard of soldiers and people on camels. In the chariot sat a dark colored man. He was a great man from Jerusalem. He was an officer of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who had charge of the queen's money and treasures. The people with him were his servants. God whispered to Philip, "Go near and speak to this man." Philip walked towards the chariot and he heard the traveler reading from a long roll of parchment, and what do you think it was ? It was part of the holy scriptures, as our Bible is called ! The Ethiopian had been to Jerusalem to see the great temple. He was filled with wonder at the beautiful temple and the Jewish way

He had heard the teachers reading about the Messiah, the holy one, whom God had promised to send to the world. He had seen and heard the excitement in Jerusalem about those new teachers and apostles, who were telling the people that this holy one had come, and was called Jesus of Nazareth.

He got a copy of the scriptures, and as he rode along in his chariot on his way home, he was reading and trying to find out what it meant. When he saw Philip he ordered the chariot to stop. Philip stepped up and said, "Do you understand what you are reading?" The Ethiopian said, "How can I understand, unless somebody will teach me?" Perhaps he thought Philip was one of the new teachers who had been in Jerusalem, for he asked Philip to get up in the chariot beside him, and as they rode along Philip had a fine chance to tell him about Jesus. The Ethiopian believed all that Philip told him, and wished to be baptized and be a true follower of Jesus.

When they came to a stream of water he ordered the chariot to stop, and Philip and he went into the water, where Philip baptized him, and the Ethiopian went on his way rejoicing, while God called Philip away to preach in other places.




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
