THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

The Debate on the Address.

Mr. McLaughlin, of West Durham, after stating the indulgence of the House, stated that there could not be any other opinion but that the elections were held at the most opportune moment. The result had been very greatly strengthened the Government. He alluded to the abundant harvest, and from that, anticipated a great and prosperous year would result. He was glad to notice that the lumbering interests were receiving the attention of the Government, and that the Government was not neglecting the North-west had been favorable to this Province. It was hardly possible to estimate the advantages which would result from the acquisition of this new territory. With regard to the provisions to be made for improving the young people confined in reformatories, he could assure the leader of the Government of his support. With regard to the new Parliament buildings, he thought that the Government should state at the time of the election that they intended to erect new buildings. In his opinion there was no necessity for new buildings, and he thought the expenditure of money for this object, as it was not necessary. He joined in the eulogium passed upon the Lieutenant-Governor, and was not the intention of the Opposition to move any amendment to the address. He hoped the debate would close to-night, and that the Government of next week would proceed to business. The hon. gentleman resumed his seat amidst continued applause.

Mr. Attorney-General Mowat assumed the leadership of the Opposition, that the Government would be glad to go on with the business of the House. He was very grateful to the electors for sustaining his Government in the manner he had done. He was glad to see the policy of the Government, which was most gratifying. He urged the great importance of having an Agricultural Commission, asserting that the Agricultural Commission would result from it. As it was most likely that the Insolvency Act would be repealed by the Dominion House this year, it was necessary that we should take steps to prevent our being left without an Act in Ontario. There could be no question as to urgent need of the new Parliament buildings. The hon. gentleman concluded by nominating a committee to draft a reply to the address.

OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM.

The Annual Report of the Minister of Education was presented to the Legislature yesterday. The report is a valuable document, and contains a full and complete account of the progress of education within this Province. The expenditure for the year 1878-79 was \$1,280,000, or less than \$490,000 in attendance, a remarkable exhibit. The average daily attendance has improved. This vast body of scholars, taught in 4,990 schools, employs about 6,240 teachers, in which number the ladies have a majority of four hundred. The salaries, which are low, show a trifling decrease. There are 224 urban school houses, 1,773 rural school sections. The Roman Catholic Separate schools in the Province number 177, being a decrease of nine during the year. The pupils in attendance in the 104 High Schools, there are 10,774 students; the expenditure amounted to \$396,010. These institutions are intended to meet in each county the requirements of higher education, just as the public schools in each section is established to furnish elementary instruction, and in this direction there are doing good work. The Minister's report contains a mass of interesting information respecting the Normal schools. No less than 8,022 Toronto Normal school pupils are enrolled, of whom 3,965 had been teachers. The position of the public educational institutions of the Province in 1878-79 was thus summarized:—The number of these institutions was 5,028; decrease 120; the whole number of students and pupils attending was 174,880; increase 5,001; the total amount expended for all educational purposes, \$3,523,841. Total amount available for educational purposes, \$3,822,374; decrease \$147,233. The growth of our educational system during the last thirty-five years has been steady and encouraging. In 1842, the number of Public Schools was only 1,721. In 1851, this had increased to 3,601; and in 1878, to 4,990; and the number of pupils attending them from 168,149 in 1851, to 439,015 in 1878. The amount paid for the purchase, erection, repairs of school-houses and for other purposes, of which there are no reports earlier than 1856, including the amount paid for the purchase, erection, repairs of school-houses and for other purposes, only \$55,735, and \$77,336 in 1851, but which in 1878 amounted to \$78,137, making the aggregate actual expenditure for Public Schools purposes in 1878, \$2,347,322. The results obtained from this expenditure have been fully commensurate with the outlay, and our Public School system, with the improvements which will doubtless be made annually therein, will continue to be regarded with pride and satisfaction by the people of this Province.—Mail.

NEW REGULATIONS.

The supplementary regulations for the inspection of weights and measures which have been decided upon as the result of Mr. Bab's personal inspection to the matter are a much greater advance towards a reasonable plan than has before been made, and if departmental officers are kept from interfering with the operations of the workshops in which weights and measures and weighing machines are made there will be little to complain of. Hitherto the manufacturers were not permitted to remove their weights or measures from their shops without having them verified and stamped, and for this they had to pay the fees. The hardship of this regulation was that the articles may remain in the hands of the dealers for many months after they are stamped, the fees in the

case being a loss to the makers and no benefit to the public. Under the new regulations it will be necessary to pay the fees until the weighing machine or measure is actually set to work for the purpose of trade, nor will it be necessary to have them verified and stamped, unless the manufacturer chooses. Should the manufacturer wish to have his weights and measures verified before leaving his factory, he may do so, and either pay the fees or postpone payment just as he chooses. The article so stamped is to bear the name of the maker, marked by which it can be identified. If the fees are paid a black stamp is affixed to the certificate of verification. If they are not paid, a red stamp is affixed. The article may then be removed from the factory to the store of the manufacturer, and the fees are to be paid when it goes into use. Under the old rules it frequently happened that the manufacturer had to pay the fees, and then when the new rules the work is to be done when he has finally adjusted them, and at any time after that which may be more convenient for him, and may then be taken down and packed. When the article is stamped and packed, the certificate of verification is to be affixed to the shop number, or other mark by which it may be identified, and also the words "fees paid" or "unpaid," as the case may be.

When a manufacturer wishes to remove weights or measures or weighing machines from his factory, he may do so on the following conditions: The article is to bear the name of the maker and the "consecutive number" which may be more convenient for him, and may then be taken down and packed. When the article is stamped and packed, the certificate of verification is to be affixed to the shop number, or other mark by which it may be identified, and also the words "fees paid" or "unpaid," as the case may be.

This is probably as far as the Minister could go with the law in present shape. Upon this point the Minister has not fully explained the intention of the clause bearing upon it. A simple plan, however, would be the repeal of the clause, and the substitution of one for one to weights, measures or weighing machines for the purpose of trade without having them inspected or stamped. Such articles cannot be used secretly and no man would run the risk of using unmarked scales. Still the modification now decided upon will be a great convenience to manufacturers, and will facilitate their business. With regard to imported scales, which were favored over the home-made ones, the Government has made the same provisions are made, the importer being substituted for the manufacturer. Sections 8 and 9.—Grading on these sections is three-fourths completed. The work is being done on the line, but Messrs. Stewart and Edgington have thus far performed their work very creditably. There are some very fine stone-work on the culverts. Track-laying will commence on time.

Sections 10, 11 and 12.—Messrs. Rogers and Kennerly have their work more than four or five bridges on this contract. At Hanover Falls there is a very heavy bridge, the best cut on the line is also at this point.

Sections 13, 14 and 15.—More work was done on this contract during December. Sections 22, 23 and 24.—Mr. James Allen has heavy work on these sections. The cuttings are very heavy and there is a large amount of chopping, grading, &c. The work will be well in a considerable portion of his contract graded, and the line thence is rapid progress con-

sidering the fact that section 24 was located only a few days ago.

The Company deserve great praise for the energetic manner in which they are pushing their road forward to completion, and judging from the amount of work already done, we think the contractors are all in good lands.

A PRODIGIOUS GRAIN BLOCKADE.

An unprecedented situation at Chicago, Jan. 10.—A grain blockade of prodigious proportions is now in progress at this market. The elevators of the city, which contains an aggregate of sixteen millions of bushels, are being nearly filled, and are refusing to receive grain for this market, because, when it arrives, there is no room for it. The grain is piled up along the tracks in the city loaded with grain, unable to deposit. There are in storage fourteen and a half million bushels of grain, and millions at this time late year. The explanation is that the Grain Syndicate, which keeps in the representative, have had the option for some time, to raise the price of wheat in this city to a point where it cannot be shipped to New York, nor from New York to Liverpool. Farmers are unable to market their grain, although prices are satisfactory. The outcome of this unprecedented situation will be watched with much interest.
