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
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

Discusses the Government and the Manitoba School Question.

Deploring the Creed War aroused by Tory Dishonesty.

When the house was moved into comttee of ways and means on the afternoon of the 15th inst., Mr. Laurier began his speech by describing the Manitoba school question as a perplexing one. The reason for the resignation of the Quebec ministers was not as Mr. Foster had described it, "A misunderstanding," but a want of confidence in the sincerity of the government. The proper word to describe the crisis was not "misunderstanding," but "mistrust." (Cheers)

There was foundation for this mistrust-The nights and days of the government were haunted by the demon of vacillation. Lord Salisbury and his Tory govern ment are having it all their own way in the elections, and have already a majority of parliament outside of Chamberlain and his fellow-Unionists. Since our last issue there have been a few notable defeats and victories in the contest. Hon. Edward Blake, the well known Canadian, is returned for South Longford without opposition, and Justin McCarthy received the same courtesy in North Longford. H. Rider Haggard, the popular fiction writer, met defeat in East Norfolk as a Unionist, although he pulled the Liberal majority down over two hundred, and General Laurie was successful in Pembroke and Haverford, winning a seat for the government. General Laurie is well known in Canada. A Crimean hero, he came to Halifax at the close of the war as deputy adjutant general of Nova Scotia. Here he married a rich wife, daughter of the late Enos Collins, and settled down to scientific farming at Oakfield, a short distance up the I. C. R. from Halifax. He took a very warm interest in agriculture, especially in the breeding of thoroughbred cattie, and his herd of Shorthorns was well known all over Canada. General Laurie was in Fredericton at the exhibition of 1878 and had his herd with him. He was twice elected to represent Shelburne, N.S., in the Canadian House of Commons, but he did not cut much of a figure there. He tried for a seat in the English House last election, but was defeated by the man over whom he triumphed last week. In Mr. Blake and General Laurie, Canada will have two warm friends in the new Imperial Parliament.

The defeat of John Morley, late Chief Secretary for Ireland, is almost as great a blow to the Liberals as Sir Vernon Harcourt's rout.
