Thousands are homeless, and outbreaks of fire occurred in many towns and villages, and great destruction has been caused by the upheaval.



Canadian even more than Newfoundland fishing interests are watching closely the fishing experiments being carried on by the Booth Fisheries Co. in Newfoundland waters just now. It is understood the big concern has set aside \$25,000 for these experiments. The company is using three fishing vessels, the Elva L. Spurling, a gasoline power craft; the Edward Black and the Ida Campbell. The Spurling has cruised the Banks from Ramea to Port au Port, seeking cod and halibut; the Edward Black direct from Portland recently, was sent to Bonne Bay and further north on similar quest, and the Campbell is at Bay of 'Islands gill net fishing.

A. W. Piccott, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, recently returned from a visit to the Booth fishing fleet. He is eager, it is said, to see the operations of the Booth concern extended to Nova Scotia waters. The Spurling landed him at Port aux Basques and forwarded her catch of halibut in cold storage cars to Boston, Mass. It is probable another month of experimenting will be required, according to Minister Piccott, before the company reaches a decision about continuing fishing in these waters on a large scale. Capt. O'Neil, master of the Spurling, is said to have jigged halibut in 15 fathoms of water at Port au Port with a handline from the ship's deck, and brought up specimens close of the meeting a well-known politician. notorious for having weighing 250 pounds. 
