CRIME IN WAR TIME. The records of the twelve London Metropolitan Police Courts, of Quarter ssions, and of the Ceneral Criminal Court all go to prove that crime has materially decreased in London during the war. Serious crimes and felonies have been reduced by roughly two-fifths, and the work of administering the criminal law would have undergone an extraordinary slump new, and the increase of certain es tablished, types of offences. Within the former come cases under alien and restrictive regulations, and among the latter are the unusually large number of bigamy cases. Rival claims for separate allowance, one by the first and legal and the other by the second and present "wife," are the cause of most of the bigamy cases being brought to light. At Scotland Yard (the headquarters of the police force here) the war has brought great changes. Formerly the strictly criminal work of the Criminal Investigation Department dominated its activities; to-day it is the "special branch" that claims first place, for on this department falls the difficult work of constant surveillance over suspected spies, controlling enemy aliens, and keeping under observation suspected persons who, given the opportunity, might be ready to act as enemy agents. To-day Scotland Yard is the handmaid of "Dora"—the police abbreviation for the Defence of the Realm Act and its innumerable regulations. This is the day of the linguist at the Yard. Through him and the perusal of opened foreign mails plots are quashed in the making, and the originators and agents of many an enemy device never even get into contact.

One or two are still making a brave display with a wide range of qualities and colors, but others have not recovered from the raid made on them during the sales when people realised that it was their silk departments. One or two are still when people realised that it was their last chance of getting silks at any-thing like the old prices. Now those shops are facing the continued heavy demand for charmeuses, heavy silks and crepes de Chine with the vaguest idea of the supplies they will be able to command, but certain that prices, which are already 25 to 30 per cent. above last year's, will make another very big advance before the winter. Taffeta silk is still to be had at reasonable if increased prices and in good colors, and because the dyes are purer and the dressing less metallic than formerly these silks are recommended for hard wear. Charmeuses and crepes de Chine which comes from France and Italy are affected not only by the 50 per cent. restriction on importation but by the scarcity of the very skilled workmen required for their tricky manufacture. All the heavy qualities of Japanese silk have been commandeered by the Government, who need them for aeroplanes and other very important and crepes de Chine with the vaguest aeroplanes and other very important services. England is now making fine crepes de Chine and admirable lingerie crepes of pure silk, while Scotland has just enered the market with a first delivery of silk crepe. The artificial silks in bright, clean colors, eo popular for sports coats, are English made, but the price is increasing rapidly with the difficulty of getting the wood pulp from which they are with a first delivery of silk crepe. A steam trawler working in Icelandic waters frequently takes on a three weeks' voyage from seventy to ninety tons of haddock, cod, plaice, codfish and the like. The offal taken therefrom would amount to from forty to fifty barrels of livers alone, each barrel weighing from 5 cwt. to 6 cwt. Under present arrangements these are the property of the crew, and are known as stock bait. The normal price fetched is 12s. per barrel; now from 20s. to 25s. The latest developments include the splitting and curing of the fish at sea, during the voyage, sometimes extending to eight weeks. The livers are separated and melted to oil: all heads, bones and offal are made into manure; even the skins have a commercial value; and

not a particle of the catch is wasted. The amount of oil and manure landed from one trawler is from 500 to ,000 gallons of the former, and from ten to twenty tons of the latter, while the amount of salt fish landed is between 150 and 250 tons.
