The Regulations have prejudiced our customers in the Mediterranean. These Regulations were started in the wrong way and at the wrong time. We should have waited until the fish was standardized and then we would have something upon which to demand a fixed price At the same time I believe price fixing by law is unworkable and impossible to carry out. Hon. Mr. Gibbs announcement that supply and demand had been exploded is false. The law still holds good in the markets of the world. Are not the stock exchanges always regulating prices according to supply and demand. Another item of importance to us is transportation. Adequate facilities for handling and a proper premises to receive freight is an important feature, and is equally so with the ships controlled by the Government themselves.





Situation Never so Serious De clares Wholesale Dealers Who Issues Sharp Warning to Ontario,-Shortage of Ten Millions of Bituous Exists in the United States Get Coal Where You Can is The Advice to Consumers.

TORONTO, April 8.

(by Canadian Associated Press).—
The coal situation never was so bad as at present according to Geore H.
Cushing managing director of the American Wholesale Coal Dealers Association, who addressed the Toronto Wholesale Coal Dealers Association at a banquet here to-day.

There is a shortage of 10,000,000 tons of bituminous coal in the United States, Mr. Cushing said. Inadequate transportation facilities had caused the shortage he stated and what was needed was more motive power, rather

the shortage he stated and what was needed was more motive power, rather than more railway cars.

The buying of coal for consumption in the Middle Westeren States is just beginning and will be heavier later on, Mr. Cushing said. The Eastern operators are going to send coal to tidewater for export purposes and are going to find that only four per cent. is wanted. The result will be, in his opinion, that the people of Ontario opinion, that the people of Ontario are going to be between the blockade at tidewater and the congested area

in the Western States.

My advice to you, he added, is to watch for these periods and get coal

watch for these periods and get coal when you can.
Widely fluctuating prices between Eastern and Western American points were predicted by Mr. Cushing. Although stating that he did not think any decent man would attempt to justify the present prices of coal. Mr. Cushing held out no hope for an improvement in coal prices and said he did not think anyone would ever see the prices go down again to where they were before the recent advances.

(The advice to get coal where and when you can, applies equally to Newfoundland this year.—Ed.)

Lipton Will Use

SHAMROCK IV IN CUP RACE.

London, April 17.—Regarding the statement that in the event of the Shamrock III, proving faster than the challenger, Shamrock IV in the trials, he would ask the New York Yacht Club to be allowed to substitute the boat for America's Cup. Sir Thomas Lipton declared to the Associated Press yesterday.

"I have never dreamed of suggesting such a course. I am fully aware that having challenged with the Shamrock IV. I cannot race any other boat against the American defending yacht, without issuing another challenge in accordance with the rules covering the contest."

New York, April 17.-The 21 meter yacht Shamrock which Sir Thomas Lipton will use in the trial races against his Shamrock IV preliminary to the America's cup races, sailed from Southampton April 8, for New York, Colonel Neillside, of the British sportsman announced upon his arrival here vesterday on the steam ship Adriatic.

Fighting H. C. L.

(From the Sydney Record.) The "Overall Clubs" in some American states have been formed in an effort to pull down the cost of living. The example is being followed in North Sydney. The theory is that a lessened use of ordinary suits will help to enable supply to catch up to demand and so to bring prices down and, in the second place, that any merchants that have been asking excessive praces for suits which they have in stock will be glad enough to cut down the profit and price when they find the goods staying on shelves and hangers, because men are substituting overalls and old coats for new suits. But what is to happen to overall prices in these American states? If demand for overalls catches up on supply, or if there are profiteers among overall dealers, a further upward trend in the prices of these goods will follow. Moreover, the maker of suits will scarcely op-erate his factory to capacity and so pile up a surplus stock, at a time when production costs are high, if demand shows signs of slackening off; on the contrary, if his plant is suited to the work at all, he is more likely to add overall-making, to his undertakings. In that case, perhaps, there would be a check to rising overall cost, but what of the price of suits since suit production would have been
