

THE SHOE MEN.

**Royal Authors.**

The Queen of Roumania, who is rehearsing her own play, is the latest in a long list of Royal writers which includes David at one end of time and George V. of England at the other.

And between the reputed psalms of King David and the collected speeches of King George there are to be found royal writers dabbling in every kind of authorship from classical poetry to "ad." writing.

James I. of Scotland, who wrote a poem that has become a classic, occupies naturally the most considerable place in literature. On his way to France to be educated he was captured, and held prisoner in England for eighteen years. His captivity was not too rigorous and gave him opportunity to read Dan Chaucer and to fall in love with Lady Joan Beaufort, a combination of events that made literature the richer by his finely wrought love poem, "The King's Quair."

His household, too, was a nest of royal singing birds. Three of his six daughters became famous; Marguerite, married to a neglected Dauphin, wrote "Fragon, roudeux"; Isabel, Duchess of Braganza, wrote a fine elegy on Marguerite's death; whilst Eleanor, who married an Austrian archduke, became the accepted model for German authors by her translation into the vernacular of an old French romance.

It must not be forgotten, too, that the first English prose writer was a king; Alfred was his name. Asser his tutor, and Winchester his scriptorium. Eight centuries lapse into limbo before we reach the royal

Negotiations for Conference Being Conducted.

Cabinet and Sinn Fein Heads May Meet in London -- Sensational Correspondence Published in White Book--Rothermere Condemns Battleship Building--Lord Burnham Next Governor General of Canada.

CONTACT ESTABLISHED.

DUBLIN, Jan. 8. Influences at work to establish contact between the Cabinet and Sinn Fein have at last been successful. Documents are now in existence which give up a definite possibility of a conference between the two parties.

SINN FEIN M.P.'S HAVE BEEN IN CONFERENCE.

LONDON, Jan. 8. Authorities here believe a conference has already been held of all Sinn Fein M.P.'s who were able to attend and that their attitude toward the Government was that they could not enter into negotiations in the absence of their fellow members who are under ban of the law.

CORRESPONDENCE PUBLISHED.

LONDON, Jan. 9. Correspondence which passed between the German Embassy at Washington and the Foreign Office of Berlin in which the names of a number of Irish Americans are mentioned to be the active connection between the Sinn Fein and the Government during the war was published in the Daily News yesterday.

D.I.S. CO. REDUCE WAGES.

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 9. Twenty per cent. cut in wages effective January seventeenth is announced by the Dominion Iron and Steel Company here. The reduction will affect approximately five thousand men of whom about twenty hundred are temporarily laid off.

D'ANNUNZIO'S INTENTIONS.

TRIESTE, Jan. 8. Gabriele D'Annunzio intends to remain in Fiume, it is alleged. This statement is based largely on reports he has sent to Venice for a large wardrobe of Italian clothes and he has requisitioned one of the largest villas in Fiume.

ARMENIANS BEING DEMOBILIZED.

LONDON, Jan. 8. Demobilization of the entire Armenian army is being carried out by Soviets of Erivan, according to the Times. The intention is said to be a fundamental reorganization of the Republican forces.

REGINA, Jan. 8.

Fire from unknown cause completely destroyed the junction garage at Nokomis, Sas., with an estimated loss of three hundred thousand dollars. Twelve autos and a large number of accessories were lost in the blaze.

AN OFFICIAL DENIAL.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. The Navy Department Saturday afternoon issued an official denial of a report from Ottawa that the United States naval balloons, who landed in Northern Ontario and are now making their way back to the railway line, will be placed under arrest when they reach the United States for making an unauthorized trip.

THE MEXICAN FINANCIAL CRISIS.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 8. Leading bankers declared here today to a correspondent of the Associated Press that "the backbone of the financial crisis has been broken."

TWO DIE FOLLOWING BLOOD TREATMENT.

TORONTO, Jan. 9. Two Toronto women after receiving special blood treatment from Dr. J. M. McConnell at his office Saturday afternoon collapsed and died within fifteen minutes of each other. The women were Mrs. Emily Bond, Sunnyside Street, Toronto, and Miss Monica Kenney, Palmer Avenue. Miss Kenney was the first to collapse.

TODAY'S MESSAGES.

LORD DECIES HAS HOPES. BERLIN, Jan. 9. The first candidate, publicly to offer himself for election to the Southern Irish Parliament, is Lord Decies, who has written a letter for publication to-morrow in Irish newspapers, in which he admits that the Home Rule Act is far from perfect, but says it represents a gift of self-government, which is ours for the asking.

INDIAN OFFICIAL'S ADVICE. LONDON, Jan. 9. Sir Michael O'Dwyer, until recently Director of the Important Punjab Province of India, in an article in the Times concerning unrest in India, which has taken the form of Government demands, strikes, and seditious propaganda, declares this much at least as to be satisfied, certainly, that the present extremist movement is heading straight for disorganization of trade and commerce, for the ruin of every British interest, and for the overthrow of the British Government. He states that the time for trying with patience in this vast empire has long since passed, and that if Britain would restore India the law must rigorously and impartially be enforced irrespective of persons, caste or class.

EXCELLENT PROSPECTS FOR SNUTS.

LONDON, Jan. 9. The special correspondent of the Sunday Observer, writing on the approaching elections in South Africa, points out that fully a hundred thousand electors mostly from Urban districts, obtained from voting in the elections last March, and says that the issue is clearly defined before the country. He is convinced there will be such a rally to General Smuts as will carry him to victory, and South Africa to an immediately prosperous future.

SINN FEINERS SENTENCED.

CARRIGILLMORE, Ireland, Jan. 9. Sixty Sinn Feiners, charged with breaking up a meeting at Carrigillmore, were sentenced to six months hard labor by the Military Court here. Twenty others were sentenced to three months of the same charge.

READING FOR VICEROY.

LONDON, Jan. 9. An extraordinary precedent is being created by the vacation, by Lord Reading, of the Lord Chief Justiceship to become Viceroy of India. A writer in the Sunday Observer, the leading Sunday paper, believes the sequence will make his career comparable with that of Lord Balfour. The notion that Mohammedans or Hindus prefer Christians, and reject Jews, is described, as crude error.

CLYNES HOWLED DOWN.

LONDON, Jan. 9. John Robert Clynes, Labor Member of Parliament for Manchester, former Food Controller, and President of the National Union of General Workers, was howled down today while attempting to address a meeting of unemployed at Cambwell. He was obliged to desert, a large section of the audience shouting "We want revolution: We want Soviet."

SERIOUS EFFECT OF STRIKE.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 9. A deadlock in the shipping strike continues, and is having serious effects. No trains or trams are running here or at Perth on Sunday, owing to the necessity of economizing in coal. A motor launch, which yesterday excursionists aboard, sunk yesterday in the Hopkins River at Warranvool, Victoria. Twelve persons were drowned.

SINN FEIN M.P. ARRESTED.

BELFAST, Jan. 9. Troops at Derry to-day surrounded the residence of Jos. O'Doherty, Sinn Fein Member of Parliament, and arrested him. He will be interned. Two previous raids on his home were without result.

NEGOTIATIONS BROKEN DOWN.

DUBLIN, Jan. 9. It reports in official circles are to be credited, all negotiations looking to peace in Ireland have broken down. Definite information is lacking, but it is said that Lloyd George

has definitely refused to consider Sinn Fein's proposals for the withdrawal of the Home Rule Bill. Officials here take a gloomy view of the situation. Increased activity, recently, on the part of military and Republicans in martial law areas, is considered as indicating an extension of guerrilla warfare.

PLACED GUARD ON STEAMER.

QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, Jan. 9. On the arrival here to-day from New York of the United States steamer Honolulu, with a cargo of provisions on board, for relief of the unemployed in Cork, the authorities placed an armed guard on the vessel. Notwithstanding the protest of the captain the guard remained on the steamer, which has proceeded to cork.

TO RESTORE DUTY ON FISH.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Jan. 9. Representatives of fishing interests in the city were being sounded out to-day to obtain their views of prospects to restore the import duty on fish. Committees, representing fish exchange, vessel owners' Association, and Master Mariners Association, held an informal conference last night, at which it was apparently agreed that the tax on both fresh and salt fish from freight vessels should be asked of Congress, and it was stated that a definite programme would be prepared after the committee men had an opportunity to report back to their organizations.

AT NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. Captain George Dawe and crew of the Newfoundland coaster Euphrates, which was abandoned on January 3 after a five days fight with heavy seas, arrived here to-day on steamship Galilee, from Antwerp. The Euphrates, which sailed from Bell Island, Nfld., for St. John's on December 27, sank after her crew had been taken off by men from the Galilee.

CROWN FORCES AMBUSHED.

DUBLIN, Jan. 9. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Dublin, says it is rumored that Crown forces have been ambushed at Duncannon, County Meath, on the border of Dublin County. The despatch adds that operations appear to have been extended over a wide area from Leixlip, in the East, through Cellbridge, Maynooth and Kirocock, at all of which places road bridges are reported to have been destroyed to hinder troops in the west. There has been no official confirmation of the rumors as all wires in the districts concerned have been cut.

SPANISH WARSHIP ASHORE.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Jan. 9. The Spanish warship Espana, of fifteen thousand tons, on which the Spanish delegation to the Magellan celebration voyaged to Chile, is aground in the Gulf of Ancud, off Puerto Monto, according to advices to the Ministry of Interior.

DANGERS OF EMIGRATION.

LONDON, Jan. 9. Another warning has been issued by the British Foreign Office, regarding emigration to South and Central America without ample means or definite guarantee of employment. This warning has been prompted by the failure of another South American immigration scheme, necessitating the repatriation of more than two hundred British subjects from Peru, where they had emigrated in the last six months, as a result of offers by the Peruvian Government of free passage and employment upon arrival.

LUCKY LLOYD GEORGE.

LONDON, Jan. 9. Lloyd George has taken formal possession, during the week end, of Chequer Court, at Aylesbury, Bucks, which is to be the official country residence of the Prime Minister. The

ROYAL APPROVAL GIVEN.

LONDON, Jan. 10. Lord Reading's appointment as Viceroy of India will become effective on April 1. The royal approval has been given.

CAUSED A RIOT.

TARANZO, Italy, Jan. 10. Arrival of Puglian Legionaries yesterday, provoked a manifestation which ended in a riot. One person was wounded and numerous arrests were made.

ROYAL NUPTIALS.

TURIN, Jan. 10. The marriage of Princess Bona, third child of the Duke of Genoa, to her cousin, Prince Conrad, nephew of the late King of Bavaria, and son of the Prince Leopold, was celebrated Saturday in the presence of a great gathering of Royalty.

HARDING RESIGNS AS SENATOR.

MARION, Ohio, Jan. 10. President-elect Harding yesterday resigned as United States Senator from Ohio, forwarding his letter to Columbus for action of the newly elected Republican Governor, Harry J. Davis, who assumes office to-day.

NOT SATISFACTORY.

LONDON, Jan. 10. The conference between Rev. Michael O'Flanagan, Acting President of Sinn Fein, and Premier Lloyd George, with a view to bringing about peace in Ireland, has been broken off, and will not be resumed. The Daily Mail, before Father O'Flanagan returned to Ireland, Friday, he had a long conversation with the Premier and the outcome is said to be described in official circles as "not as satisfactory as could be hoped." Negotiations have not altogether broken down, the newspaper adds.

GOT AWAY WITH IT.

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 10. Six men, armed with rifles, and travelling in two automobiles, held up a west side export liquor house at Carleton Place, near the border, and escaped with sixty cases of whisky.

CHINA WILL APOLOGIZE.

TOKYO, Jan. 10. Japan and China have concluded an agreement closing the incident at Nikolaievsk, Siberia, last spring, when a Chinese warship fired on Japanese subjects during the fighting with Russian partisans. The Chinese Government and officers of the warship will apologize, and China will pay thirty thousand yen compensation, according to newspapers here.

TURKS WANT AINTAB.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 10. Turks are reported to have made several attacks in an attempt to regain Aintab, and the French are said to be withdrawing to stronger positions, preparatory to a counter attack.

BRITISH COLORS IN NEW YORK CHURCH.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. Paded, century and a half old regimental colors of the King's Royal Rifle, originally the Royal American Regiment, were presented yesterday by the British Army to Trinity Church, in which officers and men of the regiment worshipped in pre-revolutionary days.

Masons Initiate Pres.-Elect Harding.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 8.—President-elect Harding became a 32nd degree mason to-night at the end of a 12-hour initiation ceremony here, participated in by ranking officials of the order from all parts of the United States. Starting as a master mason, the President-elect was raised through the other twenty-eight degrees at a continuous sitting arranged for his particular accommodation. He was the third chosen chief executive to travel through the higher degrees of Masonry before the Scioto Valley consistory, James A. Garfield and Wm. McKinley having been given their thirty-second degrees here. At the conclusion of the ceremony late to-night Mr. Harding was presented with a masonic ring given by the thirty-second degree masons of Marion, his home town, who had occupied posts of honor in the institution.

Moral and Immoral Dancing.

It is not only what Henry James calls an "acute spasm of the moral sense" that has stirred a Wesleyan minister of Montreal to preach a crusade against modern dances. What the minister rather aptly calls "excitement" is a malady that may well find a congenial atmosphere in the places where the less comely of these dances vail. The least Puritan of us will confess that some modern dances are all silly, some as ugly, some as degrading, as the crudity of their names would imply. But however naughty a bad dance may be, dancing in itself is perhaps the most natural and earliest of all ways of expressing that desirable thing, "the rhythm of life," and to condemn what Corney Grant used to call "the unculturing of the waltz"—his had "not been encephaled for many years"—is to condemn a natural art, a beneficent social influence, and a most proper amusement. It would be as wise to condemn music, once almost inseparable from the sister art of dancing.
