### Another Secret Treaty.

Follows Example of France--Irish Free State Elections Next Month--Republican Forces Raid Bank of Ireland--Contending Factions May Effect Reconciliation.

**ELECTIONS EARLY IN JUNE**  
DUBLIN, May 2.—Returning officer for the South-Ireland elections has announced the elections directed to be held early in June.

**MAKES SECRET AGREEMENT.**  
LONDON, May 2.—The Pall Mall Gazette and Globe today it has just learned that Italy, following France's example, has made a political pact with the Turkish Nationalist Government at Ankara and Great Britain's back. "A full picture of this has only just been said in the newspaper, though it has been suspected for some time. Consequences are likely to be serious."

**BANKS RAIDED.**  
LONDON, May 2.—Several branches of the Bank of Ireland were raided by the disaffected of the Irish Republican Army today. The sums taken are not known in four cases, but it is reported others yielded nearly 100,000. The raiders gave receipts for amounts taken.

**RUSSIAN OIL AGREEMENT.**  
LONDON, May 1.—A Russian industrial agreement was signed on Sunday at Genoa by representatives of the Russia Soviet Government and the Shell group of British oil companies, says the Genoa correspondent of the Evening News. Under the agreement, he writes, the Shell group will control all sales and, under certain conditions, all productions of oil in every part of Russia for an agreed period. The concession may be renewed by mutual consent. Fifty per cent of the net profits will be allotted to the Soviet Government and fifty to the Shell group. Working of the oil fields will be administered by the British companies under provisions of the Russian jurisdiction code, and the proviso that no more than fifty per cent of the workers shall be foreigners. The Shell Combine have arranged to apply the agreement, almost immediately to the Caspian fields, taking charge of the pipe line from Baku to Batum, and also to develop vast potential fields in the Uralak Province. Leonid Krassin, Soviet Minister of Trade and Commerce, signed the agreement, the decision to sign being reached, says the despatch, only after the Russians, on several occasions, had played off various groups against one another to obtain better offers for the privileges, involving millions of pounds worth of output from the oil fields, which, next to those of the United States, are the most prolific in the world. It is more than possible, adds the correspondent,

that difficult complications may result over working the important area in which the Standard Oil Company had concessions, prior to Soviet nationalization of the fields.

**U.S. TRADE WITH CANADA.**  
WASHINGTON, May 2.—American exports to Canada during March were \$45,000,000 against \$49,000,000 for March 1921; the imports were \$26,000,000 compared with \$31,000,000.

**WHEAT STARTING WELL.**  
WINNIPEG, May 2.—Wheat is three inches above the ground in some parts of Southern Manitoba.

**AGREEMENT DENIED.**  
LONDON, May 2.—The Genoa correspondent of the London Evening News quotes Colonel Boyle, representing the Shell group of British Oil Companies and the Royal Dutch interests here, as denying that an industrial agreement has been signed here between those interests and the Russian Soviet Government, as has been reported. Reuter's correspondent here says the Russian delegation to the Economic Conference also flatly denied having made any concessions to Shell interests.

**A RECONCILIATION MOVE.**  
DUBLIN, May 2.—Southern Ireland to-day awaited the first results of a definite move to unite the contending military factions, taken at an unheralded conference here yesterday. Ten army officers, five of them members of the dissenting section of the Irish Republican Army, signed a statement agreeing to army unification on the basis of holding elections with a view to forming a Government, which will have the confidence of the whole country and recognition of "the fact, admitted on all sides, that the majority of the people of Ireland are willing to accept the Peace Treaty." These signing for the regular army included Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government, and Richard Mulcahy, Minister of Defence in the Dail. Rory O'Connor, head of the revolting section of the army, declared that the signers from his forces were minor officers, but in other quarters it is stated that each one held the rank of General. O'Connor did not indicate either approval or disapproval, but indicated that he might have made a statement after considering the documents in detail.

### English Wine Week.

VINTAGES NOW WITHIN REACH OF ALL.  
LONDON (Associated Press).—English palates, long noted for their appreciation of fine old wines, are in danger of deterioration because of the lower price of vintages, according to a group of prominent wine merchants who propose an English "wine week" in emulation of the French custom. Wine, they declare, is no longer a luxury as the lower price has brought it within reach of all. The purposes of wine week, it is said, will be to educate the English taste for wines and also to instruct diners in the elementary rules and traditional usages of beverage selections. It is planned to gather a representative group of speakers and writers to sing the praises of wine, and to tell those who would learn how to drink it. The merchants expect substantial assistance from the governments of wine producing countries, such as France, Italy, Spain and Australia.

LINGUALISTIC COPS WANTED IN ARGENTINA.  
BUENOS AIRES (Associated Press).—Globe trotters who have acquired two or three languages in their wanderings and who would like to settle down to steady jobs, will be heartily welcomed by the Chief of Police of Buenos Aires. This city has become so cosmopolitan that the police force decided to muster in a large number of linguists as patrolmen, but discovered there were not sufficient men here to complete the personnel. Declining to invite foreigners to apply for the jobs, the authorities have specified that applicants must speak

two foreign languages and be willing to become citizens of Argentina. As part of his uniform, each member of the linguistic squad wears on his sleeve a flag of the country whose language he speaks, with corresponding inscriptions such as "Je parle francais," "Ich sprech Deutsch," "Io parlo Italiano" and "I speak English." Some of the men wear as many as seven placques.

### "Cruelty" in Army To Be Retained

Howard in introducing the measure said that the practice was destructive to discipline, but Sir Robert Saunders, Under-Secretary for War, opposed the amendment, saying that he didn't think it would be wise for the House to impose their opinion on the men who had the responsibility of maintaining discipline. Earl Haig and Sir William Robertson, former Chief of Staff, favored the retention of the "cruelty", which consists of tying the offender to a cart wheel by his legs and arms.

### The Pride of Bath.

In the 18th Century, when Bath had reached the zenith of its fame and allurements, among the beautiful women who flocked from all parts of the West in search of pleasure and conquest, there was none more lovelier than Elizabeth Ann Linley, daughter of Thomas Linley, a singing master, and organizer of the concerts in the Assembly Rooms. Indeed the fame of her beauty and her voice had spread beyond the Great West country town in which she was born on May 3, 1730.

George III. summoned her to his London palace, and was greatly moved by her beauty and gift of song. The Bishop of Meath declared that she was "the link between an angel and a woman; while Dr. Charles Burney, supreme musician and father of the more famous Madams D'Arblay, was enchanted with her voice. Gainsborough and Reynolds immortalized her in two of their most inspired canvases—the latter as Cecilia.

It was inevitable that a girl so richly endowed should have no lack of lovers, and every gallant who came to Bath hastened to avail the fortune. But she turned a deaf ear to all until the appearance of Richard Brinsley Sheridan, who loved Elizabeth in secret, but did not reveal his affection until the arrival at Bath of a Major Matthews, a handsome rogue, with a large rent roll, who fell in love with the girl at first sight. He began to persecute Elizabeth so much with his attentions that she appealed to Sheridan to help her. This young lover was only too willing, and conceived a cunning plot. Ostensibly as an escort he arranged to get her away. After a brief stay in London a boat was taken to Dunkirk and the journey continued towards Lille. Now that he had the girl in his power Sheridan demanded that she marry him to save her fair name. Elizabeth had no alternative and she found herself standing at the altar of a village church, with an accommodating priest speaking the words that made them one. The honeymoon was but a few days old, however, when Elizabeth's father appeared on the scene, and indignantly carried off his runaway daughter leaving the bridegroom to follow ignominiously in her wake. Arriving at Bath, the irate Major met Sheridan, and challenged him to a duel. The rivals met on Claverton Downs, and Sheridan was left unconscious and apparently dying. Elizabeth, however, was soon on the scene, and had him conveyed to an inn, and there nursed him back to

health. Mr. Linley remained obdurate for a long time, but such love as theirs could not fail to triumph in the end and the capitulation of the father followed eventually.

### The Law of Gambling.

#### SOME POINTS IN RELATION THERETO.

London, April 22. (Canadian Press)—So many disputes have arisen over the betting laws and so many cases have been aired in the courts since the famous decision of the House of Lords last fall to the effect that money paid by check in respect of betting transactions is legally recoverable by the loser, a recent lecture in this city on "Some points in relation to the law of gambling" attracted a great deal of interest and seemed to make some crooked paths straight. The lecturer, Ward Coleridge, K. C., is a prominent member of the London Bar, and Justice Eve, who presided, characterized man's propensity to bet on a horse race as "harmless; fundamental instinct in human nature." Mr. Coleridge cleverly condensed 300 years' enactments and legal rulings as to wagers into four tabloids as the present standing of the law. These are:—

1. The loser who pays the winner of a wager in cash cannot recover.
2. The loser who pays the winner by cheque can recover from the winner.
3. If the loser gives his agent a cheque to recoup him for a payment which the agent has made to the winner on behalf of the loser, the loser cannot recover the amount of the cheque from the agent.
4. Any bona-fide holder for value of a cheque given him for a bet can recover from the drawer, but if he has not had notice that the cheque is in consideration of a wagering transaction he cannot recover.

#### MUCH LEGISLATION BUT FEW RESULTS.

Mr. Coleridge began his lecture with reference to the restrictive legislation instituted in various directions in the reign of Henry VIII, which, though tightened to a staggering extent by Queen Anne in 1710, were still insufficient to stamp out wagering. Statutes of George II. added to the betting restrictions, and subsequent legislation right down to the present century with its crop of famous cases and contradictory judgments, has been pointed out by Mr. Coleridge in a reference to *Sutton v. Briggs*, on which the House of Lords gave the decision with regard to the recovery of betting money paid by cheque. This case was since cited by Justice Astbury in another betting transaction which was being tried in court. It was James Sutton, a commission agent who took the question to the House of Lords in an appeal against a judgement whereby he was ordered to repay S. R. Briggs of Harringway, £20 lost on a bet paid by cheque.

Justice Eve in responding to a vote of thanks for presiding at Mr. Coleridge's lecture, said: "Many of the undesirable aspects of wagering are due to the way it is hedged about. The charwoman and the coalheaver will have their little wager, and it would be much better if they were allowed freedom to do so and to pay up if they lose."

#### Go to Church or Pay Fine

##### A DOUBTFUL WAY OF RAISING REVENUE.

LONDON. (Associated Press).—The alternative of going to church on Sunday or paying a fine is suggested by the Rev. Robert Forman Horton, one of England's most noted non-conformist ministers, as a means of raising sufficient revenue "to run the country without plunging it into bankruptcy." Such legislation, he declares, would net £20,000,000 a year. Dr. Horton's suggestion is said to be based on a law passed in the reign of Edward VI. when anyone absenting himself from church "without lawful or reasonable excuse" was fined one shilling.

The law was repealed, but re-enacted and rigidly enforced in subsequent reigns.

#### WEEKDAY SERVICES BLANK.

The 50 or more churches in the square mile around the Bank of England contained full congregations on those days, but few persons enter them on weekdays now except American tourists, and the Sunday congregations, Dr. Horton declares, "do not exceed a baker's dozen." The Bishop of London has even gone so far as to suggest that some of them be demolished and the valuable sites sold to provide funds with which churches could be built in other parts of the city. This suggestion brought a deluge of complaints upon the Bishop, but strange to say, they were not from persons identified with church affairs. Almost without exception they came from financiers, who maintained that the sight of these old churches served a very good purpose in softening the hearts of "money-grubbing crowds" who gazed upon them as they hurried by.

### Converting Rubles Into Diamonds.

BALES OF SOVIET CURRENCY BEING SPENT.  
ODESSA (A. S. Mail).—The price of diamonds is soaring so rapidly here and in Moscow that German jewelers who spent huge sums buying up collections from the impoverished Russian nobility are now back in Russia selling their wares at double the prices they asked in Germany. The diamond market owes its raise to the scramble of traders and merchants to get rid of their rubles. Never sure of the value paper money will have from day to day, they literally invest bales of Soviet currency in precious stones. Good diamonds sell for about \$200 a carat and those of inferior quality bring from \$20 to \$40 a carat. The recent heavy trade in these stones has resulted in many false diamonds being offered on the market. Levantine traders operating from Black Sea ports are said to be responsible for bringing these imitations to Russia.

### Allenby of Megiddo.

General Allenby, when made a peer in recognition of his achievement as Deliverer of the Holy Land, took the title of "Lord Allenby of Megiddo" or Armageddon. He may come into another distinction as liberator of Egypt. He was recently pictured by a Times artist as if pondering over the riddle of Egypt, figured by the Sphinx in the background. It is characteristic of Allenby to take time to think his riddles through, and then to execute his decisions swiftly. In Palestine his plans for advance in the spring of 1918 were suddenly interrupted by

the withdrawal of some of his troops to the western front. But he soon developed a new army with such thoroughness of discipline and strategy that when he suddenly did strike, as was said by the London Times after the battle of Armageddon (which made it impossible for the Turk to continue in the war,) he achieved with artistic completeness a military conception unsurpassed in the brilliancy of its plan. So consummate was his success, that it has been called the battle of dreams, because all that the soldier dreamed came true to the last detail. It is too soon to say that Lord Allenby has guessed the riddle of Egypt. He has acted with such decision in

trading self-seeking demagogues, with such consideration and sense of justice in meeting those who have the good of the Egyptian people really at heart, and with such straightforwardness and honor in everything, that it seems probable he has either divined out of his experience or discovered in the Milner report the happy answer both for Egypt and for England. It is devoutly to be hoped that General Allenby will soon find himself released from his task in Egypt by the very completeness of his success in it, so that other nations in his debt may have an opportunity to welcome to their shores this greatest crusader.

### German Engines for Russia.

MOSCOW.—Four of the largest locomotives ever bought by the Soviet government arrived in Moscow recently from Germany, each weighing 90 tons. While a certain amount of section work has been done on nearly all lines under the Soviet regime, foreign railroad experts say the railroad beds are badly in need of repair everywhere and much will have to be done this summer if Russia's railways are to be kept in running order.


