**Dominions Will** Get Preference

COL. AMERY MAKES DEFINITE PROMISE TO EMPIRE PRO-DUCERS.

LONDON, Nov. 30-Lt.-Col. Amery, Secretary of State for the Colonies. addressing the Empire Producers' Association at noon to-day, made the important pronouncement that the Premier's promise that he would not impose new taxation on food would be kept, but the Government felt compelled to carry out the preference promises of the last Imperial Conference. He definitely stated that he would arrange ten years' stabilization of the sugar duties, and whenever or wherever they placed a tariff on anything for the safeguarding of home industry or manufacture or for revenue purposes, the Dominions will be placed upon a satisfactory preferen-

tial basis. It is stated that the preferential treatment would not be confined to this. The Government has committed itself to preferential treatment in finance, emigration settlement and every phase of inter-Imperial relations. It is said the preference would include tobacco, wine, fruits and all similar products-in short, everything of the sort within the limitations of

the promise of no tax on food. It is argued that producers educate the people of England to the fact that every tax of any sort whatsoever, is a tax on food and that the latter is not confined merely to the tariff. #### Our Montreal Letter

(From Our Own Correspondent).

Judging from the figures of the majorities given for Prohibition in Ontario, since 1919, the much boasted triumph for the cause of "dry" Ontario, is beginning to show a landsl'de. In 1919 the majority was 407,-289. Three years ago it was about 100,000, and this year the majority was 40,000. It is said that it was the "Bootleggers" won the day at the last election and it cost them a million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the victory. Oh! #### A NEW ADDITION TO THE PALACE.

A few days ago I visite the Archbishop's Palace and was shown thru' the new annex attached to the Palace. It's & two storey building, with concrete walls and pillars, and fire-proof in every detail. The window casings are made of steel. Outside of the furniture there is no wood in the building. Rev. John L. O'Rourke, Chancellor of the Archdiocese explained the object of the building. In the basement are kept books of all descriptions, English, French, Lat'n and Greek, embracing theological and literary works. A special part has been reserved for books on the Index. Secing it was a kind of a dark spot, I called it the Morgue. "No," said the Chancellor, "that's what we call "L'enfer." (Hell).

In the upper portion all the documents of the Archdiocese are kept. There are 192 Parishes in the Diocese. 90 of which are in Montreal. Large steel cases are used, and each Parish has a separate apartment, where all documents pertaining to that particular Parish are kept. The marriage dispensations cover 110 years, and all ferent bundles. The Archivist is Rev. F. ther Thuot, a native of St. Alban's, Vermont and one who speaks English fluently. There are 800 priests in the Archdiocese, and out of that number there are only 35 English speaking. There are two Chancellors, Rev. Fr. J. L. O'Rourke, and Very Rev. Canon Albert Valois, who is at present travelling with His Grace Archbishop Gauthier 'h Europe, He will be absent about three months. In the meantime the English Chancellor, Fr. John O'Rourke, directs the work of the whole Archdiocese, as he is well versed in French, and was asked specially by Archbishop Gauthier to attend to Canon Valois' work as well as his own.

#### ABUSING RULERS A DANGEROUS

Under the heading of "Sowing Dangerous Seed," the Canadian Freeman says editorially:

There has been too much abuse of rulers in this country in past years. This ill-considered habit could not but have a bad effect. And this is just what has happened.

Constant abuse of governments for the sake of some personal or party advantage; unmeasured denunciation of political opponents merely because they are in office, is not merely dishonest; it is unpatriotic as well. And if anyone has been thoughtless enough in the past to imagine that the rulers of a country can be subjected to abuse and villification and ridicule year in and year out, without impairing the public respect for legislation and government in general, surely enough has been said and done in Canada in recent times to convince even so thoughtless a person that such are the natural and inevitable

Public opinion can be affected by unstinted abuse and by the continual exaggerations which are the stock-intrade of unscrupulous politicians; but Public Opinion, thus appealed to, inevitably goes the demagogue one better, and ends by holding all public men and all systems of government in contempt. That is the great evil to be expected from too long and too general a campaign of political de-

It is fair, and it is well, that a government should be attacked for wrongdoing; but there are limits which ought not to be passed; and these limits coincide exactly with the



These societies had an aggregate membership of 4,513,-000, a total share, loan and reserve capital of £130,475,000; sales amounting\_to £247,590,000; and a surplus, before deducting interest on share capital, of £17,299,000, Of these societies, 78 employing 12,902 persons and paying wages amounting to £1,649,000 in their distributive lepartments, allotted out of the surplus a total of £45,512 to their embeing equivalent to nearly 6 12d in the pound. In 1923 retail societies distributed an average dividend of approximately 1s 4 3|4d in the pound their members.



The cause for such terrible happenings must be found, and a remedy instituted at once for the safety and well being of the community. However, just at the present time I am convinced the remedy lies in the hands of the Raliway Commission, who, it is presumed, are Newfoundlanders. Being so they are familiar with the railway since its inception, and dare not lose sight of the fact. The old fifty nound rail of twenty-seven years ago may have been equal to the demands at that time, but with the rolling stock and equipment of today, which are double the tonnage, they can no longer be regarded as safe. It is believed a plan to fix up the roadbed and attach an angle bar to strengthen the rail joints is under consideration. In the event of such a plan being definitely decided on it will bring its own train of good. But, in less than five years we will return to where we have begun and look for the only safe and sane policy of rerailing the railroad with eighty or






