



Killing Wild Horses

WILLIAMS LAKE, B.C., Aug. 9 .even cowboys, paid by the governnent \$50 a month, killed 2,950 wild orses in three months and rid the hilcotin cattle country of one of the ost serious of its menaces.







Horses at \$3 Per Head for Hungry Europeans

REGINA, Sask., Aug. 3 .- Old dobbin whose market value was considerably undermined by the advent of the automobile and tractor, has again come into his own, but this time in a vastly different role.

A syndicate of exporters has en tered the market in Western Canada for 50,000 horses of all types to be slaughtered and shipped to Belgium, France and other European countries to satisfy the sophisticated palates of those to whom horse flesh is a genuine treat.


Heading the syndicate is George Pottmans of this city. He intimated that he was prepared to buy all types and sizes of horses, crippled or even in poor condition, so long as they have no organic diseases. Due to the heavy cost of transportation Mr. Pootmans points out that it was essential to get the animals at a very low price Wild horses from the range of the south country, is also regarded as otential source of supply.

Mr. Pootmans has already secured fair percentage of the first batch he proposes to ship across the Atlantic Until the industry has become fairly well established, the slaughtering and packing will be done in temporary quarters under the auspices of local packing firms. Choice of permanent headquarters will depend upon the development of the project.

Gaston Pottsmans, former vice-con sul for Belgium, in Regina, will handle the European market of the horse flesh. 



Why is the Sea Salt?

Recause the Rivers Run Into It" May Seem a Silly Answer, But It's Onite Correct.

A schoolboy, told to write an essa "The Sea," handed in the following effort: "The sea is where people bathe in ummer. It is not fit to drink because

t is salty. Also it is wet. And it is beween England and France and other ountries." You smile, but, honestly, now, what do you know of the sca? Could you

state why it is salty, or describe correctly what a wave is? Originally seas and oceans were ot salty. Deep-sea dredgings bave ought to the surface remains of plants and animals many thousands of years old, which scientists state could

never have lived in calt water.

"Fresh Water" Facts. What then, has made the see salty? The rivers of the earth The earth, you see, contains vast quantities of salt, and a river scours this out of the soil and takes it, in solution, to the sea.

So, in a sense, it is "fresh water" that has made salt water. A river, running sluggishly and with swamps interfering with its oatlet to the sea, is "brackish" because of its acculumation of salt. The virtues of a medicinal spring exist because the latter. in its underground course, has scoured out and incorporated into itself iron. sulphur, salts, etc. If the spring discharged itself into a river-as many do-the salts would go into the sea.

Now as to the colour of the sea. Everywhere its normal, actual colour is a peculiar shade of green with a touch of blue in it. Within a mile or so from a shore, however, this colour is altered by tidal movements and currents scouring and stirring up the shallower parts of the sea's bed.

And what of waves? The wind is the wave-maker. By pressing unequally on the sea's surface it depresses one part more than another. Each depression, as water cannot be compressed into a smaller space, results in the pushing up or elevation of another part. This results in the undulations we call waves.

Treasure of

SEA.

ancient treasure laden galley lying across one of the streets of a recently found city under the sea, before the Island of Jerba and the mainland, was revealed here Tuesday by Sir E. Denison Ross, driector of the School of Oriental Studies. (The island of Jerba is off the north coast of Africa).

A few months ago, Sir Denison made public the news cabled at the time of the finding of an ancient city under the sea. The Greek galley obviously must have been sunk after the city was engulfed by the ocean. "It was customary to bring trea-

sures of great value from Greece in galleys," said Sir Denison. "Those most heavily burdened with vases and gold were obviously most likely to sink, and it is probable that this galley, on its way to Africa, sank just before reaching the coast. This would have been many years, or perhaps centuries, after the city was submerged.

"Count Byron Kuhn de Prorok, the French explorer, is so interested in the discovery he has decided to abandon work at Carthage for three months, se as to devote all his time to examining the city under the sea and the Greek galley.

"I understand that numbers of reek vases already have been ought up from the galley and these re to be carefully examined to give an accurate idea of their date. Submarine cameramen are being taken to the spot to photograph the submerged city."

Only once before has a Greek galy containing treasure been discovared. That was on the Carthage coast 5 years ago.

Are the British Too Soft?

Explorer on Lost Toughness—Quiet Boys and ominating Women.

by the suggestion made by Mr. F. 


