

MOST CONTEMPTIBLE.
We have had occasion several times to point out the mean, contemptible cowardly conduct of the Advertiser, in trying to fasten the responsibility of some error it had committed on the Mercury or some other paper. Its last night's issue we are furnished with the latest and most barefaced instance of such contemptible conduct, and in order that the public may not be misled by any statements which we give its own words. We also state that we fell into the error as the Advertiser did in reference to the amount the Bank of Commerce had lost through Naughton's leaving, and in Monday's issue the Mercury made the necessary correction, but we did not lay the blame of that error on the Advertiser, speaking of Naughton's flight on Saturday the Advertiser said:—"He (Naughton) did not go away, however, provided, having just before drawn \$100 on the credit of the firm, from the Bank of Commerce—being upwards of \$600 over the whole account. One of \$2,100 and another of \$1,000 were drawn on Provincial banks, which turned out to be worthless." In Monday's Advertiser the following paragraph appeared:—"We are pleased to learn that the Bank of Commerce will not suffer to any great extent by the disappearance of Edward Naughton, and that therefore the statement of the Mercury to that effect is totally groundless. A portion of the drafts which Naughton made perfectly good, while his property, chattels, and those of the firm, expected to cover all deficiencies, far as the Bank is concerned." These two paragraphs furnish their own commentary.

The Deaf and Dumb.
In a lengthy circular which Mr. McMillan, of the Deaf and Dumb Institute, Milton, addresses to the Wardens and members of County Councils of Ontario, it is stated that there are in the Province deaf mutes, 100 dumb and paralysed, consequently idiotic, and 632 blind. A child out of every four dies under five years of age. The causes of the above mentioned maladies, and of much of the infantile mortality Mr. McGann are three. First, consanguineous marriages, and the disease must be traced back to the grand parents, for it is a generation in a direct line, and appears in a collateral branch of the family. Second, scrofulous affection in mother or grandmother is sure to induce deafness, blindness or idiocy, or a daily progeny who die prematurely. And third, dissipation or an abandoned mode of living is sure to be visited on succeeding generations. All these are facts established long ago, but which still lose nothing of their force by repetition, or by being endorsed by the experience of Mr. McGann. There is no doubt whatever that Nature is jealous of her enactments, that if her laws are broken she sends her angels to exact the full amount of the penalty. We are disposed to deprecate the arrangement by which the sins of the fathers are visited upon the children unto the third and fourth generation (some physiologists say the fifth generation is always safe) but it is Divine and we must question its wisdom. We do not know that the spread of intelligence will be very effectual in removing the last two causes which Mr McGann assigns for the cases of which he speaks. Intellectual education goes but a short distance in ridding men the mastery of their passions that is the work of no human teacher, we think that consanguineous marriages are of much rarer occurrence than they were some years ago, and that there is an increasing tendency on the part of the sexes to avoid marital relations with those who could previously claim kinship.

From Ottawa.
It is rumored that surveys on the central line of the Intercolonial Railway have been suspended by order from Ottawa. There is no quorum for the Council at the capital and nothing is being done. The looseness of the public administration is something wonderful. A strong pressure is being brought to bear on the Government to abandon their intention of appointing Mr. Howland Lieutenant Governor. A good many Conservatives have called upon Sir John A. Macdonald, on a charge of Fenianism, to be removed from office. His property was destroyed, and the Sheriff has stepped in to complete the wreck of the affairs. On the recommendation of the militia department, it has been decided to improve the plank road running from the St. Lawrence south to the village of Huntingdon, in order that troops may be thrown into that place to protect the frontier.

The Rev. J. P. Dumolin, assistant minister of Trinity Church, Montreal, and late of Galt, about leaving on a tour through Europe, was presented to the congregation with a purse of \$100 and a suitable address, to which Mr. Dumolin responded.
SIR JAMES WATSON BARRIE—Ald Dakin, President of the Great Western Railway Company, Mr. Falconer, and Mr. Mackenzie Baker, the Secretary, are expected to arrive at New York by the steamer, on or about Wednesday. Mr. Barrie has gone to meet them at New York. This is the same deputation that was sent four years ago.

John Alexander, a native of Derry, Ireland, and for many years Crown Land agent in the County of Simcoe, died in Barrie a few days ago. He had amassed a fortune variously estimated at from \$100,000 to \$150,000, and the entire sum has been left to good and charitable purposes. His old servants were all remembered, and after them came the following: To the resident minister of the Barrie Presbyterian church an annuity of \$400. To finish the Presbyterian church in Barrie the sum of \$2,500. To fence, lay out and improve the Presbyterian burial ground in Barrie, the sum of \$500. To improve the street leading to said burial ground, \$200. Towards building and fitting up a Protestant common school, or common school house for male and female scholars, on the site of the present common school house, the sum of \$5,000. To enlarge the Town Hall and Market House in Barrie the sum of \$5,000. For a steam fire engine, hose, and water tanks, for the town of Barrie, the sum of \$5,000. For improving Collier street in Barrie, by grading, making side-walks, planting trees, &c., the sum of \$1,000. To assist in paying off the debt on the English Church in Barrie, or for improving the grounds thereof, the sum of \$1,500. Towards the debt of the Wesleyan Church in Barrie, the sum of \$1,000. To the Presbyterian congregation of Barrie the house and lot occupied by the Rev. Mr. Frazer, for a manse for the resident minister. In addition to the above there is a sum of \$600, subject to certain conditions, which, if not fulfilled, is to be divided equally between the Grammar School and male and female Common Schools in Barrie for prizes.

There are certain other sums of money, subject to certain conditions, which, if not fulfilled, are to be handed over to the trustees of Knox's College, Toronto. The residue of the estate, if any is to be given to Knox College.

Napier Reviews the Army.
Shortly after leaving the smouldering ruins of Magdala, Napier reviewed the army under his command. The clever and impartial correspondent of the New York Herald says that, "they presented a most gallant array, taking into consideration the fatigues they had undergone. Three months ago, when they first started from the table-land of the Senafe, straining their eyes towards the equator, they numbered 5,600 strong; to day they numbered 5,359."
The General Order read to them sounds like their own measured tread. It is remarkably precise and destitute almost to a fault of the ornamentation which words can be made to give to facts. It is as follows:—Soldiers of the Army of Abyssinia—The Queen and the people of England entrusted to you a very arduous and difficult expedition, to release our countrymen from a long and painful captivity and to vindicate the honor of our country which had been outraged by Theodoros, King of Abyssinia. I congratulate you with all my heart on the noble way in which you have fulfilled the commands of our sovereign. You have traversed, often under a tropical sun and amid storms of rain and sleet, four hundred miles of mountainous and difficult country. You have crossed many steep and precipitous ranges of mountains more than ten thousand feet in altitude, where your supplies could not keep pace with you. When you arrived within reach of your enemy, though with scanty food and some of you for many hours without either food or water, in four days you passed the formidable chasm of the Bahilo and defeated the army of Theodoros, which poured down upon you from their lofty fortress in full confidence of victory. A host of many thousands have laid down their arms at your feet. You have captured and destroyed upwards of thirty pieces of artillery, many of great weight and efficiency, with ample stores of ammunition. You have stormed the almost inaccessible Fortress of Magdala, defended by Theodoros with the desperate remnant of his chiefs and followers. After you forced the entrance, Theodoros, who never showed mercy, distrusted the offer of mercy held out to him and died by his own hand. You have released not only the British captives, but those of other friendly nations. You have unloosed the chains of more than ninety of the principal chiefs of Abyssinia. Magdala, on which so many victims have been slaughtered, has been committed to the flames, and remains only a scorched rock. Our complete and rapid success is due, first, to the mercy of God, whose hand I feel assured has been over us in a just cause. Secondly, to the high spirit with which you have been inspired. Never has an army entered on a war with more honorable feelings than yours; this has carried you through many fatigues and difficulties; you have been only eager for the moment when you could close with your enemy. The remembrance of your privations will pass away quickly, but your gallant exploits will live in history. The Queen and the people of England will appreciate your services. On my part as your commander I thank you for your devotion to your duties and the good discipline you have maintained. Not a single complaint has been made against a soldier, of fields injured or villages willfully molested in person or property. We must not forget what is due to our comrades who have been laboring for us in the sultry climate of Zoola and the pass of Koomaylee, or in the monotony of the posts which have maintained our communications. Each and all would have given all they possessed to be with us. But they deserve our gratitude. I shall watch over your safety to the moment of your re-embarkation, and to the end of my life remember with pride that I commanded you.

melancholy and fatal affair took place at Montreal on Friday last. A private of the 16th Regt., named Black, was sentenced to seven days cells through a court-martial of the same regiment. The term of imprisonment expired to-day. The prisoner was sitting on his bed to-night, and on shooting the corporal. He fired instead of shooting the corporal, the ball passed through the thigh of one and the arm of another private sitting between him and the corporal, and entered the heart of a third private killing him instantly. The culprit was promptly secured, and the sufferers cared for.

FENIAN ITEMS.—The Montreal Gazette's "special frontier correspondent" is responsible for the following:—"I have heard the rumor, but cannot vouch for its correctness, that the Fenians intend to hold fairs at Malone and St. Albans similar to the one now at Buffalo, but only as a cloak to cover the gathering of their forces to these points."—"A person residing across the line, but who is thoroughly British in sentiment, and reliable, has been in Canada this week, and has stated that the transportation of arms and ammunition to the frontier is correct, and that about the 20th of this month is the time fixed."—"There has also been a leaking out, as the time approaches, of some around Chateaugay, Four Corners and Burke. (probably being so elated they cannot keep it), that this month will not end without a stand being made in Canada by the Army of the Irish Republic."—"A few days ago two cases of arms were taken off the cars at the 'summit' Station, 12 miles east of Chateaugay Four Corners."

THE MONTREAL MURDER.—The coroner's jury, in the case of the soldier James England, shot by his comrade, Maurice Blake, returned a verdict of wilful murder against the latter. The circumstances of the murder are as follows:—"On Sunday England, a private of the 16th regiment, was shot dead in the Victoria Barracks by Maurice Blake, also a private of the same corps. Prisoner and deceased were both in their beds at the time, and the former apparently aimed at Sergeant Gilby, at the other end of the room. Shortly before the murder he expressed regret that he had mistaken Sergeant Gilby against whom he seems to harbor some ill will, and for whom he said he had his rifle loaded."

TANGERS.—The Toronto Telegraph says "that eight companies of Fenians arrived in Buffalo on Wednesday night."

The Montreal "Gazette" has appointed a Fenian raid to come off on the 20th inst.

The Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Huron will hold its annual session at the City Hall, in London, on Tuesday, the 15th inst.

The soldier of the Rifle Brigade who was arrested for signalling to Whalen while on duty, has been tried by court martial and acquitted.

On Friday the schooner "Evening Star," bound from Goderich to Kincardine, was captured in a squall on Lake Huron, and Captain Thorburn and another man were drowned. The balance of her crew were rescued by the steamer W. R. Clinton from Saginaw.

At a special meeting of the Council of the town of Woodstock, it was decided to supplement the pay of such married men as may be enlisted, from the town, in fifty cents per month. This liberal grant with the Government allowance, places a married volunteer in a fair position.

Two priests from Algiers, MM. Lemannuff and Rion, have come to Canada to solicit donations for the suffering Arab population of the French colony. They bring credentials from the Archbishop of Algiers, and will appear for aid to all denominations of Christians.
