The act gave the officer no judicial power whatever, his duties were solely mandatory. The hon. member continued his speech after recess, appealing to the honor and conscience of members to rectify the wrong done Dr. Robertson. 

THE CHINESE QUESTION.

To the Editor of the World. SIR: I believe one of the stipulations the Anglo-Chinese treaty of Tientsin pro lowed to travel for pleasure or business all parts of the interior, and that under the most favored nation clause, the same privilege should be given to Chinese who might be desirous of migrating to British territory. As a matter of fact, then, any refer back the clause of the waterworks thing as an overdose. This is certainly the regislation of the federal parliament tending government as inconsistent with imperial treaty engagements. You say that similar legislation to that proposed by Mr. Shakespeare, was passed in New South Wales in 1881, and allowed by the home government. If so, that government must have counted on Chinese forbearance and on the strength of that old prejudice it had done its best to destroy when its destruction appeared necessary in the interests of British commercial supremacy. Shut out the Chinese from British Columbia by taxation or otherwise and instantly China has the right to call Great Britain to account, whether the right be exercised or not. Suppose it exercised—suppose the Pekin government took into its head to threaten the closure of the five free ports and the consequent Ald. Clarke, seconded by Ald.
