

KING MILAN'S MARCH.

What an Old Street Car Driver Said About the Company's New Regulation.

The Point Defended at Which Russia Will Suffer—A Settlement There to be Made According to the Treaty of San Stefano.

Prussia, Nov. 5.—King Milan continues to actively prepare for war, and is making arrangements in the event of hostilities breaking out to advance from Piro to Soba, the capital of Bulgaria.

The Serbian premier, M. Gerschaniak, is preparing to cross the Timok river, which divides Bulgaria and Serbia, with a strong force into the Widdin district.

The first conflict between the Serbians and Bulgarians will probably be brought on by an attempt to prevent the advance of King Milan and his force on the road to Soba.

Widdin will be attacked by the force under the command of King Milan, and the Serbians will probably be victorious.

If Serbia succeeds in crossing the Sofia and Widdin rivers, it will intervene and insist that King Milan withdraw behind the Servo-Bulgarian frontier.

The conference meets. Constantinople, Nov. 5.—The first meeting of the Balkan conference took place today.

Business was limited to the exchanging of credentials and the appointing of plenipotentiaries.

The Balkan conference opens among the powers on the following day.

The treaty of Berlin is nominally maintained; that Roumelia and Bulgaria be kept separate, but be in a certain sense united under Prince Alexander.

A Martyr to Science. PANAMA, Nov. 5.—A young medical student of Lima, who was selected as the subject of his dissertation a report on the well known disease indigenous to Peru, known as veruga, or croys fever.

He was not sufficient to resist the action of the fever, and after suffering excruciating agony he died.

The police ordered an inquest into the cause of his death, and the remains were followed to the grave by the scientific medical notabilities of Lima.

An Exchange of Views. PARIS, Nov. 5.—Count von Munster, the new German ambassador to France, presented his credentials today to President Grevy.

Count von Munster said to President Grevy: "I am convinced that your personal feelings, together with the common interest of both nations, will strengthen the relations existing between them."

A Rick Assault Paroled. DUBLIN, Nov. 5.—Mr. Parnell has protested against the selection of Philip Callan, member of parliament for Louth, by the nationalist party.

Callan is reported to be a candidate at the coming parliamentary elections.

The Serbian government is issuing ten franc bank notes, which contain a picture of the expenses incurred by her war preparations.

Heavy rains are falling in the midland districts of England. The water in some places has risen two feet deep.

Telegraphic communication has been established between London and Constantinople.

The National Gazette of Berlin, in an editorial on the Caroline question, warns Spain that German public opinion is not in favor of that which the tension is believed a rupture will ensue.

In accordance with an invitation from the English government, Italy will send two officers to meet the Italian army at the camp of exercises in Lahore district.

The Burmese envoy at Paris declares that the present difficulty with Great Britain is a purely commercial matter, which it is his duty to settle, and that his government has offered to consent to arbitration.

The Turks are greatly irritated because M. Lagoules, the English agent at Sofia, has publicly accompanied Prince Alexander to the railway station, and has been seen to shake hands with him.

THE DISEASE ABATING.

Upwards of Forty Deaths Still Reported in the City and District on Wednesday.

MONTEREAL, Nov. 5.—The official returns of the health office this morning show thirty-six smallpox deaths in the city yesterday—five in Cote St. Louis, four in St. Cenege, and two in St. Henri.

At the civil board of health to-day Dr. Laberge's report of the week's work yesterday showed 49 cases reported and verified.

About 805 houses are reported placarded in the city, whereas there are 700 houses infected.

In the recorder's court to-day, E. J. Gagnon, who has caused the health authorities so much trouble on Roland lane, was charged with resisting and firing upon the police in the execution of their duty.

He was held over to the grand jury in bonds of \$200 in himself and two sureties of \$100 each.

At the police court, aged 31, was charged with resisting the police and shooting with intention to kill. He was committed to the court of queen's bench and bail was fixed in \$100 and two sureties of \$200 each.

An Attack on Mayor Beaudry. MONTREAL, Nov. 5.—Le Monde publishes this evening an exceedingly violent article against Mayor Beaudry for having removed Gagnon's children to the almshouse hospital.

It says that by his removal of Gagnon's children to the almshouse he has brought shame and disgrace on the city and that he is responsible for the death of Gagnon's child by his barbarous and inhuman conduct.

The article also says that the health authorities continue in their ordinary course. No later than yesterday they dismissed fifty sanitary policemen on the ground of expense.

Five cases in New York. NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Five cases of smallpox have been discovered in this city by the health officers within the last two or three days, all of a mild type.

Craving Vaccinators. MONTREAL, Nov. 5.—The Hamilton and Dundas railway has been leased for five years by John Weatherston, who will manage the road in room of A. A. Anderson, retired.

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PARLIAMENT STREET OUTRAGE.

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GARRISON CREEK SEWER.

Another Heavy Day at the Board of Works—Contractor Godson's Balance Account Expended on the Contract.

A special meeting of the board of works was held yesterday afternoon, to consider the Garrison creek sewer question.

The letter from Mr. Godson's solicitor, which was missing at Monday night's council meeting had turned up since, and it was considered this letter that the meeting was called.

There were present Chairman Carlyle, Ald. Steiner, Hastings, Jones, Woods, Frankland, Baxter, Hunter, Allan, and Ald. W. Manning. Mr. Godson and Solicitor Neville were also present.

The letter was produced, and read as follows: "We desire to call the attention of the council to the fact that the works committee has passed a resolution to prevent Mr. Godson from receiving \$2000 of the amount of the engineer's last progress certificate, as they claim that there are several defects in the sewer."

The works committee also recommended that the caretakers of the sewer be paid at the rate of \$100 per month, and that the caretaker of Mabel school be paid \$2 per month for each additional room; and that the caretaker of Mabel school be paid \$2 per month for each additional room.

Trustee Ogden thought it remarkable strange that not a member of the printing and supplies committee could give an intelligible explanation of the report. He then went on to say that he had heard numerous complaints about Bolton avenue school, to the effect that the work being done on the sewer was of poor quality.

He had himself visited the site and he had no hesitation in saying that the school was "conceived in corruption," that the contractor had been bribed to do the work, and that the school would bring disaster and disgrace to the board.

Several of the members of the board, and the chairman poured oil on the troubled waters. The report of the committee on night school was adopted.

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MURDERED ON A FARM.

A Hired German Killed by an Imported Englishman.

The Victim Fifteen Years Old and the Slayer Seventeen—Arrest of the Latter at Harrowburg.

GALT, Ont., Nov. 5.—A murder was committed this afternoon at the farm of Levi Weber, near the village of Strausberg, about eight miles from here, in Waterloo county.

The murdered person is a young German farm hand, named unknown, about fifteen years of age, recently from Germany, and has been working for Mr. Weber for the past six months.

The supposed perpetrator of the murder is said to be John Calvin Ravier, a young Englishman about seventeen years of age, who was brought to Canada as an orphan and was formerly employed on Mr. Weber's farm, but left about a year ago.

He returned to-day carrying Mr. Weber's name from home and went to the barn, where he was told the young German boy was waiting.

Upon Mr. Weber's return home he found the murdered boy in the barn, the body being covered with chaff. A long wound across the chest, Chief M. F. Fagan, a constable, visible and a broken clay lay near by.

Mr. Weber immediately set out to notify the coroner and to find the suspected murderer, who was traced to Flat station, where he took a train for Galt.

It was discovered that he left Galt for Harrowburg, making a circuitous route by the way of the station and captured his man at Harrowburg, and brought him back to Galt.

Mr. Weber states that he cannot assign any motive for the commission of the crime, as he does not think the supposed murderer and victim ever met each other before to-day.

PROVINCIAL SALARIES. At the court of revision yesterday case No. 61, that of Mr. Cornelius Donovan, M.A., was called. Mr. W. F. Maclean was the prosecutor.

Mr. Donovan was assessed in Toronto on his income of \$1800, and his answer was that he was not liable.

Ald. Baxter, chairman of the court, said that this was a complicated question and directed the attention of his colleagues to Mr. Maclean when stated Mr. Donovan's objections, namely:

"I am now and always have been a resident and taxpayer of Hamilton. My office is in that city, and the bulk of my office work is done there. I have never resided in Toronto, and in a hundred other places in Ontario, and I have never paid tax in any of them. I am not liable for the province of Ontario."

Several members of the court thereupon said: "If he gets his salary here, that settles it; confirm it."

Mr. Maclean then said: "There has been a ruling in a similar case, namely that of the late J. M. Buchanan when inspector of high schools, and a resident of Hamilton at the same time. The county judge held that Mr. Buchanan was not liable to pay taxes in Toronto, but that he was liable in the province of Ontario."

Commissioner Maclean: That is right—the law is against us. Our case will not hold.

Chairman Baxter—We will have to strike Mr. Donovan's assessment off.
