Ottawa, Jan. 14—Reports received by the Department of the Interior from over sixty points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta show that unusually severe weather and heavy snow is general in the three Provinces. Manitoba, Eastern and Northern Saskatchewan and Northern Alberta have from two to three feet of snow. In Manitoba and Saskatchewan the treight service is demoralized and the passenger train service is a day late.

Some districts report plenty of fuel, but in others the fuel situation is serious. From almost all points come complaints of the tie-up of grain shipments and of the ranching country reports some losses, but also reports



Discovered a bug Exterminator.

Lethbridge Alta., Jan. 21.—A discovery of great importance has been made by Dr. A. Watson, Dominion bacteriologist, at the quarantine station liere, no less than the isolation of the germ known as the trypensesomes, which cause "sleeping sickness," one of the scourges of Africa. Dr. Watson was in town yesterday, and imparted to some of his friends the interesting information.

The dread germ was obtained from

The dread germ was obtained from the blood of a cotton tail rabbit, which the scientist captured for purposes of experimentation, and which had the disease of which rabbits have been dying in great numbers throughout the country this winter.

Every seventy years a scourge sweeps the rabbits almost out of existence. During the past seven years the virus gradually accumulates in the rabbits, till another scourge again decimates them. This happened this year.

The storm was the worst ever experienced in this vicinity.

It must always be in the nature of a compensation to those whose lot is cast under bleaker skies to reflect that the soil they tread is stable and that their houses are not going to tumble down about their ears. Providence has distributed its favors discriminate ly-flowers all the year round, sun-shine, and a certain amount of danger to some, to others variable airs and winters downright cold, but a great

sense of security withal. There is, however, little food for the moralist in the misfortunes of St. Pierre, Naples, Valparaiso, Honolulu, San Francisco, and Kingston. Science explains that all these places are in the seismic circle, and that it needs no great wickedness on their part to stir the elemental forces, which seem to be strongest where the line of resistance is weakest. The old theory of these visitations was the sins of the people, but the proved fact is that those who seek warmth and the delights of a subtropical climate must in cur the local disadvantages of quake and smoldering fire. In the case of Kingston it is stated that the capital was built on the only volcanic for-mation on the island, and that some such thing as happened Monday might have been expected from the fate of Port Royal, only a few miles away which was destroyed by an earthquake and tidal wave over two hundred years ago. Unfortunately, however, the people who start cities have not been in the habit of studying the geological fitness of the neighborhood, and no blame can, therefore, attach to any

bad spot in Jamaica. Outside the soldiers in the garrison the greatest loss of life will probably be among the colored population. It is reassuring to learn that all the visiting Canadians are safe, and that death has taken no toll of the healthseekers. Jamaica has special claims on the sympathy and assistance of Canada as a sister colony, and it is to be hoped that Parliament will see its way clear to voting a money contri-bution, as it did with San Francisco
