



Practical Talks and Plain Precepts for Farmers.

Edited for the Farmer readers of the MONITOR by an Annapolis Valley Agriculturist

BEEF Vajolary.

The wave asked me to express my opinion as to the relative merits of a best and early here and the readers of the first place the opinion that for the best ances of the states of the states

of such a farm.

On the other hand, take the large farms of 100 to 150 acres, and it seems to me that we cannot apply the same rules. Here in Gagetow for many years we have been drifting more and more toward special beefarming because of the "girl" question and the low price of dairy butter, and so long as those factors went for anything a special beef brand was perhaps better than a mixed purpose herd. But the advent of a cheese factory this season has supplanted the girl and the necessity of making butter for a low market, and just at

that will easily support from fifty to 100 head of cattle now. Though cat ering to a cheese factory, is generally a profitable business, not a man of us would wish to have all our cattle milkers. Perhaps from fifteen to thir

we cannot carry on the special but ourselves on large ferms.

It seems to me, though I am not certain, that we can have good deem lkers in a herd of beefy cows. I know that is my evperience. I have used a beef bull on the ordinary country row, and often the half-bred heifer is a far bester milker than her mother, although the sire was a beebuil. Then again the steer calves bred in the same way but raised differently, make grand beef cattle. It is easy each year for us to pick out the best and most promising heifers and rais them for the dairy, while the other can be stuffed with fat-forming food and sold to the butchers as beef at two years, along with the steers. I these calves are bred from a milk bred bull they will not fatten to advantage, and I have no doubt that some one will say "if the heifers are breef from a heef bull they will not milk to advantage." In answer to that would say let him try it and he will is true that many heifers so bred are turning out grand dairy cows—good large udders giving lots of good rich milk. Joker's Corner.

People do not relish the same articles of food if served repeatedly on successive days, therefore, it is well not to provide too lavishly of any one article, no matter how tempting it may look or taste at the first serving; and here comes in the difficulty in catering to a small family; many recipes are proportioned to meet the needs of a large family, and it is not always easy to divide the portions of each ingredient with enough exactness to be sure of the result.
