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

#### THE G. T. RAILWAY.

The changes in the Board of the Grand Trunk Railway are leading to all kinds of rumors as to the summary dismissal of some, or all the heads of departments. That such rumors are too previous is self-evident. That such a course is unlikely is certain. The new Board are not idiots, nor are they after anyone's scalp. Allowing that they are sensible, the only course is for them to examine the mode of management, and after acquainting themselves with the work of the staff, make only such changes as may then seem imperative. Some people imagine that the recent defeat is like a government downfall, and that their successors want at once to divide the spoils of office.

Perhaps the new President may find that the ill-success of the Company is based upon local causes and bad times, and that the staff here is no more responsible than a government that holds office in bad seasons, but is held equally responsible by the electors.

The drawback to the Grand Trunk Railway is explained in the closing sentence of an article in *Herepath* on the election. After showing Sir Henry Tyler's difficulties and those before his successor, the writer concludes: "The Canadian people care not one jot for the G. T., except for what can be got out of it. The capital is held here, and here control must remain."

With all due respect to the great railway journal, so long as that policy is continued and control is kept in England, so long will Canadians care nothing for the Company, and so long will the English investors sigh for prosperity.

#### REAL ESTATE IN JUNE.

As will be seen from the record of sales, the total value of transfers of real estate for the month of June for the city, Westmount, St. Henri, St. Cunegonde, the Junction and the Annex was \$414,-249.09. This amount shows a considerable decrease as compared with last month, when the sales for the city and Westmount amounted to more than \$466,000.00. In St. Antoine division business has been very quiet, the sales being only \$27,250, against \$199,471 last month. In Montreal East the sales are about \$4,000 above those of last month; while in Hochelaga the values are nearly double, amounting to \$106,000, against \$58,000 last month. In Westmount a very large increase is seen, the sales this month including nearly \$30,000 purchased for the Institution for the Advancement of Learning, and totalling over \$88 000. In Montreal Annex over \$13,000 have changed hands and St. Henri has been fairly active.

#### A GUILTY MAYOR.

Judge Mathers has found Mayor Aubrey, of Hull, guilty of boodling, and has sentenced him to pay a fine of \$983, with costs exceeding \$2,000, and disqualified him for seven years, and this only on a single charge, the other two charges lacking evidence enough to convict.

Such a decision ought to strike terror to the civic representatives all through the Dominion who are guilty of the same offence. The Honorable Judge deserves great credit for carrying out the law so effectively, and preventing the criminal from repeating his offence for some years to come. It is a great pity that similar convictions cannot be obtained in the many cases where boodling is selfevident. But, apparently few boodlers neglect to protect themselves in the way that Mayor Aubrey did. As a rule the boodler is sufficiently wide-awake to prevent anything illegal being traced back to him. The Town of Hull deserves honor for thus exposing the deliberate treason of the sacred trust imposed by the public or their representatives. We will be glad to record in these pages many cases following the lines laid down by Hull.

#### A NEW POINT.

A novel point has been raised as to the duties of railway companies in providing sleeping cars, in the action taken by Mr. S. Davis, the well-known cigar manufacturer, against the C. V. Railway. Mr. Davis complains that the company failed to furnish a sleeping car from New York to Montreal, and that, as he was in bad health, he suffered damages which he puts down at \$1,000. The responsibility of the company in furnishing such accomodation for only part of a through run should be fixed, and Mr. Davis has done a good turn to the travelling public in thus having it legally tested.

Mr. St. George, Montreal's City Engineer, proposes to utilize the incinerators in making electric light.

THE Clare Bros. Co. have just concluded the sale of a large heater for the church at Farnham, Que.

THE corner stone of the Methodist church, Knowlton, Que., was laid with Masonic honors.

EXPERTS declare that there is an inexhaustible supply of coal oil at Kingsville, Ont.

#### THE CHICAGO CANAL.

The completion of the huge drainage canal of Chicago promises to furnish an international question. The canal, which is 300 feet wide by 20 feet deep, conveys water from Lake Michigan to the Mississippi, the channel being cut through the watershed which separates the two basins. The volume of water thus diverted will, it is claimed, distinctly lower the level in Lake Michigan and its connections, and this will affect navigation not only for the States but for Canada also. If the completion of this gigantic enterprize has the effect of detracting from the navigable qualities of the Lakes, it is a pity that a protest was not entered before the plan was commenced. Engineers must have been able to foretel the effect of the canal upon the lake levels, and any action to prevent this stealing of the water should have been prevented. The Directors of the Richelieu Company have taken the lead in asking the Government to enquire into the matter, and they should be supported by the public in their efforts.

#### DREDGING FOR GOLD.

A new way of obtaining gold is being put into operation in the Cariboo district by the Dominion Gold Dredging and Placer Mining Co. Instead of working along the shore to secure the gold ore with which the sand of nearly every river in British Columbia is rich, the Company is using a device patented by Mr. James Amess, which is known as the "cable dredge." From a cable slung across the river is hung a bucket dredge which is lowered and hauled in by an engine on the bank, the contents of the dredge being emptied into a sluice and there washed in the usual way. It is claimed that the dredge can be operated for about \$15 per day, while each yard yields from \$1 to \$5 on a conservative estimate, bars occasionally showing deposits that yield as high as \$1,000 to the yard. One bar in the river, known as the Boston Bar, has been worked since 1858, and is said to have produced two millions of gold, and as the freshets constantly bring down fresh deposits, the supply is inexhaustible. A company has been formed to work the patent, with a capital of \$40,000, and shares are being taken up in this city. Mr. E. D. Wintle represents the company here.

#### LEGAL CASES.

Judge Davidson (A. A. Normandin vs. City of Montreal) gave \$500 damages for slipping on icy sidewalk.

Mr. F. R. Alley has entered an action against the Montreal Street Railway Co. for half a million, for failing to carry out their agreement to build a line along St. Denis Street to the Back River.

Mr. Lepine has taken action against Maisonneuve Municipality for damage suffered from fire, claiming unsufficient protection.

The coroner's jury held the authorities responsible for the death of J. R. Decelles, from a landslide at the excavation for the new C. P. Ry. station.

Judge Jette (Painchaud vs. City of Montreal) gave \$125 for illegal arrest. Painchaud was one who spread snow on the Street Railway tracks and was arrested.

Judge Archibald (Brown vs. Montreal) refused to alter award of valuation, holding that awards should be maintained unless grave errors be proved.

Judge Pagnuelo gave \$500 and \$600 damages (Marion vs. Montreal) for flooding of plaintiff's cellar.

Judge Davidson (Bartholomew vs. Sincennes-McNaughton) decided that towing companies are not liable to the same extent as common carriers, and proper diligence exonerates them from responsibility.

A. Davis has taken action for \$50,000 against the city for illegal dismissal as Water Superintendent.

Mr. O. Boule has taken action against the Montreal Water and Power Co. for \$125 for nonsupply of water, for which he paid in advance.

Montreal has taken action against the Monttreal Water and Power Co. for \$50,000, for taking water from the city's mains to supply their own customers.

Judge Archibald (G. Bishop vs. Cote St. Antoine) dismissed action to increase award for damage caused by alteration in street level.

Judge Archibald (Lachance vs. Montreal) decided that no rent can be collected for stalls outside the market, even if on land owned by the city.

Messrs. P. Grace & Co. have entered an action against Montreal for \$3,000 damages for injury to their business owing to condition of Notre Dame Street for past three years.

Judge Gill (Labbe vs. Murphy, and counter action) decided that a tenant is responsible for damages by fire to property occupied by him, if it results from circumstances which he cannot prove were beyond his control.

Judge Desnoyers discharged Mr. O'Brien (Quebec Bank vs. Jas. O'Brien, Jr.) holding that no false representation had been proved by plaintiffs.

The Court of Review has confirmed judgment of \$300 damages to Mrs. Tremblay for injuries caused by step in cellar giving away in a house leased from Mr. Gratton.

The Court of Appeal has reduced the award of the Superior Court (Mandeville vs. Montreal) from \$6,300 to \$2,500.

The Court of Appeal (Valade vs. Montreal Street Ry.) dismissed the action, holding Valade responsible for the collision. This reverses Superior Court decision. Mr. J. A. Mancotel has entered an action against the Montreal Street Ry. for \$5,000 damages for being run into by the cars.

Petitions have been presented against the assessment for the widening of St. Nicholas St.

Judge Doherty (Gendreau vs. Brodeur) dismissed the action which was to recover a commission on the award of expropriation commissioners, before whom Gendreau gave expert evidence.

Judge Doherty (Connolly vs. Forget dit Depatie) dismissed action and refused to cancel lease of quarry.

Judge Mathieu (Jacob vs. St. Henri) decided in favor of petitioner and has declared the purchase of an incinerator illegal, as the borrowing powers were exhausted.

Judge Davidson (Guerin vs. Montreal) gave \$4,200 damages, plaintiff's property having been reduced to less than 50 ft. in depth by expropriation.

The City of Montreal (McKerley vs. Montreal) has been condemned to pay \$1,000 damages for plaintiff's son falling into an open drain.

Judge Archibald (Montreal vs. Stuart & Herbert) ordered defendants to pay \$211 taxes, as they had failed to comply with all conditions under which they claimed exemption in Cote St. Louis before its annexation.

Mr. J. S. Norris has taken action against J. S. Bache & Co., New York, for \$17,550 profit on grain transactions.

Judge Mathieu (Gosselin vs. A. & N. W. Ry. Co.) decided that unless personal damage was alleged, no one could sue a railway company for general damages.

The Consumers' Cordage Co. is suing Messrs. Connolly for \$20,000 for breach of contract in selling binder twine in Canada instead of exporting it. The defendants leased the factory at Brantford, Ont., from plainiiffs.

Judge Archibald (Donovan vs. Montreal) has given \$344 damages from a burst drain.

Judge Davidson (Vanier & Montpetit vs. Montreal) gave \$3,000 damages for flooding of cellar, holding city responsible.

Judge Ouimet (Guerin vs. Manchester Ins. Co.) decided that as plaintiff had increased risk by opening property as an hotel, he had no claims on company for insurance.

Miss F. Lamoreux is suing the C. P. Ry. for \$1,000 for a broken leg, the result, she claims, of neglect of the Company at L'Ephipanie.

Judge Pagnuelo has given \$2,122 damages to Laurent against the Montreal Gas Co.

Judge Pagnuelo (Bachmann vs. Hillock) held tenant responsible for damages from snow on roof.

#### THE IROQUOIS HOUSE.

The destruction by fire of the Iroquois House, on Belæil Mountain, is a loss, not only to the shareholders and the insurance companies interested, but also to the public at large, for it was an attraction to many people from the States, who came annually to enjoy the lovely air and exquisite views. It will, however, set at rest the bickerings which are said to have been very perceptible among the shareholders, and they will be united in bewailing their loss.

#### LOANS.

The St. Henri loan of \$330,000 has been arranged through Ald. Wilson Smith, at 4½ per cent.

Messrs. Hanson Bros. and Mr. A. E. Lewis have purchased the St. Louis de Mile End debentures, amounting to \$140,000, at 94½.

GLYN, Mills, Currie & Co. ask for tenders for £550,000 4 p. c. Newfoundland stock at a minimum price of 93½, repayable in 40 years.

The applications for the Newfoundland loan exceeded the amount required by \$311,075, the minimum price being 98½.

Lloyd's Bank will receive tenders for the Toronto 3½ p. c. bonds.

Maisonneuve has unanimously resolved on a loan of \$225,000 for drains, etc.

The Church Wardens of St. Louis de France have borrowed \$90,000 at  $4\frac{1}{2}$  for a new church-

Newfoundland has passed a bill for a loan of \$2,500,000 at 4 per cent. for forty year bonds, interest being guaranteed by its being a first lien on the colony.

CHINA has secured a gold loan of £16,000,-000 in Paris at 4 p. c., redeemable in 36 years, the issue price being given as 93; it is guaranteed by Russia.

LACHINE AND INTERMEDIATE POINTS.

To the Editor of Property:

Sir,—Allow me, as one interested in the welfare of any publication whose aim is to advance the interests of our city, to congratulate you on the success which the first issue of your excellent paper has most deservedly received.

You have very fortunately hit upon an important subject when you deal in one of your leaders with the necessity of an immediate, and at once efficient, electric service to Lachine. Your idea respecting the advantage to be gained by permitting two companies to compete for traffic, is certainly practicable, and should be carefully considered and reconsidered by those who have the power to grant the necessary rights. Would it not be a paying investment for Montreal to be connected by one electric line with Kensington, Montreal Junction, Dominion and Lachine, and by another line with the suburban points

lying along the riverside, with its terminus at Lachine?

The writer has many times wondered why we have no coach line to Lachine, such as we find carried on successfully in several large cities in the United States. As an instance, allow me to call attention to the coach line operating through the boulevards on the South Side of the City of Chicago. The return trips in this case includes some twelve miles, and the cost is one dollar. The monthly receipts of this company average during the summer season, about \$600 per coach, and the expenses for the same period are less than \$200 per coach.

There is certainly plenty of room for an electric service as well as a coach line conducted in some such way as I have outlined. Your readers, I am sure, recognize the magnificent advantages our city has in being situated as it is, surrounded by so many delightful spots suitable for summer residences. Let us bring those retreats within the reach of all.

#### Motes.

THE Commonwealth Mutual Fire Insurance Co., Boston., has gone into the hands of a receiver.

DEPUTY Sheriff Franchere has improved his office for the convenience of the public by replacing the disorderly fyle of notices of official sales, by books, of which one is devoted to each division.

THE United States Cordage Company has been placed in a receiver's hands; only ten of the twenty works will be operated.

The Sun Life Insurance Co. are to invade the State of Michigan and open up business there.

ALBERT College, Belleville, Ont., will have an addition to cost \$20,000.

Cortons have advanced from 5 to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

THE Province of Quebec Association of Architects held their Annual Dinner at the Queen's Hotel on the 5th.

THE expropriation of St. James Street cost \$201,391 for damages awarded and \$42,119 for expenses. Over 20 per cent!

MICA mines in the Saguenay district are booming. A mine at Lac a Castor has been sold for \$20,000.

Mr. P. Mackay has been elected Vice-President, and Mr. Chas. Cassils, Director, of the Bell Telephone Co.

THE Civic incinerator is costing a great deal more than the contractors said. Their figure was less than \$7,000, while it will take about \$18,000, which, however, includes cartage.

By a recent proclamation, the farmers on the Magdalen Islands can purchase their holdings at the value of their annual rent capitalized.

The Montmorency Mill has left the Cotton Combine.

THE Association of Architects of Quebec have petitioned the City of Montreal to appoint an Art Standing Committee.

A FINE vein of plumbago has been discovered near Gooderham, Ont.

THE National Association of Furniture Manufacturers advocates an advance in prices, on account of the increased value of lumber.

The Montreal Road Committee has recommended the granting of a contract for \$130,000 to the Sicilian Asphalt Company and of \$62,000 to Bastien & Valiquette, without asking for tenders.

THE Iroquois House, St. Hilaire, was sold at sheriff's sale for \$10,500 on the 17th, and burnt down on the 25th.

THE estate of Boyd & Co., Huntingdon, Que., bas declared a first divided of 12 cents on the dollar.

Mr. T. Daoust has secured the contract for the College of St. Elizabeth's Parish, on Notre Dame Street. The price is \$70,000 and the building will be of stone and pressed brick. Mr. P. Kelly, who died on the 21st. inst., was the contractor for the Bonsecour's and St. Lawrence Markets, and superintended the building of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.

The Hudson Bay Co. will pay 12 shillings per share dividend, and carry forward £25,305 as a balance, and increase of 2 shillings in the dividend over last year, the balance being practically the same.

A NEW sidewalk is wanted at the bottom of St. Peter Street. The tenants say so, and so do all who are unfortunate enough to pass by.

Mr. C. McGill has been appointed General Manager of the Ontario Bank, Toronto.

Westmcunt (Cote St. Antoine) is to have a park; the site is on the mountain, next McGill College Reserve.

A New college will be built at St. Louis de Mile End, Montreal, to cost \$25,000. It will be 110 x 46 and four stories high.

#### Railway News.

A serious accident took place on the Monttreal Street Railway, at Westmount, on the 1st, over twenty persons being injured. A trailer jumped the track, as the motorman did not slacken and a car in the opposite direction struck the car, making a complete wreck.

Work has been resumed on the Newfoundland Railway.

The I. C. Ry., carried Sousa's Band from Quebec to St. John, N.B., 578 miles, in  $14\frac{1}{2}$  hours, an average of 40 miles per hour, including stoppages.

Lord Mount-Stephen, Sir D. A. Smith, Sir Wm. Van Horne and T. G. Shaughnessy, were among the directors of the Duluth, S. S. & A. Railway elected at the annual meeting on the 6th.

The Quebec Council have accepted Mr. Beemer's plan for an electric street railway.

The Dominion Coal Co.'s line from Sydney to Louisburg was opened on the 14th.

Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, the new President of the G. T. Railway, will not come out to Canada until the fall.

The Canada Atlantic employes held a large pic-nic at Golden Lake on the Parry Sound Ry., on the 24th.

A railway from Renfrew to Portage du Fort, about 50 miles, is contemplated.

The G. T. R. workshops are to resume work after the usual two weeks' holiday.

The M. P. & I. Ry. Co. are extending their line round the mountain and expect to reach the M. S. Ry. track at Westmount by August.

The C. P. Ry. pic-nic at Peterson was a great success, about 3,000 people being present.

The B. & M. are talking of buying the Q. Central and building a bridge so as to enter Quebec.

The Trunk Line Association is endeavoring to adjust rate and stop cutting, and J. Pierpont Morgan urges the injury caused to securities, as a reason for adhering to rates.

#### TORONTO NEWS.

The Georgian Bay Ship Canal and River Aqueduct Company have offered to supply the city with water on a basis of \$2,400 per day for 30 million gallons, for a term of 50 years, and, as a guarantee, they offer a deposit of half a million dollars.

The Board of Trade through Messrs. Caldecott )President), E. B. Osler (Vice-President), and E. Gurney, have applied to the city to improve the water pressure in view of the high rate of insurance,

#### BANK REPORTS.

BANK OF MONTREAL.

The annual report shows profits \$1,-210,436.77; balance from last year \$804,-715.33; total \$2,015,152.10. From this was paid dividends of 10 per cent., \$1,-200,000.00, while a balance of \$816,152.10 was carried forward.

#### MERCHANTS' BANK.

The annual statement shows net profits \$551,849.51, and balance from last year \$51,428.28; total, \$557,277.79. Out of this has been paid an 8 p. c. dividend, \$480,000, while \$20,000 has been added to the contingent fund, leaving a balance of \$57,277.79.

#### HOCHELAGA BANK.

The annual statement shows net profits \$88,851.34; balance from last year \$3,922,78; premium on new stock, \$17,980,00; total, \$110,754.12. Out of this \$54,001.65 has been used for dividends, making 6\frac{3}{4} per cent.; \$50,000 added to reserve fund; \$3,062.73 to employes' guarantee fund, and \$3,689.74 carried forward as a balance.

#### JACQUES CARTIER BANK.

The annual statement shows net profits, \$45,323 84; balance from last year, \$8,-284.69; total, \$53,608.53. Out of this were paid dividends, \$35,000, of 7 per cent.; \$10,000 was added to reserve fund and \$8,608.53 carried forward as a balance.

#### BANQUE VILLE MARIE.

The annual report shows net profits, \$36,221.11; balance from last year, \$7,-107.10; total, \$43,328.21. Out of this were paid a 6 per cent. dividend, \$28,-773.60; \$10,000 was carried to rest and \$4,554.61 carried forward as a balance.

#### BANK OF COMMERCE.

The annual report shows net profits, \$441.028.50, with balance from last year, \$19,157.02, making a total of \$460,185,52. Out of this has been paid a dividend of 7 per cent, \$420,000; transferred to pension fund, \$10,000; written off bank premises and furniture, \$7,500, leaving a balance of \$22,685.52.

#### CIVIC COMMISSIONERS.

According to report, Winnipegis taking the lead in civic administration, as it is proposed to abolish the City Council and substitute Commissioners. This is a plan which has been widely discussed and as favorably received as any such radical change in the existing governmental machinery could be expected. If the idea is carried out in the Western city, it will be carefully watched by many a municipality which is wanting to change its plan.

#### STOCK NOTES.

Mr. G. W. Hamilton resigned as Vice-President of the Montreal Stock Exchange, but, at the request of the members, remains in the position.

The Toronto Stock Exchange has elected Mr. J. W. Beaty, President; A. E. Ames, Vice-President; J. K. Niven, Treasurer, and G. T. Ferguson, Secretary.

Hon. A. W. Morris has purchased a seat on the Montreal Exchange, the price is said to be \$2,800.

#### ON THE STREET.

The past month has seen many important bank meetings, and especially that of the Bank of Montreal, which shows a most satisfactory report considering the recent depression. The usual dividend of 10 per cent. was paid and the balance increased by about \$10,000. The bank is to be congratulated upon the valuable assistance it gave to Newfoundland, where it has established a branch office. Condensed details of the bank reports will be found elsewhere.

Wheat has shown a decided decline during the month, the closing prices for June, July and Sept., on the 28th being 8½, 9½, and 8c. lower than the closing figures on the 1st, and 10¼, 11½ and 10½c. below the highest points touched. After a slight drop, prices went up on the 5th, but on the 12th, fine weather, good reports and a want of excitement in Engand caused a decline of two cents, which was continued pretty steadily.

The local stock market has shown considerable life, and prices of the ten representative stocks all show an advance,

except Montreal Cotton, which closes 123 against 129, having dropped as low as 120 on the 27th.

Montreal Street Railway made a decided jump, from 1994 on the 1st to 2094 on the 28th, a gain of 10½ points; the highest point was 2104 on the 24th.

Toronto Street Railway also shewed an advance from 804 to 85 ex. div., but rose to 883 on the 13th.

Canadian Pacific Railway gained 1½ points to 54, and touched 54½ on several days. Duluth gained 1¾ points, from 6½ to 8¼, rising as high as 9 on the 24th.

Commercial Cable has been active and shews a gain of 3 points, to 160½, having risen to 163¾ on the 17th.

Montreal Telegraph Co. rose from 162 to 1631 (the highest point) on the 27th, and stood at 161 ex. div. on the 28th.

Richelieu has risen pretty steadily all the month and closes at 105, an advance of three points. The prospects for this season's earnings are very good and warrant the advance for that reason.

Montreal Gas has been active, and, after varying from 202½, the opening price, 202 and 203½, up to the 14th, it took a jump on the 18th on the statement that the company would not yield and give "dollar gas," and on the 17th a gain of 4 points to 206¾ was made; this was increased to 208½ on the 20th, but this was gradually lost until the closing bid was 206, a net gain of 3½ points.

Bank of Montreal has ranged between 219, on the 1st, to 221\frac{3}{4} on the 7th, the figure on the 28th being 220, a net gain of a single point.

#### INCENDIARIES IN NEW YORK.



#### COLD STORAGE.



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
