

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MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

TAKEN IN THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH, ST. JAMES STREET, MONTREAL, QUEBEC.

Organization of the Conference, 5th June, 1879.

THE FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, began in the St. James Street Church, in the City of Montreal, at Nine o'Clock A.M., on Wednesday, the 5th of June, 1872.

The Rev. WILLIAM MORLEY PUNSHON, M.A., LL.D., President, in the Chair.

The President gave out the 482nd Hymn, the Secretary read the 72nd Psalin and the 12th Chapter of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans. The Co-Delegate, the Rev. G. R. Sanderson, and the Rev. Dr. Rice, led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the roll, as received from the several Districts. One Hundred and Eighty Ministers arswered to their names.

The SECRETARY read an extract from the address of the British Conference, confirming the nomination of the Rev. William Morley Punshon, M.A., LL.D., as President, and the Rev. John Borland, as Co-Delegate of the Conference.

The Rev. WILLIAM SCOTT was elected Secretary of the Conference.

The President delivered an appropriate address.

The Co-Delegate briefly addressed the Conference, as did also the Secretary and the Retiring Secretary.

QUESTION IX.

Atho have Died?

1. Moses M. Johnston.

Bro. Johnston was born near Jerseyville, in the township of Ancaster, on the 23rd of November, 1836, and died at his father's residencee on the 27th of August, 1871, aged 34 years and 9 months. He was consecrated to God in his youth, and maintained his Christian character to the last. In early manhood he believed

himself called to the work of the Christian ministry, but delayed offering himself for some time on account of his delicate constitution. He finally resolved to devote himself to this work with whatever capabilities he had been endowed. He entered the ministry in 1862, and was ordained at Monircal, in 1866. During his second year on the Compton Circuit, after severe labours in a camp-meeting, and also in subsequent special services, he was attacked with hemorrhage of the lungs, which left him greatly reduced in strength, but he continued to superintend his Circuit until the ensuing Conference, when he retired.

Bro. Johnston was an arduous labourer, paying special attention to the sick. His pulpit efforts were characteried by sincere humility; his purity of mind, chaste conversation, and universal charity, made him greatly beloved and esteemed by those who knew him best. His long illness, which lasted one year and ten months, was borne with great patience. He loved his friends, his family, his brethren,—but above every earthly affection was his ardent love for the work of Christ. Once, when spoken to about his future reward, he made the remark, "Ah! yes; but this world is the sphere of labour." During his illness he was supported by the religion which he had preached to others. A few moments before his death, when asked if he could trust in Jesus, he answered, "Yes, forever."

2. THOMAS JEFFERS.

Bro. Jeffers was born in the city of Cork, Ireland, in 1810, and came with his parents to Canada while yet a boy. His chi dhood and youth were blessed with the watchful care of a consistently pious mother, who exemplified religion in every stage of life.

Our brother was converted about the age of twenty, and never wickedly departed from the Lord. His stability was severely tested during the period of the rebellion in Canada, but he performed duty as a brave soldier without giving up his Christian integrity. In 1841, being recommend duby the old Bay of Quinte Circuit, he was received as a probationer for the Wesleyan Methodist Ministri. He passed through his probation with credit; and, after his ordi-

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ip of ther's uths. I h's ieved dination, was generally placed in the Superintendency of the Circuits on which he laboured.

Complicated disorders, induced by excessive labour and exposure, obliged him to request a Superanuated relation in 1868. The last year and a half before his death, although this relation to the Conference remained, he supplied a small Circuit by arrangement with the Stationing Committee.

Bro. Jeffers possessed average preaching abilities, which joined to very careful preparation, male him an acceptable preacher. But his highest praise was his great laboriousness and marked attention to every part of his work. His conscientiousness was unquestionable through the whole course of his religious life; but all acquainted with him observed an increase of spiritual-mindedness during the last few years.

The wants of his family necessitated such efforts to supplement the slender resources derived from the Superannualed Ministers' Fund, as overtaxed his failing physical energies, and perhaps hastened his death. He literally died in the Master's work. He attended and assisted at a camp-meeting, commenced about the 12th of September, 1871, near the village of Norval. He was observed to exert himself very much in the prayer-meetings on the afternoon of the 15th. He took his tes on the ground with the brethren, and went about nightfall to the adjacent residence of Mr. Thomas Forster, to lodge for the night. He complained of being chilly and tired, and after warming himself at the fire, lay down to rest on a lounge, and immediately expired. He was in the 62nd year of his age, and 26th of his Ministry.

3. EZRA ADAMS.

The subject of this notice was born July 17th, 1788, in the State of New York and died, in Drayton, December 1st, 1871. His parents sympathized with Britain during the revolutionary struggle, and not long after his birth removed to the Eastern Townships, Lower Canada. He was brought up as a Presbyterian, the family being strongly prejudiced against Me hodism. This continued until his 23rd year, when the Holy Spirit powerfully convinced Ezra of his lost condition. Under deep conviction, he found his way to a

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Methodist Quarterly Meeting, held in the Township of Ascott, by a Presiding Elder from the States, when God revealed himself in his forgiving love, and gave him the Spirit of adoption. From that hour his life was a living sacrifice for God. No toil too great, no suffering too severe for him to endure, if only God might be glorified and souls saved.

Feeling that God had called him to the work of the ministry, he entered the door when is opened, and commenced as an itinerant on the Long Point Circuit, in the year 1814. In our day we can form little conception of the suffering and toil through which the ministers of those days parsed. The writer once heard Father Adams say that he lived one year on the small pittance of \$50 and some cents. He had to go so thinly clad in the winter, that lung disease was the result; bringing him so low that he could neither see, hear, nor feel. In answer to prayer, he was raised from the gates of the grave, but was forced to locate for several years. No sooner did health return, than afresh he gave himself to God's work; but such was the carnestness with which he laboured (for soul-saving was a passion with him) that in a few years he was again forced to retire. Again, on the return of strength, he was at the work in which his soul delighted, and continued to toil on till the year 1848, when he superannuated, (making his residence in the Township of Peel,) not again to return to active labour. His, however, was far from being an idle life. He continued to preach as he had strength, and retained his popularity and influence to the last. Nor need we wonder at this; he had a clear, strong intellect, joined to an ardent tomperament, sanctified by a large measure of Divino grace. successful in winning souls for Christ, wherever he laboured. His loyalty to Methodism was manifested in zeal for her interests, and in giving all his children to her. His duty to his God and the Church of his choice, were the two great ideas of his life, to which everything else was made subordinate.

A short time previous to the Conference of 1871, he preached a most powerful sermon. It seemed as if he had such a sight of the sinner's exposure, that he could hardly close. It was his last sermon. In a few days he was stricken down with a partial paralysis, from which he never recovered so as again to take his place in the house of God. The Master said, "Workman, thy work is done; tarry

awhile on the border land, and then will come the time of reward."

During his sickness, while it was painful to witness the shaken body and the weakened mind, yet it was delightful to see his triumph in God his Saviour, and his full assurance of a home with loved ones gone. The last hour came unexpectedly. One of his sons who had been conversing with him, turned away to do something, when he looked again Father Adams was gone,—and gone, without a struggle or a groan. May the mantle of the fathors be caught by worthy hands, and may we commit it without a stain to those vino follow us, that the bright succession may continue so long as the sun and moon endureth!

4. WILLIAM MCGLADDERY,

A native of Canada, was converted about four years ago on the Yonge Street South Circuit, under the labours of Rev. J. Metcalf. His conversion was clear and powerful, and his evidence of acceptance bright and joyous. After having filled the offices of class-leader and local preacher, he was, at the Belleville Conference of 1871, received on trial as a minister and appointed to the Milford Circuit. He laboured there with great acceptance for three months, when disease compelled him to resign the office and studies, in which he greatly delighted. He died of consumption, on Yonge Street Circuit, 2nd December, 1871, at the early age of 21 years and five months. His end was peaceful and triumphant.

5. THOMAS DEMOREST

Was born in Ontario, Canada, March 7th, A.D. 1798. In early life he was brought under religious influences, and at fifteen years of age was led with earnestness to seek a personal interest in Christ, and was soon enabled by faith to apprehend Him as his all-sufficient Saviour. Though young in years he soon became zealous in the cause he had espoused, and at the age of 19 received license to officiate as a local preacher, in which capacity he laboured acceptably for two years. In 1819, Bro. Demorest was received by the Conference and appointed to the St. Lawrence Circuit. In 1822, having laboured zealously and successfully for three

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years, he was received into full connexion and ordained deacon, and at the close of two subsequent years he received ordination to the eldership.

Soon after his reception into full Connexion and ordination, he was united in marriage to Miss Harriet R. Burnett, an estimable young lady, of respectable parentage and deep piety, who, during the few years her life was spared, was truly, a "help meet for him." For three years he laboured with great acceptability on the Niagara and Dumfries Circuits, when at the call of his father, he sought and obtained permission from the Conference to leave the regular work for a time. From 1827 up to 1841 his relation was that of local elder. During this period he continued to labor zealously and effectively in the Lord's vineyard as circumstances would permit. In 1841, he again entered the field of evangelistic toil, after which he laboured successfully in the following Circuits, viz. : Picton, Rideau, Brockville, Peterboro', St. Catharines, Grimsby, York, and Humber. 1849, he was appointed General Agent for the Connexional Funds. This office he retained for a number of years; travelling through all parts of Ontario; attending with scrupulous exactness to his duties, and preaching when and where circumstances would permit.

In consequence of age and infirmities, our departed brother superannuated in 1859. To preach was his delight to the last, and it may be emphatically said of him, he was an ardent lover of all the ordinances of the Lord's house. Hence, his place was never vacant in the sanctuary when he could attend. He was strongly attached to the church of his early choice, yet free from sectarian bigotry. He was sound in Methodist theology. As a preacher he was punctual, plain, and practical. His last illness was somewhat protacted, and towards the close his sufferings were severe; but he found that that religion which had sustained and comforted him amid the bitterest bereavements and disappointments of life, and which he had so frequently recommended to others for nearly sixty years, was all-sufficient to sustain and comfort him in suffering, and remove all gloominess from the grave. The greatest anxiety ho experienced during his illness arose from the consideration of the spiritual condition of his son, with whom he resided after his superannuation. May the prayers of friends and sainted parents specifily

be heard and answered in behalf of an only child! Our departed brother closed his earthly pilgrimage in holy triumph, January 29th, 1872, in the 74th year of his age and the 53rd year of his ministry.

6. WILLIAM SHAW,

Son of William and Sarah Shaw, was born at Shawbridge, P.Q., in the year 1838. He was converted to God at a camp-meeting held at Lacolle, the date of which cannot be given. His enjoyment of religion was not clear until a revival of God's work at Shawbridge, which took place under the labours of Revs J. Webster and C. Jones, from which time he began to exercise gifts for Christ in taking occasional appointments. This led to his receiving a call from the Church to the regular work of the ministry, which was accepted by him with many fears. He travelled the Circuits of Lachute, Franklin Centre, Smith's Falls, Newburgh, and Napanee, on all of which he preached the gospel with much acceptance, and endeared himself to all who became acquainted with him by the amiability. simplicity, and sincerity of his Christian character. He took a severe cold soon after his removal to the Napanee Circuit, and was compelled to give up his Master's work in the month of September, 1869. His sickness terminated in a lingering consumption, from which he died on the 24th of February, 1872, in the 34th year of his age and sixth of his ministry. He fell asleep trusting in that Saviour whom he had preached to others, and his death was a blessed exhibition of Christ's power to save.

7. DAVID WRIGHT,

A native of the Province of Ontario, born near the Bay of Quinte, in the year 1792. He died on the 28th of March, 1872, being 80 years of age at the time of his death.

Mr. Wright received a somewhat better education than many of his own rank and station in this country during the period of his school-going days. Like nearly all the young men of the Province at that time, he did his full share of militia service during the war of 1812-15. In youth, he was handsome in person and vivacious in spirit. These qualities made him a general favourite among

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maný l of his covince war of ous in among the gay and thought!est, but led him into many follies before his conversion; yet his was not a heart unsusceptible of religious impressions. At the age of 24 he was savingly brought to Christ in a revival of religion then in progress on both sides of the Bay of Quinte. He began immediately to labour for God and souls in a local sphere. In 1820, he was employed as a Chairman's supply on the Ottawa and Cornwall Circuits, and then for two years on the Belleville Circuit, but was not received on trial till the Conference of 1823.

His early ministry was characterized by great zeal and much success. He was just the man to resuscitate a run-down Circuit. His commanding voice, powers of sacred song, fervour of spirit, and giftedness in prayer and exhertation, compensated for any lack of method in the order of his sermons. He was several times placed on Indian Missions, and made himself a favourité among that people to whom he was more than usually useful. Once during the course of his ministry, for the space of three years, he filled the important office of Chairman of a District.

His nominal superannuation took place in 1846, about twenty-three years from the time of his formal reception on trial, but he ever stood ready to perform any work the exigencies of the Connexion might require. Two of these intervals of pastoral charge, each extending over a period of three years, embraced the Circuits of Stoney Creek and New Credit.

The loss of his holy and helpful partner in life, two years or more before his own departure, was a heavy blow to him; and the removal from this world, of his only and much-loved daughter, Mrs. Judge McDonald, of Guelph, at whose house he made his last earthly home, a short time before his own demise, seemed to be the rupture of one of the last links that bound him to earth.

The last few weeks of his life were spent with his son-in-law and grand-children. Two Sabbaths before his death he assisted the Rev. E. B. Harper, in the Guelph pulpit, and evinced a spirit religiously triumphant. After his fatal attack, Mz. Harper was summoned, and found him in a partial lethargy; but when spoken to, and inquired of about his religious state and future prospects, he aroused himself, and answered in his usual decided and sententious

manner. "There is not a cloud—nor a doubt—nor a fear!" Being left to himself, he relapsed into stuper, and soon passed away to the land of rost and joy.

8. HESRY W. MAXWELL.

Bro. Maxwell, of Durham, died at his father's residence, Wyoming, on the 12th of April, 1872. He was religiously trained, and to this fact he often made grateful reference.

Under the ministrations of Rev. Jaz. Hughes, 2nd, and the Rev. D. L. Brethour, he was awakened and led to Christ. In a few months he was appointed leader, and soon after exhorter; and in June, 1862, leaving a fucrative position, he was sent to the Ainley-ville Mission, where he spent a very happy and successful year. He afterwards laboured successively on the Kincardine, Howick, Eaton, Bathurst: Roxbero', Pert Nouf, and Durham Circuits. He was a man of great energy, which he devoted to the service of the Master. Self-sacrifice and carnestness were in all his labours; indeed we may regret that by the intensity of these his useful life was shortened. He was a man of sound and growing piety. His preaching was instructive, and he was carefully punctual to time and place. He left his work with great sorrow, yet with complete submission to the Divine will. After a year of patient suffering "he was not, for Ged took him."

GENERAL STATEMENT.

According to the Minute: of 1871, the total number of members returned, including those on trial, was 66,709. This year the numbers are 69,597, showing an increase of 2,708. There were 856 deaths reported during the past year. This year's Church Relief Fund was in advance of last year's about \$250. The Contingent Fund advanced this year \$269 66. The College Fund, as far as reported, is about \$500 less than in 1871. The Missionary Fund has advanced more than \$9,000 above the year which closed on the 30th of June, 1871. The Superannuated Ministers' Fund has advanced a comparatively small amount. The grand total of Scholars in our Sabbath Schools, at the Conference of 1871, was 64,598. This year the numbers are 69,112, showing an increase of 4,514.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITEES.

WESLEYAN MISSIONARY THE REPORT OF COMMITTEE, 1871-72.

The Committee held its Annual Session in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, in the town of St. Catherines, beginning on Tuesday, 10th October, 1871. The occasion was one of great interest and harmony. The widely extended Mission work of the Church was carefully reviewed, and the Committee proceeded to the work of appropriating the funds necessary to carry or the work for the current vear.

The Committee also took into serious consideration the question of inaugurating a Foreign Mission. discussion it was resolved, on motion of John Macdonald, Esq., seconded by the Rev. Dr. Wood :-

"That whereas in the carrying out of the great trust committed by Christ to His Church, viz, that of preaching the gospel to every creature, the Church is bound not only to avail itself of providential openings which clearly indicate its duty in that direction, but to look for them; and as so many circumstances of a most favourable character combine at this time pointing to Japan, with its vast and interesting population, as an inviting field of Missionary enterprise, a Committee be appointed, consisting of the Rev. W. M. Punshon, M.A., President of Conference; Revs. Dr. Taylor, Dr. Evans, Samuel Rose, and W. T. Masor, Esq., with the mover and seconder, to make enquiries as to the suitability of that or any field, and report to the Sub-committee of Finance and Consultation, who shall take such steps as may be necessary to bring the same before the Conference."

The Committee also recommended the Sub-committee to ascertain whether arrangements could be made to send a deputation from the Society to visit our Missions in the North-west.

A letter was laid before the Committee by the President, signed by the Rev. W. B. Boyce and the Rev. George T. Perks, Secretaries of the English Wesleyan Missionary Society, in reference to the commutation of our claim against the Parent Scriety; and consenting to extend the time within which the Sanadian Society could claim the final grant till the year 1874.

The rest of the business, including appropriations to Indian Missions and Missions in the North-west, was referred to the Sub-committee of Consultation and Finance,

and the Committee adjourned.

The Sub-committee met in Toronto, on the 2nd of November, 1871, and again on the 6th of February, 1872. The appropriations to the Indian Missions, and the Missions in the North-west, were carefully considered and adopted, and the general topics referred from the General Committee were taken up. In regard to the recommendation to send a deputation to Red River, the Sub-committee resolved that a Deputation be appointed to visit our work at Winnipeg, that valedictory and ordination services be held there, and that all the Missionaries in the North-west be notified to meet such Deputation. It was also resolved that the Sub-committee recommend to the authorities of the Church the appointment of the President of the Conference, the Rev. Dr. Wood, and John Macdonald, Esq., as such deputation.

A question having been raised at a previous meeting of the Committee, concerning the date of the organization of our Missionary Society, and a Committee appointed to inquire into the same, a report was presented and adopted by the Sub-Committee, setting forth that our Missionary Society was organized at Hallowell, on the 28th day of August, 1824, and recommending that efficient arrangements be made to celebrate the Jubilee of the Society during the year commencing the 28th of August, 1873.

to report as follows :--

"We find that your Society was formed in Hallowell, on Saturday, the 28th day of August, 1824, and during the first sessions of the Canada Conference, which had been organized but three days previous to this date. The first Annual Report of your Society was presented at Saltfleet, on Saturday, the 17th of September, 1825; consequently the year which closed last June was the 47th year of the Society's existence, and not the 46th, as on the cover of the Report.

"The error arose in this way:—No Report was printed for 1830, but in 1831 the operations of these two years were reported and printed together, credit being taken on the cover for one year only. By this trifling accident an awkward discrepancy has existed for years between the age of the Society and your annual reports, which we submit should be corrected in the next report to be printed.

"We beg also to recommend that as the fiftieth year of this Society will commence on the 28th day of August, 1873, efficient arrangements be made to celebrate its Jubilee during that year, in time to close the services connected therewith on the 28th day of August, 1874."

The Committee having carefully re-considered the claims of the children of Superannuated and Deceased Ministers, recommend that the clauses of the Constitution, published in the New Edition of the Discipline, reducing them, be annulled, and that in future the said children be paid according to the former regulations of the Fund.

They also recommend that in view of the improved condition of the Fund, the Treasurer be instructed to pay the claims of such children for the past year without reduction.

The claims of 880 children have been paid, 37 have gone off the Fund; and 64 new claimants have arisen. The number now to be provided for is 907, an increase of 27.

The following resolutions were passed by the Committee relating to the sale of Church Property, and approved by the Conference:

TORONTO DISTRICT.—Resolved, that the Trustees of the Wesleyan property in Bathurst street have permission to re-convey a Lot to the Government in order to obtain a satisfactory deed of the same.

That the Trustees of the Yorkville Wesleyan Church have permission to sell a certain property in that place.

Hamilton District.—That the Trustees of the Bethel Church, in the Hamilton Centre Circuit, have permission to sell the Bethel Church and apply the proceeds to the removal of the debt on the Simcoe street Church, in the same Circuit.

Brantford District.—That the Trustees of the Fairfield Wesleyan Parsonage have permission to sell the same in order to purchase a more desirable property.

CHATHAM DISTRICT.—That the Trustees of the Wesleyan Parsonage property at Windsor have permission to sell said property, with a view of building a new one in a more suitable place.

That the Trustees of Wallaceburg have permission to sell the old log Church, with lot in Johnston's neighborhood. The proceeds to be applied in paying debt on the church at Wallaceburg.

SARNIA DISTRICT.—That the Trustees of the Park Hill Parsonage property have permission to sell Lot 9, on the north side of Mill street, Park Hill.

GUELPH DISTRICT.—That the Trustees of Elmira have permission to sell the Elmira Wesleyan Church, and apply the proceeds in aid of the erection of a new one.

That permission be granted to the remaining Trustee of the Priceville Church, on the Artemesia Circuit, to sell the lot now said to be no longer needed, and apply the proceeds in paying for a Church erected in a more suitable place.

Barrie District.—That the Wesleyan Trustees of Barrie be allowed to sell a lot in the said town of Barrie, and purchase another in a more suitable place.

PETERBORO' DISTRICT.—That the Trustees in the Robinson's neighborhood be allowed to deed the old church lot to Mr. Robinson in exchange for a more suitable situation.

Belleville District.—That the Trustees of Bloomfield be allowed to sell the old Church and apply the proceeds in the crection of a new one.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.—That the Trustees of the Church property in Morven, Napanee Circuit, be allowed to sell said property and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new Brick Church.

That the Trustees of the Wesleyan Church in Wilton be allowed to sell the old Church and lot, and apply the proceeds to pay for a Church about to be built.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.—That permission be given to the Trustees of the second concession congregation of Osnabruck, to sell the Hooper Church.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.— That the Wesleyan Trustees of Pembroke congregation have permission to sell the old Burial Ground and apply the proceeds towards paying for the new lots obtained.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.—That the Trustees be allowed to sell the Wesleyan Parsonage property in Longneil, L'Orignal Circuit, and also land in rear of chapel ground beginning at a distance of six feet from rear of shed, to a point straight with northerly line to a distance of twelve feet from north side of Chapel, with right of passage over twelve feet reserved on said north side of Chapel, for the sum offered, \$200, and proceeds applied to new Parsonage Fund.

That the Trustees of the Wesleyan Parsonage property in Bearbrooke, be allowed to exchange the east half of Parsonage lot for an equal portion of land on the west side of Parsonage.

That the Trustees of North Gower be allowed to sell the Church lot formerly occupied, proceeds to be applied for the purchase of a more suitable site.

MONTREAL DISTRICT.—That the Trustees of Great St. James Street Wesleyan Methodist Church be allowed to sell to a new Board of Trustees, appointed in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline.

That the Trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Chatham, P. Q., (Lachute Mission,) be permitted to sell the old Church, and apply the proceeds to a new Church of the same congregation.

That the Conference be recommended to take steps for the passing of an act in the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, similar in its provisions to 35 Vic., Chap. 107, Ontario Statutes.

That the Church Relief Fund Committee meet on the first Tuesday morning of the Conference, and that the Secretary of Conference send notice of the same to the Lay Members of this Committee appointed by the May District Meetings.

That the thanks of this Committee be presented to the Rev. Thos. Cosford, and that he be re-appointed Treasurer of this Fund.

REPORT OF THE CONTINGENT FUND COMMUTATION COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to consider the commutation of the grant made by the Parent Body to our Contingent Fund, met in the Vestry of the Wesleyan Church, Great St. James Street, at about 11 o'clock, June 7th, 1872.

Rev. W. M. Punshon, LLD., President of Conference, in the chair.

Present—Dr. Wood, Dr. Rice, Dr. Taylor, Dr. Green, and Dr. Evans; Revs. G R. Sanderson, S. Rose, R. Jones, Alex. Sutherland, and J. Gray, who was requested to act as Secretary.

We were also favoured with the presence of the Rev. Luke H. Wiseman, M.A., one of the Secretaries of the Parent Missionary Society.

The President stated briefly the present position of the question.

A free and general conversation took place, in which most of the Members of the Committee took a part. The Committee unanimously agreed to recommend the Conference to accept the sum of £7,000 Stg., in commutation of the Annual Grant now drawn by this Conference in behalf of the Contingent Fund of the Canada Conference.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE TO THE CONFERENCE OF 1872.

RESPECTED BRETHREN,-

The increased interest manifested in our Sabhath School work during the past few years, has greatly encouraged our brethren who are engaged in carrying on the

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Schools, and has incited them to greater exertion than formerly, and with the most happy results, as will be observed on examination of the statistical summary herewith appended.

Expressions of general satisfaction with the Constitution, published in the last Minutes of Conference, have come to us from 11 parts of our work, and 597 schools are reported

as having adopted it.

The Montreal District presented a resolution requesting that laymen be added to the Sabbath School Committee; in the same manner as in the composition of the Church Relief Committee. On this subject, your Committee would not recommend any action this year; not that we undervalue the help which our brethren would undoubtedly be able to render us, but that the change proposed requires more consideration in its details than we have been able to give at the present time.

In the event of Superintendents of Schools becoming members ... the Quarterly Official Meetings, your Committee hope that they will be furnished with Annual Schedules; which they shall fill up and read at the May Quarterly Official Meeting. From these returns the Superintendent of the Circuit or Mission shall prepare the Circuit Schedule. Also that the Chairmen of Districts be required to have the Circuit Schedules read at the District Meeting, with as as much care as other schedules. It will be a matter of surprise to the Conference to learn, that although the schedules are more complete than on any former occasion, yet at this late date of the Conference there are several Circuits which have presented no report, and many Schedules give evidence of extreme haste in their preparation. It is hoped that these recommendations will secure more promptuess and precision in the returns.

Your Committee are of the opinion that a public Annual Conference Subbath School Meeting would greatly serve the interests of our schools. At such meeting, held on some evening during Conference, the General and Statistical Report might be presented, and addresses delivered by members of the Conference. Should the judgment of the

Conference approve this measure, we should be thankful if such a meeting could be provided for when the Conference plan is prepared.

We have been reminded from many sources of the importance of securing better books for our libraries. We trust the appointment of the Library Committee this year, in connection with our esteemed Book Steward, will, before very long, secure this desireable result.

Your Committee are glad to find that a large number of schools have adopted the uniform series of lessons published at the Book-Room, and would respectfully recommend that they be introduced into all our schools. Our Sunday School Banner and the Advocate are accomplishing a good work, and deserve much greater encouragement than they have yet received. We would call the special attention of the Conference to the importance of keeping prominently before the officers and teachers the great value of our Catechisms, and endeavor to secure their use in all our schools.

Many of the Districts desire that some plan be recommended by the Conference, whereby all the Ministers will have an opportunity of visiting the schools at least once a quarter.

Our judgment on this subject will be presented in a resolution accompanying this report.

Your Committee feels deeply impressed, not only that in the Sabbath School work there is a rich heritage entrusted to us as a Christian Church, but that here is our main dependence for the future. In the Sabbath School are the materials which must supply the life and activities of the Church at no very distant day. We may not, therefore, treat the subject lightly, but with heart and soul labor with increased diligence in the Master's work. And your Committee most earnestly pray that we may be Divinely aided in discharging this trust, and be thus enabled to gather a full harvest of blessings for the Master's glory and and for the Church's good.

The Conference adopted the following resolutions brought up by the Sabbath School Committee:—

Resolved,—That the Secretary of the Sabbath School Committee be requested to take charge of all papers and books belonging to our Sabbath School work from one Conference to another, make arrangements for the first meeting of the Committee as soon after the opening of the Conference as may be convenient, and continue in office until his successor be appointed. We recommend further, that the Secretary be requested to assist the Book Steward in preparing new schedules, in order to carry out the recommendations of this Committee and the Conference of last year.

Resolved,—That Superintendents of Circuits and Missions where the Schools cannot otherwise be visited by them, are requested; as far as practicable, to arrange their work in such a manner as to allow the schools once a quarter to supersede the regular preaching service. On such occasions it would be well to have the schools conducted by the Minister and Superintendent conjointly.

REPORT OF MODEL DEED COMMITTEE.

The Jommittee on the Model Deed, appointed at the Conference of 1871, have devoted their earnest attention to the matters entrusted to them. The various reprints of the Model Deed in the successive editions of the Book of Discipline were carefully read, and compared each with other, and with the original Deed. A number of variations were found to exist, some of which, viewed in connection with certain provisions necessary for the more complete adaptation of the Deed to cases occasionally arising in course of adminstration, were deemed to require legislative interference.

A Bill was therefore prepared, and laid before the Legislature of Ontario, which contains a copy of the original Deed, with the additional provisions introduced by your Committee.

The bill furthermore provided a short-form Deed, the execution of which places the property conveyed under all

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ed, the nder all the trusts set forth at large in the original Deed as by the bill proposed to be amended.

The new clauses in the bill provided for the declaring of vacancies in the Trust Board by death, resignation, cessation of church membership, or removal to an inconvenient distance, and for the filling of such vacancies. Also for increasing the number of Trustees beyond that originally constituting the Board, but fixing the maximum number at twenty-one.

By another important clause, provision was made by which Trustees holding lands for our church uses under other Deeds, may, by an easy and inexpensive process, place them under the trusts of the amended Model Deed.

The Committee express their obligations to A. W. Lauder, Esq., of Toronto, barrister, for his valuable advice, and time and ability gratuitously devoted to the preparation of the bill; and to Messrs. Spencer, Rose, and Macdonald, for their services as solicitors for the bill, which were also rendered without charge to the Connexion.

Your Committee would earnestly call the attention of Superintendents of Circuits, to the great importance of examining the state of the trusts on their respective Circuits, and of doing their diligence to have them placed under the uniform system of administration provided for in the amended Deed.

Your Committee have received a copy of a Resolution passed by the Conference of the Methodist New Connexion, which is as follows:

"Resolved,—That having again considered the subject of Methodist Union, this Conference would renew its expression as to the desirableness of an organic Union of the various Methodist bodies of Canada, and while adhering to the action of our last Conference in regard to the basis recommended by the United Committees, this Conference feels bound to say, that we could not accept any scheme of Union by which restrictions would be imposed upon the legislative powers of a General Conference, or upon the right of the laity to co-operate with the Ministry in such Conference in all acts of legislation and discipline."

It is the opinion of your Committee that the course taken by the Wesleyan Conference on the subject of Union affords to other Methodist bodies evidence of its sinceredesire to lead the pending negociations to a practicable

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scheme of Union; and your Committee recommend the Conference to re-affirm its Resolution of last year on the desirability of Union, and to appoint a Committee to confer with the representatives of the Methodist New Connexion, and with any Committee or Committees appointed by any of the Methodist bodies who accept the general basis laid down by the United Committees, and to report to the ensuing Conference.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE.

It will be gratifying to the Conference to know that an interview has been had between your Committee and the Representatives of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America.

After a free interchange of views, the following resolutions were adopted by your Committee, and they are presented for adoption by the Conference:

Resolved I.—That we have heard with great satisfaction the statements of the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D., and the Rev. D. D. Curry, in reference to the practicability of a union between the Canadian and E. B. A. Conferences, and we rejoice to find that the hindrances in the way are comparatively slight, and are of such a nature that they may be easily overcome. Wherefore,

Resolved II.—That this Committee recommends to the Conference the propriety of taking immediate steps to consummate a Federal Union with our brethren in Eastern British America, being convinced that such a step would tend to strengthen and consolidate Methodism, and promote the work of God throughout the whole of British America.

RFPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE, AS AMENDED BY ORDER OF THE CONFERENCE.

Your Committee beg to report that, in accordance with the resolution of last Conference, a public temperance meeting was held in the St. James Street Wesleyan Church, on

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Tuesday evening, the 11th inst. After devotional exercises, the Secretary of the Conference was called to the chair. The meeting was very large, and the resolutions discussed and adopted were of a useful and practical character. Your Committee are gratified with the fact that there is a growing conviction in the Conference and in the Church of the vast importance of the Temperance Reformation, and that it is our imperative duty at the present time to use all lawful and scriptural means to diminish the traffic and obtain its legal prohibition. These sentiments have frequently been expressed and adopted by the Conference We cannot go further upon this question than our venerable founder went a century ago. That there should ever have been an apparent departure from his sound principles of abstinence and prohibition is greatly to be lamented. It is difficult to get back to first principles; but your Committee recommend the reiteration and republication of the resolutions of the Conference in former years, believing that it is highly necessary and expedient to keep the subject clearly before our Church and congregations. The Conference is therefore respectfully requested to authorize the reprinting of the following declarations, which received the sanction of the brethren at our Conference in Belleville:

1. That this Conference reiterates its frequently expressed views on Total Abstinence, and would renew its earnest recommendation that every minister preach at least one sermon in each year to every congregation under his charge, enforcing Mr. Wesley's sentiments against the drinking and the sale of intoxicating liquors.

2. That this Conference earnestly recommends some form of Temperance effort in connection with all our Sabbath Schools, and urges on all superintendents and teachers, because of the potency of example, the practical adoption of Total Abstinence, and that they place in the hands of the children such books and tracts as will serve to inform them on the subject of Temperance, and guard our youth against the pernicious drinking practices which now prevail to an alarming extent.

3. That inasmuch as the rules of our church virtually constitute it a Temperance Society, we heartily approve, and respectfully recommend the general adoption of a practice now prevailing in some of our Circuits of incorporating into the meetings of the Church one for the discussion of the subject of Total Abstinence,

which may also assume the character of a Literary or Mutual Improvement Society.

We, moreover, devoutly hope that our church will practically and heartily identify itself with a y judicious measure inaugurated to secure the prohibition, by law. of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks; and we would respectfully suggest that until this consummation shall have been realized, a public meeting be held during each session of Conference for the promotion of Temperauce.

By a resolution of the present Conference, a Special Committee has been appointed, to whom all memorials and resolutions on this subject are to be referred, and whose duty it shall be to make arrangements for the Annual Conference Temperance Meeting. We beg to state that several resolutions of District Meetings came before your Committee, recommending more distinct Church action on this grave and momentous subject. But it was evident to your Committee that the large amount of regular Conference business which demanded consideration in a very limited time, rendered it inexpedient to attempt the introduction and discussion of propositions on which there would be widely different opinions. The subject is too vast and weighty to be either slightly touched or speedily decided, but we trust the day is not distant when the whole body of Christ's people will unitedly stand up against the encroachments and destructive influences of the liquor traffic.

Your Committee received a memorial from the Temperance and Prohibitory Leagues of Ontario and Quebec. We refer to the Minutes of 1869 for the judgment of the Conference in regard to these societies, which are only an expansion of the "Canada Temperance Union." It was then resolved, "That this Conference hails with much pleasure the formation of the Society designated the Canada Temperance Union, having for its object the consolidation and co-operation of all the various organizations of the country with a view to promote the cause of total abstinence and the entire suppression of the liquor traffic, regarding this effort as essentially Christian in its character, and in perfect accordance with the views of Mr. Wesley, and the general rules of the Methodist Churches."

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sentirs. orm of Your Committee has no reason to suppose that the Conference has changed its views in any degree but would reiterate them most cordially. In the modes of procedure adopted at any time by these Societies, we are not required to concur, but in the general principles of abstinence and prohibition, which in themselves are at least as old as Wesleyan Methodism and cannot be abandoned without the saddest prospects of deterioration and danger. Your Committee conclude with the earnest hope that the Temperance cause will revive throughout the Dominion, and that concomitant therewith the Church may receive a glorious outpouring of the Holy Ghost, without whose gracious influences nothing is holy or strong or good.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT OF VICTORIA COLLEGE.

For some years past an effort has been made by the Faculty of Arts in your University to afford all the aid in their power to students preparing for the work of the Christian Ministry. They have done this not only in connection with the ethical, classical, and rhetorical instruction of the Arts course, but also by the establishment of special classes in Theology, free to all who wished to attend. Of these advantages no less than thirty-six young men availed themselves during the four years preceding the present. All these are now in the work of the ministry.

The appointment of Mr. Richard W. Wilson, B.A., as Classical Tutor, opened the way for compliance with the expressed desire of the last Conference, that more system and completeness should be given to this department, and with the advice of the President of Conference, the following arrangements have been carried into effect during the past year:

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by the the aid of the nly in instrucnent of shed to young eceding inistry. , B.A., vith the system nt, and following the The President of the University, in addition to the usual classes in Logic, Ethics and Metaphysics, took charge of a class in Biblical Literature during the first term and subsequently in Homiletics, meeting them for lecture once a week throughout the year.

Professor Wilson formed a class in Angus' Bible Handbook, besides a junior and a senior class in Greek Testament, devoting to these subjects five hours a week the first

term, and three the second.

Professor Burwash formed two classes in Theology: one in Biblical History, and two in Hebrew, giving eight hours' instruction a week.

A large number of Theological students have also received instruction from Professor Reynar in Rhetoric.

The President of the Conference opened the course by an admirable lecture on the duties and studies of a Christian minister, and the special importance of the study of the word of God.

Twenty-seven students entered their names in these classes, two of whom are preparing for the ministry in other branches of the Methodist Church. Nine of these were engaged in studies for the Conference preliminary examinations, five of whom obtained certificates, and one will offer himself for the Bible Christian Conference. Six were engaged in studies of the first year, two taking certificates. Twelve were engaged in the studies of the third and fourth years, and all obtained certificates, several of the highest class.

The lectures in Homiletics have been attended by ten students; the classes in the Greek Testament by eleven; in Angus by seven; in Hebrew by seven; in Theology, primary class, ten, advanced eleven; in Bible History by twelve. Besides these classes, eleven of the twenty-seven are carrying on the studies of the undergraduate course. The others have received instruction in elementary Classics and English branches, or in Rhetoric, Logic, Metaphysics, Ethics, or Natural Science in the ordinary College classes.

It will be seen from the foregoing report that an earnest

effort has been made to meet the demand of the Church for an educated ministry. During the ensuing year it is hoped that the classes now established may be rendered more efficient,—and that instruction may also be provided in Church History, the Evidences of Religion, and other subjects.

The Board have to express their obligations to the President of the Conference, the Revs. E. B. Harper, M.A., and W. Briggs, and Gervas Holmes, Esq., for kind assistance in conducting the Theological examinations.

In connexion with this report, it may be mentioned that a carriculum for the Degree of Bachelor in Divinity is under consideration, and will forthwith be published.

In conclusion, the Board are glad to state that they have good grounds for hoping that shortly a Chair in Theology in connexion with the University will be fully endowed, thus giving permanency to this department, and lightening the burden on the general funds of the Institution.

A large Committee of Ministers and Laymen was appointed to consider the foregoing Memorial.

After a very full and careful examination of the proposal made therein, the following resolution was adopted:

"That this Committee having carefully considered the Memorial of the Hon. James Ferrier and others, in reference to the establishment of a Theological School in the City of Montreal, under the control of the Conference, are of opinion that the generous offer of the friends in Montreal should be promptly and gratefully accepted, and that we recommend the Conference to take immediate steps for carrying out the object contemplated in the Memorial referred to."

The subject was brought before the Conference, and after a very earnest and exhaustive discussion of the preamble and resolutions, they were adopted as follows:

Whereas the Hon. J. Ferrier, Wm. Clendinneng, John Torrance, and others of the W. M. Church in Montreal, propose to endow a Theological Chair in the City of Montreal, and for which purpose have already secured the sum of \$40,000, which sum is subsequently to be augmented; and whereas they further propose to place the said Theological Department under the exclusive control and direction of the Conference, with the following sole conditions, viz:—

- 1. That it be established in the City of Montreal.
- 2. That it be established speedily.

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1. That this Conference with the greatest cordiality, accepts the proposition of the generous donors.

2. That the Professor or Professors, as also the members of the Board of Management consisting, at the beginning, of five Ministers and five Laymen, shall be appointed from time to time by the Conference, and any additional facilities and provisions for further instruction shall be provided by the Managing Board at its discretion, provided always that the financial responsibility involved in the establishing and maintenance of the Theological School shall be assumed by the Board of Management.

3. That the Board of Management shall regularly present an Annual Report of the condition and progress of the Theological Department to the Conference.

At a subsequent period in the Conference proceedings, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved,—That the Rev. Geo. Douglas, LL D., be and is hereby appointed the Theological Tutor in the Theological School in the City of Montreal."

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee on Memorials met in one of the vestrys of the St. James Street Church, on Monday evening June 10th, 1872. John Hunt was appointed Chairman, James Preston, Secretary.

In reply to the resolutions of the Yonge Street South Circuit and the Niagara District Meeting, requesting that the Recording Stewards and Lay Representatives from the circuits should have a vote in the election of the District Representative to the Stationing Committee:—

It was resolved that we recommend to the Conference that in view of the unsettled state of the question of Lay Representation, it is not expedient to make such an arrangement at present.

In reply to the special resolution of the Brantford District requesting the publication of the Belleville resolutions in the Minutes of Conference and in the next edition of the Discipline:—

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District in the ipline:— It was resolved that it be recomm need to the Conference that they be published in the Minutes of Conference for the present year.

In reply to the resolution of the Kingston District that it is desirable to have an additional column in the Connexional Fund Schedule for the amount collected by each Circuit or Mission for Sabbath School purposes:—

It was resolved that they are not properly collections for connexional purposes and it is not expedient to have an extra column for such purpose.

In reply to the resolutions from the Quarterly and Trustee Meetings of the Montreal Centre Circuit asking for the extension of time in which a minister may remain on a circuit to five or six years:—

It was resolved that it is not expedient to make such change at present.

In reply to the resolution from the Quarterly Meeting of the Stanstead District, asking that the salaries of our probationers be raised at least 40 dollars:—

It was resolved that as our Quarterly meetings may make such allowances for board as in their liberality they may deem fit, it was resolved that it is not expedient at present to interfere with the disciplinary allowance.

In reply to the resolution from the same District asking that our ministers' salaries be not taxed for Co.lege purposes:—

It was resolved that as everything connected with the interests of the College will be brought before the Conference in the report of the Board, we beg to submit the question to the consideration of the Conference.

In reply to the resolution from the Belleville and Whithy Districts respecting the employment of Evangelistic agency:—

It was resolved that it is not deemed expedient to originate any new agency at present, believing that our itinerant system vigorously worked will answer every purpose.

In reply to the memorial from the Hamilton West Circuit respecting the reception of members into the Church and members from other Circuits:—

It was resolved that whilst we deem it desirable to have a me formula in their reception, in the present condition of our Conference arrangements we recommend the subject to be laid over until we have a legislative Conference, which will be able to give more time to this and kindred questions. In the mean time we recommend to our ministers to give greater prominence to the reception of members from other Circuits.

In reply to the memorial from the Hestings' Mission respecting subscription lists and speakers at tea meetings.:—

It was resolved that the general rules of our Church provide for honesty in all our dealings, and suffic ently enforce truthand justice.

In reply to the resolution from the Bellevi le District respecting an the organization of a Tract Society in connection with our Church:

It was resolved that we approve the spirit of the resolution and recommend the Conference to refer the subject to the serious consideration of the Book Committee.

In reply to the memorial from the Montreal District recommending that Conference take steps for the passing of an Act in the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, similar in its precisions to the 55th Vic. Chap. 107, Ontario Statutes:—

It was resolved that we recommend the Conference to take such steps.

In reply to the resolution from the Owen Sound and Whitby Districts respecting the formation of a Connexional Insurance Company:—

It was resolved that the formation of such a company is not expedient, because the formation of an Insurance Company would necessitate a large deposit to be made with the Government, and the terms on which some of our Mutual Companies can insure Church property it would be impossible to compete with them, and the formation of such a company would necessitate the employment of an agency which is not experient for us at present.

In reply to the resolution of the Whitby District that the total from Circuits shall embrace only the items of salary, board, and fuel as these only constitute the actual income common to all ministers in our active work, and that the items of rent, horse keeping, and travelling expenses be inserted among the items at the foot of said Schedule.

It was resolved that we approve the spirit of the resolution, but we think our quarterly meetings on rural circuits will not be prepared for so great a change, but we recommend Conference to order that the item of "house rent" be placed at the foot of the Schedule.

In reply to the resolution from the same District that a column be inserted in the Financial table appendix in the published Minutes to exhibit the actual income of each minister from the circuit.

It was resolved that we recommend to the Conference to do nothing of the sort.

In reply to the memorial of the quarterly official meeting of the city of Octawa, desiring that some scheme whereby Lay-representation shall be granted to the membership of the church irrespective of the question of Union, that the laity be on a footing of equality both as to numbers and as to legislative and executive powers in all Conferences, Committees and Church Meetings.

It was resolved that we recommend the Corference that as a

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Committee has been appointed on the subject of Methodist Union before whom the subject of Lay-delegation will be brought for consideration and reported to the next Conference, it is unnecessary to refer to the matter more fully at present.

The following was passed in amendment to the Memorial Committee's Report for Insurance:—

Whereas by our Church, through the trustees of its various trust property, a large amount of money is annually paid to provide against loss by five, and that of the amount thus paid but a very small portion is claimed to apply on losses occurring, and

Whereas, some institutions of our Church, especially Victoria College, could be greatly advantaged by turning to good account the benefit which now goes to aid in building up independent insurance companies.

Therefore, Resolved,—First, That it is expedient and urgent for the Conference to make provision within itself, for the insurance against loss by fire, of its trust property and of ministers effects.

Second, That a Committee be appointed at this Conference who shall report at the next Conference; furnishing a scheme for the carrying out of the foregoing resolution, subject, of course, to the approval of or amendment by the Conference.

A Committee on Insurance was accordingly appointed. See page 10.

In regard to the proposed increase of Salaries for unmarried Ministers, and the above report, it was resolved in amendment, that this Conference approves of the proposed increase of Salary for unmarried Ministers, and directs that the matter be laid before the Quarterly Meetings of the Connexion previously to the next Conference, for their judgment thereon.

REPRINTED FROM THE MINUTES OF 1836,

BY ORDER OF THE CONFERENCE.

What can we further do to promote the prosperity and permanency of the work of God in our Societies?

After prayerful and serious deliberation on this important question, the Conference unanimously adopted the following resolutions of the British Conference passed on similar questions:—

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- 1. We, on this solemn occasion, devote ourselves afresh to God; and resolve, in humble dependence on His grace, to be more than ever attentive to personal religion, and to the Christian justruction and government of our families.
- 2. Let us endeavour, in our public ministry, to preach constantly all those leading and vital doctrines of the Gospel which particularly distinguished the original Methodist preachers whose labours were so signally blessed by the Lord, and to preach them in our primitive method, evangelically, experimentally, zeal ously, and with great plainness of speech.
- 3. Let us consecrate ourselves fully and entirely to our proper work, as servants of Christ,—giving ourselves wholly to it, both in public and private, and guarding against all occupations of our time and thoughts which have no direct connection with our great calling, and which would injuriously divert our attention from the momentous task of saving souls, and taking care of the flock of Christ.
- 4. Let us covet earnestly the best gifts to qualify us for an acceptable and useful ministry—let us seek them in prayer from Him who is the Father of Lights and Fountain of Wisdom—let us stir up and improve by diligent cultivation the gift that is in us, and strive in every way to be "workmen that need not to be anhamed, rightly dividing the word of truth:" taking care, however, that whatever qualifications we acquire, our Ministry shall, at least, by the Divine blessing, always be characterized by sound evangelical doctrine, and by the spirit of tender affection and becoming zeal.
- 5. Let us frequently read, and carefully study, the duty of a preacher and pastor, written in the 4th section of our Discipline, on page 43-5.
- 6. Let us try in every Circuit to open new places for preaching,—let us try again places which have not been recently visited,—let us be increasingly attentive to the supply and superintendence of all places already on the plan,—let us not be satisfied till every house and neighbourhood shall be blessed, as far as we possibly can accomplish it, with the means of grace and salvation,—in a word, let every Methodist preacher consider himself a Missionary, whose business it is to enlarge and extend, as well as keep the Circuit to which he is appointed.
- 7. Let us speak plainly and pointedly in every place, both in meetings of the Society and in our sermons, on the duty and advantages of Christian Communion, and exhort all who are seeking salvation to avail themselves without delay of the help of our more private means of grace.
- 8. Let us encourage public prayer-meetings. We recommend to our preachers, in all cases where it is practicable, the establishment and superintendence of prayer-meetings in private houses, as being calculated not only to call into exercise the gifts of our people, and to promote their religious improvement, but also to awaken others to the concerns of their souls, as well as to obtain the special blessing of God upon the ministry of His Word.
- 9. Let us, wherever we have access and opportunity, be diligent in pastoral visits to our people at their own houses; especially to the sick, the careless and the lukewarm.
 - 10. But as such private visits must, in many cases, from our plan of continual

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itinerancy, and from the number of members in our Societies, be greatly limited, let us endeavour so to arrange, in our several Circuits, the plans for the quarterly visitation of the classes as to allow full time for a minute examination into the Christian knowledge, experience, and practice of the members, and for pastoral enquiries, instructions, and counsels respecting personal and family religions.

- 11. Let us regularly meet the class leaders, and examine their class papers in Town and Country,—and do all we can to engage both them and our respected brethren the Local Preachers to co-operate with us, in their respective departments, in promoting vital gaddiness among our people and extending the work of the Lord.
- 12. As much depends, under the blessing of God, on the piety, knowledge, and Christian temper of our leaders, as well as on their firm attachment to the doctrines, discipline and cause of Methodism,—let us never nominate a new leader until we have conscientiously satisfied ourselves, by previous enquiry and personal examination, as to his character and qualifications.
- 13. Let us reflectionately, but firmly, enforce on the leader as an essential article of our pastoral discipline, and one which in consequence of our own constant Itinerancy cannot be dispensed with, the rule of the Society in which it is stated to be the duty of a leader to see each member of his class once a week.
- 14. Let us pay particular attention to backsliders, and endeavor in the spirit of meekness to restore the a that have been overtaken in a fault;—and by private efforts, as well as by our public ministrations, to recover the fallen out of the snare of the Devil.
- 15. Let us afresh enforce on all our people a conscientious attendance $\,$ in the Lord's Supper.
- 16. We also rescive that there shall be a regular observance of the quarterly fasts in all our Circuits, as directed in our discipline; on which occasions public prayer meeting shall be held in all our Societies, at those hours which may be deemed most convenient for the attendance of our people.
- 17. Let us earnestly exhort all our Societies to make the best and most religious use of the rest and leisure of the Lord's day—let us admonish any who shall be found to neglect our public worship under pretence of visiting the sick, or other similar engagements,—let us show to our people the evil of descerating those portions of the Sabbath which are not spent in public worship by visiting or receiving company, to the neglect of private prayer, of the perusal of the Scriptures and of family duties,—and let us ourselves "be living episties" to enforce the Divine Command, "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it Holy."
- 18. In conducting our Leaders' and Quarterly Meetings, and in all other official meetings among us, let us affectionately and sceadily discountenance the the spirit of strife and debate, and promete in the management of all affairs, both by advice and example, the temper and manner of mer. he are acting for God in the service of his church. Let the introduction of useless and irritating discussion not legitimately connected with the proper business of such meetings be

prudently repressed—let us remember that in a large body the only way to live in peace and comfort is to walk by rule, and, to use the language of Mr. Wesley, not to mend our rules, but to keep them for conscience sake. And while we steadily and cheerfully protect all our members in meetings in which we preside, in the exercise of such functions as belong to them, according to known laws and general usages, let us not for that we are under solemn obligations to conduct ourselves on such occasions, no as the mere chairmen of public meetings, but as the pastors of Christian Societies, put in trust by the ordinance of God, and by their own voluntary association with us, with the scriptural superintendence of their spiritual affairs, and responsible to the great Head of the Church for the faithful discharge of the duties of that trust.

19. Every Superintendent is requested to leave for his successor a Circuit book, which shall not only contain a list of the official members, and of the annual subscribers to our reveral Funds, &c., but especially an exact list of the names of all members in his Circuit, arranged in their several classes and societies as found at the last Quarterly Meeting of the year.

20. As we are deeply sensible that the great thing to be desired in order to a revival and extension of the work of God, without which no resolutions, or labors, or regulations will avail, is a new and more abundant effusion of the Holy Spirit on ourselves, on our Societies, and on our congregations,—we solemnly agree to seek that blessing in humble and earnest prayer. And we hereby appoint, that some day to be agreed upon shall be observed in all our Circuits as a day of special fasting and prayer to Almighty God. Let meetings for public supplication be held in as many places as possible in every Circuit, and let the preachers speak largely and particularly on the subject in their sermons on the preceding Lord's Day.

21. The various articles included in this Minute shall be read by every Chairman at the regular Annual Meeting of his Dietrict, and shall then be made the subject of serious conversation among the brethren with a view to their particular bearing on the spiritual state and circumstances of each District respectively.

SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS.

Registration of Trustees.

Resolved,—That whereas Superintendents of Circuits and Missions are often put to great inconvenience in ascertaining who are the Trustees of Connexional Property, and who hold the deeds, the Conference instructs all Superintendents to record in their Circuit Books, and also in their Circuit Registers, the names of all Trustees, and, if possible, state in whose possession the Trust Deeds are kept.

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Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it is

Resolved,—(1.) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements sudified and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2.) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairmen to the above resolution.

Sustentation of Victoria College.

Resolved,—That this Conference, on the recommendation of the Annual Meeting of Victoria College, now directs a special collection to be made in the month of February in all the Congregations under its care, the proceeds to be applied in manner and proportion as were the proceeds of the Ministers' Assessment last year, and instead thereof.

Duties of S. S. Library Committee.

Resolved,—It shall be the duty of the Sabbath School Library Committee to make selections of books from the shelves of the Book Room, such as in their judgment may be suitable for our Sabbath School Libraries. These shall be carefully read by the members of the Committee. All books which have been read and approved by any member shall, on recommendation, receive the approbation of the Committee, unless any other member of the Committee shall present an objection to their adoption. Such books shall have the sanction of the Committee printed on them for the guidance of our friends purchasing libraries.

Relating to the Division of the Conference, &c.

Resolved,—1. That in the judgment of this Conference the time has come when it is necessary and expedient to divide the Conference.

Resolved,—(2.) That a Committee be appointed on this question who shall consider the whole subject and prepare a plan which shall be laid before the next Conference.

Resolved,—(3.) That in the event of the Eastern British American Conference deciding in favour of Federal Union, they be invited to send a delegation for the purpose of drafting a scheme for the future government of our Church in British America.

Resolved,—(4.) That in the event of the appointment by the Conference of a Committee to confer with other Methodist bodies in Canada on the subject of Methodist Union, the two Committees shall be required to be in correspondence with each other.

Resolved,—(5.) That the scheme of division which may be devised by the Committee appointed for that purpose shall be printed, and a copy sent to every member of this Conference before the month of May next year.

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dian Methodism, we desire to record our unabated affection for our brethren in Britain, and our loyal attachment to the institutions, principles and memories, which have given to that land we love so well, her present high position among those nations that are the vanguard of Christian civilization and the hope of the world.

Revolved,—That this Conference has received with the highest satisfaction the admirable answer of the Conference of Eastern British America to former addresses of this Conference, and takes the opportunity of expressing the delight with which it has listened to the eloquent, Christian and National sentiments which have been addressed to this Conference by the distinguished representatives of the Conference of Eastern British America, the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D., and the Rev. D. D. Currie. This Conference reciprocates to the fullest extent the sentiments of affection which have been expressed, and prays that God's blessing may rest on the whole Church of Eastern British America, and make it more abundantly prosperous.

The Irish Conference.

Resolved.—That this Conference hereby expresses the satisfaction it has experienced by the visit and address of the Rev. Jos. W. McKay, the Secretary of the Irish Conference, and reciprocating his kindly-uttered and fraternal feelings, prays that he may have a prosperous voyage to his native land and that the richest blessings of Heaven may rest upon him and his Conference.

The Orphan Children's Home.

Resolved,—That whereas a statement has been made to this Conference by the Rev. Thos. Bowman Stephenson, M.A., of London, England, respecting the work of God now being carried on in the Children's Home, an institution for the reception and training of orphan and destitute children, and whereas it is the wish of the Committee and Directors of that institution to establish in Canada a Home, to which

these children when duly trained may be sent for distribution amongst Canadian families, therefore it is

Resolved,—That this Conference expresses its cordial approval of the scheme, and commends it to the sympathy and support of the Christian public of the Dominion.

The Methodist New Connexion.

Resolved,—That this Conference has heard with great satisfaction the expressions of fraternal regard presented to us by our esteemed brethren, the Rev. Dr. Cooke, Kev. Mr. Pitcher, and R. Wilkes, Esq., the representatives of the Methodist New Connexion, and while we rejoice in the substantial oneness of New Connexion Methodism with ourselves, we earnestly express a hope that the day is not far distant, when Wesleyan Methodism and New Connexion Methodism shall not only be one in spirit, faith, and purpose, but one also in organized unity of effort in the great work of spreading scriptural holiness throughout this vast Dominion.

The Delegates to the General Conference of the M. E. Church.

Resolved,—That the very heartiest thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby preparted to the Rev. G. R. Sanderson and to the Rev. A. Sutherland, for the very efficient and valuable services which they have rendered to this body, when acting in the capacity of delegates to the General Conference of the M. E. Church of the United States; and especially this Conference would express its gratitute to the Rev. G. R. Sanderson, Ex-Co-Delegate, for the faithful, wise, able and practical manner in which he explained and defended the history and position of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, before that body.

The Model Deed.

Resolved,—That the very cordial thanks of this Conference be presented to A. W. Lauder, Esq., M.P.P., and to Messrs. Spencer, Rose, & Macdonald, for the valuable services which they have cheerfully and most efficiently rendered to the Wesleyan Methodist Church in obtaining the legal istribu-

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recognition of the Model Deed, passed by the last Ontario Legislature.

Resolved,—That the thanks of the members of this Conference be presented to the Rev. John Potts, and the Ministers of the Montreal Circuits, for the labour they have performed in providing for their comfort, during the time they have been in attendence at their Annual Conference, and they beg to assure these brethren, that they will ever retain a lively recollection of their kindness on this occasion. The Conference also records its grateful appreciation of the services rendered by the Rev. James A. Gordon, by his faithful attention to the Postal department during the sessions of Conference.

The Friends in Montreal.

Resolved,—That the heartiest thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby tendered to the members and friends of our Church in Montreal, for the ample provision made for our entertainment during our stay in this beautiful city. We also direct that this expression of our gratitude be presented to our people in Montreal, from their respective pulpits next Lord's day.

Railroads and Steamboats.

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the various Railroad and Steamboat Companies for their generosity in allowing the ministers to travel at reduced rates.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

Order of Connexional Collections.

Resolved.—That the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order viz :-

1. CHURCH RELIEF FUND-In the month of July.

2. CONTINGENT FUND—In the month of September and March.

3. SUPERANUATED MINISTERS FUND-In the month of November or December.

. FDUCATIONAL FUND—In the month of December.

5. VICTORIA COLLEGE FUND. - In the month of February.

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Collections for Connexional Funds.

Resolved,—That it is the judgment of this Conference that when collections for connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust, or other Fund.

Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock, P.M., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church: therefore, it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make enquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Preachers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to

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Relating to the Book Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward, at or before the Meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—That in the case of any Minister or Preacher who is indebted the amount of \$100 to the Book Room, the Book Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of any Connexional Funds on which that brother may have a claim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent. of his claim annually, until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved,—That the brethren indebted to the Book Room, they not being claimants on the Connexional Funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts.

Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who, within the period of ten years after Oranation, may wish to withdraw from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a Certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill health.

Visiting the Public Schools, &c.

Resolved,—That the Conference earnestly recommends the Ministers of this body, to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Council of Public Instruction, to visit the Public Schools as frequently as possible at the times prescribed, for the purpose of communicating religious instruction.

Attendance at Conference.

1. That the Conference shall each year, after the place of holding the next Session of Conference is fixed, determine the whole number to be appointed by the District Meetings to attend the Conference, and leave each District Meeting to

select its proportion from among the members of Conference belonging to the District.

2. That this limitation shall not apply to the District within the bounds of which the Conference is to be held.

Registration of Baptisms.

Resolved,—That the Conference re-affirms its resolution of 1843, on the Registrations of Baptisms, viz:—

- 1. That it shall no longer be required to keep Registry Books on the various Circuits, but that there shall be kept, at the Conference Establishment, in Toronto, one General Registry of Births and Baptisms for the whole Church.
- 2. That the General Registrar shall be the Book-Steward for the time being. The Registrar shall furnish each ordained Minister yearly with a small ruled blank-book, for the convenient and uniform entry and return of Births and Baptisms. The Minister shall return the said book, with the entries, to the Registrar at the Conference after. The returns shall be copied into the General Registry Book, which book shall be kept in the custody of the Registrar.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA

All Candidates before being recommended to the Conference to he received on trial, shall undergo a satisfactory examination in—

English Grammar; Composition; Geography; Arithmetic; Collier's History of the Pritish Empire; Biblical History, Pinnock's Analysis of the Old Testament, and of the New Testament, Parts II. and III.; Blakie's Biblical Geography; Wesley's Sermons, I. to LII.

N.B.—Each Candidate shall be required to write an Essay.
The subject to be given at the time of examination.

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FIRST YEAR.

At the end of the first year, Candidates shall be examined in *The Evidences of Christianity*, and of the Genuineness, Authenticity, Inspiration, and Uncorrupted Preservation of the Books of Holy Scripture, and Natural Philosophy, from the following

Text Books:—Watson's Theological Institutes, (Part I.); Angus' Bible Hand Book (Chaps. I. & II., Secs. 1, 2, 3); Wesley on Christian Perfection; Hare on Justification; Ganot's Natural Philosophy, by Peck.

For Reference and Consultation:—Paley's Evidences and Horse Paulins; Stuart on the Old Testament Canon; West-cott on the Canon of the New Testament; Lee on Inspiration, especially Chaps. 1, 4, 6, and 8; and Horne's Introduction, Part I., new edition.

SECOND YEAR.

Text Books:—Angus' Bible Hand Book (Chap. IV.) Pinnock's Analysis of Ecclesiastical History of Reformation; Lord King's Account of the Primitive Church; Wesley on Original Sin.

For Consultation and Reference:—Westcott's Introduction to Study of the Gospels, Smith's Dictionary of the Bible, Horne's Introduction.

THIRD YEAR.

At the close of the third year, Caudidates shall be examined in Systematic Theology, Church History, Rhetoric, &c.

Text Books:—Watson's Institutes, (Part 11.); Steven's History of Methodism, and Compendium of the History of the M. E. Church; Whately's Rhetoric; and Fletcher's First Five Checks.

MODE OF EXAMINATION.

That Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined under the supervision of the Chairman and Financial Secretary of each District, by means of printed papers prepared by the Examiners and transmitted to the Chairman.

That each Chairman and Financial Secretary meet the Caldidates and Probationers on their Districts, on the last Wednesday in April; place the printed questions before them, and transmit their written answers to the respective Examiners, who shall report the results to the Secretary of the Examining Board. The Secretary shall issue the Certificates and transmit them to each Chairman prior to the District Meeting.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of landidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study.

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REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person, before being received as a full Local Preacher, shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as a Local Preacher; and that no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a Certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who to be placed on the List of Reserve: being governed by their own class lists, and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of this Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to greach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the

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Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subjects of the preliminary Course of Study.

A COURSE OF STUDY.

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CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, IN THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates before being recommended to Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:

Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the M. E. Church in the United States, Pt. I., Pt. II., Ch. 1 and Ch. 2, Secs. 1-9; Elements of German Grammar.

After admission they shall be examined each year during their probation, as follows:

FIRST YEAR.—Jacoby's Compend of Dootrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. I.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz's Sacred History; Weber's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

SECOND YEAR.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. II.; Wesley's Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Sauer's Church History; Wurat's Grammar.

THIRD YEAR — Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

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ADDRESSES AND REPLIES.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

After the lapse of six years we again present to you our pastoral greetings from this eastern section of that extended field which God has commissioned us to aid in cultivating. In contrasting the circumstances under which we now meet in this commercial metropolis of the province of Quebec, compared with those associated with our last visit here as a Conference, we feel deeply thankful to our Heavenly Father for that providence which then guarded our homes in our absence, and preserved our country from the sanguinary designs of those who, if not prevented, would have been the successful agents of desolation and disaster throughout the land. But our special duty in now addressing you limits our review to the events of the Conferential year which has just closed—a year which has not been marked by any noticeable interruption to that commercial and agricultural prosperity with which these provinces have for several years been blest.

The most important subject to which our attention can be directed is that furnished in the spiritual condition of the people committed to our care, and which the record of our yearly operations presents. Thank God, it is not a dis-

couraging record; yet we would it were even more cheering than it is, and that it permitted us to chronicle greater victories in the name of Him who has commissioned us to go and preach His gospel.

The returns from the several districts exhibit a memberbership of 69,508, being an increase over last year of 2,709; which, in view of deaths, and owing to defections from various causes, may be regarded as representing at least double that number to whom the gospel has proved "the power of God unto salvation."

We have cause for unbounded gratitude to the Divine Source of all our mercies for the liberality indicated in the state of the different funds of the Church. They are, as a whole, in a very satisfactory condition. In each of them an increase has been reported. That however of the Superannuation Fund—from which a small annuity is distributed to those brethren who have given to you the labors of their wouthful and most vigorous days, and a smaller yearly portion to those whose partners and supporters God has taken to Himself—presents the smallest advancement, and is not fully equal to the legitimate demands of the year. This fact we leave with you without comment.

The Missionary Fund, we rejoice to say, not only maintains the high figure to which in past years it has been raised, but the present exceeds in amount that of any former year. The increase overlast year is upwards of \$9,000.

Wisely and well has the Missionary Committee acted in taking steps, further to strengthen our missions in British Columbia and Manitoba. Two more brethren are soon to take their departure to each of these remote fields. The value and importance of establishing churches in these new countries cannot be too deeply felt by all the Protestant denominations of this Dominion. Such are the convictions of the Conference as to our obligations and responsibilities as a missionary church, that it has recommended the commencement, at as early a date as practicable, of a foreign mission to Japan, or to some other pagan country, the condition of whose millions calls loudly for Christian effort to

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on can be on of the rd of our not a disgive them that gospel which is for the salvation of the nations. We fear the results of criminal delay to ourselves and to them.

We invite your hearty co-operation in this hopeful purpose—the co-operation of personal consecration—which includes prayer, reliance, and liberality. God's promise can never fail. On this we ground our appeal to your benevolence. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse that there may be meat in mine house, and prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

In this connection we would call your attention to the state of our Book Room, which we have much pleasure in reporting in a most flourishing condition; not only has the past year been financially successful, but the literature distributed from it is pure and good. You cannot too highly value the direct and indirect advantages of a wholesome literature: on the one hand so nourishing to heart and intellect; on the other, furnishing so effect an antidote to the corrupting and soul-destroying productions which so alarmingly abound at the present time.

We again commend to you as a safe instructor, as a high toned and eminently well conducted journal, the Christian Guardian. We feel it a duty to express our sense of obligation to the Book Steward and to the Editor for the enterprise and ability which enabled them to carry out the purpose of presenting the paper at the beginning of the civil year, in its enlarged form. The result has more than met our expectations, and we feel confident that our official organ will become increasingly valuable, not only as a vehicle of general information, but be felt on every circuit in our provinces as an effective agency in co-operation with the pulpit in raising the standard of piety, and in invigorating the zeal of the entire church.

As it respects our literary institutions we are privileged not only to speak of the successful operations of those already in existence, but to inform you of the efforts which have been made for increasing their number. The Uniof the

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privileged these alrts which The University at Cobourg has been favored with a year of exceeding success. The Female College at Hamilton has secured the confidence of our people, and its influence is felt beyond the limits not only of our Province but of our Dominion. The prospective and efficient establishment of the Stanstead College is most hopeful. It will, with judicious care, prove eminently eviceable in those beautiful eastern to makips; furnishing the means of a thorough education for the youth of both sexes who may find it inconvenient to seek, at a greater distance from home, the benefits and blessings which a liberal education is competent to confer.

On the question of ministerial education we have the sin cerest pleasure in addressing you in reference to its theological aspects. Already there has been established at Cobourg, under the direction of the authorities of our University, a Theological Department, with Professor Burwash as theological tutor. During the session of Conference, proposals, accompanied by generous offers, were presented from our people in Montreal, requesting that the long felt want of a theological chair for the instruction of candidates in the province of Quebec, be established in this city. The sum of \$50,000 to aid in the noble design was pledged. After a protracted debate on the proposal, and a careful investigation of the whole question, it was unanimously decided to accept the princely offer, so that now there will be afforded in Ontario and Quebec ample facilities to candidates for our ministry, to procure in our own country a sound theological Montreal is pledged to sustain the Theological Department in Montreal. That at Cobourg should with equal liberality be sustained by Ontario. Subsequently to the debate on this question, the Rev. Dr. Douglas was unanimously chosen as the first theological tutor to occupy the chair in Montreal.

Kindred to our literary and theological institution, is that of our Sabbath-school. The report for the past year is encouraging and satisfactory, indicating success, and on the part of the people increased liberality for its support. Evidence is furnished of a deepened spirituality among the teachers, and the cheering record is furnished of the conver-

sion during the year of many of the children to Christ; without this the most energetic efforts would be comparatively valueless.

The present Conference has been characterized by the introduction of some features of transcendent importance. Prominent among these, are the proposed division of our own Conference, and the organic union of Dominion Methodism. Encouraging have been the results of endeavors on our part to procure this desirable consummation. Eastern British America holds out her willing hand, and the New Connexion Methodist Church has reiterated its past sincerity, and is now willing for any practicable union. The question of division has been committed to a large committee, who will prepare a scheme for the consideration of the next Conference. A committee has also been appointed to prepare the details of a plan of union.

During the present Conference we have been favored by the presence of several deputations bearing friendly salutations.

The Rev. Dr. Pickard, and the Rev. D. D. Currie, deputation from the Conference of Eastern British America, cheered us with words of comfort as to the spiritual condition of their churches, and spoke most encouragingly of the prospects of organic Methodist union. The Rev. Luke Wiseman, M.A., the Secretary of the English Conference, and one of the members of the deputation to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, from whose counsels and ministrations we have derived instruction and comfort. The Rev. Joseph W. McKay, Secretary of the Irish Conference, and its deputation to the General Conference of the M. E. Church, paid our Conference a visit. It was necessarily very brief, as he had to take his leave on the first day of our Conference, in order to be present at the opening of his own. His address was full of hope for the future of Methodism in Ireland, as it respects the advantages of their new College, and in reference to their general prosperity. The Rev. Bowman Stephenson, M.A., who is a member of the English Conference, is here on a mission of the most benevolent character,

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dism in College, Bowman Confernaracter, to procure a "distributing home" for any poor children who may be sent out to this country; Mr. S. is meeting with success in carrying out his laudable design of procuring such "a home" in this country. Deputations also bearing most friendly and cordial greetings were received from the Presbyterian Church in Canada; from the Conference of the New Concexion Methodist Church in this country, including in it the Rev. Dr. Cooke, from London, England. The members of this deputation were ardent in their recommendation of a federal Methodist union. A deputation from the Congregational Union conveyed to us words of affection, and of kindly salutation.

Only one feature of a painful character demanded the attention of the Conference, namely, the intimation given by our beloved President, Dr. Punshon, that duty would render it necessary for him to return to England during the ensuing year. In the command which summoned him away he acquiesced, but he had uttered no word in directing it. He said "he wished ever to be as the passive clay, in everything that referred to himself. He desired to have no will of his own. He loved Canada. He was linked to it by the living and by the dead." Many thousands will be the prayers which will follow God's gifted servant, when the day comes to intimate his departure from our shores. The Conference and the country are under a debt of obligation to our beloved President, which they cannot repay.

During the various and sometimes exciting debates which occupied the attention of the Conference—debates in which a more than usually large number of ministers took part, the spirit which ever makes the conduct of the Christian gentleman, uniformly prevailed.

The religious services of the Conference were eminently spiritual and profitable.

During the year eight ministers have died; one of whom had preached the Gospel for forty-five years, two for forty years, and one for thirty. The other four were young in the blessed work; they were early summoned from service to reward.

Eight were added to the superannuated list, and four were restored to the effective work. So that by death and by advancing years twelve have been taking from the ranks of active and efficient laborers, but God who gives the work has given other workers. Forty-four candidates have been at this Conference received on trial, and twenty-eight who had fulfilled their four years' probation were ordained to the Christian ministry, and six have been received from other Methodist bodies.

In the solemn duty of addressing to you this Pastoral Letter of counsel and affection, we would not be forgetful of the obligation of given to you words of godly admonition as it regards the evils and temptations which are alarmingly conspicious in this day. And if we iterate allusion especially to some of these in most of our yearly addresses to you, it is because of their continuance and of their terrible power, in impeding the progress of gospel truth. Foremost among these is intemperance, and the habits which lead to it. You will be gratified to learn that, with a view to the arresting of the evils of intemperance, the first Conference Temperance Meeting was held in this city on Tuesday evening, the 11th inst. It was largely attended, was most enthusiastic, and will prove eminently beneficial.

Permit us, dear brethren, to caution you against the wordly spirit, the sin which is so apparent, and which is so damaging to the prosperity of Zion. Moreover it should not be forgotten that sacrifice and self-denial are still duties of the Christian character. Be on your guard against self indulgence and spiritual sloth, and against the many evil tendencies of material prosperity. The admonition found in the aphorism of Luther, "comfort is one of Satan's greatest temptations," is worthy your serious consideration. Let your example ever be powerful for good. Christian consistency is a force always mighty, and is constant in its influence. We would urge you to press continually forward in the Divine life. Seek daily a higher spiritual life; that Christian perfection which is the strength of the heart, and the strength of the church. We rejoice that others, as well as the "people called Methodists," are giving prominence to this grand ir were
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doctrine. But let not any cutstrip you in a race so golden. Allow us to urge upon you the employment of personal effort for the salvation of others. Sinners abound, and opportunities to seek their salvation abound. If the membership of our Church were faithful to this obligation, the increase in our members would be rapidly augmented. God has given to our country remarkable temporal prosperity, in which you, dear brethren, have largely partaken. As stewards, be faithful. Let your beneficence be systematic. Proportionate giving is a duty and a blessing; were it uniformly observed we would not now find some of our resources so small as we are compelled to report them.

You will be satisfied to learn that the income tax on the salaries of your ministers to aid in the sustentation of Victoria College has been abandoned, and a public collection substituted.

We would earnestly urge you to enter upon the duties of the ensuing year in cordial co-operation with the ministers who may in the providence of God be commissioned teachers to you of the "glorious gospel of the ever blessed God." Meet them in the spirit of prayer; welcome them in the spirit of love; labour with them in the spirit of self sacrifice; and sustain them with a generosity which the spirit of Christian benevolence demands.

Finally, brethren, we would entreat you, fulfil the duties of your spiritual priesthood; be true to the obligations of your kingship. Let the consecration of your spirit to God be constantly and cheerfully made. Let your daily walk be distinguished by the meekness and majesty of Christian royalty; and may the anthem on earth and in heaven be yours: "Unto him that loved us and washed us from our sins in his own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father: to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE IN CANADA, 1871.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We greet you in the name of the Lord, and pray that God may speed your efforts to diffuse abroad the savour of Scriptural truth and holiness. Your Address, so expressive of "unabated affection" for us, and of your determination to consecrate yourselves afresh "to the great soul-saving work in which our fathers led the way," was received with thankfulness to God. It comforted us with the assurance that, amid many changes in the nations and the churches around us, you are unchanged in spirit, in desire, and in love to us. We have one parentage and one purpose; and we rejoice that your heart is as ours, that you are resolved by God's grace to be true to the spirit and the pattern of service set for us by those into whose labours we have entered.

The presence among us of your highly esteemed President and Lepresentative, the Rev. William Morley Punshon, M.A., has called up within us stirring memories of the days when he was yet with us. To say that he has been welcomed by us is to say little. We have rejoiced over him with great joy as a brother beloved. We are not surprised at your high appreciation of his talents, and labours, and personal qualities; and we fully share with you that heartfelt sympathy which you have expressed with him in "the heavy domestic affliction through which he has been called to pass."

Mr. Punshon's eloquent address gave us an impressive view of the extent of your field of labour, with its impera-

tive necessities, of the difficulties and dangers of your enterprise, and of your high resolve to brave every danger, to grapple with every difficulty; and, while building up the work of God in cities and the older settlements, "to follow the new settlers into the wilderness," and show to them the path of salvation. To sustain and exemplify the aggressive spirit of Mathedian is one of our primary outer.

spirit of Methodism is one of our primary auties.

We trust that the relations of Canada with England will remain long undisturbed, and especially that the relations between British and Canadian Methodism will become more and more close, affectionate, and mutually helpful. On the subject of Methodist union, we echo the sentiments of your Representative,—that "it is a very desirable thing if it could be accomplished without any sacrifice of principle, and with every sacrifice of prejudice and crotchet." And though the consolidation of the several branches of Methodism into one United Church, may not be expected to take place soon, and by some may not be desired; yet we deem it most desirable, if we read the signs of the times aright, that they should draw as closely together as they can. Men who preach the same soul-saving truths, and seek to inspire the same spiritual life and joy, should not allow minor shades of opinion to place them before the world in the attitude rather of opponents than of allies.

Your nomination of Mr. Punshon as your President for the next year we cordially approve, and have appointed him accordingly. In making this appointment, however, we feel it is due to say, that we look for the return of Mr. Punshon to England as soon as is consistent with his own sense of the obligation under which he now lies. We also approve and accept your nomination of the Rev. John Borland to be Co-Delegate.

We congratulate you on the increase of members which the labours of the past year have brought to you, as well as on the general prosperity with which the Lord has been pleased to favour you. We also have been blessed during the past year with tokens of the Divine approval, but have to mourn over a decrease of members. While, however, we humble ourselves before God on this account, we are

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not discouraged. We have, if possible, stronger faith than ever in the Divine truths of the glorious Gospel which we preach, in the Providence of God over His church, and in the Holy Chost, the Lord and Giver of Life, the promise of the Father, whom our exalted Saviour has sent down for the quickening and salvation of men. Moreover, we have been refreshed, and our faith has been stimulated, by the devotional spirit which has prevailed during the sittings and the public services of the present Conference: by the earnest, importunate prayers which have been offered; by the general and heartfelt sympathy with the subject of these prayers which has been expressed, and by the soul-stirring sermons which have been preached. We have the assurance that God is in the midst of us, and that He will prosper as in His holy work. Our resolve is to preach the old truths, in that spirit of pure purpose and devoted zeal which animated our forefathers. We agree with you that "the sure foundation of law and liberty, the essential element of true civilization and happiness," is obedience to the tinth as it is in Jesus, and the saving experience of the grace of the Gospel. This has been strongly impressed upon us by the painful events on the Continent of Europe during the last year. And, by the help of God, it is our determination amid all changes and social improvements to hold fast the old and pure doctrines of the Gospel of Christ, and to teach that "God commandeth all men everywhere to repent" and believe the Gospel, if they would obtain His favour and eternal life.

We join with you in the confession of absence dependence upon God for the fruitfulness of our labours; and, while seeking in prayer a richer baptism of the Holy Spirit upon our own families and congregations, we fervently implore the great Head of the church to prosper you more and make in your endeavours to bring sinners to Christ, and to build up the church of the true and living God.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, OF 1872,

TO THE

BRITISH WESLEYAN CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND.

REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Your parental and affectionate address has given us a double pleasure and a double ground of thankfulness; pleasure from the interesting contents of your epistle and from the deepened impression of the blessed relations which exist between you and us—thankfulness, for the unruffled peace and general prosperity with which you are favoured throughout the vast and widening field of both your home and foreign work.

We are humbly, and we trust devoutly grateful to be able to say, that no element of discord disturbs the tranquillity or weakens the unity of our Church in any part of its extended operations; that our building of commodious places of worship has proceeded with a rapidity and to an extent heretofore unknown among us; that all our funds, both for Missionary and domestic Church purposes, are in advance of those of any preceding year; that our Educational Institutions, including the Sunday Schools, have been marked by unabated efficiency and growing prosperity; that the increase in our Societies has been nearly three thousand making the aggregate members of our Church 69,508, with at least five times that number attending our Ministry; that during our present Session, we have, after four years' trial of labours and annual examinations, received into full connexion and ordained twenty-eight additional fellow-helpers, besides receiving six from other religious bodies, and have also received forty-four young men on trial in the Ministerial work.

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For such manifestations of the Divine blessing upon our own religious community, in connection with the general peace and prosperity of our country, we cannot be too thankful, while we are deeply humbled under a consciousness of the many imperfections and unfaithfulnesses of our own unworthy labours.

But while we are permitted to rejoice with thankfulness at these great successes, we are admonished and made to mourn, on the removal from our militant ranks of eight of our honoured and beloved brethren; but they testified in death, as they had done in life, that while to live is Christ, to die is gain.

Among the important subjects which have engaged our attention during the present session, is a Federal Union between the Wesleyan Conference of Eastern British America and ourselves, and a union between other Methodist bodies and our own. In regard to the former, the great principle of Federal Union, as desirable, has been affirmed by us, and concurred in by the representatives of the Conference of Eastern British America; and we believe it only now remains to arrange and agree upon the details, in regard to which we apprehend no serious difficulty. respect to the latter, progress has been made so far as that the Conference of the Methodist New Connexion has expressed its approval of the principles of Union which had been avowed by ourselves, and agreed to be recommended by a United Committee appointed by the Conferences of that body and our own. But the whole question has been remitted to a large Committee for consideration in all its details, to be reported upon at our next Conference.

The relations of our country to the Parent State command the loyal and strongest affections and sympathies of all Canadians; and in our own ecclesiastical relations to you as the Parent Church, you hold the highest place in the affectionate respect and heartfeit attachment of the preachers and members of our whole Connexion.

These sentiments of loyal attachment to the Throne and to the Empire, and of fervent affection to the Farent body of Methodism, have been greatly intensified by the min-

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ne and t body o ministrations, labours, and intercourse of the Reverend William Morley Punshon, LL.D., and by the short visit of the Rev. Luke H. Wiseman, A.M., who, though he has not come to our country as your representative, has so deeply interested us by his able ministrations and instructive addresses, that while we are under great obligations to him for them, and regret that his visit has been so short, we shall deem it a privilege to receive him in any relation in which you may think proper to appoint him to us. We have requested Mr. Wiseman to act as our representative to you; and to him we refer you for detailed information in respect to the state and prospects of our work in this country.

We have also been gratified by the presence, statements, and ministrations of the Rev. Thomas Bowman Stephenson, A.B., and have expressed our hearty sympathy with the truly benevolent objects he is labouring to perform.

Of Dr. Punshon's labours throughout the length and breadth of this land, we cannot speak in language of due appreciation and gratitude. We thank the God of all wisdom and grace for his many endowments and graces; we thank you for permitting him to remain so long among us; and we thank him for his unceasing toils, his scriptural ministrations, his affectionate and wise counsels in the spiritual edification of ourselves and people, and in the upbuilding and extension of every department of our work. We would indeed deem it a joy and blessing to ourselves, our people, and our country, could he spend his valuable life among us; but we should be ungrateful and act unworthily did we attempt to interpose these considerations, however deeply and widely felt in this country, between Dr. Punshon and his early associations, and his convictions of submission to your wishes and of duty to the Parent body and the Fatherland. Whenever he may return to you and to his native land, while he will leave behind him noble memorials of his labours and usefulness, he will carry with him the esteem, the affection, and the prayers not only of ourselves and of our whole Church, but of many thousands of the members of other churches and of our country at large.

On the deeply regretted retirement of Dr. Punshon as our President, we have by ballot nominated to that office for the next year our honoured and beloved brother, the Rev. Samuel D. Rice, D.D.; and as Co-Delegate, the Rev. Ephraim B. Harper, M.A. We trust these nominations will receive your cordial sanction.

We are sure you will learn with pleasure from the Rev. Luke H. Wiseman, that the proposed settlement of the only unadjusted financial matter between you and us, has been concurred in on our part in a way that will be satisfactory to you. You will be pleased to learn, that provision has been made for the more thorough and practical theological training of our Preachers on trial who are permitted to attend Victoria College; that a noble offer of \$50,000 has been made by some of our friends in Montreal for the establishment of a branch Theological Institution there, under the direction of the Conference—an offer which we have most gratefully accepted, and appointed a Committee to give it effect.

Our deliberations on the several important subjects which have engaged our attention during the present session, have been uniformly characterized by true brotherly affection and unity of spirit; the public and devotional services have been marked by hallowed influences and blessings; we go forth to our appointed fields of labour with renewed strength in our own souls, with increasingly assured confidence in the agencies of our Church, with firm purpose to maintain inviolate its discipline, to spend and to be spent in the work assigned us by our Lord and Saviour, and to implore with you those divine influences and outpourings which bring the Gospel to the minds and hearts of men "not in word only, but in power, in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance."

REVEREND AND BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Your kind addresses issued at your session of 1870, and at your last session, are most gratefully received, and the sentiments of love and simpathy they express are most cordially reciprocated.

Your representative, the Rev. S. D. Rice, D.D., whose pulpit addresses have been a means of spiritual edification to our congregations, and whose counsels have rendered us essential aid in our Conferential deliberations, is most cordially welcomed, not only as one whose name is associated with the most pleasant recollections of other years, but also as one commissioned to bear to us the greetings and congratulations of a body, between whom and ourselves there exist the ties of a common origin and a common interest.

In the increase of your church membership, in the efficiency of your Educational Institutions, in the extension of your Church accommodation, and the enlarged liberality of your people, we thankfully recognize the evidences of a growing power and prosperity full of promise to the future Dominion, and while, "we do not cease to give God thanks for you, making mention of you in our prayers," we hope in the spirit of a holy rivalry to emulate the zeal and self-devotion which have led to such grand results.

You will rejoice with us that though emigration and other causes have produced a continuous drain on our church membership, our returns show an increase of 353 members, with 1,331 on trial, and that with us as with you these

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OTT, ETARY. represent, not merely a nominal accession of spiritual power, since "being justified by faith in our Lord Josus Christ," the seals of our apostleship are they in the Lord.

We give our tears to the grave of the venerated Dr. Cooney, whose labours of love are his memorial in these provinces, and while we mourn over the loss of three beloved brethren who in the prime of life, and covered with the honours and rewards of successful workmen in the Master's vineyard, have left the ranks of our ministry to join the "general assembly and church of the first-born in Heaven," we are devoutly gratified that young men of promise and piety are prepared to take up the standard that has fallen from their hands and to carry it into new and unoccupied fields.

To such an extent has the work of God increased among us, that we are unable to answer all the urgent calls that come to us for help, but the reception of the unusually large number of eighteen young men of approved qualifications, as candidates for our ministry, encourage the hope that the Lord of the harvest will provide for the necessities of His work.

The religious education of the young, which by the lessons of Scripture, by the traditions of our church, and by the obligations which gree out of the consecration of their infant being to God, we are led to conceive of, as indescribably important, is steadily advancing among us.

In our 330 Sabbath-schools, 17,863 children are under the instructions of a routine which is becoming more thorough and practical, are learning elements of knowledge and principles of conduct, which in their maturity, by the blessing of God, must give a most powerful and influential character to the next generation.

Our Educational Institutions at Sackville, still maintain their efficiency.

It is a source of encouragement to the Professors, and of satisfaction to our church, that recognizes its obligation to give to those Institutions a place in its sympathy and

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prayers, that the attendance during the last year has been thirty per cent. in advance of the previous year.

We gratefully acknowledge your kindness and courtesy in consenting that the Institution should for another year have the valuable services of the Rev. John Burwash, M.A., whose Christian bearing and self-denying devotion to duty, have elicited our warmest praise.

In our Theoligical Institution, under the judicious teaching of the Rev. Dr. Steward, six Students have been instructed in the doctrines of Christianity, as they were understood by our fathers, and of this number three have, with all the advantage of this training, been appointed to the active work.

The subject of the Union of the two Conferences, which is not now before us for the first time, has engaged our deepest interest.

We have appointed a Committee to act in connection with a similar Committee of your body, with a view to accomplish this grand object.

And when the details of a plan of Union shall be laid before us under the strong impulse of hope that all the Methodist bodies in British America shall soon become one in church polity, as they are one in Christian faith, we shall give to them our most prayerful consideration.

We have appointed as our Representatives to your next Conference, the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., ex-President, and the Rev. D. D. Currie, our Secretary, brethren honoured and beloved for their many valuable services to our church, who will convey to you our fraternal salutations, and communicate such further information respecting our work as may be of interest to you.

The Rev. E. Botterell, whose increasing infirmities have compelled him to retire from the active work of the pastorate, is also commended to your affectionate regard.

Finally, brethren, farewell. Peace be to the brethren, and love with faith, from God the Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ.

TO THE

CONFERENCE OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

The pleasing duty of reply to your truly welcome and encouraging address finds us the subject of emotions which indicate a ripening of the friendly relation of the past into one more intimate and interesting; and if we rightly interpret the spirit of your letter and the eloquent utterances of the honoured brethren you have been pleased to depute to us we think ourselves correct in the impression that the warmth of regard of which we speak is sufficiently reciprocated to justify the hope of that closer bond which a simple friendship does not contemplate; if this opinion be correct we may mutually hope that the negotiations entrusted to the respective committees may encounter no barrier sufficient to prevent the fellowship our growing intimacy appears to crave.

In view therefore of this serious, and, as we believe, destined relation we especially rejoice with you in the successes to which your fraternal letter alludes, and we assure you that it affords us additional pleasure to be able to say that in our still broader field of toil we too are full of encouragement and hope.

We are humbly grateful to the Giver of all good in the announcement of a membership increased during the past year—our numbers being 2798 in excess of the membership reported at our last Conference; and it may be said of all our Connexional Funds that they were never in a more prosperous condition than at this time.

Our Educational Institutions are at present commanding special attention and regard. Victoria College steadily

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anding eadily out-growing the temporary embarrassment occasioned by the withdrawal of Government aid was never in so promising a position as at the present day. The Convocation held in May was in every respect distinguished above its predecessors in the number of the degrees conferred and the profound interest taken in its proceedings by a large and appreciative public. And you will rejoice to learn that in addition to the increased efficiency of its Faculty under the able Presidency of Rev. Dr. Nelles, there has been secured to the University, a Theological Departmentlong needed, which will provide for the additional degree of "Bachelor of Divinity," for which a suitable curriculum has been prepared.

The Wesleyan Female College at Hamilton under the able Governorship of the Rev. Dr. Rice is nobly emulating the efficiency and prosperity of its relative at Cobourg, and is not only more largely attended than ever, but steadily becoming the foremost institution of the kind in the Dominion of Canada.

During the year an additional Institution of Learning has been projected to meet the wants of our people in the Province of Quebec, and there is encouragement to hope that at no very distant day a flourishing College will be established at Stanstead; while, for the establishment of a Theological School in the city of Montreal, \$40,000 have been subscribed by a few of the membership of our Church in that city.

In addition to the encouragements which appear in the life of our Home Work it is proper to notice that in our Missionary efforts for the spread of the truth abroad there are grounds for the most inspiring hope. Our Missions to the new Province of Manitoba, and the increase of our Missionary staff in British Columbia and Vancouver Island have justified the most sanguine expectations, and give promise that in these distant fields, Methodism will take the prominent position which a kind Providence has vouch-safed to it at home.

Having assured you that in all the vital parts of our growing work we have special reason for encouragement, it

remains for us in conclusion to refer to matters which mutually affect us.

The presence and addresses of your honoured representatives, the Rev. Dr. Pickard and the Rev. D. D. Currie, have been warmly received by us, and by their utterances we are reassured of the magnitude and importance of your work.

We red hardly tell you that we shall be ably represented at your approaching Conference when we inform you that our honoured President, the Rev. W. M. Punshon, L.L.D., and the Rev. E. Evans, D.D. have been appointed to bear to you our fraternal greetings.

With respect to the important question of Union we beg to state that a Committee has been selected with whom any Committee you may appoint may confer on the formation of such basis of Union as is practicable in the accomplishment of so desirable an object; which basis is to be laid before the respective Conferences for acceptance.

We have pleasure in acceding to your request, for the continued permission of the appointment by you of the Rev. John Burwash, M.A., in connection with your College at Sackville.

And now, praying that great grace may rest upon you all, and that in your approaching Conference you may have additional causes for praise to Him whose we are, we assure you of our continued affection.
