Commencing January 27th, 1891.

COUNCIL CHAMBER,
LINDSAY, 27th January, 1891. }

Council met this day pursuant to statute.

The following Reeves and Deputy Reeves having filed their certificates of election, took their seats as members of the County Council for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety one, viz :

Moved by Mr. Staback, seconded by Mr. Stewart, that one half hour be allowed for the reception of nominations and that no further nominations be received thereafter.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Walker, that new nominations be allowed after each ballot.

The amendment was declared lost.

The original motion was declared carried.

Moved by Dr. Wood, seconded by Mr. Alton, that Adam E. Staback, Esq., Reeve of Eldon, be Warden for the current year.

Moved by Mr. Adam, seconded by Mr. Ham, that Dr. Adam E. Vrooman, Reeve of Mariposa, be Warden.

Moved by Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Kelly, that Elijah Bottum, Esq., Reeve of Bobcaygeon, be Warden.

Moved by Mr. Berkeley, seconded by Mr. Bailey, that Eustace H. Hopkins, Esq., Reeve of Ops, be Warden.

Moved by Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Bottum, that when three ballots shall have been taken, the name of the candidate having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped.—Carried.

The balloting was then proceeded with, thirteen votes being necessary for election.

Ballot No. 5:—Mr. Staback, 11; Dr. Vrooman, 10; Mr. Bottum, 4.

Ballot No. 6:—Mr. Staback, 11; Dr. Vrooman, 10; Mr. Bottum, 4.

Ballot No. 7:—Mr. Staback, 13; Dr. Vrooman, 12.

Moved by Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Berkeley, that Samuel Irwin and Eustace H. Hopkins, Esquires, be appointed

Auditors of accounts for Administration of Justice for the current year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bailey, seconded by Mr. Kylie, that John Kelley, Esquire, of the Town of Lindsay, be appointed an Auditor of County accounts.—Carried.

The Warden nominated Samuel Irwin, Esquire, an Auditor of County accounts.

On motion of Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Walker, the Council adjourned for ten minutes to allow the Special Committee appointed to draft the Standing Committees to meet and report.

The Council resumed.

On motion of Dr. Cornwall, seconded by Dr. Vrooman, the report of the Special Committee appointed to draft the Standing Committees was received and read, and

The Council went into committee thereon.

COUNCIL CHAMBER,
LINDSAY, 28th January, 1891. }

Council met this day at 10 o'clock.

The Warden in the chair.

Members all present.

The Warden addressed the Council.

The Warden laid before the Council the following documents:

Treasurer's statement of Current Liabilities and Available Assets 1st January, 1891.

Treasurer's statement of Liabilities and Assets on account of Railway Debenture Debt 1st January, 1891.

Treasurer's statement showing Auctioneers' Licenses in force for the whole or part of the year 1890.

On motion of Mr. Adam, seconded by Mr. Carmichael, the foregoing documents were referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.

The Registrar's statement of commission on fees for 1890, payable to the County.

From the Clerk of County of Oxford, transmitting copies of petition to Legislative Assembly praying that the powers at present enjoyed by County Councils in the control of gaols be not curtailed.

From the chairman of Canal Committee, County of Simcoe, asking co-operation respecting Trent Valley Canal.

From Treasurer of Prisoners' Aid Association, Toronto, asking aid.

From the Clerk of the united Counties of Leeds and Gren-

ville, enclosing copy of petition to Legislative Assembly asking that grants to Public and High Schools be increased, and for other purposes.

From the President and Secretary of the Canada Land Law Amendment Association, enclosing copy of petition to Legislative Assembly for extension of the Torrens system of Land Transfer.

The fourth annual report of the Police Magistrate for the County of Victoria.

From Mr. D. Eagleson, applying for the position of Auditor.

From the Secretary of the Board of Trade, Lindsay, enclosing copy of resolution relative to a House of Refuge.

On motion of Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Kelly, By-law No.—to appoint auditors of accounts for Administration of Justice was received and read a first time, and

The Council went into committee thereon.

Dr. Vrooman in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the second reading of the By-law without amendment.

By-law read a third time and passed by a two-thirds vote and signed by the Warden and sealed.

On motion of Mr. Bailey, seconded by Mr. Kylie, By-law No. — to appoint an Auditor of County accounts, and to confirm the appointment of an Auditor nominated by the Warden was received and read a first time, and

The Council went into committee thereon.

Mr. Bailey in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the second reading of the By-law without amendment.

By-law read a third time and passed by a two-thirds vote and signed by the Warden and sealed.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Fisher, that this Council make the usual charity grants, viz: The Central Charity Committee of the Town of Lindsay, \$100; Fenelon Falls \$25.00; Omamee, \$25.00; which sums are to be appropriated towards relieving distress in the above municipalities, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Bottum, that this Council make the usual charity grants, namely: to the Central Charity Committee of the Town of Lindsay, \$100; to the Council of Fenelon Falls, \$25; Bobcaygeon, \$25; Omamee, \$25, Woodville, \$25; which sums are to be appropriated towards relieving distress in the above named municipalities, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.

On the amendment being put it was declared carried.

The original motion was declared lost.

Moved by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Dr. Vrooman, that By-law No. — to assume certain roads as County Roads and to maintain the same be read a third time and passed.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Cornwall, seconded by Mr. Adam, that the By-law be not now read a third time, but that it be read a third time this day three months.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Bryans, that the By-law be not now read a third time but that the third reading be deferred until the June session.

On the amendment to the amendment being put it was declared lost.

On the amendment being put it was declared carried.

Mr. Bottum presented the petition of H. Hurchmer and seventeen others, praying that the By-law relating to Hawkers and Pedlars be so amended as to provide that increased license fees shall be paid.

The petition was read.

On motion of Mr. Bottum, seconded by Mr. Stuart, the petition was referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.

Moved by Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Berkeley, that this Council grant the sum of \$400 in aid of the Electoral District Agricultural Societies of the County, to be distributed as follows: to the South Riding, \$200; and to the North Riding, \$200; the grants to be paid on or before the first day of September, 1891, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bottum, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, that a grant of \$200 be made by this Council in aid of the several Mechanics' Institutes and Library Associations, as follows:—Lindsay, \$100; Fenelon Falls, \$50; and Bobcaygeon, \$50; and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bailey, seconded by Mr. Alton, that the County Engineer be instructed to examine the bridge over Head River on the Victoria Road between Carden and Laxton, and the bridge over Gull River at Norland on the boundary between Somerville and Laxton, with a view to the said bridges being made safe for public travel, and that th's motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ham, seconded by Dr. Wood, that this Council grant the sum of \$200 to assist the Township of Bexley in filling in the mill pond bridge at Cobocok, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Mr. Chambers gave notice that to-morrow he will introduce a By-law to confirm a certain By-law of the Township of Fenelon, to provide for the procuring of a road allowance across the eighth concession in lot No. thirty one, of the Township of Fenelon and for other purposes.

On motion of Mr. Walker Council adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

THIRD DAY.

COUNCIL CHAMBER,
LINDSAY, 29th January, 1891. }

Council met this day at 10 o'clock.

The Warden in the chair.

Members all present except, Messrs. Dr. Cornwall, Fell and Dr. Vrooman.

Minutes of yesterday were read and confirmed.

The Warden read and laid before the Council the following communications :

From the Clerk of County of Huron respecting Railway Commission.

From the Longford Lumber Company respecting the covering of the High Bridge on Victoria Road on boundary between Dalton and Rama.

The foregoing communications were referred to the committees to which they respectively belong.

Moved by Mr. McQuade, seconded by Mr. Switzer, that fifty dollars be granted to the Township of Emily for the repairs of Pigeon Creek Floating Bridge, on condition that the County of Peterborough or the Town of Peterborough grant a like sum, this amount to be considered a re-vote of the sum granted last June for the same purpose, the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Emily to be Commissioners, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Bryans, that a special grant of \$50.00 be made to the Victoria Rifle association, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Switzer, seconded by Mr. McQuade, the report of the Standing Committee on Printing was received and read, and

The Council went into committee thereon.

Dr. Wood in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the report without amendment.

Report received and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Bailey, seconded by Mr. Ham, that this Council grant a sum sufficient to make the bridge over the Talbot River on the boundary between Bexley and Laxton safe for public travel, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Bailey, leave was granted for the presentation of a petition.

Mr. Thompson presented the petition of George Sandford and 21 other ratepayers of the Township of Dalton, asking grant for repairing a certain road.

On motion of Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Bailey, the petition was received and referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Moved by Mr. Ham, seconded by Dr. Wood, that this Council make an appropriation of \$500.00 to improve the leading roads in the Townships north of the second range, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Kylie, that Mr. Bowman, County Engineer, be permitted to address the Council.—Carried.

Mr. Bowman addressed the Council relative to the necessity that exists for an annual inspection of and report as to the condition of County Bridges.

Moved by Mr. McQuade, seconded by Mr. Switzer, that the attention of the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges be drawn to the necessity for having some competent person inspect the several County bridges and report to this Council, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Alton, seconded by Mr. Thompson, that this Council grant the sum of \$100.00 for the repairs of certain roads in Carden, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Kylie, that this Council grant the sum of \$500.00 to assist the Council of the Town of Lindsay in placing Lindsay and William streets in good repairs, as they are leading streets for the public, that the Reeve and Deputy Reeves of the Town be Commissioners for the expenditure of said grant, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Bryans, that this Council grant the sum of \$25.00 to the East Victoria Farmers' Institute, and the sum of \$25.00 to the West Victoria Farmers' Institute, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Fisher, that the sum of \$100.00 be appropriated to assist the Township of Ops in making repairs to the East Cross Creek's Bridge, on the leading road from Lindsay to Janetville, the Township of Ops to give an equal amount, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Bryans Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

Council resumed at 2 o'clock.

The Warden in the chair.

Members all present except Dr. Cornwall.

On motion of Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Thompson, the name of Mr. Kelly was added to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Moved by Mr. Fell, seconded by Mr. Ham, that a grant of \$600.00 be made by this Council to assist in re-building a bridge known as Mitchell's Bridge across Burnt River, on lot 22 concession 1, Township of Somerville, the same road being generally used in lieu of the boundary line between the Townships of

Somerville and Fenelon, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Chambers, seconded by Mr. Berkeley, By-law No. , to confirm By-law No. 466 of the Township of Fenelon was received and read a first time, and

The Council went into committee thereon.

Dr. Vrooman in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the second reading of the By-law without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, Col. Deacon addressed the Council, and extended an invitation to the Council to attend an entertainment to be given in St. Paul's school room to-morrow evening.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Stuart, that this Council make a special grant to the village of Fenelon Falls of \$100.00 the said sum to be expended on Lindsay and Colborne streets, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Stuart, seconded by Mr. McDougall, that a special grant of \$100.00 be made to the village of Woodville, the said sum to be expended for the improvement of the leading streets, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Wood, seconded by Mr. Bailey, that \$250.00 be granted as a special grant towards repairing the first quarter road between the 6th and 7th concessions of the Township of Eldon, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bottum, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, that this Council make a special grant of \$100.00 to be expended on the leading streets in the village of Bobcaygeon, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Walker, that this Council make no special grants this year.—Lost.

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Moved by Mr. Berkeley, seconded by Mr. Chambers, that a special grant of \$200 be made to the Township of Fenelon, to be expended on the leading roads in Fenelon, and that this motion be referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, a deputation of ladies led by Mrs. Neelands was received by the Council who presented a memorial on behalf of the women of the County of Victoria read by John Dobson, Esq., respectfully and earnestly urging upon the Council the establishment and maintenance of a County House of Refuge for the aged and infirm destitute.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND ASSESSMENT.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

Your committee have duly considered the resolutions of Council and communications submitted to them proposing certain grants, and your committee would recommend that effect be given to the said resolutions and communications by grants being made as follows :

To the East Victoria Farmers' Institute.....	\$ 25 00

To the Lindsay Mechanics' Institute.....	100 00

The Council having referred to your committee a number of memorials and communications from other Counties would recommend that they be dealt with as follows :

That the draft memorial to the Legislative Assembly transmitted by the Council of the County of Oxford, praying that the authority and control which County Councils now exercise over County gaols be continued, be introduced to the Council.

That a memorial to the Legislative Assembly be introduced to the Council praying that the Torrens system of Land Transfer be introduced to the County of Victoria on the same terms as those on which it has been applied to the City of Toronto and County of York.

That the Dominion Government be memorialized asking for the appointment of a Railway Commission to regulate traffic and to compel Railway companies to supply cars to shippers on reasonable notice.

The fourth annual report of James Deacon, Esquire, County Police Magistrate has been submitted and considered. Your committee would express their appreciation of the continued thoroughness and efficiency with which the duties of the office are discharged.

Your committee have given full consideration to the petition of Mr. H. Hurchmer and others praying that the license fees of Hawkers and Pedlars be increased, and beg to recommend that the fees be increased as follows: For those travelling on foot, from \$4.00 to \$10.00; for those travelling with one horse, from \$8.00 to \$12.00 and for those travelling with two horses or other animals, from \$15.00 to \$25.00. Your committee would ask leave to introduce a By-law to amend the By-law at present in force, for this purpose.

The statement of the Deputy Registrar of the County of Victoria embodying return of fees and emoluments for the year 1890, and of the commission payable to the County thereon, has been submitted. The commission amounts to \$146.00, and appears to have been arrived at in accordance with the statute.

The Treasurer's statement of current liabilities and available assets as they appeared on 1st January instant, has been duly considered. It exhibits a surplus of \$3399.26, a satisfactory shewing considering that several large expenditures were made in the latter part of the year 1890, that could not be estimated when the rate was levied in June last.

Your committee find that the Provisional County of Haliburton is in arrears on account of the share payable to this County, of the cost of Administration of Justice, to the extent of \$800.00, and that a further sum of \$450.00 will become due on 1st March next. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to press immediate payment of the amount past due, and to urge the necessity of prompt payment in future.

It is most gratifying to your committee to be able to report the steady, satisfactory increase in the Sinking Funds which will be available for the payment of the Railway Debenture debt when it matures in 1886. A sub-committee was appointed to examine the securities. The sub-committee report that they have carefully examined the securities held by the County on account of the Railway Sinking Funds. They find that the amount of a few of the earlier mortgages exceeds the statutory amount which may properly be loaned, namely two-thirds of the assessed value of the property offered as security, but they are satisfied that the actual security is ample in every case. They recommend that in one such case in which the mortgage is past due, the solicitor be instructed to have the loan so re-arranged as to bring it within the provisions of the statute. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to continue in the meantime making investments of Sinking

Funds in mortgages to mature not later than 1st of April, 1896, at the rate of six per centum per annum.

The resolution of the Board of Trade relative to the establishment of a House of Refuge has been considered. Your committee recommend that action be deferred with a view to the ratepayers of the County having an opportunity to fully inform themselves on the subject.

Your committee have examined the statement submitted by the Treasurer relative to Auctioneers' Licenses. It is evident to your committee that the By-law is practically disregarded by a number of persons exercising their calling of Auctioneer. Your committee recommend that Mr. Stephen Nevison of Fenelon Falls and Mr. John Short of Lindsay be appointed prosecutors for infractions of the By-law, for the East and West Ridings respectively, their remuneration for prosecutions to be as provided by the By-law. Your committee would ask leave to introduce a By-law changing the division of the County under the By-law into the East and West Ridings respectively, the fee for the East Riding to be \$20.00 and for the West Riding \$25.00.

Your committee recommend that a By-law be introduced authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow for current expenditure a sum not exceeding \$25000.00.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

The report of the County Engineer submitted at the November session relative to the bridge situated north of the Forest House, in the village of Bobcaygeon has been brought up for further consideration. Your committee recommend that no action be taken at present towards re-building the bridge, but that the Reeve of Bobcaygeon be authorized to have such repairs made as may be found necessary.

With reference to resolution of Council relative to the inspection of bridges, your committee recommend that the County Engineer be instructed to make examination of all the County bridges during the ensuing Spring for the purpose of having such repairs made as may be found to be necessary immediately, and to report to the Council on their condition at the June session.

A communication from Thos. Walters, Esq., Superintendent of Ontario Public Works, with an account for \$163.35 one-half the cost of repairs of rest

pler of the Rosedale bridge made in August last, has been submitted and considered. Your committee recommend that the amount claimed be paid but without prejudice.

Your committee have considered the communication from the Clerk of the County of Ontario conveying the information that \$150.00 has been granted by the Council of that County towards building a bridge over the Talbot River on the town line between the Township of Eldon and the corner of the Townships of Mara and Thorah. Your committee cannot recommend that any action be taken by this County.

With regard to a communication from the Longford Lumber Company respecting the re-covering of the High bridge on the Victoria Road between Dalton and Digby, your committee recommend that the Reeve of Laxton be requested to visit the locality and examine the bridge, and if in his opinion it is a County bridge and the repairs indicated are found to be necessary to have authority to have the work done.

Your committee recommend that no action be taken on the petition of George Sandford and others asking that a grant be made for the repair of a certain road in the Township of Dalton.

Your committee recommend that effect be not given to the resolution of Council proposing that a committee be appointed to confer with the Council of the County of Peterborough respecting the building and repairing of bridges on the eastern boundary of this County.

With regard to the resolution of Council respecting a proposed conditional grant of \$100.00 to the Township of Ops, to assist in making repairs to the East Cross Creeks bridge, your committee recommend that no action be taken.

Respecting the resolution of Council proposing that a grant of \$200.00 be made to assist the Township of Bexley in filling in the mill-pond bridge at Coboconk, your committee recommend that no action be taken before the June session.

Your committee recommend that effect be given to the resolution of Council proposing that a grant be made to assist in re-building a bridge known as Mithell's bridge across Burnt River on Lot number twenty-two, Concession one in the Township of Somerville, and that the sum of six hundred dollars be granted to the Township of Somerville for that purpose, the Reeve of Somerville to be commissioner on behalf of the County. The proposed bridge will form a part of a road which is generally used in lieu of the boundary between the Townships of Somerville and Fenelon.

Your committee recommend that the sum of \$100.00 be granted to the Township of Laxton to assist in building a new bridge over Beech Creek on the Cameron Road in Laxton, the Reeve of Laxton, Digby and Longford to be commissioner on behalf of the County.

With regard to the proposed inspection by the Engineer of the bridge over Head River on the Victoria Road between the Townships of Carden and Laxton, and the bridge over Gull River at Norland, your committee recommend that the Reeve of Laxton be requested to examine and make necessary repairs on the Head River bridge, the question of repairs on the Norland bridge to stand until it is examined by the Engineer in the course of his inspection.

Your committee recommend that the Reeves of Laxton and Bexley be requested to examine the bridge over the Talbot River on the boundary between Bexley and Laxton, and to have such repairs made as they may deem to be necessary and expedient, the cost of such repairs not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars.

Your committee recommend that the sum of fifty dollars be granted to the Township of Emily for the repair of Pigeon Creek Floating bridge, on condition that the County of Peterborough or the Town of Peterborough grant a like sum, this grant to be considered a revote of the like grant made in June last, the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Emily to be commissioners.

Your committee have given earnest consideration to the resolution of Council proposing that certain appropriations be made for roads and bridges in the municipalities of the County. Your committee deem it expedient that the amounts should be increased in several instances, and beg to recommend that the appropriations be as follows: For the leading roads and bridges in the Township of Bexley, \$100.00; in the Township of Somerville, \$100.00; in the Township of Carden, \$100.00, in the Township of Dalton, \$100.00; in the united Townships of Laxton, Digby and Longford, \$100.00; in the Town of Lindsay, \$700.00; in the Village of Woodvill, \$150.00; in the Village of Fenelon Falls, \$400.00; in the Village of Bobcaygeon, \$250.00; in the Township of Eldon, \$300.00; in the Village of Omemee, \$150.00; in the Township of Fenelon, \$200.00; in the Township of Mariposa, \$400.00; in the Township of Ops, \$200.00; in the Township of Emily, \$200.00; in the Township of Verulam, \$200.00.

Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law embodying the appropriations mentioned in the next preceding clause, specifying the roads in the respective municipalities on which the moneys are to be expended, and appointing commissioners to carry out the respective expenditures and report to this Council, and embodying also the other specific grants and appropriations recommended in this report.

Your committee recommend that no commissions or allowances be paid to the commissioners who are entrusted with the control of the expenditures recommended in this report, except in the case of the bridges known to be County bridges.

Your committee recommend that effect be not given to the other various resolutions of Council submitted to your committee proposing grants as follows: To the Village of Fenelon Falls, \$100.00; to the Town of Lindsay, \$500.00;

to the Township of Fenelon, \$200.00; to the Township of Eldon, \$250.00; to the Townships of Opa, Emily and Verulam, \$200.00 each; to the Village of Bobcaygeon, \$100.00; to the Townships north of the second range, \$500.00; to the Township of Carleton, \$100.00; and to the Village of Woodville, \$100.00.

The Reeve of Somerville has submitted a report and vouchers for the sum of \$100.00 granted in 1890 for the improvement of the leading roads in the Township of Somerville, and your committee find the report and vouchers satisfactory.

The system is giving complete satisfaction, and Mr. Woods who carried out the work of adopting the combined system for the purpose, is to be congratulated on the complete success which has attended his efforts to give efficient service.

Your committee recommend that a committee be appointed, composed of the Chairman of this committee, Dr. Vrooman, Dr. Cornwall and Mr. Berkeley to consider the whole question of accommodation for County Officials in the Court House, and to report at the June session.

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MEMORIALS.

To the Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald, G. C. B.

Premier and Minister of Railways and Canals of the Dominion of Canada.

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, now in session assembled, humbly sheweth.

That your petitioners have learned that during the last session of the Parliament of Canada a charter was granted to construct, equip and operate a line of Railway known as the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool railway, commencing at a point at or near Burketon on the Ontario and Quebec Division of the Canadian Pacific Railway, thence north easterly through and touching parts of the Townships of Cartwright and Manvers in the County of Durham, through the Township of Ops to the Town of Lindsay in the County of Victoria, and thence north easterly through the Townships of Verulam and Harvey to the incorporated village of Bobcaygeon in the County of Victoria, a distance between the southern and northern terminal points of about 39 miles.

Your petitioners respectfully point out that the projected line would run through a section of the country very poorly served by railway facilities between the southern terminal point and the Town of Lindsay and that there is no railway connection now existing between the Town of Lindsay and the Village of Bobcaygeon, a distance of about 20 miles.

Your petitioners beg to state that there exists at the Village of Bobcaygeon an excellent water power owned and utilized for the manufacture of lumber by the firm of Messrs Mossom Boyd and Company, who have for many years carried on that important industry at a serious inconvenience and comparative loss for want of railway facilities, having had to pay water carriage to Lindsay and railway freight from thence to the several points of delivery in their many and important contracts.

Your petitioners also beg respectfully to point out that there are in the vicinity and at points north of the Village of Bobcaygeon vast beds of phosphates and minerals which require only railway facilities for shipment to ensure rapid and profitable development.

Your petitioners beg to point out that the County of Victoria has aided Railways by way of bonuses amounting in the aggregate to \$418,400, and a reference to the statement heretofore forwarded will convince you that little if any aid could be expected from the municipalities through and near which the projected line would run.

That the construction of the projected Railway would give great impetus to the establishment of one of the best markets in the Midland District at the Town of Lindsay, for pork, coarse grain and lumbering supplies, and would

encourage our own people to supply the market with these important lumbering necessities instead of importing, as has been done in the past, from the markets of the Western States, and would also give still greater impetus and encouragement to the lumber and other recently established milling industries at the Village of Bobcaygeon.

Your petitioners as shown by the facts above recited have been compelled to assume grave and heavy responsibilities with a view of conferring a substantial benefit upon the County of Victoria generally; and for the purpose of giving the promoters of the scheme and the Provisional Directorate a better financial basis, your petitioners pray that you will be pleased during the ensuing session of the House of Commons to grant such subsidy to the southern extension of the proposed Railway, coupled with such restrictions as you may deem best in the public interest, as may enable the promoters to construct, equip, and operate the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway at an early date.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

MEMORIALS

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To the Honourable the House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada, in Parliament assembled.

The petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, humbly sheweth.

That it is cause for grievous disappointment that no proper tribunal has yet been established to which the Railway Companies on the one hand and the large and increasing number of the people who need to use the Railways as shippers, on the other, can resort with some measure of convenience and at moderate expense, for the settlement of difficulties and disputes that are arising continually throughout the country.

That it appears to your petitioners that the proper means for providing a remedy for existing and growing difficulties, is to appoint independent Commissions, whose sole duty it would be to look after and hear and determine all questions arising between the public and the railways, on such questions as discriminations rebates, drawbacks, exorbitant rates, and other matters of a like nature, and who would therefore be likely from constant practice, to become thoroughly acquainted with the whole railway question, and would be prepared for that reason to suggest any required change in the laws relating to Railways.

* That a grievance which has existed always, is becoming intensified, namely, the impossibility of obtaining cars for making shipments within a reasonable time after a requisition has been made upon the companies for necessary accommodation.

Your petitioners pray therefore that an Act be passed during the ensuing session of your Honourable Body, providing for the immediate appointment of permanent and independent Railway Commissions to deal with and settle with reasonable promptitude all disputes that may arise between the Railway Companies and the public.

To the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario.

The petition of the Corporation of the County of Victoria, sheweth as follows:

That in the Session of the Parliament of Ontario which was held in the year 1885, an Act was passed to facilitate, and make more secure, the transfer of lands and the titles thereto, under what is commonly known as "The Torrens System of Land Transfer;" but the provisions of the Act were confined to the City of Toronto and the County of York.

That the reasons for confining the operations of the said Act to the City of Toronto and the County of York was, that the introduction of the System was regarded as being in the nature of an experiment. The money voted for introducing the said Act was, however, voted by the people of Ontario at large out of the Provincial Funds; and such vote has, from year to year, been continued.

That the surplus derived from the fees produced by the working of the said Act in the City of Toronto and County of York for the year 1889, over and above working expenses, amounted to nearly \$3000, which surplus profit, inured to the benefit of the Province of Ontario at large.

That the operations of said Act have proved very beneficial to landed proprietors in the City of Toronto and County of York, by enabling them to transfer their land with a speed and safety heretofore unknown.

That an Act was passed in the year 1887, whereby the other municipalities in Ontario were authorized to pass by-laws for the introduction of the same system of land transfer into the municipality, provided that the municipality, upon the passage of such by-law, provided the necessary buildings and vault, and paid the salaries of such officers and inspectors as the Government of Ontario should see fit to appoint for the working of the Act in the municipality.

That this municipality has not availed itself of the benefits of the said Act for various reasons, among which may be mentioned, the uncertainty as to the expenses to which the municipality might be subject in consequence of such a by-law. And also, that the municipality was required thereby to pay officers without having any voice in their appointment, or in the fixing of their salaries.

Your petitioners believe that no municipality in Ontario has yet passed such by-law; and they further believe, that had the Torrens System been proposed for adoption by the City of Toronto and the County of York on the terms thus prescribed for its introduction into other municipalities, it never would have been adopted.

Your petitioners therefore submit, that, as the Act has proved of great benefit to the landed proprietors of the City of Toronto and County of York, your petitioners are entitled to have the Torrens System of registration and

transfer extended to their municipality, on the same terms as those upon which it was put into operation in the City of Toronto and County of York.

Your petitioners therefore pray that the benefits of the said Torrens System of registration and transfer may be extended to this Municipality upon similar terms to those upon which they were granted to the Citizens of the City of Toronto and the County of York.

And your petitioners will ever pray, &c.

To the Honourable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario in Parliament Assembled.

That the law respecting the building of bridges jointly by adjoining county municipalities is most unjust and unsatisfactory, and in the opinion of your petitioners it ought to be so amended as to enforce joint responsibility of corporations so adjoining each other for the construction and maintenance of bridges over streams and rivers, forming or crossing the boundary lines of counties or any deviation used in lieu thereof, in proportion to the benefits enjoyed by the respective municipalities and the advantages and privileges conferred thereby on the inhabitants thereof respectively.

That by recent decisions of the Courts it has been decided, that roads and bridges being wholly within one County where the boundaries are formed by lakes, rivers and streams are not under the joint jurisdiction of the Counties adjoining on each side of such lakes, rivers or streams, and the result of such decisions is that the cost of erection and maintenance presses unduly on the single municipalities which under the law as interpreted by the Courts are compelled to maintain the bridges over waters crossing such roads.

Your petitioners therefore pray that the Municipal Act be so amended as to remedy the inequalities and uncertainties that now exist regarding the jurisdiction over and maintenance of bridges erected or to be erected across rivers or streams between County Municipalities.

2. That the sum of one hundred dollars be granted to the Municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford, to assist the said Municipality in building a new bridge over Beech Creek, on the Cameron road in the Township of Laxton, and that the Reeve of the said Municipality, be Commissioner on behalf of the County of Victoria.
3. That the sum of fifty dollars be granted to the Municipality of Emily, to assist the said Municipality of Emily, in repairing the Pigeon Creek Floating Bridge, on condition however, that the County of Peterborough or the Town of Peterborough, grant a like sum for the same purpose, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of the said Municipality be Commissioners on behalf of the County of Victoria.
4. That the sum of one hundred dollars be expended on the Fenelon Falls and Kinmount road in the Township of Somerville, and that the Reeve of Somerville be Commissioner.
5. That the sum of one hundred dollars be expended on the eighth concession line in the Township of Carden, and that the Reeve of Carden be Commissioner.
6. That the sum of one hundred dollars be expended on the leading roads of the Township of Dalton, and that the Reeve of Dalton be Commissioner.
7. That the sum of one hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the United Townships of Laxton, Digby and Longford as follows, that is to say: On the north quarter line of Laxton, twenty-five dollars; on the north boundary line of Laxton, twenty dollars; on the fourth concession line of Laxton, twenty dollars; and on the bridge over bay of Gull River north of Norland on Cameron Road, thirty-five dollars, and that the Reeve of Laxton Digby and Longford be Commissioner.
8. That the sum of seven hundred dollars be expended on William and Lindsay streets southerly from Kent street in the Town of Lindsay, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeves of Lindsay be Commissioners.
9. That the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars be expended on King and Agnes streets in the village of Woodville, and that the Reeve of Woodville be Commissioner.
10. That the sum of one hundred dollars be expended on the road leading

from the Village of Coboconk to Victoria Road station in the Township of Bexley, and that the Reeve of Bexley be Commissioner.

11. That the sum of four hundred dollars be expended on Colborne and Lindsay streets in the Village of Fenelon Falls, and that the Reeve of Fenelon Falls be Commissioner.

12. That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars be expended on Bolton, Front and Helen streets in the Village of Bobcaygeon, and that the Reeve of Bobcaygeon be Commissioner.

13. That the sum of three hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Eldon, as follows, that is to say: On the eighth concession line, one hundred and fifty dollars; and on the first quarter line one hundred and fifty dollars, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Eldon be Commissioners.

14. That the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars be expended on King and Mary streets in the Village of Omemee, and that the Reeve of Omemee be Commissioner.

15. That the sum of two hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Fenelon as follows, that is to say: On the new road from Fenelon Falls to the boundary of Ops, one hundred dollars; on the second concession line, fifty dollars; and on the seventh concession line opposite lots numbers twenty and twenty-one, fifty dollars, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Fenelon be Commissioners.

16. That the sum of four hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Mariposa, as follows, that is to say: On the quarter line between lots numbers fifteen and sixteen north from Oakwood, one hundred dollars; the first Deputy Reeve of Mariposa to be Commissioner; on the quarter line between lots numbers five and six from the eighth concession line north, one hundred dollars, the second Deputy Reeve of Mariposa to be Commissioner; on the quarter line between lots numbers fifteen and sixteen south from Oakwood, one hundred dollars, the Reeve of Mariposa to be Commissioner; and on the fifth concession line, one hundred dollars, the Reeve of Mariposa to be Commissioner.

17. That the sum of two hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Ops, as follows, that is to say: On the fourth concession line between the middle line and the second quarter line, one hundred dollars; on the sixth concession line from the boundary of Lindsay to the fifth quarter line, fifty dollars; and on the fourth quarter line in the seventh and eighth concessions, fifty dollars, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Ops be Commissioners.

18. That the sum of two hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Emily, as follows, that is to say: On the eleventh concession line, one hundred dollars; and on the fourth concession line, one hundred dollars, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Emily be Commissioners.

JANUARY, 1891.

BY-LAWS

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19. That the sum of two hundred dollars be expended on the roads in the Township of Verulam, as follows, that is to say : On the leading road from Bobcaygeon to Lindsay, one hundred dollars; and on the leading road from Bobcaygeon to Fenelon Falls, one hundred dollars, and that the Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Verulam be Commissioners.

20. That the said sums so granted shall be paid by the Treasurer on the order of the Commissioners on or after the first day of May next.

21. That no commission or allowance shall be paid to the Commissioners hereinbefore named for their services under this By-law.

22. That the said Commissioners shall report to the Council and produce satisfactory proof of the expenditures made by them under this By-law at or before the last meeting of the Council for the present year, held after the month of September next.

THE WARDEN'S MESSAGE,

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:

GENTLEMEN,—

In opening the proceedings of this session of the Council, there are three matters only to which I deem it necessary to call your attention specially. They are as follows:—

1. In the month of March, my attention was called to a bill then before the Legislative Assembly, relative to County Boundary bridges, the passage of which would probably set at rest the long standing difficulty existing between the County of Peterborough and this County, relative to the erection and maintenance of the Bobcaygeon and Kinmount bridges. The Advisory Committee met on 31st March, and it was decided that a deputation should wait upon the Government, and present a statement as to our position, and give such assistance to the promoters of the bill in question, as might be helpful in procuring its adoption by the House of Assembly. You have in your hands the statement submitted to the Attorney-General, relating to the Bobcaygeon bridges. The bill was rejected by the Municipal Committee by a small majority. It became more and more manifest to the deputation, that our own case was so strong that it should be dealt with by a special Act, and I would suggest the necessity for taking steps at this session, looking towards the introduction of a bill at the next session of the Legislative Assembly for the relief of this County from the disabilities under which it rests as to the Bobcaygeon bridges, by reason of the passage of what is known as the Harvey Act.

2. At the same meeting of the Advisory Committee a communication from the Trent Valley Navigation Association was considered, and I was advised to attend a meeting of the Association in Peterborough, in company with the Reeves of Bobcaygeon and Lindsay, and I was authorized to take such further steps as I might consider necessary. I attended with my colleagues the meeting in Peterborough, and afterwards I proceeded to Ottawa with a large delegation from other Municipalities which waited upon the Premier, who assured the delegation that the work would be proceeded with although not so rapidly as might be desired by those specially interested in the construction of the Trent Valley Canal.

3. The question of an application to the Dominion Parliament for a refund to the Municipalities which have granted bonuses to Railways, of a portion of the amount so contributed towards their construction, was also brought before the Advisory Committee. I was advised to sign the memorial to the Governor General in Council, making the formal application, and the Reeve of Mariposa, the Reeve of Lindsay and myself were appointed delegates to proceed to Ottawa at such time as might be appointed, to support the memorial. The

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duty was fulfilled with the result that little or no encouragement was given to the delegation to hope that their request would be granted.

It is becoming that I should take this early opportunity of directing the minds of the members of the Council to the great sorrow that has fallen upon our Country in the death of the Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald, Premier of the Dominion, knowing that you will during the session give fitting expression to your sense of the irreparable loss the Dominion has sustained.

GENTLEMEN,—

A communication from the Clerk of the Village of Fenelon Falls, offering to loan to the County certain Corporation funds has been considered. Your committee cannot recommend that the offer be entertained.

Your committee have considered the petition of the Fenelon Agricultural Society, asking that the mode of distribution of grants to Agricultural Societies be changed in order that the Township Societies may share therein, but your committee cannot recommend that any action be taken.

Your committee cannot recommend that the draft Petition received from the Council of the County of Welland, relative to the appointment of an Inspector to enforce the provisions of the Act which provides for the prevention of the spreading of Noxious Weeds and of diseases affecting Fruit Trees, be entertained.

Your committee recommend that the sum of \$10.00 be granted to the Ontario Rifle Association as requested by the Secretary of the Association.

The Auditors' Report and Statements of accounts for the year 1890 have been submitted. Your committee recommend that the same be received and adopted.

The Estimates for the year 1891 have been considered. The amount to be provided by assessment is \$20,965.74. Your committee recommend that a rate of two mills on the dollar of the equalized assessment amounting to \$100,62064.00 which would realize \$20,124.00 be levied for the current year. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law to provide for the levy of the County Rate.

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REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:

GENTLEMEN,—

Your committee have duly considered the report of the County Engineer relative to County and other bridges. The report contains much valuable information and recommends expenditures for renewal and repairs in a number of cases. It appears to be expedient that certain bridges should be repaired or renewed during the present year, and your committee beg to recommend as follows.

1. That the Reeve of Bexley be authorized to have the Gull River Bridge at Cobocook tightened up and replanked.
2. That the Reeve of Laxton be authorized to make necessary temporary repairs on the Gull River Bridge at Norland.
3. That the Reeve of Bobcaygeon be authorized to have such repairs made on the Iron Bridge in the Village of Bobcaygeon as are indicated by the Engineer's report.
4. That the Reeve of Bobcaygeon be authorized to make necessary temporary repairs on the Forest House Bridge in the Village of Bobcaygeon.
5. That the Reeve of Fenelon Falls be authorized to have the Iron Bridge in the Village of Fenelon Falls repainted throughout and make such repairs as are shewn to be needed by the Engineer's report.
6. That the Reeve of Bexley be authorized to fill in the approaches and make renewals on the Mill-Pond Bridge in the Village of Cobocook, the cost of such work not to exceed the sum of three hundred dollars.
7. That the Reeve of Omeme be authorized to have the painting of the Iron Bridge in the Village of Omeme completed in every part.

With regard to the Head River Bridge on the boundary between Carden and Laxton no further instructions are needed, the Reeve of Laxton having received authority at the January Session to make necessary repairs.

Your committee recommend that the Engineer be instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a new bridge across the Gull River at Norland, to be erected on the site which in the judgement of the Reeves of Laxton and Somerville and the Engineer appears to be the most desirable and practicable.

Your committee have considered the portion of the Warden's message respecting legislation as to boundary bridges, as it affects the relations of the Counties of Peterborough and Victoria as to the erection and maintenance of the Bobcaygeon and Kinmount Bridges. Your committee recommend that the First Deputy Reeve of Mariposa, the Reeve of Ops and the Reeve of Omeme be appointed a committee with instructions to take proper steps for the introduction of a bill to give the County of Victoria relief from the disabilities

under which it has been placed by the Harvey Act especially: the committee to have authority to engage such legal Counsel in conjunction with the County Solicitor as they may deem necessary in the interests of the County; and your committee recommend further that a petition to the Legislative Assembly for needed legislation be introduced to the Council not later than the November Session.

Your committee have considered the resignation of John Dobson, Esquire, of his position as a Trustee of the Lindsay Collegiate Institute and beg to recommend that the same be accepted.

Your committee recommend that Samuel Hughes, Esquire, be appointed a Trustee of the Lindsay Collegiate Institute in the room and stead of John Dobson, Esquire, resigned, and that a By-law be introduced to give effect to the said appointment.

Your committee have considered the reports of the Inspectors of School for the East and West Ridings of the County respectively and beg to recommend that the said reports be printed in the minutes of the Council.

With regard to the appeal of certain ratepayers of School Section No. 1 of the Township of Verulam, against the action of the Council of the Township of Verulam in detaching the east halves of Lots No's 8 and 9 in the 7th concession of said Township of Verulam and attaching said lots to School Section No. 9 in said Township, your committee recommend that the following be appointed Arbitrators under the provisions of the Public School Act, viz: His Honor

Judge Dean, J. H. Knight, Esquire, Public School Inspector, and Adam E. Staback, Esquire, Warden of this County. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law appointing said Arbitrators.

Your committee recommend that the fee to be charged to County pupils in attendance at the High Schools of the County, be at the rate of one dollar per month, commencing with the first day of the next ensuing School term.

Your committee recommend that the following be appointed a committee to settle with the High School Boards of the County, the amount to be paid by the County for the maintenance of County pupils at the High Schools, under the provisions of the 31st section of 'The High Schools Act,' viz: Messrs. Hopkins, Adam, Dr. Wood, Dr. Cornwall and the Warden.

Your committee beg leave to introduce By-laws to raise a sum of money to form a part of the Public School Fund for the present year, to give effect to the recommendations in this report as to fees to be paid by County pupils at High Schools and for the appointment of a committee herein recommended.

The townships of Ops and Verulam have each eleven sections, the same number as in 1871. By the union of two small sections, numbers 10 and 14, Emily has 12 sections instead of 13. Somerville has 9 instead of 6, two new sections, numbers 9 and 12, having been since formed, and number 5 divided into two sections. There were two school houses in No. 5 section, and the school held 6 months in each during the year. Since the division into sections Nos. 5 and 6, there has generally been a school held in each section. At present

the school population of Number five is so small that it is almost impossible to maintain the school at all times.

SCHOOL-HOUSES AND DEPARTMENTS.—At the Village of Bobcaygeon there was one school-house with two departments, occupied by two teachers. Now there are two buildings with accommodation for five teachers, only four being as yet employed. At Omemee a frame building serves the purposes of the high and public schools, two teachers being engaged in the high school and three in the public school. In 1871 one teacher did the work of the high school and two teachers that of the public school. In 1871 the Town of Lindsay had two school-houses with six departments. Now there are 5 school-houses with 16 departments, besides the Model School taught by the Head Master in the last half of the year. All the school-houses in Lindsay are of brick.

In 1871 there were in Ops 8 school-houses of brick, 1 frame and 2 log. Now there are 11 of brick.

In Emily there were 5 of brick, 1 frame, and 7 log. Now there are 9 of brick, and 3 of frame.

In Verulam there were 4 frame school-houses and 7 log. Now there are 2 of brick, 6 frame and 3 log.

In Bobcaygeon there was one building partly frame and partly log. Now there are two brick buildings,

In Somerville there were 6 log schools and one frame. Now there are 9 frame buildings.

Of the 51 school-houses in East Victoria, 3 were erected in 1871 and 35 since that year. Additions have been made to the East Ward and South Ward Schools in Lindsay, and St. Andrew's Church converted into the Francis Street School. Of the 38 new school-houses, 10 were erected in Ops, 9 in Emily, 6 in Verulam, 8 in Somerville, 1 in Omemee, 2 in Bobcaygeon, and 2 in Lindsay.

Six school-houses have been destroyed by fire, 2 in Ops, 1 in Emily, 2 in Somerville, and 1 in Omemee; besides one in the South Ward of Lindsay which was in the course of erection.

For convenience I have divided the school-houses into four classes. In 1871 there were in Ops 4 buildings first-class, 5 second-class and 2 fourth-class. Now there are 6 first-class, 4 second-class and 1 fourth-class.

In Emily there were 4 second-class, 1 third-class and 8 fourth-class. Now there are 3 first-class, 7 second-class, 1 third-class and 1 fourth-class.

In Verulam there were 3 second-class, 4 third-class, and 4 fourth-class. Now there are 6 second-class, 2 third-class, and 3 fourth-class.

In Omemee there was one third-class. Now there is one second-class.

In Bobcaygeon there was one third-class. Now there are 2 first-class.

In Somerville there were one second-class and six fourth-class. Now there are 8 second-class and one third-class.

SCHOOL SITES.—The Regulations require that there shall be at least half an acre for each department of a school. In 1871 there was in Ops one site having the required quantity of land, and there were 10 with less. Now there are 9 sites with the required quantity and 2 with less.

In Emily there were 13 sites with less. Now there are 12 with the required quantity.

In Verulam there were 11 sites with less than the full quantity of land. Now there are 10 with the required quantity, and 1 with less.

In Somerville there were 7 sites with less. Now there are 7 with the full quantity, and 2 with less.

In Bobcaygeon there was one site with the full quantity of land. Now there is one with the full quantity and one with less.

In Omamee there has always been less than the required quantity of land.

In Lindsay 2 sites had the required quantity of land. Now 3 sites have the required quantity and 2 have less.

FENCES, TREES, &C.—The Regulations require that every school site shall be properly fenced, levelled and planted with shade trees. In 1871, in Ops one site was first-class, 4 were second-class, and 6 fourth-class. Now seven are first-class and four second-class.

In Emily 13 were fourth-class. Now 1 is first-class and 11 are second-class.

In Verulam 11 were fourth-class. Now 10 are second-class and one third-class.

In Somerville one was second-class and 6 fourth-class. Now 5 are second-class, one is third-class and 3 are fourth-class.

In Omamee 1 was fourth-class. Now it is second-class.

In Bobcaygeon 1 was fourth-class and one third-class. Now 1 is first-class and 1 third-class.

In Lindsay 1 was second-class and one third-class. Now 2 are first-class and 3 second-class.

DESKS for pupils and teacher. Twenty years ago many trustees considered it quite sufficient to have a log school house partly on the high road, with a stove in the middle, desks along the walls for copy books, and benches without backs. When desks for two pupils with backs to the seats were recommended, the cheapest that could be bought were generally obtained, and it

was some years before there was any great improvement. A few of these uncomfortable desks still remain.

In 1871 the desks in Ops might be considered second-class in 6 schools, third-class in 2 and fourth-class in 3. Now they are first-class in 7, second-class in 3 and third-class in 1,

In Emily they were third-class in 1 and fourth-class in 12. Now they are first-class in 6, second-class in 5 and third-class in 1.

In Verulam they were third-class in 2 and fourth-class in 9. Now they are first-class in 4, second-class in 6 and third-class in 1.

In Somerville they were third-class in 1 and fourth-class in 6. Now they are first-class in one, second-class in 7 and third-class in one.

In Omecc and Lindsay they were third-class in all. Now they are first-class throughout.

In Bobcaygeon they were fourth-class. Now they are first-class.

The most satisfactory desks are those manufactured at Preston.

BLACKBOARDS AND MAPS.—There has been very little improvement in rural schools.

The supply of blackboards and maps was first-class in 5 schools in Ops, second-class in 3, third-class in 2 and fourth-class in 1. Now it is first-class in 2 and second-class in 9.

In Emily it was first-class in 1, second-class in 3, third-class in 5 and fourth-class in 4. Now it is first-class in 1 and second-class in 11.

In Verulam it was first-class in 3, second-class in 2, third-class in 1, and fourth-class in 5. Now it is first-class in 1, second-class in 9, and third-class in 1.

In Somerville the supply was second-class in 2 schools, third-class in 4 and fourth-class in 1. Now it is second-class in 6, and third-class in 3.

In Lindsay, Omecc and Bobcaygeon the supply was second-class. Now it is first-class.

TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES.—In 1871 the certificates held by teachers in Ops were 2 first-class provincial, 5 second-class, 2 third, 1 first-class old County Board and 1 Permit. Now there are 1 first-class, 3 second and 7 third.

In Emily there were 2 second-class provincial, 8 third-class, 1 first-class old County Board, 1 second-class old County Board and 1 Permit. Now there are 3 second, and 9 third-class certificates.

In Verulam there were 4 third-class, 1 first-class old County Board, 2

second-class old County Board, and 2 Permits. Now there are 4 second-class, 6 third and 1 Permit.

In Somerville there were 2 third-class and 5 Permits. Now there are 1 second-class, 5 third and 3 Permits.

In Omemee there were 1 second-class and 1 Permit. Now there are 2 second-class and 1 third.

In Bobcaygeon there were 2 second-class teachers. Now there are 3 second-class and one third.

In Lindsay there were 2 first-class, one second, 2 third and one Permit. Now there are 2 first-class, 14 second and one third.

The summary for East Victoria is as follows : There were in 1871, 4 first-class, 11 second, 17 third, 3 first old County Board, 6 second old County Board, and 11 Permits. There are now 3 first-class, 30 second, 30 third, and 4 Permits.

TEACHERS' SALARIES.—The average salary paid in Ops in 1871 was \$274.55. Now it is \$368.18. In Emily it was \$210.02. Now it is \$322.08. In Verulam it was \$216.45. Now it is \$285.00. In Somerville it was \$192.28. Now it is \$275.00. In Omemee it was \$250.00. Now it is \$310.00. In Bobcaygeon it was \$355.00. Now it is \$328.75. In Lindsay it was \$300.00. Now it is \$391.17.

PUPILS.—The number of pupils on the Registers, and the number present at my first and last visits are given below :

From the above it will be seen that while the school population has increased nearly 7 per cent. for East Victoria, the school population of Ops and Emily together has decreased nearly 29 per cent. It will also be seen that while the number present at the first visit was only 42.23 per cent. of the number on the register, at the last visit it was nearly 57 per cent.

While it is a source of regret that so few children take advantage of the means of education provided, it should be borne in mind that owing to the great distances in many rural sections it is impossible for a large proportion of the scholars to attend regularly. If there could be three schools where there

are two now, it might be easier for some to attend. But the result of the change might be cheaper teachers and inferior schools, and the remedy might be worse than the disease.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF SCHOOLS, WEST VICTORIA.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honour to report that the Schools of West Victoria still continue to make satisfactory progress, except in the matter "Fifth Classes," in the country schools as mentioned in my report of last year. A new School Section, No. 1 union, 20, Mariposa, was formed last year and an excellent brick school house erected therein. A new brick school house, with all the modern improvements, was also built during the year in S. S. 13, Mariposa, to replace a defective brick building. The brick school houses in S. S. 18 Mariposa, and in S. S. 4, Eldon, have been condemned because of defective construction. Beautiful stone school houses have been erected in S. S. 2, Bexley, and S. S. 6, Carden.

I am happy to state that my suggestion with regard to having a "leaving examination" for the public schools established to cover fifth-class work with a view of re-establishing the fifth class in the public school and in behalf of which your council was so kind as to memorialize the Hon. the Minister of Education, has been acted upon by the Legislature and has now become a part of the public school law. Teachers will commence to prepare pupils immediately after the approaching holidays for this examination, the first of which will be held in July 1892. Both the Entrance and Leaving examinations will hereafter be held annually in July.

The Entrance examination will still continue to admit pupils to the High School and will at the same time serve as a promotion examination to the Fifth class in the Public Schools.

It is hoped that one of the effects of the Leaving Examination will be to re-establish the Fifth class in all or nearly all our country public schools. I think it desirable in the interests of both Public and High School Education, that no pupil should leave the public school or enter a high school until he has passed the Leaving Examination.

A pupil entering the high school with defective public school education (say a bad speller) will find the defect telling against him during the whole of his life. I hope the time is not far distant when the Leaving Examination will alone admit pupils to the high school. This would leave pupils at least one

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year longer at home with their parents and lessen in a proportionate degree the time spent in the high school, and would lessen the expense of the High School Education to the parent of each pupil by at least \$100.

Another important change made in the school law at the last session of the Legislature, is that requiring township councils to pay out of the funds of the township \$100 to each school, and \$150 where two teachers are employed.

This is a step in the direction of the township board system, but which will, I think, prove less satisfactory, as it still leaves room for invidious comparisons. Sections which receive this \$100 and pay less will be pleased with it; those that receive the \$100 and pay more will be dissatisfied. I think one of its tendencies will be towards the establishment of township boards.

Perhaps a still more important change is that contemplated by the Act respecting compulsory attendance. I have no doubt of its success in towns and incorporated villages, but fear it can only be put into successful operation in the county schools after the establishment of township boards.

BY-LAW No. 411.

A By-Law to authorize and provide for the levying and collecting of certain rates and assessments for County and other purposes in the County of Victoria, in and for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Whereas it is estimated that the sum of twenty thousand one hundred and twenty-four dollars will be required for the following County purposes, in and for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, namely: Administration of Justice, Roads and Bridges, Education, Salaries, Sessional Expenses, Interest, Printing and Advertising, Books and Stationery, Maintenance of County Buildings and Expenses, Law Expenses, Agricultural Societies, Postage, Contingencies, Votes of Council and other Expenditures;

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows:

That for the aforesaid purposes the said sum of twenty thousand one hundred and twenty-four dollars shall be assessed, levied and collected in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, upon the whole rateable property in the County of Victoria, liable to assessment, according to the law now in force concerning rates and assessments, in the manner following, that is to say:

In the Municipality of Mariposa the sum of four thousand seven hundred and eighty-four dollars.

In the Municipality of Ops, the sum of two thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight dollars.

In the Municipality of Emily, the sum of two thousand nine hundred and fifty-four dollars.

In the Municipality of Eldon, the sum of one thousand nine hundred and ninety-three dollars.

In the Municipality of Fenelon, the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-five dollars.

In the Municipality of Verulam, the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-five dollars.

In the Municipality of Somerville the sum of five hundred and eighty-seven dollars.

In the Municipality of Bexley, the sum of two hundred and eighty-eight dollars.

In the Municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford, the sum of two hundred and five dollars.

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In the Municipality of Carden, the sum of one hundred and forty-three dollars.

In the Municipality of Dalton, the sum of seventy-dollars.

In the Municipality of Lindsay the sum of two thousand dollars.

In the Municipality of Omemee, the sum of one hundred and seventy six dollars.

In the Municipality of Fenelon Falls, the sum of three hundred and fifty-two dollars.

In the Municipality of Bobcaygeon, the sum of two hundred and ten dollars.

In the Municipality of Woodville, the sum of one hundred and four dollars.

And, whereas, by By-law numbered 189, passed by the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria, on the ninth day of March A. D. 1876, it is provided that the total sum to be raised annually in certain municipalities, and portions of municipalities therein named, by special rate, for paying the debt thereby contracted, and interest, is nine thousand three hundred and fifty dollars.

And, whereas, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal act respecting sinking funds and investments, it is estimated that the sum of seven thousand one hundred dollars, levied annually, will be sufficient for the payment of the interest, and to form a fund, which, with the interest on the investments, and the securities and money already accumulated, and the interest thereon, will be sufficient to pay the debt contracted under the By-law.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows:

That for the said last mentioned purposes, the said sum of seven thousand one hundred dollars shall be assessed, levied and collected in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety one, upon the whole rateable property in the said Municipalities and portions of Municipalities hereinafter mentioned, and in that portion of the Village of Woodville which formed a part of the Township of Mariposa, liable to assessment, according to the law now in force concerning rates and assessments in manner following, that is to say:

In the Municipality of Mariposa, the sum of two thousand six hundred and eighty-one dollars.

In that portion of the Municipality of Woodville which formed a part of the Township of Mariposa, the sum of twenty-six dollars.

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In the Municipality of Ops, the sum of one thousand five hundred and sixty-two dollars.

In the Municipality of Fenelon, the sum of one thousand and seventeen dollars.

In the Municipality of Lindsay, the sum of one thousand one hundred and forty-two dollars.

In that portion of the Municipality of Verulam lying south of Sturgeon Lake and west of the concession line between the fifth and sixth concessions, the sum of one hundred and thirty-five dollars.

In that portion of the Municipality of Emily, lying north of the concession line between the sixth and seventh concessions and west of the quarter line between lots numbers twelve and thirteen, the sum of five hundred and thirty seven dollars.

BY-LAW No. 412.

A By-law to provide for the payment of a salary to the Police Magistrate for the County of Victoria.

MESSAGE.

THE WARDEN'S MESSAGE.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

In the month of August I received an urgent notice from the Reeve of Laxton as to the precarious condition of the Head River Bridge on the boundary on the Victoria Road between the Townships of Carden and Laxton. I at once visited the locality and inspected the bridge. The Reeve of Laxton had been authorized at the January session to make necessary repairs, and at the June session the County Engineer had reported as to the necessity for repairs. On uncovering the bridge to commence work the Reeve of Laxton found that the whole strength of the superstructure had gone owing to the decay of the timbers, and one of the abutments had already fallen down. It was so evident to me that a new structure was needed I took the responsibility of instructing the Reeve of Laxton to take down the old structure and erect a new one in its stead but with such modifications as in my judgment seemed practicable. Instead of a span of over forty feet I decided that one of about 25 feet would suffice. A new bridge has been erected accordingly and the approaches have been filled with stone thus securing a much more satisfactory and durable crossing and providing for much less expense for repairs and maintenance in the future.

Under date of 1st August the County Engineer called my attention to the apparent alarming condition of the Forest House Bridge in the Village of Bobcaygeon. The matter seemed so important that I deemed it advisable to hold a meeting of the Advising Committee at Bobcaygeon on 12th August in order that the Committee might examine the bridge for themselves. It was certainly found to be in a dangerous condition but in view of the legislation that may probably be obtained at the ensuing meeting of the Legislature affecting the interests of the County in all the bridges in and near the Village of Bobcaygeon, the Committee decided to authorize the Reeve of Bobcaygeon to make repairs as indicated by the Committee, which would keep the structure standing during the coming winter and spring.

On receiving a request from the Reeve of Dalton that I should visit his Municipality for the purpose of inspecting a bridge across Head River known as Johnston's Bridge I complied, and found the bridge a practical wreck. This bridge is not a boundary bridge and any claim the Municipality may have on the County arises under an amendment to the Municipal Act enacted at the session of the Legislative Assembly in 1890. On consulting the County Solicitor I was advised that the initiative must be taken and the bridge erected by the local Municipality, and any share of the cost of its erection for which the County may be liable would remain to be adjusted afterwards in accordance with the provisions of the amending Act.

In compliance with By-law passed at the June session under which I was appointed with the County Judge and the Inspector of Schools for East Victoria to arbitrate in the matter of an appeal by certain ratepayers of school section number one against the action of the Council of the Township of Verulam, in detaching certain lots from said section and attaching them to school section number nine, the arbitration took place at the Red School House in Verulam on 11th August and having heard all the evidence offered the arbitrators decided unanimously to sustain the action of the Township Council.

GENTLEMEN,—

Your committee beg to report that a meeting was held on 8th October last at which were present at the request of the Committee, Messrs. John Fell and Dr. John McKay, M.P.P's., and F. D. Moore, Esquire, County Solicitor.

After full consideration had been given by your committee to the important question referred to them, they decided that the necessary steps be taken by the County Solicitor for giving notice of the introduction of a Bill to the Legislative Assembly at the ensuing session, to repeal the Harvey Act or so amend the said Act that the rights and responsibilities of the Counties of Peterborough and Victoria relative to the erection and maintenance of the bridges in and near the Village of Bobcaygeon may be restored to the same position which they occupied prior to the coming into force of the Harvey Act; and the County Solicitor was authorized to engage the assistance of Charles Moss, Esquire, Q.C., in carrying out the terms of the decision of the committee.

Your committee understand that the legislation to be asked for by the County Solicitor under the advice of Mr. Moss is the passage of an Act so amending the Harvey Act as to again place the bridges in question under the joint jurisdiction of the Counties of Peterborough and Victoria.

Your committee beg to submit herewith a copy of the draft of the proposed Bill.

Your committee beg leave to introduce a petition to the Legislative Assembly praying that the legislation be granted.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED AT THE JUNE
SESSION TO PREPARE THE NECESSARY ACCOMMODATION
IN THE COURT HOUSE FOR JUDGE'S CHAMBERS AND
THE LAW LIBRARY AND FOR THE COUNTY
ATTORNEY AND CLERK OF THE PEACE
AND THE POLICE MAGISTRATE
OF THE COUNTY.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :

Your committee entered upon the discharge of the duties laid upon them by your instructions as soon after the June session as they could be conveniently convened.

Their first duty was to ascertain from His Honor Judge Dean, the officers of the Law Association and the other members of the legal profession the extent and nature of the accommodation that would be required for Judge's Chambers and Law Library. It was indicated that three rooms would be

needed, one for Chamber's usiness, one for the Library and one for the Judge's personal use, and in addition to these a fire-proof vault. After mature consideration and with the assistance of plans prepared by Mr. L. M. Bowman County Engineer, your committee decided to erect a second story on the wing used by the Local Registrar of the High Court thus providing a commodious vault and one of the required rooms, a second room to be provided by joining the east end of the upper corridor to the large committee room and the third room to be provided by taking the easterly apartment of the old Judge's Chambers.

Tenders were then asked for building the addition and making the requisite changes, on plans prepared by the County Engineer and approved by your committee.

Four offers were received, which may be described as No. 1 \$520.00; No. 2 \$875.00; No. 3 \$650.00; No. 4 \$765.00. The lowest tender, that of Mr John Kells, was accepted, a contract was entered into, and the work was begun on 10th August and pushed forward to satisfactory completion.

A few additional articles of furniture may be needed but your committee are of opinion that the sum of \$1300.00 will cover the whole expenditure, and they have placed at the service of the Judge and legal profession of the County

of Victoria a suite of rooms which are each pronounced to be acceptable and suitable in all respects. The rooms have been occupied for about a month.

Your committee took hold of the work entrusted to them with the strong determination to settle effectively the long vexed question of the location and quality of the accommodation which the County is required to provide for the conduct of legal business, and they have the gratification of knowing that in this instance they have succeeded in meeting the wishes of all who are immediately concerned.

Your committee beg to point out that financially a saving will be effected. An expenditure of \$1300.00 at 5 per cent. is equal to an annual outlay of \$65.00 whilst the rent heretofore paid for the inadequate, and necessarily temporary, quarters down town was \$125.00 per annum shewing a balance in favor of the County of \$60.00. There is to be added to this saving of \$60.00, as a consequence of the decision of the Council at the June session, a further saving of \$125.00 the amount paid per annum for rent &c. of apartments now occupied by the County Attorney and Clerk of the Peace and the Police Magistrate, making a total decrease of \$185.00 in the annual outlay.

The Police Magistrate has signified his ready willingness to accept the accommodation which is at his disposal in the Court House.

In the case of Mr. A. P. Devlin, County Attorney and Clerk of the Peace the efforts of your committee have not been rewarded with success. Mr. Devlin has shewn a disposition to accept nothing in the way of accommodation but such as he must have known could not be given him. The only rooms he would accept were the two rooms known as the old Judge's Chambers one of which had been set apart for the Law Library. An offer of the two corresponding rooms at the west end of the corridor equal in every regard to those he would accept was rejected. An offer of two rooms on the north side of the west part of the upper corridor met with a like fate. The large room immediately east of the Council Chamber and the room on the ground floor formerly occupied by Mr. McKibbin were offered in turn but neither would be accepted.

Your committee have no hesitation in stating that Mr. Devlin has met them in an unreasonable and captious manner, and they are justified in concluding that he does not wish to come to the Court House but would like a grievance on which to hang a claim for compensation against the Council. They are of opinion that either of the single rooms offered him is sufficient for the conduct of the business appertaining to his official positions, and they do not understand that Mr. Devlin can claim accommodation in the Court House for carrying on the general business of a Barrister and Solicitor.

Your committee would recommend that the County Attorney and Clerk of the Peace be not further approached on the subject, and that the remaining unoccupied rooms in the Court House be put to such service as the Council may deem expedient.

Your committee beg to report that the necessary notices have been served upon the landlords of the premises now under lease, and that payment of rent for the rooms formerly occupied as Judge's Chambers will cease from 31st December next, and for the rooms now occupied by the County Attorney and Clerk of the Peace and Police Magistrate on the 31st January next.

Your committee would express the hope that the Council will not again bring upon itself the expense and difficulty entailed by the payment of rent and the holding of leased premises, but that in future it will be understood that in no case will the County supply accommodation which it may be required to provide, except within the precincts of its own freehold.

ANCE OF COUNTY PUPILS AT THE HIGH SCHOOLS OF
THE COUNTY, IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE PRO-
VISIONS OF THE 31st SECTION OF "THE HIGH
SCHOOLS ACT 1891."

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

Your committee beg to report that a conference was held with the Finance Committee of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay on the 17th day of July 1891.

The latter committee submitted statements shewing the relative attendance of County pupils at the Lindsay Collegiate Institute for the three years ending 30th June 1891 to be 37 8-10 per cent. of the whole attendance at the school, also a statement shewing that the estimated expenditure for maintaining the school for the year 1891 was \$9305.00. From this amount was deducted the sum of \$1505.00 the average amount of Legislative grant received by the Board for the same period of three years as that for which the relative attendance was given, leaving the net sum of \$7800.00 to be dealt with as a basis of settlement.

According to the relative attendance the County would be liable in all for 37 8-10 per cent. per annum of \$7800.00 equal to \$2948.00. Of this amount it was estimated that the sum of \$948.00 would be received in fees from County pupils

leaving the net amount to be paid by the County the sum of \$2000.00.

It was contended by the Finance Committee of the Board that the Town of Lindsay, in addition to maintaining its own pupils in attendance at the Collegiate Institute will, as a part of the County, pay in County Rate, one tenth of the County's net share, viz: \$200.00 and that therefore the total amount for which the County should hold itself liable was \$3148.00.

With a view to an unanimous agreement being effected your committee undertook to allow the sum of \$3050.00 per annum as the total amount for which the County would hold itself liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Lindsay Collegiate Institute for each of the three years ending 31st December 1893.

The following summary will show the effect of the changed relations of the County to the Lindsay Collegiate Institute brought about by the provisions of "The High Schools Act 1891:"

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

The communication of Mr. M. O'Brien, Secretary of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, with reference to the case of Bryan Murtha, who has been for a long time in the County Gaol because he is homeless and friendless, has been duly considered, and your committee beg to recommend that the sum of two dollars

per week be paid for the maintenance of Murtha in the House of Providence Peterborough, to which institution he is to be removed.

A return shewing the amount expended on the indigent poor by the local Municipalities in the year 1890 has been submitted. Your committee recommend that the County Treasurer be instructed to add to the said return a statement of the amounts paid by the County, exclusive of grants for Charity to local Municipalities, for the support of persons whose maintenance is provided by the County, and also the cost of maintaining persons of the same class confined in the County Gaol in 1890, and that said return be printed in the minutes and three hundred copies in sheet form for distribution.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:

GENTLEMEN,—

Your committee have had under consideration the paragraph of the Warden's message relative to Head River Bridge on the boundary between the Townships of Carden and Laxton. Your committee approve of the Warden's prompt decision in ordering the erection of a new structure on finding that the old bridge had become worthless from decay. The new bridge is much shorter than the former one, the saving in length having been effected by building stone approaches. The Reeve of Laxton who carried out the Warden's instructions has submitted a full and satisfactory report, and your committee have no doubt of the interests of the County and of the people who traverse the road on which this bridge has been built having been conserved. The total cost of bridge and approaches is \$391.34. A voucher for the sum of \$13.75 remains to be supplied. Your committee recommend that a quantity of unused plank be disposed of at \$7.00 per thousand. If that price cannot be obtained the Reeve of Laxton is requested to keep it for future use on some other County work.

Your committee approve of the action of the Warden and Advisory Committee in taking steps for strengthening the Forest House Bridge in the Village of Bobcaygeon in order to keep it standing during the ensuing winter and spring.

With regard to Johnston's Bridge across Head River on the second concession of the Township of Dalton, referred to in the Warden's message and brought before your committee by a resolution of Council, your committee recommend that the Council of Dalton be requested to have plans and specifications and estimate of cost of a new bridge prepared for the consideration of the Council at the January session.

The Reeve of Bexley has submitted a report of expenditure on the Mill Pond Bridge at Cobocok. The approaches have been filled in to the extent of 210 feet, 100 feet at west end and 50 feet at east end, thus making a permanent reduction in the length of the bridge of the same number of feet. In carrying out the work the Commissioner found it necessary to expend \$355.08 which is \$55.08 in excess of the maximum amount named by your committee at the June session. Your committee are satisfied the Commissioner has done the best possible under the circumstances and beg to express entire approval of his action in the matter.

A report has been submitted by the Reeve of Laxton of his examination of the bridge on the Victoria Road on the boundary between Dalton and Digby known as the high gully bridge. He states that in his opinion it is not a County bridge.

The Reeve of Bexley has submitted a report of the repairing and repainting the Gull River Bridge at Cohoconk at a total cost of \$118.31. He informs the Council that the bridge is now in a first-rate state of repair.

A report has been submitted from the Reeves of Laxton and Bexley on the repairs made to the Talbot River Bridge on the boundary between Bexley and Laxton. In carrying out the instructions of the Council a new bridge has practically been erected at a cost of \$137.00.

With regard to the resolution of Council respecting the dangerous condition of the Grass River Bridge Victoria Road in Victoria Road Village, your committee recommend that the Reeves of Bexley and Carden be appointed Commissioners with authority to erect a new bridge, keeping in view the necessity for shortening the structure as much as possible by building approaches. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law to give effect to this recommendation.

Your committee have had under consideration a report from the County Engineer with partial plans and specifications of a new bridge to be built across Gull River at Norland. Your committee recommend that John Fell and John Bailey, Esquires, be appointed Commissioners with authority to construct a new bridge on the old site or such new site as they may consider most suitable, on plans and specifications to be prepared under their directions by the County Engineer. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law to give effect to this recommendation.

With regard to the resolution of Council relating to the bridge across Pigeon River on the boundary between this County and the County of Durham your committee recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to notify the Clerk of the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham that the bridge in question is now unsafe for public travel and request that joint action be taken to have the necessary repairs done during the ensuing winter; and that the Reeve of Ops be appointed Commissioner on behalf of the County of Victoria.

A resolution of Council proposing that the usual commission be paid to the Commissioners appointed under By-law No. 409 to expend certain appropriations for roads has been considered. Your committee recommend that effect be given to the terms of the resolution and therefore beg leave to introduce a By-law to repeal Section 21 of By-law No. 409 and to provide that a commission of four per cent. upon the amount expended be paid to the Commissioners so appointed.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON COUNTY PROPERTY.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

Your committee have examined accounts as follows and beg to recommend payment of the same, viz :

A communication from G. H. Hopkins, Esquire, Secretary and Treasurer of the Lindsay Law Association and claim therewith amounting to \$94.51 for caretaking, lighting &c. of the Judge's Chambers down town, recently vacated, have been considered. Your committee cannot recommend that the claim be entertained as the Council at the time an arrangement was made for the payment of \$125.00 per annum for rent of the premises in question stipulated that the Council should incur no other expenses in connection with them.

An account from the Consumers Gas Company amounting to \$7.14 for placing gas pipes and fixtures in the County Attorney's Office on Kent street has been submitted. The Council gave no authority for having this work done, and further as it was stipulated by the Council when the Office in question was leased that no expense other than for rent and fuel should be incurred, on behalf of the Council, your committee cannot recommend that the account be entertained.

With regard to the request of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Law Association that an annual grant of \$25.00 be made to the Association your committee recommend that consideration be deferred until the January session.

Your committee recommend that additional furniture for the Judge's Chambers and adjoining apartments be purchased by the Chairman of this Committee.

Your committee recommend that the Chairman be authorized to place storm windows on the Judge's Chambers and private room and on the west windows of the Registry Office.

Your committee recommend that the Chairman be paid the sum of fifty dollars in recognition of his services in supervising the improvements made in and about the Court House and grounds during the present year.

Your committee recommend that any of the County officials who may require furniture, fixtures or other requisites for their respective offices, which the County may be bound to provide, shall make a requisition in writing to the County Clerk who shall, when practicable, obtain the sanction of the Chairman of the Standing Committee on County Property before authorizing any purchase, and that accounts for such supplies shall be submitted to and certified by the Chairman of this committee before the same are referred to the respective committees.

Your committee recommend that the office in the Court House formerly occupied by the Clerk of Division Court be leased to him for the sum of twenty five dollars per annum, including caretaking, three months notice to be given by either party to terminate lease.

PETITION.

TO THE HONORABLE THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED.

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria:
HUMBLY SHEWETH,—

1 That on the petition of certain of the inhabitants of the Township of Harvey in the County of Peterborough an Act was passed in the year 1879 (42 Vic. Cap. 47) whereby all that portion of the said Township, consisting of all lots in the Nineteenth Concession from lots One to Fifteen inclusive (forming a narrow strip of land on the West side of Pigeon Lake) was detached from the Township of Harvey and annexed to the Township of Verulam in the County of Victoria.

2 The Corporation of the County of Victoria was no party to the passing of the said Act, but the same was passed wholly for the benefit and convenience of the inhabitants of the said Township of Harvey.

At the time of the passing of the said Act, three bridges known as "The Big Bob" or "North Bridge," "The Forest Hill Bridge" and "The Little Bob Bridge" were situate on the boundary line and used for that purpose between the said Counties of Peterborough and Victoria.

4 At all times previous to the passing of the said Act each Corporation of the said Counties bore a just proportion of the expenses of building and maintaining the said boundary line and bridges in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act in that regard, and since the passing of the said Act the inhabitants of the County of Peterborough have continued to use the said bridges as they did before its passage.

5 At the time of the passing of the said Act the attention of your petitioners was not called to the fact that the said Corporation of the County of Peterborough might be relieved from their responsibility to assist in maintaining and repairing the said boundary line and bridges or they would have opposed the same or would have pressed for the insertion of some clause whereby the liability of the said County of Peterborough would be preserved.

6 After the passing of the said Act, the Corporation of the County of Peterborough contributed in the year 1880 towards the erection of the North Bridge, but thereafter refused any more to assist the County of Victoria in maintaining or repairing the said boundary line and bridges, on the ground that they were relieved from all such responsibility under the Municipal Act, as the boundary between the Counties now passed down the centre of Pigeon Lake instead of along the west shore of the said lake as formerly.

7 Your petitioners then applied to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council to appoint an arbitrator on behalf of the Corporation of the County of Peterborough to arbitrate upon the dispute between them as to the maintenance of said road and bridges, when the Honorable the Attorney General suggested that as that application would be resisted by that corporation, it would be more advisable for your Petitioners to test the matter in Court. Whereupon a suit was entered in the Common Pleas Division of the High Court of Justice for Ontario and was tried before Mr. Justice Robertson.

8 After hearing the evidence of all parties, the learned Judge gave judgment on the Sixth day of December, 1887, (15 O. R. 440) declaring that the said boundary line should still be considered the boundary line road between the said Counties, and that the Corporation of the County of Peterborough was liable to contribute to the maintenance and repair of the said bridges.

9 In this judgment the learned Judge states that the evidence before him "Shewed that the inhabitants of the Township of Galway, in the County of Peterborough, which Township is bounded on the West by the boundary line between Peterborough and Victoria and forms the North West angle of Peterborough as well as the inhabitants of the North West angle of Harvey, travelling to the town of Peterborough use the bridges in question, the road



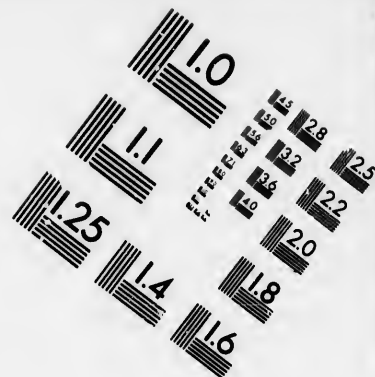
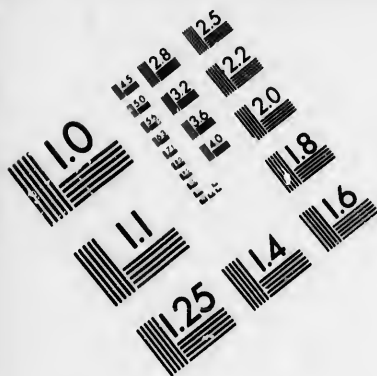
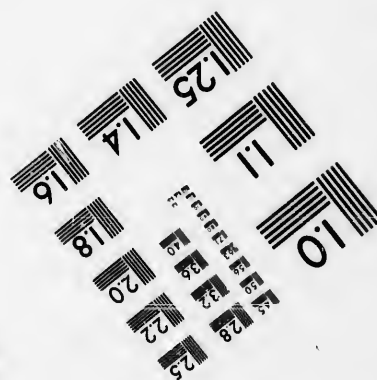
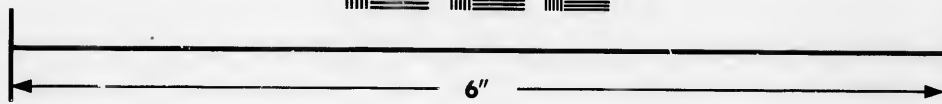
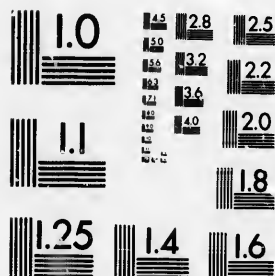

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"by and across them being the only convenient way they have of reaching that point." "And taking into consideration the reasons which admittedly existed from the first, for leaving the boundary line as a road it is impossible, in my judgment, to hold that the mere fact of detaching the lots mentioned has relieved the Municipality of the County of Peterborough from liability to bear its fair share of the maintenance of the bridges in question. There is no doubt, that, had the lots taken from Harvey, by the Act 42 Vic. Ch. 47 (O) originally been a part of Verulam, the same reasons would have existed for making the deviation of the road through the Village of Bobcaygeon as existed while they were a part of Harvey. The boundary between the two Counties could not have been utilized as a public highway then, any more than it could before the passing of that Act—the deviation would of necessity, have taken place under such circumstances just as certainly as it did when the boundary between the respective counties West of Pigeon Lake existed along the rear of the 19th concession of Harvey." "There was reason and justice for making the detour in the first place; and the same reason prevails here." . . . "And as it is admitted that the inhabitants of the County of Peterborough are to the same extent now, as they always have been, obliged to use these bridges in order to enable them to reach their market and county town, the same justice demands that the defendants should, as formerly, contribute to the building and maintaining of the bridges in question."

10 From this judgment, the Corporation of the County of Peterborough appealed to the Court of Appeal for Ontario, which Court, on the Thirteenth day of November, 1888, (15 A. R. 617) reversed the judgment of Mr. Justice Robertson, on the technical ground that the said Act 42 Vic. Cap. 47, by the force of Cap. 5 Sec. 10 R. S. O., 1887, (which defines the boundaries between Counties where lakes intervene) had changed the boundary line between the said Counties to the centre of Pigeon Lake, and as the joint jurisdiction of the two counties over the original boundary line had not been reserved in the said Act of 42 Vic. Cap. 47, the Corporation of the County of Peterborough was not compelled under the Municipal Act to contribute to the maintenance of said bridges. This judgment was afterwards sustained by the Supreme Court at Ottawa on the same technical grounds without regard to the merits or justice of the case.

11 Your Petitioners would also submit that by the passage of the said Act of 42 Vic. Cap. 47, the Corporation of the County of Victoria was compelled to pay Nine hundred and fifty-four dollars and fifty-three cents for the transfer of the title papers of the said lots detached from the Township of Harvey in the Registry Office of the County of Peterborough to the Registry Office of the County of Victoria, which, at six per cent. per annum, amounts to the sum of Fifty-seven dollars and twenty-seven cents annually in perpetuity, while the lands annexed by the said Act to the County of Victoria only add Thirty-five dollars

and nineteen cents annually to the revenue on the basis of the equalized assessment of the County of Victoria for the year 1891, thereby causing a loss of Twenty-two dollars and eight cents annually to the County.

12 Besides this annual loss, the Corporation of the County of Victoria has been compelled under the said judgment of the Supreme Court to maintain the said bridges and will have to so continue to maintain and repair the same, at an estimated cost of One thousand five hundred dollars per annum—the said cost being for the estimated depreciation by wear and tear and for the necessary annual repair of the said bridges during their natural existence, and is based at ten per cent. per annum on Fifteen thousand dollars, the original cost thereof.

13 Your Petitioners would further submit that while the County of Victoria is subject by the said Act of 42 Vic. Cap. 47 to the said annual outlay of over Fifteen hundred dollars, the natural obligation of the County of Peterborough to assist the County of Victoria in maintaining and repairing the said road and bridges remains the same as heretofore by reason of the inhabitants of the County of Peterborough—as declared by Mr. Justice Robertson in his said judgment—still continuing to use the said road and bridges as they have always done in order to reach their market and county town.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Legislative Assembly may be pleased to enact such amendments to the said Act of 42 Vic. Cap. 47 as will place the said original boundary line or road used for that purpose and the said bridges thereon, under the joint jurisdiction of the Corporations of the said Counties and so that each County shall contribute its fair share of the costs necessary for the proper maintenance and repair of the said road and bridges.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW No. 418.

A By law to confirm an agreement with the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay as to the amount for which the County of Victoria shall be liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay.

Whereas the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria did on the Thirteenth day of June, A D 1891, appoint a committee to settle with the High School Boards of the County, the amounts to be paid by the County of Victoria for the maintenance of County pupils at the High Schools of the County.

And whereas the said Committee has agreed with a Committee of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay that the amount for which the County of Victoria should hold itself liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay for each of the three years ending on the thirty-first day of December in the year 1893 is \$3050.00, inclusive of the amount of fees receivable from County pupils in attendance at the said Collegiate Institute.

And whereas it is expedient and necessary that the action of the said Committee should be confirmed;

The Municipal Council of the corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows :

That the amount for which the County of Victoria shall be liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay, for each of the three years ending on the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetythree, is the sum of three thousand and fifty dollars, which said sum shall be inclusive of the amount of fees collected from County pupils in attendance at the said Collegiate Institute.

BY LAW No 419

A By law to provide for licensing, regulating and governing Auctioneers

Whereas in pursuance of the provisions of "The Municipal Act" it is necessary and expedient to provide for licensing, regulating and governing Auctioneers

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows:

1. -From and after the passing of this By law it shall not be lawful for any person to sell or put up for sale goods, wares, merchandise or effects by Public Auction within the County of Victoria, without first having obtained a license for that purpose in compliance with this By-law, excepting such

persons as are now exempt by law in the discharge of their duties as officers of Courts or otherwise.

2.—The Treasurer of the County, on the application of any person and on payment of the fees therefor fixed by this By law, shall issue to such person a license as Auctioneer under the Corporate seal of the County, which may be in the form of Schedule 'A' to this By law or to the like effect and describing the territory covered by such license

3.—Every license issued under the provisions of this By law shall contain the name of the person to whom it is issued and no other person shall exercise the calling of an Auctioneer under its authority.

4.—That licenses may be issued for the whole of the County, for the respective Ridings into which the County is divided for the purpose of representation in the Legislative Assembly or for any one of the Municipalities within the County, and the fees to be paid for such licenses for the respective territories shall be as follows:

For the whole County—Forty dollars

For the West Riding of the County—Twenty-five dollars.

For the East Riding of the County—Twenty dollars.

For the Town of Lindsay—Twenty dollars

For the Township of Mariposa—Fifteen dollars.

For the Township of Ops—Twelve dollars.

For the Township of Emily—Twelve dollars.

For the Township of Fenelon—Ten dollars

For the Township of Eldon—Ten dollars

For the Township of Verulam—Ten dollars.

For the Township of Somerville—Eight dollars.

For the Township of Bexley—Six dollars

For the United Townships of Laxton Digby and Longford—Six dollars.

For the Township of Carden—Five dollars.

For the Township of Dalton—Five dollars

For the Village of Fenelon Falls.—Ten dollars.

For the Village of Omemee—Ten dollars.

For the Village of Bobcaygeon—Ten dollars

For the Village of Woodville—Eight dollars

For any Municipality hereafter formed or set apart within the County—Five dollars and every license issued under the authority of this By law shall be in force for one year from the date of issue and no longer.

5.—The moneys received for licenses issued under the provisions of this By law shall form part of the ordinary funds of the County.

6.—Every Auctioneer, or person exercising the calling of an Auctioneer licensed under this By law shall whenever engaged in the exercise of his calling as such Auctioneer if thereunto required by any ratepayer of the County produce and exhibit his license to such ratepayer and in default of so doing shall upon conviction thereof before any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction in this County, be liable to be fined and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars nor less than four dollars, to be levied and divided as provided by the Statute in that behalf

7.—Every person who shall put up for sale any goods wares merchandise or effects by public auction, contrary to the provisions of this By law shall upon conviction thereof before any Justice or Justices of the peace having jurisdiction in this County be liable to be fined and pay a sum not exceeding thirty

dollars nor less than ten dollars, such fine to be levied and divided in accordance with the provisions of the Statute in that behalf

8—The Treasurer of the County shall publish in some newspaper or newspapers published in the County, twice in each year, namely: in the first week of April and the first week of October the names of all persons licensed under this By law the territory for which the licenses have been issued, and the dates on which such licenses will expire.

9—By laws numbered 280, 375 and 406 being By laws relating to licensing, regulating and governing Auctioneers are hereby repealed except in so far as they relate to licenses issued under the provisions of said By law No 280 which have not yet expired and no By law thereby repealed shall be hereby revived

BY LAW No 420.

A By law to provide for the licensing, regulating and governing of Hawkers
Pedlars and Petty Chapmen.

Whereas in pursuance of the provisions of "The Municipal Act" it is
expedient and necessary to provide for the licensing regulating and governing
of Hawkers, Pedlars and Petty Chapmen within the county of Victoria

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts
as follows:

1—That from and after the passing of this By law it shall not be lawful
for Hawkers Petty Chapmen and other persons carrying on petty trade or
who go from place to place or to other men's houses, on foot or with any
animal, bearing or drawing any goods, wares or merchandise for sale or
or in or with any boat vessel or other craft, or otherwise carrying goods wares or

merchandise for sale, to exercise such calling without having first obtained a license for that purpose in compliance with this By-law.

2.—The Treasurer of the County, on the application of any person and on payment of the fees therefor fixed by this By law shall issue to such person a license for any or all of the purposes aforesaid, under the Corporate seal of the County which license may be in the form of Schedule 'B' to this By law or to the like effect and describing the territory covered by such license.

3.—That any such license may be issued in the name of a firm, but each license shall only entitle one person to travel, and sell and trade under its authority.

4.—The amount payable for licenses shall be as follows: For a license to travel on foot the sum of ten dollars; to travel with one horse or other animal, the sum of twelve dollars; to travel with two horses or other animals the sum of twenty dollars; and to sail or travel by boat, vessel or other craft the sum of twenty dollars, and each license shall remain in force for one year from the day of issue and no longer.

5.—The "oneys received" for such licenses shall form part of the ordinary funds of the County.

6 Every person licensed as aforesaid under this By law shall whenever engaged in the exercise of his said calling if thereunto required by any ratepayer of this County produce and exhibit his license to such ratepayer, and in default of so doing shall, upon conviction thereof before any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction in this County, be liable to be fined and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars nor less than four dollars, to be levied and divided as provided by the Statute in that behalf.

7 Every person who shall exercise any or all of the trades or callings aforesaid contrary to the provisions of this By law shall, upon conviction thereof before any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction in this County be liable to be fined and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars nor less than four dollars, such fine to be levied and divided in accordance with the provisions of the Statute in that behalf.

8.—The Treasurer of the County shall publish in some newspaper or newspapers published in the County twice in each year, namely: in the first week of April and the first week of October, the names of all persons licensed under this By law, the nature of the licenses, and the dates on which such licenses will expire

9. By laws numbered 319 and 409 being By laws relating to the licensing, regulating and governing of Hawkers and Pedlars are hereby repealed, except in so far as the said By laws relate to licenses issued under the authority of said By law No. 319 which have not yet expired, and no By law thereby repealed shall be hereby revived

BY LAW No. 422.

A By law to provide for the erection of a bridge across Grass River on Victoria
Road in the Village of Victoria Road.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts
as follows:

That a new bridge be erected across the Grass River on Victoria Road in
the Village of Victoria Road, the said road forming the boundary between
the Townships of Carden and Bexley.

That the Commissioners to be appointed for carrying into effect the provi-
sions of this By law be and are hereby required to give special consideration to
shortening the structure so far as practicable by building approaches.

That the said bridge shall be constructed of wood and of a substantial, durable character.

That the Commissioners hereafter appointed shall have power to enter into a contract for the erection of the said bridge and building approaches, or behalf of the County of Victoria or to carry out the work by such other method as to them shall seem expedient. That they shall have authority to grant orders upon the County Treasurer for the payment of the amount of contract or the payment of workmen and for materials, if they decide to carry out the work by the employment of labor under their own control.

That the Reeve of Bexley and the Reeve of Carden be and are hereby appointed Commissioners to carry out the said work with full power and authority to carry out the same in an efficient manner.

BY LAW No 423.

A By law to provide for the erection of a bridge across Gull River at the Village of Norland.

Whereas it has become necessary and expedient to erect a new bridge across Gull River at the Village of Norland which river forms the boundary between the Townships of Laxton and Somerville.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows.

That a new bridge be erected across Gull River at the Village of Norland, the said bridge to be constructed of wood and on such site as the Commissioners hereinafter named shall decide to be most suitable and according to plans and specifications to be prepared under their direction by the County Engineer.

That the Commissioners shall have full power and authority to carry out the work either by entering into a contract or contracts or by employing workmen and purchasing timber and other materials, as they may conclude the interests of the Corporation will be most effectively guarded, and shall have authority to grant orders upon the County Treasurer for the payment of the contractor or contractors or for the payment of the wages of workmen and for materials.

That John Fell of the Township of Somerville and John Bailey of the Township of Laxton, Esquires, be and are hereby appointed Commissioners on behalf of the County of Victoria with power and authority to carry into effect the purposes of this By law.
