In The World, in the middle of July, Canadian formers were advised to have their early crops of winter wheat threshed out and marketed as soon as possible, so as to get advantage of the fair prices which were then offering on account of the deficient stocks all over the world, and which prices were not likely to be maintained when new wheat began to be offered freely. Since that time prices have fallen off: In Chicago 14c, in New York 15c per bushel and in other markets in about the same proportion. The Northwest spring wheat is now being freely delivered at Minneapolis, Duluth and other western markets. The visible supply may now be expected to increase rapidly.
