SOME INTERESTING POINTS.

Another Woman in the Mollineux Case at New York—Victories for Prosecution.

New York, Dec. 8.—Several interesting points developed to-day in connection with the trial of Roland B. Mollineux for the murder of Mrs. Katharine J. Adams. First, there was the capture of an important witness for the prosecution. This was Mamie Mulanda, the young woman who cared for Mollineux's rooms at New York. Through a ruse on the part of the detectives, she was induced to cross the State line, and when once within the jurisdiction of the New York State authorities she was placed under arrest and brought to New York city. It is said she will be placed on the stand by the State and compelled to testify that Mollineux was accustomed to use the now famous blue paper, surmounted by the three interlaced crescents.

This same paper made its appearance again in the case later in the day, when George William Hall of Moods, Conn., was called for the purpose of testifying concerning a letter which fell into the possession of his employer, Prof. Fowler. Witness said that James Burns of Detroit, Mich., sold a great many thousand letters to Prof. Fowler, who deals in medical remedies; that the signature "Roland B. Mollineux" was noticed, and the New York authorities were notified of the find. The defence admitted the identity of this letter as having been written by the left hand. This is considered important, owing to the fact that it was written upon blue crescent-shaped paper, and the defence has acknowledged the writing of it.

It seemed to be a day of victories for the prosecution, for the specimens of handwriting by Mollineux before his arrest and at the time that Cornish was under suspicion, were admitted; also, the diagnosis blank of a patent medicine concern with the blanks filled out in handwriting said to be the same as that of other letters in evidence and signed "H. C. B. met"; and in the face of strenuous objections Expert Kinsey was permitted to testify that in his opinion Mollineux wrote the address on the poison package sent to Harry Corah.

AN INTERESTING CASE.

Court of Appeal Heard Argument in Action of Earle v. B. A. Bank Note Co.

The Court of Appeal yesterday heard argument of counsel on the appeal of the defendants in the action of Henry Earle and the other minority shareholders against George B. Burland and others, the directors of the British American Bank Note Co. The amount involved is very large and the case is an interesting one. The appeal is from the decision of Mr. Justice Armour, from the decision of Mr. C. R. Robinson, Q.C., in counsel for respondents, A. B. Aylesworth, Q.C., for appellants, and the defendant, G. B. Burland, was the plaintiff shareholder and was in control of the affairs of the company, which were of the order of 10 per cent. a large amount was annually laid by, and it is in connection with this fund that the trouble arose. The plaintiff's claim further showed that large sums of money were invested without authority and resulted in big losses, amongst others \$18,000 being dropped in Federal

Bank stock and \$10,000 in Central Bank stock, there being also very large sums out at loan in Mr. Burland's name. The judgment appealed against ordered that the sum of \$24,167, and any further sums ascertained to be due by Mr. Burland to the company, be applied in payment of dividends to stockholders, and further restrained Mr. Burland from investing any of the company's money in his own name.

Knocked Down by a Car. In attempting to cross Yonge-street just above Bloor-street yesterday morning, Andrew Davidson, aged 15 years, who lives at 31 Hayden-street, was struck by Yonge-street car No. 542, and thrown to the side of the road. Pedestrian carried him into Cox's drug store and Dr. Spencer was summoned. The physician found the Davidson's right leg was broken, left wrist fractured, face and head badly cut and a number of teeth knocked out. After dressing the wounds the ambulance conveyed Davidson to the Hospital for Sick Children. As the young lad is suffering from shock and his injuries are serious, it is feared that he may not get better. At the time of the accident Davidson was going to buy medicine for his sick mother.

A MOCK PARLIAMENT.

The University Students Considered Weighty Problems Last Night at an Open Meeting of the Lit.

The open meeting of the University College Literary and Scientific Society was held last night, and in points of merit and attendance was a success. The event of the evening was the thirteenth mock parliament. With all due gravity, T. A. Hunt was elected speaker, after which the speech from the throne was read by the clerk. The term mock parliament usually implies the proposal of ridiculous measures for the consideration of that august body, but last night such questions as: A second Canadian contingent; the assistance of an imperial navy; the bringing of all the colleges of Canada under the control of one central body; to be known as the University of Canada; the printing of the lectures of several of the professors to save them the trouble of reading them so often; the abolition of sectarian control of colleges; the adoption of English Rugby rules; the establishment of a battalion of university students; and many other equally serious ones were discussed and weighed by that far-seeing and illustrious body of representatives. Premier Alf. N. Mitchell proved himself a collected leader and formidable opponent. Before the opening of the parliament Mrs. McCurdy presented the prizes won at the annual University games.

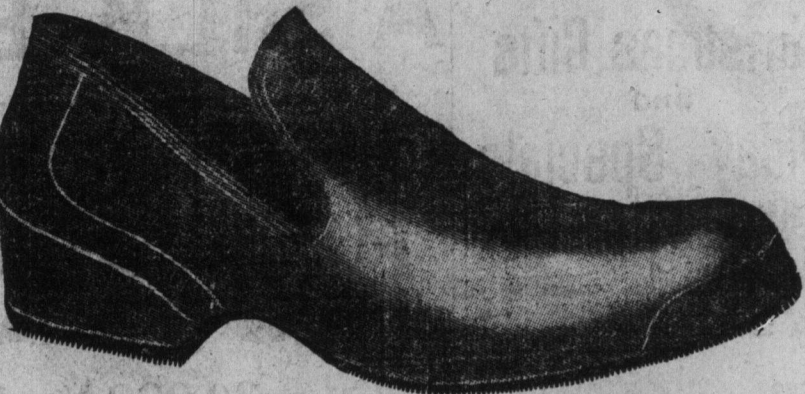
