ELDERS' DISTRICTS.

The congregation is now divided into Twelve Districts, and each Elder has a district assigned to him for visitation. (*For residences of Elders see page 3.*)

District No. 1—Mr. Paterson—Richmond Road and its adjoining neighborhood, west of the toll-gate.

District No. 2—Mr. Frank Bronson—Hull, Victoria Island, LeBreton Flats south-west to Wellington Street.

District No. 3—Mr. E. H. Bronson—Richmond Road from the toll-gate eastward, Rochesterville, Wellington Street south, and Albert Street north and south, westward from Concession Street.

District No. 4—Mr. G. P. Drummond—Ashburnham Hill, eastward to Bay Street and southward to Sparks Street.

District No. 5—Mr. Clegg—from Bay Street eastward to Bank Street and northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 6—Mr. Gibson—from Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 7—Mr. Hamilton—from Maria Street southward to Lewis Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 8—Mr. F. H. Chrysler—from Lewis Street southward, and Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River and Billings' Bridge.

District No. 9—Mr. A. Drummond—from Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 10—Mr. Larmonth—Sandy Hill from Rideau Street southward and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

District No. 11—Lieut-Col. Macpherson—from Mackenzie Avenue eastward to the Rideau River, and from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

District No. 12—Mr. Borthwick—Gloucester and country sections beyond Rideau River.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation is held in the Lecture Room of the Church on the first Monday of March in each year.

MEMORANDA.

Annual Reports of the Congregation may be obtained from the Beadle at the Church.

Applications for sittings may be made to the Treasurer of the Temporal Committee or to Mr. Larmonth, 46 Sparks Street.

Members changing their residence are requested to notify the Elder of the District in which they reside.

Cases of sickness should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the minister.

The Church schedule, when filled up, may be given to the District Visitors or sent to the Treasurer of the fund, Mr. E. H. Bronson, 75 Concession Street.

Pew rents are due and payable in advance, quarterly, on the first week in March, June, September and December.

PASTORAL LETTER.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church:

MY DEAR FRIENDS—We have great reason to thank God for His blessings to us as a congregation during the past year. There has been a growth in almost every department of church life. Our numbers have increased, and I have reason to hope that our active workers have increased proportionately. You have maintained your reputation for showing kindness to strangers, and have responded largely to the appeal made a year ago for the accommodation of those who were seeking to find a home amongst us. When account is made of the wide district included within the bounds of the congregation, the attendance at the Sabbath services has been most gratifying. There may be a few, however, who have contented themselves with being in their places at the morning service, but whose presence in the evening, as often as possible, would be to me a source of much encouragement. By your courtesy in attending to the comfort of others, there will still remain sufficient room for those strangers who from time to time visit the church, to each one of whom I unite with you in extending a most cordial and affectionate welcome.

It has done me good to observe the increased interest manifested in the Wednesday evening service, which I have reason to believe has been, by God's blessing, a source of guidance and strength to many who have attended it. There is still a large number, however, who might join with us in this hour of instruction and worship, and while I view the increase of the past with much gratitude, I look for larger things in the future. It cannot be impossible, surely, to snatch one hour from the pursuits of the week for prayer and the study of the Word. Make the trial, at first, if you will, from a mere sense of duty; and I feel sure that you will find it at length a privilege of which you would not care to be denied.

I desire to acknowledge with sincere thanks the substantial aid which has been given me by the Elders, Temporal Committee and the various Christian workers, who whether connected with some distinct organization in the church or not, have been labouring and praying for the prosperity of Zion.

As a congregation we are in peace and harmony, and I hope we shall begin another year with increased zeal in the service of our common Master. Freely have we received; let us freely give first ourselves, and then our possessions to the Lord.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

The Kirk Session desire to recognize with gratitude the signs of prosperity by which the life of the Congregation has been marked during the past year. The various departments of christian work have been maintained with vigour, and with a degree of success which encourages the hope of still further growth and increase in the future.

Since the last Report, the Session have added three new names to their number, viz., Lt.-Col. Macpherson, F. H. Chrysler and F. P. Bronson, and a slight re-adjustment of Elders' Districts has been made in accordance with this change. It is hoped that the members will become more and more thoroughly acquainted with the Elders, and the Elders with them.

The Session record with pleasure the marked increase in the membership of the Church during the year. Fifty-four names have been added to the Roll, twenty-six by certificate, twenty-six by profession of faith, and two by re-admission to membership. Fifteen names have been withdrawn, twelve by removal, and three by death. Among the latter the Session desire to make special mention of Mr. Edward McGillivray who was one of the oldest members of the Church, and whose name is closely identified with every department of its progress and work.

During the year there have been fourteen Baptisms, and twenty deaths in the Congregation.

The large attendance at the Sabbath Services has been fully maintained, and in spite of the prompt response made to the appeal for further accommodation, there are still a few families not provided with seats. It is hoped that by a careful utilizing of all available space through the further concessions of present pew-holders, the remaining applicants, together with those who from time to time may be added to our number, will secure as speedily as possible a fixed position in the Church.

The Wednesday evening Service continues to grow in point of interest and numbers, but still leaves room for further improvement, and the Session desire to commend this hour of worship to the attention of the Congregation. Recently a short practice of Hymns has been inaugurated at the close of this service, with a view to securing better Congregational singing on the Sabbath day.

The three Sabbath Schools continue to prosper, and the Session desire to recognize with much satisfaction the devoted service which is being rendered in this department of Church-work.

The Pastor having found it impossible on account of his other duties to continue the Congregational Bible Class of last winter, its place has been supplied by a distribution of the work, a class for young men being constructed by Mr. Falconer, and one for ladies by Mr. S. Woods. It is hoped that a still larger number, especially among the

young people of the Congregation, will avail themselves of the excellent instruction thus placed within their reach.

The operations of the Ladies' Aid Society have been conducted with their accustomed energy, and substantial aid has been given to the city charities, and to many poor and needy ones who have been so fortunate as to receive their care.

The District Visitors have afforded much assistance to the Pastor in his work, and merit the thanks of the Session for their continued diligence.

The Session record with much satisfaction a considerable increase in the number of those contributing to the schemes of the Church, and a consequent increase in the amount contributed. This liberality has enabled the Session without drawing as largely on the balance in hand as they did last year, to allocate a slightly increased amount to the schemes of the Church. The allocations are as follows: viz.

While the above figures indicate the amounts contributed by means of the Schedules during the year, they cannot be regarded by any means as the measure of the Congregation's gifts to the Missionary and Benevolent enterprises of the Church.

The Session in closing their Report would express the hope that during the coming year there may be still deeper manifestation of spiritual life in the Congregation, and still more generous and intelligent interest in all the departments of Christian Service to which the Church is called by her Lord's command. It is in active service for the Master that we must expect the strengthening of our own souls, as well as the souls of others. Let us not weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not.

Moved by Mr. McRae, and seconded by Mr. F. Bronson, that the thanks of the meeting be tendered to the Choir for their efficient services.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Halkett, and seconded by Mr. Forgie, that the thanks of the meeting be tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society and the District visitors.—Carried.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

REPORT OF THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

The office bearers of the Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in submitting this their eleventh Annual Report. The average attendance throughout the year has been 19 (nineteen), as against 22 (twenty-two) last year. The largest number present at any one meeting having been 32 (thirty-two), the smallest 4 (four). At a special meeting of the Society held on the 22nd October, 1885, it was unanimously decided to accept the offer of the Women's Christian Temperance Union to allow Ladies the use of their rooms in the Victoria Chambers, for the moderate sum of 2.00 (two dollars) a month, and it was hoped that as these rooms were more central as well as more comfortable than the Bible Class rooms, an increase in the attendance would be the result, such has not been the case. Those who have attended have, however, done well. Three entertainments have been given during the year ending March 1st, and from the proceeds of these and from other sources the sum of \$100 (one hundred dollars) was paid over to the Trustees of the French Protestant Congregation to assist in paying off the debt on their Church. \$100 (one hundred dollars) was also handed over to the Trustees of the Orphan's Home towards furnishing their new building. A donation of 25 (twenty-five) sheets and 6 (six) dozens of underwear given to the County Carleton General Hospital, and a quantity of china glass, cutlery, &c., and a stove purchased for the use of the Society. Much more might have been accomplished had there been sufficient workers to enable the Society to meet all the demands made upon it. It is therefore hoped the attendance will be larger in future. The Treasurer's statements are herewith submitted.

The total number of Scholars now on the roll is 260, rather less than reported last year. The cause of the decrease is that several of the older scholars have joined the Bible Classes under Mr. Woods and Mr. Falconer, and the rolls of these classes do not form part of our statistics.

The number of Teachers and Officers is the same as at this date last year, namely 33. The School is divided into 24 classes, taught by 17 ladies and 7 gentlemen, and we have 4 teachers on the reserve list.

The School was kept open during the whole year, but in the months of July and August the attendance was very small. The average attendance for the other ten months was 155 Scholars and 25 Teachers.

During the year the School has collected for Missions by ordinary Sabbath collections the sum of \$152.76, which sum has been appropriated as follows:—

In October the new Children's Hymnal was introduced into the School. It is found to be helpful in training the children to sing many of the hymns and tunes used in the Church Services.

On the last Sabbaths of June and December, afternoon services were held in the Church, and sermons preached by our Minister to the children of the School, together with those of Lower Town and Stewart Schools.

In the month of November a Teachers' Institute was conducted in the city by Rev. John McEwen, of the S. S. Association of Canada. It was attended by most of our teachers, and found to be instructive and profitable.

The Annual Festival was held as usual in the end of January, "the best we ever had."

The teachers would earnestly urge upon parents the necessity for their co-operation, by seeing that the children faithfully prepare their lessons at home, "lesson leaves" being provided for that purpose. Where this is not attended to, it is but little the Sabbath School can do for a child; but by the blessing of God upon the united efforts of parents and teachers, much may be accomplished in the religious training of the young, so leading them to the knowledge of Him who is "the Way and the Truth and the Life."

Report of the Sabbath School at Stewarton, in connection with St. Andrew's Church in the City of Ottawa.

This School is carried on in a building erected upon a lot of land given by Mrs. W. Stewart, situated on McLeod Street, in the Village of Stewarton. The land has been conveyed to trustees who hold it subject to the direction and control of the Session of St. Andrew's Church, and the building has now been completely paid for.

During the last year the School has made gratifying progress, the number of pupils has increased very considerably and the attendance has been quite satisfactory. The average attendance has been about 70, and the largest number present on any one occasion was 92. The infant class under Miss Stewart numbers about 35, and a number of the larger pupils could with advantage be removed and placed in separate classes. At present there are two difficulties in carrying this out; the first is the want of a sufficient number of teachers, the second is the want of room.

The building is already too small for the requirements of the school and a very much larger attendance could no doubt be obtained if additional room were provided for classes and teachers.

Of the pupils in attendance about one-third belong to families connected with St. Andrew's Church, and the rest to families who attend the other Presbyterian Churches, the English Church and the Methodist Church.

In making any extension or addition to the building, provision should be made for a comfortable class-room for a Bible-class for larger pupils, as it is found difficult to retain them in the school for want of such a class.

If such a class-room could be added to the present building, it is believed that the attendance of such pupils together with a number of adults, who would gladly avail themselves of the privilege of such a class, could be secured.

The Session have recently agreed to pay the ordinary school expenses out of their funds, so as to permit the Sabbath collections to be applied to Missions or other schemes of the Church. The grant for this purpose of \$40 is now in hand for the expenses of the ensuing year. An addition to the Library is much required, and it will become necessary before long to provide funds for the purchase of an organ, as the one now used is not the property of the school.

The Superintendent and Teachers feel that under God's blessing the School is in a position to do much useful work in the locality in which its work is carried on.

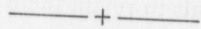

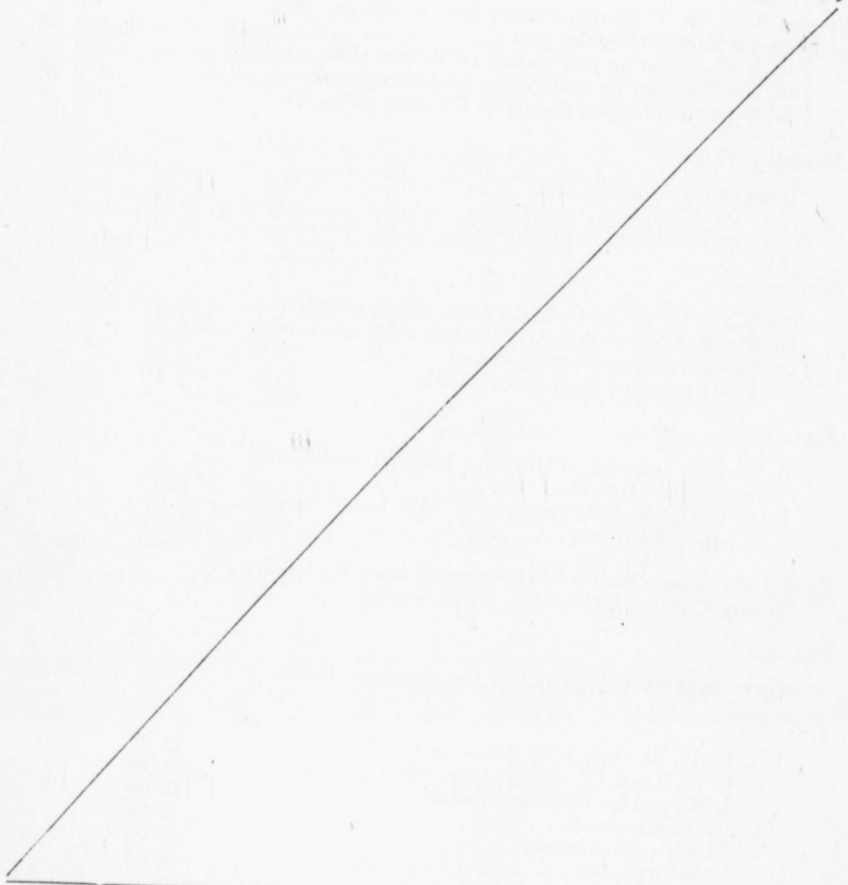
