From May 8 To 14 Bloodiest Days in History Of Western Europe

Dead Like Corn Stalks at Harvest Time—French Official Report Tells of 2,000 Germans Killed on Sunday and Monday

London, May 18—Seven distinct battles were fought in the week just closed, and there can be little doubt that the days from Saturday, the 8th, to Friday the 14th, will rank among the most bloody in the history of western Europe, says the Pas de Calais correspondent of the Times. He adds:—

"Saturday night saw no lessening in the intensity of the struggle. On the Ypres front, although outnumbered and in danger of being outflanked, our men again and again hurled back German attacks. During the darkness the Germans, as though aware that with every passing hour the opportunity was slitp-ping away, continued to hurl themselves against our lines. Men who lived through this night shot until they could no longer hold their rifles. The fury of the assault was indescribable. Dawn of Sunday showed in the fields in front of Ypres, the dead piled like corn stalks at harvest time, British and German lying

# **Germans' Temporary** Success Offset By **Rout of The Austrians**

Latter Driven From Powerful Positions Along Great Front—Large Tract Now in Possession of the Czar's Men

ndon, May 18—A Petrograd despatch to Reuter's says:—
"The Russian official statement describes the Austrian debacle in Buko wina, as of such vast importance as to render nugatory the ephemeral success in West Galicia. The latest particulars represent that the entire region between the Dniester and the Pruth is in Russian hands, as the results of the brilliant victory, while the Austrians, utterly defeated, are in disorderly flight. They have abandoned 20,000 prisoners and important, powerfully organized positions on a front of 140 versus for the defence of which they made tremendous

sacrifices in money and lives.

"Everything tends to prove that as a consequence of this victory, Czernowitz already is in the possession of the Russians, while the remnants of the Austrian army, flying in the direction of the Pruth, are in danger of disaster, which seems inevitable because of the fierce action of our cavalry which fell upon the retreating enemy in full divisions, destroying him and incessantly augmenting the number of our trophies. # EIGHTEEN NEW SENATORS

Increase in West, However, Can Not be Made During Life of Present Parliament

Ottawa, Ont., May 18—The passing of the amendment to the British North America act to the imperial government to give an addition of nine members from the west to the senate, will give the four western provinces their long delayed increase in the upper house. Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta now have each four members, and British Columbia three. By the change they will each have six.

The additional members cannot be appointed until after the dissolution of parliament. This will ensure the Liberals retaining control of the upper house for the remainder of the present parliament.
