HAVE PAID IT ALREADY, SAY THE GERMANS

Note to Allied Reparation Commission Received

Paris, March 23.—Germany, in her reply today to the recent ultimatum of the allied reparations commission, refuses to pay the one billion marks due on this date and disputes the commission's figures showing a balance of twelve billion marks due May 1.

It is maintained in the German note that the twenty billion marks which the allied treaty provided should be handed over by May 1 have been more than paid.

LOCAL NEWS

TILL NEXT WEEK. A case against W. J. Morrison and Harry A. Ross, charged with operating a stationary boiler without a certificate under the New Brunswick Factories Act, was resumed before Magistrate Ritchie and postponed until next Wednesday.

TO PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL. A woman, who arrived in the city last night from Moncton, was taken to the Provincial Hospital this morning. She said she belonged to Quebec. An effort is being made to find out something about her relatives.

WHO WROTE IT? Police Magistrate R. J. Ritchie received an anonymous letter this morning stating that there was "bootlegging" going on in a certain part of the city. He tore it up and said that if persons wished action taken in a matter of this kind they must sign their names.

MISS ELIZABETH NOWLAN. The death of Miss Elizabeth Nowlan occurred this morning at the Home for Incubables. He death was the culmination of sixteen years of patient suffering. She leaves one brother and one sister. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon from O'Neill's undertaking rooms.

HAS ST. JOHN FRIENDS. William R. E. Wakeley, whose appointment as head of the Nova Scotia commission for the distribution of liquor, is now said that the new Government is of the firm of W. & C. H. Mitchell of Halifax. He is well known in this city, where he has made a good many visits, as well as throughout the maritime provinces. He is a prominent member of the Halifax council, Knights of Columbus.

CONDENSED NEWS. Toronto meat packers and workmen are at odds over wage reduction. Important discoveries of ruins of a highly developed Greco-Roman civilization are reported. It is now said that the new Greek offensive against the Turks in Asia Minor has been abandoned, at least for the present.

RUSSIAN APPEAL. Washington, March 23.—White House officials said today that President Harding had not received an appeal from the Russian Soviet government that the U. S. resume trade relations with Russia. A radio yesterday in London from Moscow said such an appeal had been sent to the U. S. president.

THE SICK CARDINAL. Baltimore, March 23.—Cardinal Gibbons, who suffered a relapse last night, is reported to be in a critical condition today. He is conscious only a part of the time and virtually all hope for his recovery has been abandoned by members of his household.

DEATH OF REV. MOTHER PATRICK

Former Superior of St. Patrick's Industrial School and Infirmary Dead After Long, Useful Life. After a lifetime spent in the service of God, which found its expression in his little ones and in the administering to the sick and infirm, Mother Mary Patrick of the community of the Sisters of Charity, passed away last evening. The last hours of her life were spent in the St. John Infirmary, the institution which was the realization of her plans and in which she was the first superior. She had been ill for nearly two years and although her recovery was never expected, the news of her passing was received with distinct regret by a large host of friends.

Mother Patrick was formerly Miss Ellen Mahoney and was born at Melrose, Westmorland county, a daughter of the late Dennis Mahoney. She was about seventy years of age and joined the Sisters of Charity more than forty years ago, entering Cliff street novitiate. After she had taken her final vows, the St. Patrick's Industrial School was opened and she was sent to take charge at Silver Falls. Under her excellent care and largely owing to her business ability the institution became a great success and many men who are now leaders in the world making success of their lives owe a deep debt to her ministrations to the mother who looked after them at St. Patrick's when they were there as little orphans. About five years ago the St. John Infirmary was opened in the city and on account of the success she had made at Silver Falls, Mother Patrick was put in charge of this up-to-date hospital and she remained there until her recent illness forced her to retire. She leaves one brother, Hon. P. Mahoney of Melrose. W. J. Mahoney of this city is a nephew and A. E. Ritchie of Moncton also is a nephew, while Dr. J. M. Barry of St. John city is a first cousin. A large circle of friends in the province and throughout the world mourn her death.

A requiem high mass was sung this morning in the St. Vincent's convent chapel by Rev. W. M. Duke. The funeral will take place from the Infirmary, Colours street, on Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock.

KINDERGARTEN MATTER HEARD IN FREDERICTON

St. John Delegation Before Board of Education

Fredericton, N. B., March 23.—The provincial board of education this morning heard a delegation of women from St. John, in support of legislation to make it permissible for St. John to add kindergarten training to the free school system. The delegation, which was presented to the board by Messrs. Hayes and Scully, was composed of Mrs. A. F. Robinson, Mrs. W. P. Hatheway, Miss S. Greany and Mrs. Holman. A committee was appointed to consider this matter and report at the next meeting of the board.

A. J. Brooks was awarded the traveling scholarship for school inspectors and will probably attend a summer course in Toronto.

It was decided to have instruction on public health given in the Normal school, and to have the census enumerators for the province to take into account the fact that previously called between the ages of five and six were not enumerated and this was accountable for the poor showing made by this province as far as literacy was concerned.

A large delegation chiefly from Charlotte county, walked upon the government today to press for the building of a branch line of railway from Pennell station on the Shore Line to Letang, Harbor, Dead Man's Harbor and Black's Harbor, the length of the branch to be about two miles.

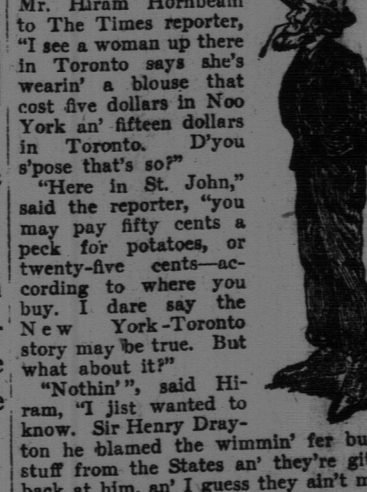

SOME MINES IN CAPRE BRETON HAVE RESUMED

Sydney, N. S., March 23.—Seven collieries of the Dominion Coal Company resumed operations yesterday after a complete shut down for three days. The remainder of the company's mines were still idle but would probably work today so as to make an equal division of available work among the miners of the district. The output yesterday was 6,100 tons, about half the normal quantity.

TOWBOAT EMPLOYEES MAY GO ON STRIKE

New York, March 23.—Plans for an immediate strike of employees aboard ocean-going towboats, in protest against wage cuts placed in effect on March 1, were being held in abeyance today by the Marine Engineers' Beneficial Association pending approval of its national executive committee.

JUDGE FITZGERALD OF CHARLOTTETOWN DEAD; AGED 74

Fitzgerald of Charlottetown are sons, and Mrs. Herbert Shaw of Montreal, Mrs. Bowen of London, Ont., Mrs. Hutchinson of New Liscard, Toronto, and Miss Agnes Fitzgerald, Charlottetown, daughters.

LAUGHAN GIVEN TWO YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

Guelph, Ont., March 23.—Colonel Laughan, convicted of "concealment of birth," was yesterday sentenced to two years in Portmouthe penitentiary. The case of Mrs. Beisel, mother of the child and charged with murder, will be left over till the next session.

MONTREAL STOCK MARKET.

Montreal, March 23.—Only quietness prevailed on the local stock market during the early trading this morning, and nothing worthy of special comment occurred. Abitibi was up a quarter point at 33.8-4. Breweries was also stronger by a quarter at 87-8. Riordon and Spanish Rivers were unchanged at 112 and 77 respectively.

BIG IRISH DAY IN BRITISH HOUSE IS LOOKED FOR

Attacks on Policy by Liberals and Labor. London, March 23.—Independent Liberals and Laborites were expected to make a joint attack upon the government's Irish policy today. It was understood that they intended to press their arguments for a renewal of peace negotiations at the point where they were interrupted last December, and also were ready to insist that the government waive its demand that Sinn Fein surrender their arms before the peace parties were commenced.

Asquith, Clynnes and Lloyd George Expected to Speak—Wires Between Belfast and Dublin Cut Last Night.

Belfast, March 23.—Two brothers named McLean successfully held their house near Monaghan yesterday against an attack of two hundred Sinn Feiners. Every window was shattered. The brothers used revolvers and shotguns with such effect that the besiegers were forced to attempt to burn the building and adjacent buildings.

SPY SYSTEM ON THIS RAILROAD

Heated Discussion Over Difficulties Between Management and Employees. Madison, Wis., March 23.—Senator La Follette announced today that he contemplated a trip to Ireland to study the Irish question at close range. He said that several other senators also were planning to make the trip.

FITZ RANDOLPH CASE ENDED

Fredericton, N. B., March 23.—The charge of non-support preferred against Charles Fitz-Randolph has been withdrawn by Peter J. Hughes, solicitor for Mrs. Fitz-Randolph, following the completion of an agreement under which monthly payments sufficient to provide suitable maintenance for Mrs. Fitz-Randolph and her three children who reside with her.

Jack O'Heron wishes to challenge Walter O'Toole, George Brooks and Georgeff and agrees to throw the three in less than an hour.

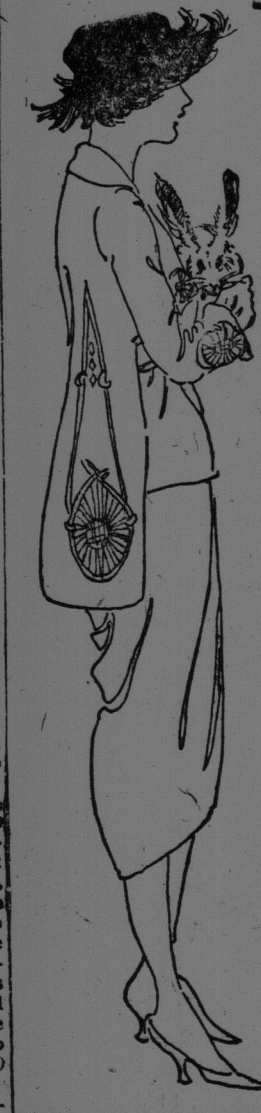

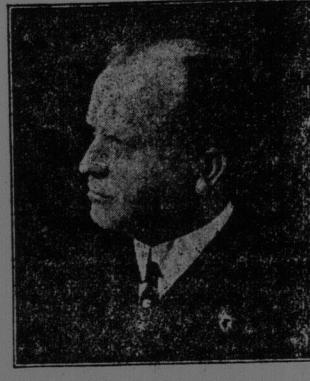

Dark Days Experienced.
The present internal economic condition in Germany is far from enviable, but there are reasons for believing that the darkest days were passed in 1920, when the economic crisis was particularly acute.

Germany is seeking to re-establish trade with the countries against which she was struggling in mortal combat less than two and a half years ago. So far as Canada is concerned, exports from this country greatly exceed imports of German products.

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GERMANY TRIES TO GAIN TRADE

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Items That Are Imported.

The principal commodities taken from Germany during 1920 were: Clocks, magnetic vacuum bottles, enamelware, lead pencils, glassware, sewing machines, thermometers, machinery, tools, scientific instruments, silk hosiery, cosmetics and dyes, cutlery, silk goods, woolen yarns.

Exchange Helps Exporters.

The state of foreign exchange is affording Germany a wonderful chance to secure trade, especially in neutral markets where the prejudice against both Germany and her products is not as distinct as it is in the Entente countries.

Trade Efforts Widespread.

In Latin-America, particularly Brazil and Argentina, the German exporters have been taking active steps to regain the markets.

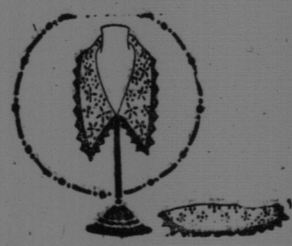

TORONTO WOMEN HAVE A WORD TO SIR HENRY

Question of Buying Things in United States Instead of in Canada.

Toronto, March 23—Toronto ladies are quoted in interviews in the Globe, as airing views of Sir Henry Drayton's recent statement in Montreal that much of the responsibility for the shrinkage of the Canadian dollar in the U. S. could be laid on the shoulders of the housewife.

"What cheek," exclaimed Mrs. L. A. Hamilton, member of the Toronto city council, with a laugh when asked about Sir Henry's reported remark. "It's the old story of Eden and the apple, and the original man," Mrs. Hamilton added. She said she believed that many American made articles were brought here by women who did not know they were from the U. S.

Mrs. A. H. Beaton, president of the Women's Liberal Association, Toronto, asked—"Does Sir Drayton know the quality of many Canadian made articles is not as good as the quality of the same articles in the United States? Does he know that American aluminum ware will last six times as long as Canadian aluminum?"

Mrs. Beaton in her turn, asked a question of her interviewer—"Does anyone know if Sir Henry himself always wears suits of Canadian homespun?"

"It's an unfair statement," declared Mrs. P. MacGregor, of the University Women's Club. "I think there is a good deal of truth in what he says, of course, but there is something to be said on the woman's side, too. I know that at this moment I am wearing a blouse that costs \$5 in New York, and the same blouse cost me \$15 here in Toronto."

ADDRESS ADOPTED WITHOUT DIVISION

Premier Foster Closes the Debate in a Very Able Speech

Is Warmly Congratulated By Both Sides—Speaks of Good Work Done By the Government and Asks Public to Give Proper Consideration to Work of Its Representatives in the House—The Hydro-Electric Development—Finances, the Valley Railway and Natural Resources—Says Provincial Interests Not Being Well Looked After at Ottawa.

Fredericton, N. B., March 22—After one of the shortest debates in the history of the provincial legislature, the house this afternoon passed the address in reply to the speech from the throne, without division.

Only three speakers besides the mover and seconder were heard. Hon. J. B. Baxter, leader of the opposition and A. Chase Fawcett, leader of the Farmers' group spoke on Friday. Hon. Mr. Foster, who spoke this afternoon, made a fine impression, and his points, made clearly and distinctly, were warmly applauded by both sides.

The premier dealt fairly with the criticisms of the leader of the opposition and the leader of the Farmers' group concerning the speech from the throne and took the opportunity of answering some of the statements made by the opposition in the recent provincial campaign. He spoke of the Restigouche election case and clearly showed that the government had done all in its power to have the county properly represented in the legislature.

He made a strong plea for proper appreciation on the part of the people of the province of the work of those whom they had elected to be the representatives in the legislature.

Every member of the house, he believed, was working for the good of the province as a whole and not for individual gain. He paid a glowing tribute to former members of the house and particularly mentioned Hon. John F. Bouchard and Hon. Mr. Dugal. He assured the leader of the opposition that members on the government side would give him support in maintaining his present position indefinitely.

Hon. Mr. Foster welcomed the Farmers' group and hoped that it would give inspiration to the minister of agriculture to continue the good work in that department. He favored, however, the two party system and thought the farmers would be best served if their representatives were joined up with one of the larger parties. All classes and groups must be represented, he said, in order to have a stable government. The premier made reference to some remarks of the Farmer leader but pointed to the fact that farmers were in the government, and therefore the farmer group did not represent all the farmers of the province. His explanation of the government plans for hydro-electric development was straightforward and clear, and his forecast of the future was optimistic.

His hon. friend (Baxter) had plucked up sufficient courage to refer to the result of the general election. He had remarked upon the fact that the administration had elected only twenty-four members, but that of his own situation with only eleven following in the house of assembly.

The government hoped to link up all parts of the province with hydro-electric power in due time. They hoped to supply the towns of Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle, Dalhousie and Chatham, as well as the towns along the St. John river. They were anxious that the province should derive the greatest benefit from the government's policy of hydro development.

The honorable member had criticized the government's policy of encouraging the growing of ice this province. He (the premier) would take the credit for the reference to the matter in the speech from the throne. He had seen the exhibition last year, and had also seen the factory which would have done credit to any other province in the world.

Hon. Mr. Foster, continuing said the honorable leader of the opposition in his reference to the liner-building industry had expressed the opinion that the government was obtaining fifty per cent line at one hundred per cent. He did not think that the honorable member was justified in making that statement without acquainting himself with the facts.

He would refer to one or two matters which had come to his attention during the campaign. One was the charge that a deficit on current account of more than \$800,000 had been created by the administration between the time of taking office, in 1917, and October 31, 1920. The leader of the opposition two days before the election had made a statement at that time that his deficit was the principal charge, but he was unfair in his figures, which he placed at \$1,000,000.

Another charge had been in connection with methods of accounting. Much had been made of alleged discrepancies between the report of Price, Waterhouse and Company and the report of the Comptroller General. That was a matter not open to criticism, but was a matter of bookkeeping entirely. He wished to call to the attention of hon. members of the House, particularly new members, that when the public accounts would be brought down, each member would bear the certificate of Price, Waterhouse and Company, one of the best known firms in the world. The chairman had been made from the old one horse system of single entry to the double entry system which was being universally adopted. Not Well Looked After.
Hon. Mr. Foster said that the interests of New Brunswick in federal matters were not being looked after as they should be. When he viewed the railway situation and realized the penalty the province was paying, when he realized the tribute being paid to other parts of Canada for their railway facilities while New Brunswick paid for its own, he said the provincial representation decreasing and creating a situation never contemplated by the fathers of Confederation, when he saw the boundaries of other provinces extended almost indefinitely and including some unold wealth, he was appalled. It should be remembered that New Brunswick had an interest in those natural resources being given to other provinces. Even differentials in freight rates had been increased to the detriment of the small industries of the maritime provinces.

With regard to the natural resources of the western provinces upon which New Brunswick as an original partner in Confederation had a just claim, he would draw the attention of certain members to the attitude of the federal leader of the Farmers' party upon that matter. The Regina Leader of November 12, 1920, editorially stated the following: "Bridly stated, Mr. Cramer would give back the natural resources of which the western provinces were unjustly deprived and would include compensation for the resources already alienated. He would allow the eastern provinces, if they think they are entitled to compensation for the loss of what they assert is their interest in these resources, to sue for them in the courts."

Hon. Mr. Cramer in his generosity would give New Brunswick the privilege of suing in the courts for what was justly her right, said Hon. Mr. Foster. Let the honorable members of the Farmer Party in the house take note of that. All wanted a united Canada, but they also wanted what was justly due the province of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that it must be a source of gratification to all hon. members that the credit of the province stood so high. He also would like to make a few remarks concerning the Restigouche election. LETTER FROM HON. R. W. WIGMORE

Reply to Commercial Club Secretary on the Postal Matter.

H. H. McLellan, secretary of the Commercial Club, received the following letter this morning from Hon. R. Wigmore, minister of customs and inland revenue.

Dear Sir—With reference to your recent telegram, I may say that the question of amalgamating the branches of the post office department in the maritime provinces is under consideration. I have very strongly pressed my views on the postmaster again and have advised him that in my judgment the proposed changes would not result in any real economy.

I will advise you later what is decided upon. In the meantime, let me assure you that I shall not fail to keep in mind the interests of St. John. You will remember that in amalgamating the engineering services of the public works department it was the intention to have the headquarters at Chatham and not at St. John, but it was successful in having the headquarters located at St. John, which, of course, resulted in a very strong protest from Chatham, so that St. John is undoubtedly getting some additional benefit from the amalgamation of the public works engineering service. 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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Fredericton, March 22.—The annual report of the schools of New Brunswick as submitted to the legislature this afternoon lays stress on the inadequate supply of teachers. It estimates that the shortage of teachers is nearly 800 in this province. In spite of this fact the number of schools and teachers showed an increase during the last school year.

The number of schools in the province was 1,979 with 2,119 teachers for the first term and 1,998 schools and 2,054 teachers in the second term. The enrollment was 45,000 pupils. St. John had 8,414, Fredericton had 1,407 and Moncton 2,954 pupils in the schools for the first term of the year.

The average salaries paid teachers were as follows: Class, 1920, \$1,064.63, \$1,756.11; Superior, 692.22, 1,038.70; First (male), 603.28, 1,400.61; Second (male), 335.29, 694.51; Third (male), 205.90, 405.71; First (female), 598.71, 848.54; Second (female), 290.25, 511.23; Third (female), 227.91, 395.87.

The number of graded schools was 120 with 909 departments, during the last term of the year. The provincial grants to teachers amounted to \$1,935,115.94 for the year.

High school work in the province has grown considerably. In 1924-1925 the number of pupils attending high schools was 1,550, while for the last term of last year the attendance was 9,263. During the year 812 candidates were examined for teachers' licenses. There were 207 students in attendance at the normal school, which was eight less than in the previous year.

The report gives the following as some of the things accomplished in the last ten years affecting education in the province: Two weeks' extension of summer vacations in rural districts.

Fredericton, March 22.—The sixteenth annual report of the crown and department, as tabled in the legislature today, shows a great increase in the territorial revenue of New Brunswick during the last year, the total receipts for the twelve months ending Oct. 31, 1924, amounting to \$1,673,840.09.

The receipts from timber licenses amounted to \$785,860. The largest individual payment was \$2,025, made by the Shives Lumber Company of Campbellton, who secured 650 1/2 square miles.

The total timber cut from the crown lands amounted to 854,842,079 superficial feet, divided as follows: Spruce and pine logs, feet, 197,663,026; Fir logs, feet, 114,690,574; Cedar logs, feet, 24,138,872; Hemlock logs, feet, 4,035,157; Hardwood logs, feet, 8,702,752; Poplar logs, feet, 1,403,758; Sleepers, pieces, 538,284; Fire and pulp wood, cords, 7,007; Poles, pieces, 7,517.

Fishing leases and angling licenses produced a revenue of \$29,938.50. The Restigouche river was responsible for \$16,500 of this amount.

Mining leases, mining applications and mining fees amounted to \$5,079.90. There were 112 licenses to search for mineral issues. The royalties paid into the provincial treasury totalled \$29,100.23.

The number of game licenses issued to residents of the province was 15,102 while 514 non-residents were licensed. These produced revenue of \$5,737.35.

From New York 160 hunters came to the province. Two nineros came from Hawaii after the New Brunswick game, and three were from England.

In addition to the above receipts for the year 1924 there was received \$1,706 for the cost of the St. John's railway. The receipts from the New Brunswick Railway Company and which was placed in the sinking fund as a payment on the cost of these lands.

GOOD RESULTS AT SANATORIUM

The report of the provincial sanatorium, Kentville, tells a story of splendid work for those of the Province of Nova Scotia afflicted with tubercular disease and a work for the returned soldier that cannot be surpassed if equalled in Canada.

During the year, 115 civilians were discharged and out of 505 returned soldiers, 389 were discharged or about 70 per cent of civilian and 69 per cent ex-military patients discharged.

The financial statement of the sanatorium shows that the total net cost of maintenance to the provincial government last year was only \$40,692.24. The statements show disbursements of \$95,679.47. The receipts less that from the provincial government were \$246,087.23.

Of this amount \$20,086.16 was board for the patients of the department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. There have been many fine gifts to the institutions from private sources during the year.

Conspicuous among them was the green house completed during the year, the gift of the Sydney Mines Red Cross Society. The library is one of the most appreciated features of the sanatorium.

A table of the report shows the number of patients admitted since 1904 as follows: (civilians). They were from the following counties: Antigonish, 10; Annapolis, 41; Cape Breton, 98; Colchester, 56; Cumberland, 88; Digby, 97; Guysborough, 29; Halifax, 245; Hants, 65; Inverness, 27; Kings, 11; Lunenburg, 47; Pictou, 83; Queens, 18; Richmond, 51; Shelburne, 14; Victoria, 4; Yarmouth, 38. New Brunswick, Newfoundland and New England also sent patients.

WANTS DETAILED REPORT ON MAINS

The regular weekly meeting of the common council was held yesterday afternoon with all commissioners present, with the exception of Commissioner Thornton, who is out of the city.

The annual report of the water and sewerage department was received and also a combined report from the city engineer and superintendent of the department. It was decided to have a detailed report of the condition of the various water mains submitted by the city engineer.

Several communications were received and considered and the report of the committee of the whole received and adopted. A letter from the West End Improvement League in regard to the removal of the street railway tracks from Queen Square and the laying of a trunk sewer in the Mill Pond was referred to the commissioners of water and sewerage and public works to report.

A communication was received from the Retail Merchants' Association against including kindergarten in the public schools. The letter was ordered acknowledged and filed.

Mr. Bullock said that the sum of \$5,000, which had been estimated for the upkeep of the approaches to the east side ferry floats had been exhausted by the repairs being made to the north wing of the floats, which had been destroyed some time ago and that it was necessary to have additional funds to complete the repairs before the ferries arrived. He asked that the comptroller be given authority to pass on the bills now coming in for this.

A resolution to this effect was passed. The commissioner pointed out that if the city acquired rights to build a crib in front of the W. H. Thorne property the present repairs would be part of the permanent work resulting from the building of the crib and would eventually be paid for by bond issue. Negotiations are now going on for the right to erect the crib.

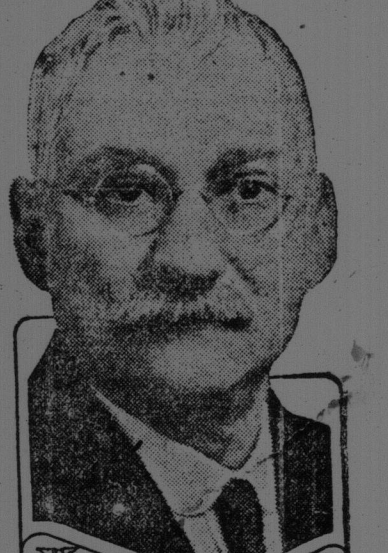
Mr. Frink also asked for information in regard to the cottages at Spruce Lake. A resolution was passed to the effect that a report as outlined should be submitted.

DISCUSSION ON HOUSING MATTER

A well attended and representative meeting of those interested in improving the housing conditions in St. John was held last evening in the board of trade rooms, when several phases of the situation were discussed.

Among those present were builders, contractors, carpenters, painters, real estate men, representatives of woodworking concerns, plumbers, dealers in builders' supplies and others interested in the subject.

The meeting was called at the instance of S. K. Smith, editor of the Business Review, to ascertain if conditions were such as to warrant a campaign to induce building. While no definite action was taken by the meeting, the views of several of those present were listened to with much interest and the exchange of ideas doubtless will have an effect on the situation.

H. L. MacGowan occupied the chair and S. K. Smith acted as secretary. Mr. Smith was the first speaker and said that he found there was a feeling that prices had fallen and it was thought that the public should know about it and a building campaign be instituted if conditions were opportune. He pointed out the need for additional houses and said that a building revival would be of benefit to all lines of industry.

Fredericton, March 22.—Fire in a shed at F. H. Everett's flour mill in Aberdeen street did several hundreds of dollars' worth of damage. Pressed hay was the chief item of loss.

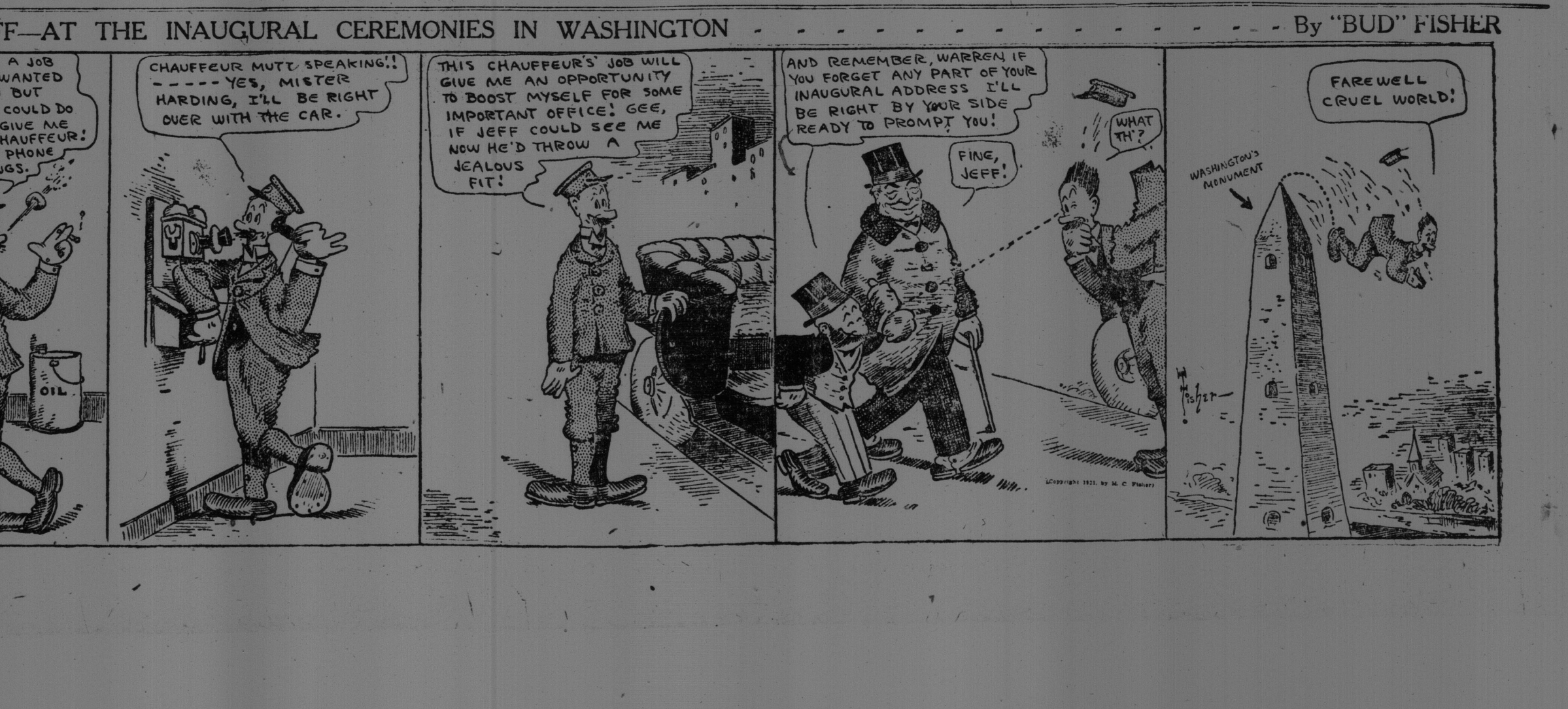

THINK MEMBERS' EXPENSES SHOULD BE FURNISHED

Committee on British M. P.'s Salaries Recommend Free Postage and Traveling Costs.

London, March 1.—(By mail, Canadian Associated Press).—Some interesting reading is furnished in the report of the committee which has been enquiring into the expenses of members of the British House of Commons. Members receive at present £400 a year as salary, or seasonal allowance, and there is no relief at present in the way of free traveling allowance or free postage. The committee agree that if £400 was necessary in 1914 it is inadequate today, but they do not recommend at present any alteration in the figure, although they advocate the grant of free postage, and free first-class travel to members' constituencies.

Dan Irving, Socialist M. P. for Burnley, told the committee that out of his £400 he pays £105 for a third-class railway pass.

"I cannot afford to give up my home," he explained. "An M. P.'s situation is very precarious; it may last some years, it may not last even months—you never know. Therefore I have to keep two homes. It is not that I elect to keep two homes going, it is because I must." His home at Burnley, he said, costs £2 a week, and in London it costs him about £5, or 5s. a week for single-room lodging, food, postages.

"These Hens alone," he proceeded, "bring me up to £270 a year. That does not give me a penny piece for clothing either for myself or my wife."

Mr. W. Adamson, M. P. (until recently chairman of the labor party), expressed the opinion that the salary should be £200, in addition to an open railway pass. His first-class railway pass, he said, cost him £180 a year, and that did not provide for extras. If he used a sleeper, for instance, it would cost him another £2 a week.

There were also hotel expenses, and keeping those down to bedrock figures it meant another £100. Postage he put at £15 a year. The leaves totalled £375.

Mr. Adamson proceeded: "To a working man, with no knowledge of the way money goes when living in London and traveling about the country, as a member of parliament has to do, £400 a year may seem a large sum, but when he begins to try and divide that up he very quickly realises where he is."

FUTURE WAR HORRORS

Shelled From Distance of 300 Miles.

Shelling on the Somme at the end of the war, according to George Barnes, M. P., visualized the pace in the next twenty years. Each of the great nations would have, tens of thousands of aircraft, much bigger and

more formidable than those used in the late war. Paris, which had been shelled from a distance of seventy miles, might be shelled in the next war from a distance of 200 to 300 miles. That war must be prevented, otherwise it would be the end of civilization. It would be prevented only by the League of Nations. Once he thought that democracy could prevent war, but they found that today democracy was just as selfish and just as contentious as autocracy, and that working people took a narrow and selfish view of their interests.

Party of Mississippians Hang Alleged Slayer of Negro Woman.

Hattiesburg, Miss., March 23.—Held on a charge of killing a negro woman, Arthur Jennings, a negro, was taken from the county jail here by armed men. SPENDING ONE-THIRD OF HER INCOME ON NAVY CONSTRUCTION

London, March 23.—Japan in 1927 will have a fleet equal to that of America and this will relegate the British navy to third place, says a Tokio despatch to the Daily Express today.

The Tokio government, it is added, is spending one-third of the national income on the Japanese navy with the 1927 programme calling for eight battleships and eight cruisers not more than eight years old.

The Japanese navy, it is pointed out, was never that of the American then the German was to the British in 1914, and Japan today is spending five times as much on her navy as Germany did in the pre-war days.

The supposition, the Express correspondent adds, is that Japan wants to be able to resist any possible pressure from America in her Far East programme.

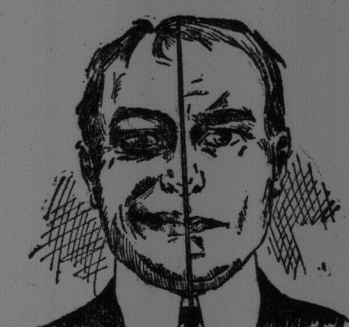

SCIENTIST HOLDS THAT GOLD GROWS

A Practical Miner Spends Months in Solitude Solving Problems in Geometry.

Vancouver, March 23.—For forty years S. J. Marsh has been a prospector and miner; today he is president of the Cariboo Gold and Platinum Reduction Company, but that is not his chief claim to fame. He rests his laurels on his ability to combine the practical mind of the miner with the aspirations and dreams of the scientist. Just now Mr. Marsh is in Vancouver on one of his rare trips to the "outside," and in an interview he has given a few particulars of his life and achievements.

Among other things, Mr. Marsh declares that several years ago he conceived the theory of "reactivity," so widely heralded recently by Professor Einstein, which is said to be really understood by less than a score of men. He has for a long time been of the opinion that the ancients were right in their alchemic ideas about gold, and proposes to write a book which will attempt to prove that gold actually grows like fungi, though naturally at an incredibly slow rate. Mr. Marsh's theories regarding the glacial epoch are extremely revolutionary, and differ radically from any found in accepted text books. He has also written four papers on his investigations in connection with the fourth dimension, and for two of these essays on the age-old problem he has been honored by scientific societies.

Mr. Marsh was the first white man to welcome Vilhjalmur Stefansson to the north country on the explorer's first journey down the Mackenzie to the Arctic. Marsh was at that time searching for minerals on the Arctic coast, and spent 128 days in solitude, occupying his spare time in solving problems

Geneva, March 23.—A case of a man's heart ceasing to beat for fourteen hours and then resuming work is reported from Berne, where a pastor of that city, the Rev. Mr. Baudenbacher, after being officially declared dead, suddenly awoke. The Rev. Mr. Baudenbacher, aged fifty, and suffering from heart trouble of

long standing, fell senseless Friday. His physician issued a death certificate, and Saturday's newspapers published eulogies of him. The pastor awoke after fourteen hours, surprised to find his bedroom filled with flowers, wreaths, disconsolate relatives and friends. He said weakly: "My call has not yet come."

The funeral was postponed indefinitely, as the doctor said Rev. Mr. Baudenbacher might live many years.

FIRST CANCEL DEBTS IN EUROPE

Sir Algernon Firth Favors Payment of European Obligations Before Settlement With United States.

Leeds, Eng., March 5.—(Associated Press by mail)—Sir Algernon Firth, president of the Association of British Chambers of Commerce, who has recently been in the United States, says the policy of Great Britain should be first to carry out arrangements for a cancellation of debts between the European Allies, without seeking to drive any bargain with the United States. The question of a cancellation of this country's debt to America can best, he thinks, be left alone for the present.

VETERAN POSTMAN IS SUPERANNATED

"Dad" Carr Walked More Than 40,000 Miles Delivering Vancouver's Mail.

Vancouver, March 23.—After having covered over 40,000 miles in delivering mail in this city in the last twenty-six years, "Dad" R. P. Carr has just been notified by the postal department that he will be superannuated on June 30, with a pension of about \$10 a month. "Dad" Carr was Vancouver's first postman, and is now sixty-seven years of age. When first he started delivering mail he had an immense territory to cover, houses being few and far between, but as the population grew his boundaries gradually closed in until at the last his area was comparatively circumscribed.

Four years ago Mr. Carr was given an inside job, which he is still quite competent to handle, but Ottawa has decided that he must enjoy a well-earned rest. The veteran has decided to spend the rest of his days "pottering around" with chickens and a bit of garden.

Angus Malpas, T. H. Cross and Charles Charlton, who have been associated with postal work for from twenty-two to thirty-one years, are to be superannuated at the same time as "Dad" Carr. There is one old-timer in Vancouver just now, however, who would scoff at any suggestion of superannuation, insofar as he is concerned. This is Col. Stevenson, who, at eighty-five, is about to start on a new gold-mining proposition at Kanaka Bar, fifty miles from Yale, a famous prospect which was barely scratched in the Cariboo gold rush of half a century ago.

Although he has been half-drowned, shot at, stabbed, and engaged in innumerable hand-to-hand fights with Indians, besides enduring the privations of trail and river portage for over sixty years, the colonel is still stout and hearty, and is really in earnest when he says that after he is through with the Kanaka Bar gold proposition, he will tackle a platinum deposit he knows of in the Nicola Valley.

LITTLE BELGIUM, THE U. S. AND THE KINDERGARTEN

At the Friday afternoon session of the Regional Citizens' Conference, called by Commissioner Claxton in New York City, January 28-29, with representatives from Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York, Major Bradley Martin, president of the National Kindergarten Association, gave an address, in which he said:

"This country has not only been a laggard in starting kindergartens, but also has been behind in extending kindergartens to the mass of its population. As early as 1890 the Belgians were giving kindergarten instruction to more than 80 per cent of its children of kindergarten age, whilst even at the present day we are providing education for less than 12 per cent of our children of the same age.

"The importance of kindergarten training has been conceded, and every commissioner of education we have had in Washington has been in favor of it. But there is one phase of kindergarten education that I should like to dwell on as particularly important at the present time when the world is filled with unrest, and that is the kindergarten as an Americanizing influence. The kindergarten is obviously the ideal means of Americanizing the family through the child; as the child through singing patriotic songs and playing games with other children and receiving moral and ethical instruction not only learns our language, but also adopts our point of view and becomes a patriotic citizen; and through mothers' meetings and home visits the family is assisted by the kindergarten teacher in the difficult task of adapting itself to the economic and social conditions that it finds in this country.

"Experience has shown that a standard kindergarten law, which provides that upon petition of the parents of not less than twenty-five children between the ages of four and six residing within the school district a kindergarten shall be added to the school, most successfully stimulates kindergarten extension. When we read day after day in the press of crime waves, discontent, and anarchy, we should realize that the real question is not whether we can afford to have kindergartens, but whether we can afford NOT to have them."

U. N. B. MEMORIAL FUND CAMPAIGN

Former students of the University of New Brunswick gathered at Bond's last evening to discuss matters in connection with the memorial fund campaign of the university. Sir Douglas Haas, the chairman, dealt with the part played by the universities during the war and particularly with the part played by U. N. B. men and women. Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the university, spoke of present conditions at the university and of the splendid records made by Rhodes scholars from the university. Other speakers were Lieut.-Col. W. H. Harrison and John B. McNair. Mr. McNair, who is secretary of the campaign, said the present objective was \$250,000.

WILL OBJECT TO TWO CLAUSES

City merchants who have received from the Railway Association proofs of the proposed new classification seventeen are requested by the trade and commerce committee of the board of trade to examine this classification as it affects their respective businesses, and if they have any criticisms to offer to send them to the committee to be embodied in its report.

Yesterday afternoon the Board of Trade committee considered the new classification, being assisted by Messrs. Fleet and Reid, of the Maritime Freight Bureau, Ltd. The bureau, at the request of the secretary of the board of trade, had previously made an analysis of the classification which proved very helpful in the consideration of the question.

The committee decided to enter objections to clauses in two of the rules. It would be glad to hear from those business men who have made a study of the classification as some points affecting individual businesses might have escaped its notice.

ACTIVITY IN YUKON. Operations on Large Scale This Coming Summer.

Dawson City, Y. T., March 22.—The Yukon is planning spring operations on a large scale. The season is expected to be one of the busiest in many years. There will be extensive gold dredging and hydraulics and rich new silver properties are to be opened. Two or three new companies, in addition to the Yukon Gold Company, have been looking into silver prospects in the Mayo district.

Work will begin in about ten days on a machine shop which will engage fifty men preparing dredges for the Upper Dominion Creek gold run and the Klondyke Valley. After the first week in May the dredge fleet will be able to secure hydro-electric power. The gold and silver yield will aggregate several millions this year in the territory.

Many old timers who were unable to secure work outside during the unemployment period are returning to Dawson by stage or on foot.

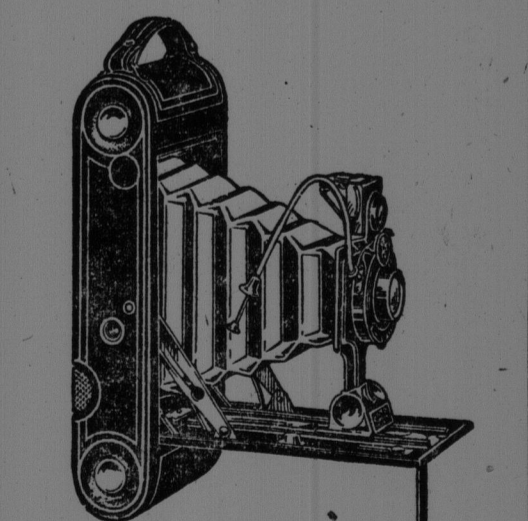

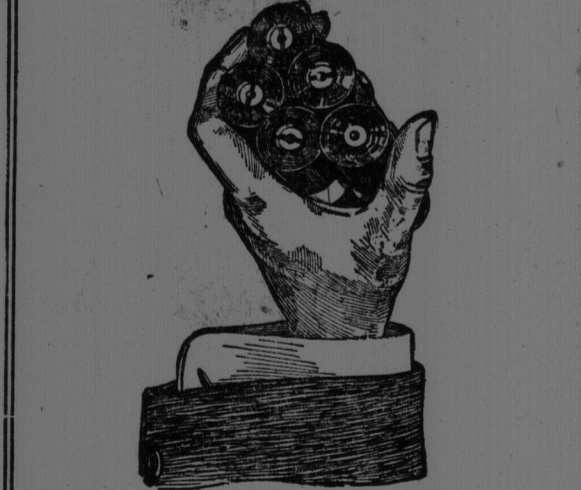
