# THE CONDITIONS REMAIN ABOUT AS YESTERDAY

Land Report From Paris Continues to Show Well For The Allies---In Furious Bayonet Fight in The Argounne Germans Are Driven Back

Paris, Nov. 6-The official announcement today says:-"There was no perceptible modification during the day of yesterday anywhere on the front. The lighting continued between Dixmude and the Lys with the same characteristics as previously and without any marked advance or retirement at any point. There was violent cannonading to the North of Arrs, and also directed upon

Arras, without result for the enemy.

"The German effort in Belgium and in the north of France continues. The Germans seem to have undertaken changes in the composition of their forces, which are operating in this region, and are reinforcing their reserve corps with active troops, with the idea of undertaking a new offensive movement, or at least, to mitigate the bloody checks which have been inflict-

ed upon them.

"Between the Somme and the Oise, and between the Oise and the Meuse, there have been minor actions. We have consolidated our advance on the village of Andrehy, to the west of Roye. A column of German wagons has been destroyed by the fire of our artillery at long range in the region of Nampoel, to the northeast of the forest of Aigue.

"Near Berry-Au-Bac we have retaken the village of Sapigneul, which had

been captured by the Germans. "There has been a furious fight in the Argonne where, as a result of fighting with the bayonet, our troops drove the Germans back.
"In the Woevre district fresh attacks by the enemy have been repulsed,"







# Save the

BY CAROLINE COE

Save the crumbs and the loaves will take care of themselves.

There's a new twist to an old adage in crumbs almost half the bread she buys profitable and much more agreeable to

moidy or else they are neither healthful or palatable.

After the crumbs, or the small bits have been gathetred from the table or from the bread box they should be placed in a warm oven to dry. They must not be baked or toasted, just dried. When the bread is crisp roll it with a rolling pin and sift through a fine sieve and then put the crumbs away in an air tight can.

There are dozens of ways in which bread crumbs may be used in puddings and croquettes and in sauces, but some of the ways I have tested in my own kitchen and found good are given here. Give them a trial, I am sure you will find them good, and I know you will find them a great aid to economy in the kitchen.

Many Good Uses for Crumb's of Bread Many Good Uses for Crumbs of Bread

Use bread crumbs to remove wax
from silk: Toast a piece of soft bread
until very hot, but not burned, and rub
spot with hot bread until cold. Then reheat or use another piece of bread. Continue until the wax is removed. Afterwards rub the spot with dry crumbs until perfectly clean.

If candles drip upon a lacquered holder it is almost impossible to remove
the wax without injury to the holder.
Dip a piece of cotton into a little oil,
then into the finest bread crumbs. Carefully rub the spot until the wax is removed.

runy rub the spot until the wax is removed.

If the bindings of books need to be cleaned and freshened rub with fine crumbs in a woolen bag. This will also freshen the soiled leaves of the books. To clean fine laces stretch the lace carefully on an ironing board, fasten the edges with pins. Sprinkle the lace with fine bread crumbs, rub them over the lace with a soft cloth. Constantly using fresh crumbs and changing cloth as it becomes soiled.

To clean gold or silver lace stretch the lace and baste it on a woolen cloth, taking great care to follow the outline. Tack the woolen cloth onto board, stretch well. Brush the lace free from dust. Mix fine crumbs with laundry blue in parts one of blue to three of crumbs. Sprinkle over lace, and rub gently with woolen cloth until clean. Many times rubbing lightly is better than trying to clean and polish with one application.

Crumbs for Soup

To one well beaten egg, add enough crumbs to be able to mould in balls, season the mixture with a little of Worand the housekeeper who throws away cestershire sauce. London, Oct. 15 (Correspondence)—
A campaign to raise British pensions nd separation allowances has been tarted by G. N. Barnes, M. P., who proposes a minimum of £1 a week for he widow of every soldier and sailor illed at the front, for the mother desendent on any soldier and sailor killed, or the wife of every soldier and sailor ow in the fighting line, and also for ery soldier and sailor permanently aimed by fighting.

Such an increase sounds small in comarison with American pension rates, ut would mean a fourfold raise for the inglish in most instances. From \$1.25 week the widow's pension would be aised to \$5. Mothers dependent for suport on men who die in active service are now unprovided for. The wives of en at the front at present get only 1.85 a week, while the minimum eachly pension allowed to disabled soldiers is 85 cents. Mr. Barnes also proposes to double the present allowance f 28 cents a week for every dependent hild.
