GAMBLING IS OPEN AT PALM BEACH

Temple of Chance Which Rivals The Casino at Monte Carlo

PROFITS ARE GREAT

Wealthy Men Accompanied There By Wives and Daughters—The Story of an Evening Spent There—Some Big Sums Lost

This is a story of what I saw in one night in the greatest wide-open gambling establishment in the United States, writes Kay K. Kitchin in the Boston Post. The place is the Beach club, commonly known as Bradley's, at Palm Beach, Fla., the most luxurious temple of chance on this side of the Atlantic. It bears the same relation to Palm Beach that the Casino does to Monte Carlo. It is an approved part of the general scheme. Though the gambling is wide open, there is not even a hint of interference by the state authorities.

Why? Palm Beach is owned by Henry M. Flagler, who is most of the state of Florida. Like Monaco, the prosperity of Palm Beach is supposed to depend upon the prosperity of its gambling establishment. It is generally reported that "Bradley's" makes a net profit of half a million a year, which is not a bad thing to do if it is open only three months out of the twelve.

John R. Bradley, hunter of big game and backer of Doctor Cook, is the man who operates this establishment. Hot Springs, Ark., French Lick, and Palm Beach are the three resorts in America where there is wide-open gambling for both men and women, free from interference by the state and local authorities. But the games at Hot Springs and French Lick are for millionaires or for those who can live like millionaires for a few days in that delightful spot. It is a place where pikers cannot pike.

It was ten at night when I arrived in Palm Beach, and with other New Yorkers I hastily donned my evening clothes and hurried to the Beach Club. Evening dress is a strict rule at "Bradley's" after seven p. m. But that and twenty-five years of age are practically the only requirements—except a bank roll. If one is fashionably attired and "looks good" to Mr. Hesse, the secretary of the club, he is admitted without question. To be sure, he is given a membership ticket and a little book of rules, but there are no dues, and membership only entitles you to risk your money.

When I received my membership card I passed from the lobby of the club building—a two-story structure—into the main gambling room, and to an atmosphere of purest air fairly laden with perfume. I found myself in the presence of perhaps 200 men and handsomely gowned women grouped around six roulette and two baccarat tables in a beautiful octagonal room.

From the appearance of the crowd one would suppose they were attending an evening function at a fashionable Fifth Avenue home. The women were as numerous as the men, and their gowns were as elaborate as one would see at such a night at the Metropolitan. Most of them were ablaze with diamonds.

A very person in the room to accept the black-coated croupiers seemed to have an aura of luxury—not merely the luxury of wealth but the luxury of its possession for at least two generations.

The men were gentlemen, the women their wives and daughters. There were no touts, bartenders, no vacationists, horsemen with pasta or girls from the chorus. The Beach club is no place for such people. If by any chance they do get in, they are asked to leave the moment they are spotted—and when a "mamma" is asked to leave, there is no argument.

The game was at its height when I was told by E. R. Bradley, brother of John R. and the president of the "club" to make myself at home. I turned to the roulette table nearest at hand—a handsome man of fifty-five or sixty—one of the leading lawyers of New York—and two young women, his niece, were sitting \$200 bills while three or four others who were seated at the table were playing with five and ten dollar chips.

At the next table a young couple, the son of a millionaire and his wife, were playing with dollar chips. They were merely "seeing life."

Later in the evening, when the crowd thinned out, the son of a millionaire was playing at the same table with \$500 bills, and rumor had it that he dropped \$30,000 in less than an hour. It is well to keep in mind that this is not a story of Monte Carlo. It concerns Palm Beach, the Mecca of fashionable New York for three months in the year. San Francisco in its early chuck-a-luck days was never more open. Canfield's at Saratoga had a Puritanical atmosphere compared with the life and gaiety at the Beach club.

There are gambling houses in New York today—I was in one less than a month ago—but the games are behind barred doors, no women are admitted, and, furthermore, there is little playing. People will not play roulette in New York since Chief Flynn's raids showed that most of the wheels were crooked. But at Palm Beach there is no suggestion of crookedness.

People at Palm Beach do not play to win. They play for amusement, because it is fashionable, because they have more money than they know what to do with. What if they do drop half a million in three months? They have had a good time.

Considering the multitude, part of which is continually moving, there is surprisingly little noise. In fact, the most profound tranquillity prevails; scarcely a word is spoken. The spinning of the marble alone breaks the silence. When it falls, the croupier indicates the winning number by pointing to the board, sweeping in the chips and money and paying the winners.

There is no drinking in the gambling room. In the restaurant, however, there is a continuous popping of champagne nocks until two in the morning, when most of the "members" leave for the hotels.

Practically every one who visits Palm Beach visits "Bradley's" so it would be impossible to give the names of those who play. I saw two supreme court judges, a dozen prominent lawyers, bankers, capitalists and society men the evening I spent in the gambling room. Most of them were accompanied by their wives.

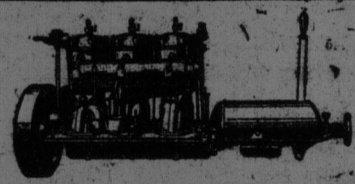
THE YOUTHFULNESS OF CRIME (The World, New York.) Magistrate McKidoo in his annual report says: There is growing up in this city a menacing army of boys and young men who are the most troublesome element we have to deal with. . . . From the ranks of these lawless, reckless rowdies that are organized in bands or bound up with chains or pale come most of the crop of burglars, truck thieves, hold-up men, gun-bearers, so-called "bad men" and other criminals and dangerous characters. This is but a new statement of an old story. It comes every year from every great city. This year it comes in its most startling form from Paris, where in running down a desperate gang of motor-car bandits the police found that the first to be arrested was a frail, consumptive youth, and the leader, when caught in his turn, is found to be a boy of eighteen. The youthfulness of daring criminals has in fact long been noted. It was so in the old days of Jack Sheppard and Claude Duval. It will always be so. A large proportion of this dare-devil crime is done not for the sake of the crime but for the sake of the daring. The brain of youth is full of romance and the heart of youth is brave and reckless. In the country this directed they may become of high value excess of energy works itself out in hunting and fishing, in bill-climbing or boating or swimming, with an occasional raid on a neighboring orchard. But in the city the one thing to fight against that a red-blooded boy sees in the police, and through sheer love of adventure he violates the law. It is noted by Emerson among the great qualities of Napoleon that he took banquets, snufflers, highway robbers and all sorts of lawless men out of the jails of France, making superb soldiers of all of them and heroes of many. We cannot in our form of government imitate Napoleonic methods, but we may at least learn from his example that the reckless energies of youth are not necessarily criminal. If rightly directed they may become of high value.

AN INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES

Congress in Cologne
In August
LONDON NEWS LETTER
A New Phase of the Marriage Problem is Presented in Empire

London, April 10.—The ministry of foreign affairs in Berlin has declared itself willing to acquiesce in those foreign governments concerned that, in response to the invitation of the German Nurses' Association, the International Council of Nurses will meet in Cologne in August and hold congress and exhibit there...

Reports are to be presented from several national councils of nurses, including Great Britain and Ireland, the United States of America, Canada, India, New Zealand, France, Holland, Denmark, and Italy, and the English nurses regret that unless the nurses registration bill receives consideration this session, it must report the great demands of the trained nurses of the United Kingdom have received neither sympathy nor consideration from the government.

State registration has been in force in the German empire since 1908—in several of our dominions and in two-thirds of the states of America for a longer period—so that Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, who is secretary of the nursing profession, is somewhat humiliated position for the final descendants of Florence Nightingale.

Modder River, on the other hand, records a "severe shock" but practically no damage seems to have been done. Buildings in Bloemfontein shook and trembled, and in one case a double-story house was cracked.

The Bloemfontein Post has interviewed Letsee, the paramount chief of Basuto land (the mountainous district between the north-west corner of Cape Colony and Natal), who lately gathered to himself large forces on the question of his hostility and discontent. Letsee declared himself afraid of the union government, which he compared to a snake trying to kill his people.

"If," he said, "the snake tried to kill me, others may try to kill the snake. I am frightened of the union. Those who made it are a highly civilized people, my nation is backward. So how can two such peoples mix? Letsee also charged the imperial government with the breach of certain agreements made in the time of Queen Victoria, and declared that he had self the title of King of Basuto, which has never been claimed by his predecessors.

HISTORY OF LONDON MUSEUM

Enthralling Story of Greatest of Cities Graphically Told By Relics
COVER MANY CENTURIES
Newest of Museums in Metropolis Will Soon be Opened—From Days of Romans to Present Time—Some of the Features

(Times Special Correspondence.)
London, April 11.—Those responsible for the safety of London's art treasures and those of historical interest still are fearful in dread of the suffragettes. For fear that they may be kept from their work, the British and South Kensington Museums and the famous Wallace collection are closed for the present, and for the same reason no date can be named yet for the opening of the "London" museum.

These costumes occupy one of the "state apartments" of the palace, while in another part of the museum are to be seen the coronation robes of Queen Alexandra and of the present king and queen. Most of the contents have been brought from the British and South Kensington Museums and the famous Wallace collection are closed for the present, and for the same reason no date can be named yet for the opening of the "London" museum.

There is little doubt, however, that the new museum, which contains more than 100,000 exhibits housed at Kensington Palace, the girlhood home of Queen Victoria, and the center of those gardens that Mr. Barris has made famous in "Peter Pan" will be on view before the advance guard of the year's invaders have arrived, and that they and their successors will find it worth a visit as guaranteed as the result of a tour of inspection made by the writer a day or two ago.

The object of this latest addition to the museums of the metropolis is to present a "vivid history" of London by means of relics, costumes and pictures from prehistoric times down to the present day. Most of the contents have been brought from the British and South Kensington Museums and the famous Wallace collection are closed for the present, and for the same reason no date can be named yet for the opening of the "London" museum.

At the London Museum, one may see the lower jaw and the skull of a mammoth discovered within the metropolitan limits, the skull of a "Londoner" of the paleolithic age, the swords of Vikings, and the remains of a Roman burg found in digging up the site of the new county hall for London's city fathers. Then, jumping twenty-five centuries or so, go on to look at a silk muller, a watch chain and a pair of gloves that were worn by the late King Edward, together with his gold cigarette case and the leather one in which he used to carry the long, black cigars that he was so incessantly a smoker.

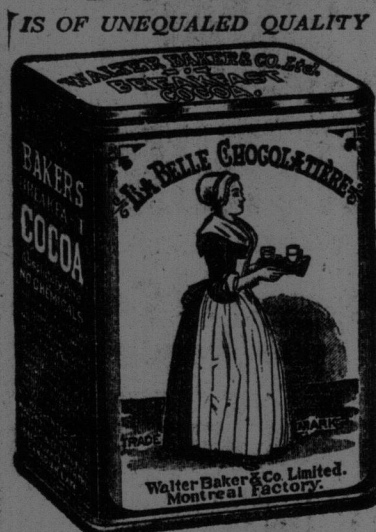

PAY OF RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

An Increase in 1911 of Almost Fifty Million Dollars. Gains made by railroad employes in compensation in the face of some of the decreased revenues of the roads are shown in a bulletin recently issued by the Bureau of Railway Economics, which was established by the railways "for the scientific study of transportation problems."

Notwithstanding an increase of 2,108 miles in the steam railway mileage of the United States, the number of employes on railroads over 500 miles long was less on June 30, 1911, by 31,037, or 2.1 per cent, than on June 30, 1910. This is a decline of 232 employes per 1,000 miles of line, or 3.3 per cent. Switch tenders, trackmen, telegraph operators and trainmen are the classes in which there were the greatest decreases.

Although for railroads over 500 miles long the total number of employes on June 30, 1911, was less by 31,037, or 2.1 per cent, than the total number of employes on June 30, 1910, the total compensation paid to the total number of employes during the fiscal year 1911 was greater than the total compensation paid to the total number of employes during the fiscal year 1910 by \$49,976,216, or 5 per cent.

As the total operating revenues of these railroads were greater in 1911 than in 1910 by \$27,381,095, the increase in compensation to employes exceeded the increase in gross earnings by \$22,585,121, or 82.5 per cent.

The increase of nearly \$50,000,000 in employes' compensation between 1910 and 1911 took effect in the face of a decline in the number of employes at \$49,976,216.

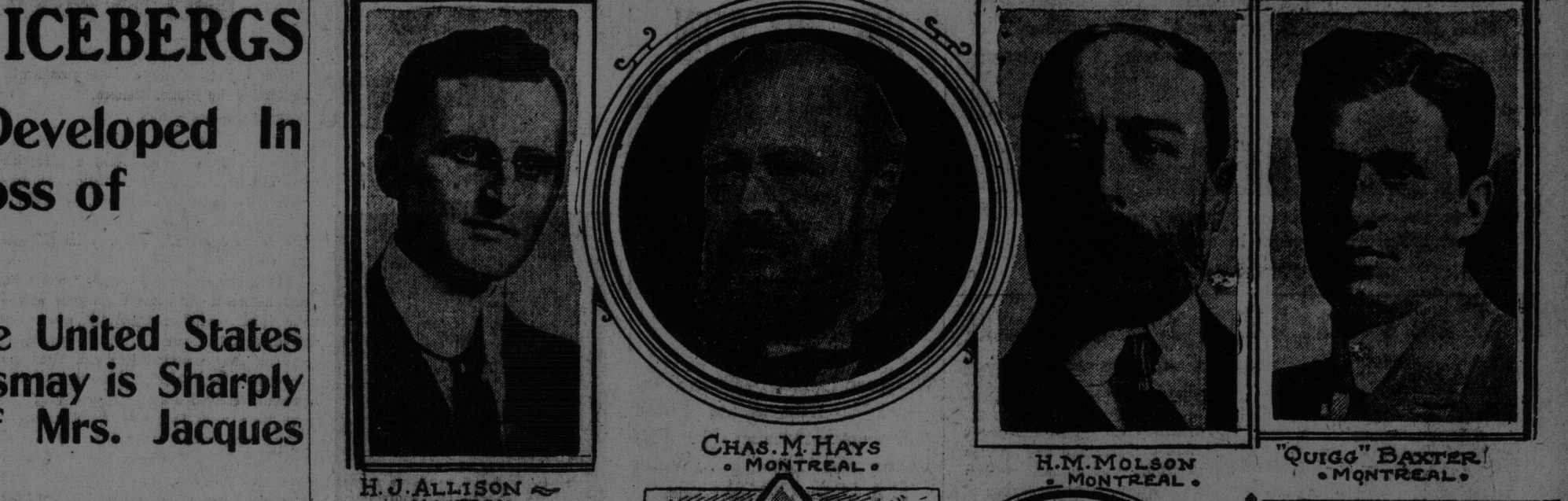

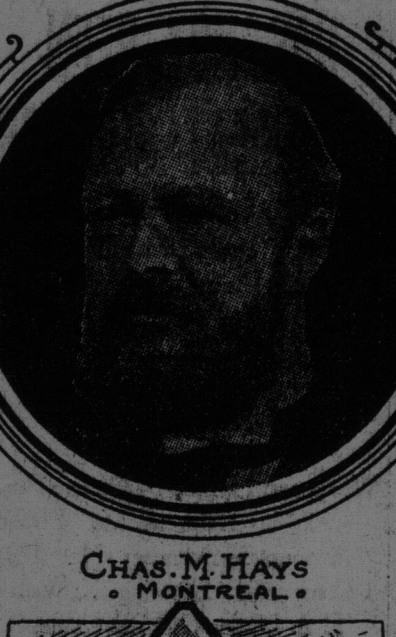

Certainly anyone who cannot reconstruct himself the story of London while wandering through this museum must be lacking in imagination. It is easy to see, for example, that the Romans, particularly the Roman women, lived in comparative luxury, for here are highly ornamented writing materials, manure pails, and richly chased perfume bottles. The modern boot, by the way, apparently has evolved from the ancient Roman sandal, several of which are on view in this museum and still are in a good state of preservation, despite having lain in the soil of London for centuries.

The charnel-house appears to have been discovered accidentally some 200 years ago, when a grave was being dug in the south aisle of the church. The sexton's spade apparently broke through the roof of the crypt and when the vaults were explored they were found to contain human bones piled very carefully in alternate strata of skulls, arms, and legs.

During the recent rearrangement it was found that great quantities of small-bones were concealed behind the larger ones. In the first excitement of the original discovery it was believed that the crypt contained the remains of 20,000 or 40,000 persons, but no accurate calculation has been possible until within the last few months. The figure is now put at 11,000, that number having been arrived at by counting the tops of the thigh bones and dividing the total by two.

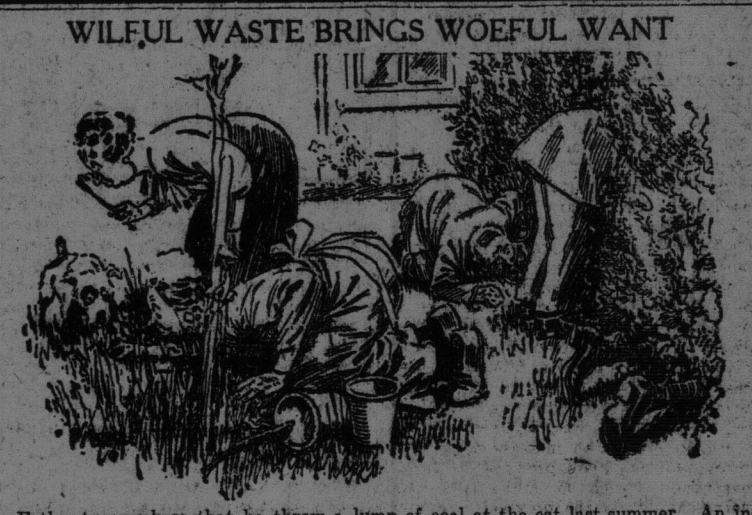

It was noticed in his match against Sutton in his injury that on one occasion he failed to get the shot for a period of ten minutes, which was due to his inability to carry through shots which used to be his 'long snail' development of the fact that for some months past the youthful champion has been troubled by a lack of co-ordination of thought and touch impulse, which warrants his indication of stroke. It is said that he has been advised that several months' rest from play would relieve him of the trouble, which is similar to that which affected Wilson P. Foss, a former amateur champion, and which rest did much to dissipate. Hoppe has been playing billiards almost constantly for fifteen years, as a matter of fact ever since he was seven years of age. It is contended that during this period, and particularly since that time when he first annexed the championship, force has been the contributing factor toward his seeming lapses from the great form and ability of execution which has been his for some years. Other champions who have been afflicted by a similar trouble include Albert Cannon, the French expert; Opa Moringer, who upon his arrival from Europe several years ago found himself possessed of it; and Maurice Daly.

THE LAST OF HER CALLING

Mlle Meyer Had Driven Diligence Over Alpine Pass for Many Years

Geneva, April 19.—At Andermatt, the death of Mlle. Esther Meyer, aged seventy-five, is announced. She was the last postilion or diligence driver in Europe, and had a romantic career.

At the age of twenty-eight her father, a widower, died, leaving her two prosperous brothers, the Trois Rois in Andermatt, and the Meyerhof in Hospental as well as the diligence service over the St. Gothard Pass. For thirty years the Meyer family were the owners of these two hotels, and at the same time were the drivers of the diligence over the pass. Pere Meyer, during later years, handed over the reins to his daughter, who drove the four horses with equal skill on the Alpine route, and sometimes over the Oberalp and Furka Passes, in spite of snow and avalanches. The diligence carried the post as well as passengers, and was subsidized by the Swiss government.

Mlle Esther, when she inherited her father's property, placed managers in her two hotels and took to the road, because she loved the Alps, and became the driver of diligences—positions she refused several offers of marriage. She leaves a good sum to her distant relatives.

A VISIT TO HONG KONG, CHINA

Almost Every Nation Makes Its Contribution to Life There—An Experience in Shopping

(Times Special Correspondence)

London, April 3.—A correspondent of the "Westminster Gazette" gives the first impression of a visitor to Hong Kong as that of a city of the dead. This effect is pronounced on account of the wide verandas belonging to all the houses, so that at a distance no windows are seen, and all the buildings look like huge skulls with empty sockets where the eyes should be.

"My own feeling as to this," he writes, "was lightened when I arrived at the Peak Hotel, and found all the boys (some of them old men) clad in long white robes with their hair, cadaverous brown faces, and shaven polls. At the office I saw the typists and clerks in their short white jackets, their light pants, and large dome-like foreheads. They were exactly like our old music-hall friend Willie Ward, and one almost expected them to urge you to sing the chorus of 'She sells sea shells on the seashore'.

The most peculiarity of the colony is the anomaly of the men and women's occupations—according to European ideas. The women work just like the men; they drag huge loads harnessed like horses, carry heavy weights strung over their shoulders, and go to work in the morning, take the first train on a few yards further, and so on, all under a blazing sun. All the bricklaying, road-mending, coaling, etc., is done equally by both sexes. But perhaps the most curious sight is to see a woman straining at an oar, or at the steering of a sampan. If the boat be a very heavy one, two of the women will work an oar together, one pulling one way, and the other pushing, while a little baby is perched on the back of each in a sort of cradle or papoose-arrangement.

"On the other hand, up on the Peak, which is the European settlement, one often sees a Chinese boy walking along sedately pushing a cart, while the English upstart walks empty-handed by his side, and superintends operations. Of course, all the housework is done by boys."

"The next point is the very cosmopolitan nature of the place. This was most forcibly borne in upon me the other day when I was walking with an American on one of the streets. We passed a very old German, a Parsee stood at the door of his shop, a Japanese girl followed by two Portuguese boys passed us, and a moment later a rickshaw went by, in which sat a Spanish maid, a Chinese man, of course, Chinese scattered all over the place as usual, so that here within 100 yards of one another, at least nine nationalities were represented. It would be hard to name a country which could not produce its type here.

"A contingent of the Baluchistan Infantry is here; we have Sikh policemen; Indians of all kinds are represented officially in the civil and police courts; next to the 'Chinks' I think the Germans predominate. There is a large sprinkling of Malays and Lascars, many Frenchmen and Swedes; Italians, Funks, Portuguese, Spaniards and Americans all have their place in the colony; the Scotsman and Irishman are here in large numbers, and that somewhere at the end of the list come a few straggling Englishmen.

"To see Hong Kong at its best you want

to get a clear, fine day and then climb slowly up the Peak and look down upon the town nestled below with all the steeply ascending hills in the harbor, and Kowloon just across the way, where the distant hills look like paper mache ones.

"You get some very fine sunset effects and now and then an extraordinary lighting display when the flashes dart about from one range of hills to another, and illuminate the place for several minutes. Hong Kong looks prettier from the harbor at night time, when you see all the lights twinkling not only along the coast, but away up at intervals to the top of the Peak, and at convenient times, when the whole colony was lit up by red Chinese lanterns, the effect from the water was delightful.

A LANDLORDS' TRUST

Increase Rents Ten Per Cent For Flat to Make up For Vacant

Geneva, April 19.—A curious kind of "trust," has just been put into operation by house builders and contractors in Geneva. They have increased the rent of their tenants in flats and villas by ten per cent, and the extra money from this source is to be "pooled" in order to recompense the builders for their unlet flats and houses.

Naturally, the population are up in arms against this measure, but as all the big firms of builders and house agents have come to an agreement the private householder has no hope of success, and must pay.

If the meantime houses, and buildings with flats are springing up like mushrooms in all parts of the town, and the jobshabbers intend to appeal to the government to legislate against this objectionable combination.

PLUMBING A SCIENCE NOW

Many Hard Problems Face Modern Sanitary Engineer

(New York Sun.)

"The days of the master plumber, as the term master plumber was understood thirty years ago, seems to be passing," said a contractor the other day. "In his place there has arrived the sanitary engineer. The master plumber was the individual who, clad in overalls, looked at an architect's drawing of a five or six story office building and estimated on the construction and the placing of the plumbing. In nine cases out of ten the work was poorly done without due regard to sanitary conditions.

"With the evolution of the office building, as understood in Manhattan today, came the evolution of the master plumber into the sanitary engineer. Modern methods of hygiene and an application of sound engineering principles have made possible the modern science of plumbing, and plumbing is a branch of engineering which is important to mechanical engineering. So that the sanitary engineer is a type of highly paid, college graduated engineer with various diplomas and other attachments to his name.

"With the enormous buildings in the business districts of large cities it requires as much planning and designing for the plumbing as for the construction of the building itself, and the architect has to work hand in glove with the sanitary engineer to make his building a success. The comprehensiveness of the sanitary engineering business can fully be grasped by following the work of a small army of plumbers on a modern skyscraper. In a new building of fifty-five stories that is now in the course of construction, the sewer, water supply, and drainage systems are not the least important items in the construction of the building.

"All sewer connections in this building have to be carried to the public sewer; the public fixtures above the basement floor have to have a gravity system of drainage to an airtight sewage pump, then again a system for the discharge of all rain water from the roof, balcony and other exposed parts of the building to the public sewer, then separate systems for the water drains, an elevator, steam blowoff, heating, refrigerating, sinks, drinking fountains, kitchen refuse and a thousand and one odd things. "In addition to the above the plumber has to provide for a separate water supply system, inclusive of flushing systems,
