

Provision is being made to continue the more important administrative functions of the Dominion Command offices, but, according to Sir Richard, until additional revenue is forthcoming this month, its majority activity, the work of the veterans' adjustment service bureau would be greatly curtailed. APPEAL FOR AID

General Turner after consultation with members of the Dominion executive and following a complete survey of the affairs of the association this week. It was the hope of the G. W. V. A. president that the adjustment service burreau might be maintained so that it could be turned over to the new organization as an operating entity. This could yet be done, he asserts, if branches of the Association and individuals subscribe sufficient funds for current liabilities and maintenance for at least three months.

CLAIMS ADJUSTED

According to General Turner, the curtailment of the adjustment service will be felt by disabled veterans and dependents in all parts of the Dominion. New cases have developed during 1925 at an average rate of 65 weekly. The more difficult cases are now being brought forward. For over eight years the bureau has acted as the advocate of the individual in dealing with governmental departments.

Is Convicted of Embezzlement From Carnegie Trust Company

Sum of \$600,000 Stated in Case of John A. Bell in Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 12.—John A. Bell, former millionaire banker and coal operator, has been found guilty of embezzling more than \$600,000 from the Carnegie Trust Company, of Carnegie, Pa. The jury deliberated only 36 minutes. The maximum sentence under the 12 counts in the indictment is 60 years' imprisonment and \$60,000 fine.

Bell was also president of the First National Bank of Carnegie, and the Burgettstown National Bank. Both institutions closed their doors follow-ing the Carnegie Trust Company

rash.

Bell was the largest individual coal operator in the Pittsburgh district. The Carnegie Coal Company, controlled by Bell, is second only in size in Western Pennsylvania to the Pittsburgh Coal Company. He also controlled other large mining operations. At one

time his fortune was estimated to be \$25,000,000 or \$30,000,000.

The aged banker was not visibly affected when the clerk read the verdict. His face did not even change color. He merely twiddled his fingers about the head of his cane as he sat in his chair at the counsel table.

A bond for \$25,000 was given for Bell's release by his son, John A. Bell, Jr., who gave his occupation as a farmer and posted farm property valued at \$275,000. The other bondsman was John S. Robb, Jr., of Carnegie, counsel for Bell.

Bell for many years has been one of the political leaders in Allegheny County and was prominently mentioned.

Some Abbey Christmases

IT was the year of grace one thousand and sixty-five. The darkest season of the year was fast approaching; but at Westminster, in the precincts of the Royal Palace of St. Stephen, which then rose where the Houses of Parliament stand today and in the adjoining town all was life and bustle and merriment.

Standing there somewhat to the west of the Palace itself, was the Abbey of St. Peter, the first specimen of Romanesque style of architecture in this country, and which had been slowly upbuilding for something like a score

This great Abbey was due to the piety of the sovereign who sat upon the throne and who bore the honored Saxon name of Edward. He was renowned among his subjects for his piety, and they loved him, together with his charming Queen, Edith by name, in that he represented the old line of the famous old house of Cedrle, whose ancestors long centuries before had distinguished themselves by sailing up Southampton Water and in process of time had secured to themselves the regal headship of England. People looked upon Edward perhaps with even more affection than would normally have been the case, for as they peered forth into the future and endeavored to descry its secrets there was that which filled them with alarm. Their beloved King was childless. His health was frail to say the least, and there was no near relative whose succession to the throne would have been accepted as an undisputed matter of course. Moreover, Saxon hearts were filled with anxiety when they saw the court of England thronged with arrogant outsiders from across the Channel, friends of the King's boyhood and exile in Normandy, for whom he entertained so lively a regard. Behind all there loomed the shadow of the growing power of the great Duchy of Normandy, whose sudden showing up growing power of the great Duchy of Normandy, whose sudden showing up into preminence had been one of the most striking political events of the

But today all was joy and good cheer. A great festival had been decreed. Christmas was to be kept as it had never been kept before here at Westminster. The King had bidden the great ones of the realm from all over the land in order that they might take part with him in the solemn consecration of the Abbey church so dear to his own heart and whose building he had watched over as if it were his own child, as indeed it was.

The ceremony, the like of which England had never before beheld, was fixed to take place three days after the Christmas festival. Every one was on the tiptoe of expectation. The King appeared as was his custom, the crown on his head, among his subjects on Christmas day. Some of the onlookers remarked upon his delicate appearance and his obviously increasing frailty. Their fears were only too well justified. Holy Innocents' Day dawned and the great concourse of people felt that the long expected climax had at last arrived. Imagine, then, their grief and disappointment when they perceived the royal party on its arrival in the Abbey to be destitute of its central figure. The good King lay stretched upon what proved to be his death-bed in the Palace hard by. Queen Edith represented him with the grace and dignity which were her wont. Archbishop Stagand and his suffragans together with the Abbot of Westminster and others, carried through the ceremony, but for all present it was a dark and cloudy day.

What would their feelings have been could they but have perceied the stupendous events which the ensuing three hundred and sixty-five days were destined to bring forth. In a few days time the Confessor (for by such title was Edward subsequently to be known) passed away. The crown was hastily offered to and eagerly accepted by his brother-in-law, the famous general Harold. No sooner had the obsequies of the departed monarch been performed, than the newly built Abbey was graced by the coronation of his successor. Then before many more months had elapsed, came the news of a Norwegian invasion on the coast of Yorkshire. Harold at the head of the Saxon army rushed northward and inflicted a disastrous defeat upon the Norse pirates who dared to violate the sanctity of our island home. But the King was struggling in the teeth of difficulties and in the presence of forces far beyond his own power to cope with. The reign, begun so inauspiclously, terminated one outumn evening in that same great year, 1066, on Senlac Field. Then there opened a new era altogether alike for England and for the Church of Westminster. William, Duke of Normandy, was not only a highly capable general, he was also a statesman of the first order. From the very first he set himself to proclaim both by word and by deed the fact that he was the proper lawful successor of the late beloved King Edward and that Harold, his immediate predecessor, was a usurper and a perjurer, who had only met with the just reward of his evil deeds.

In order to give a striking and concrete example of his policy, this new Norman king determined upon a striking innovation. There entombed immediately in front of the High Altar of the noble Abbey, due to his own piety and self-sacrifice, lay the body of Saxon Edward himself. This hallowed spot, so William averred, should be the scene of his own coronation. Winchester Cathedral, the royal church of our nation's childhood, in which a long line of Saxon sovereigns, including Edward himself, had undergone the ceremony of the "sacring," must henceforth lose her pride of place. Westminister and the hallowed remains of King Edward must for the future occupy the central position in the national life of this island.

And so it came about that once more STRIKING INNOVATION.

And so it came about that once more was a mighty throng of people drawn together to Westminster at Christmas time. They differed from the great crowd of the previous year in that they were a mixed multitude. Norman and Saxon were jostling each other, generally in no friendly manner, both within the portals of the Abbey church itself and in its adjoining purlious. Even the ceremony of the coronation itself bore witness to this dual aspect,

In Christmas holidays, the tables were all spread from the first to the last; the sirloins of beef, the minced pies, the plum-porridge, the capons, turkeys, geese, and plum-puddings, were all brought upon the board; every one ate heartily, and was welcome, which gave rise to the proverb, "Merry in the hall when beards wag all."

In 1793, in a Statistical Account of Scotland, under the head Amusements, we are told that: "At Christmas and the New Year, the opulent Burghers begin to feast their friends, and go a round of visits, which takes up the space of many weeks. Upon such occasions, the gravest is expected to be merry and to join in a cheerful song."

The obligations of Christmas, on the social side, were heavy then indeed, for host and guest alike. One wonders how, with such a cleavage of the year the feasters ever set to again at the work they had left undone. One is tempted to say once more, in the words of an old verse:

Yet, the word was not always associated with Christmas. Authorities differ as to its derivation, opinions varying between Latin, Celtic and French. 





In the various illustratoins it will be noticed that the most of the doll-makers pay little attention to features. Eyes, nose and mouth are apt to be mere streaks or dots. Striking departure from this rule is found in the instance of the clumsy image representing the doll work of the San Blas Indians in Central America. This figure is wholly of wood, costume and all. The nose is very much in evidence, and bears closer resemblance to the beak of some giant bird than to the facial feature of any human being ever discovered by the students of ethology. The loose blouse and the pleated skirt may be taken as typical of the flapper styles among the Indians of Central America at the time of the carving, although on this point I am without scientific information.

Not all Indian dolls are in human form. As in the case of the impersonators of the Hopis, the Indian toymaker goes in for animals as well as persons. One of the illustrations shows three creations from western tribes, representing the "Noah's Ark," of Indian childhood. The pony, the Buffalo and the antelope may be crudely patterned, but they would thrill the heart of a child more sophisticated than the young Indian of the American forest. Note the beadwork in the eyes of the buffalo and on the horns and legs of the antelope The child who could resist these creations has never been born.

The Zuni Indian go in for dolls are carved from the roots of the continuous are carved from the roots of the continuous are carved from the roots of the continuous tree, and some of them are wrought with a deft touch that exemplifies Indian craftsmanship at its best. Among the Mojaves there is general use of clay in making the dolls for the children. This custom prevails also among other tribes that are skilled in pottery. Explorers have found that even the children take up the task of fashioning miniature images from the plastic clay that is a part of their everyday environment. I have seen moulded by the baby fingers of child-nood. Each doll is encased in a holder resembling that used by the Indian mother in carrying and caring for her own offspring.
