Ottawa, June 5.—In the House of Commons yesterday a bill to amend the Criminal Code, French version, was referred to a special committee.

DARING HOLD-UP IN NEW YORK

Robbers Hold Up Cigar Clerk at Hudson Terminal—Complain of Small Haul.

New York, June 5.—While hundreds of commuters were entering the Hudson Terminal Station in Fulton street during the rush hour last night, two masked robbers entered a cigar store directly opposite, held up the clerk at the point of a revolver and rifled the cash register.

ON TRIAL FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Toronto Manufacturer Held in Automobile Case.

Toronto, June 5.—Harry Miller, a prominent Jewish manufacturer here, was yesterday committed for trial on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Edward Kettowich, who was run down and killed on May 20 by a motor car alleged to have been driven by Miller's fourteen year old son, Benjamin, with the father in the car at the time. Since the fatality Miller has been on bail of \$10,000.

FISHERIES GO OVER TO MARINE DEPARTMENT

All Regulations Will Now Come Under Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Ottawa, June 5.—(Canadian Press)—An order-in-council gazetted this week provides for the transfer of the fisheries branch of the department of naval service to the department of marine and fisheries and also that the general superintendent of fisheries shall in future be titled assistant deputy minister of fisheries. Fisheries regulations will in future come under the minister of marine and fisheries.

ARGENTINE BANS EXPORT OF WHEAT

Buenos Aires, June 5.—The customs uses in all Argentine ports have received orders from the government to suspend exportations of wheat pending the enactment of the proposed wheat export duty law, which is awaiting the approval of the senate.

NEW YORK LONGSHOREMEN DECIDE TO STAY OUT

New York, June 5.—Costly longshoremen who have been on strike here since April 1 decided last night, by vote of 271 to 266 to remain out until after their demand for a wage increase was granted. The strike, which has involved approximately 5,000 dock workers, has seriously interfered with the commerce of the port.

ITALIAN LOAN IN UNITED STATES DENIED

London, June 5.—A Reuters' despatch from Rome says a statement that the Italian government is obtaining a loan of \$30,000,000 in the United States in return for the tobacco monopoly is semi-officially denied. The despatch declares that the government never has entertained the idea of ending any monopoly.

STEAMER ON FIRE OFF NEW YORK

The Bergensford's Fuel Oil Reported in Flames—Now Under Control.

New York, June 5.—The Norwegian steamer Bergensford, bound out from New York, is on fire 150 miles east of Fire Island, according to a radio S.O.S. message picked up by the department of naval communications early today. The message, asking immediate assistance, said the Bergensford's fuel oil was on fire and that an explosion had occurred.

CHANGE IN THE MARITIME AND MAINE SCHEDULE

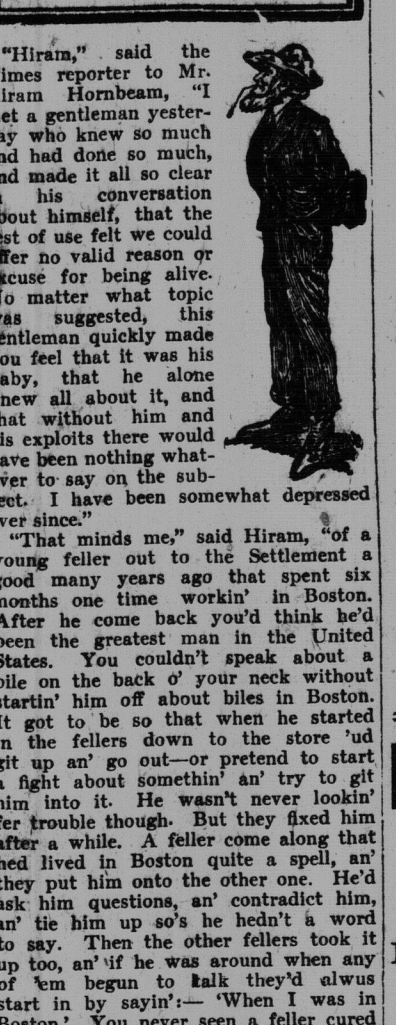
St. John Exhibition Makes a Readjustment Imminent—Moosepath Park Under Lease to Two St. John Men.

TO TRAVEL FROM TORONTO TO NEW YORK IN A CANOE

Toronto, June 5.—A canoe trip from Toronto to New York, a distance of approximately 633 miles, lay before Preston W. Bryant when he paddled out of Toronto, carrying a letter of introduction and greeting from Mayor Church to Mayor Hyatt. Bryant's trip is planned as follows: Lake Ontario, Toronto to Port Dalhousie, eighty miles; Welland Canal, Port Dalhousie to Port Colborne, twenty-seven miles; Lake Erie, Port Colborne to Buffalo, twenty miles; Niagara River, Buffalo to Tonawanda, twelve miles; Erie Canal, Tonawanda to Watford, 341 miles; Hudson River, Watford to New York, 133 miles.

SUGAR FROM ENGLAND FOR UNITED STATES

London, June 5.—The London Times reports that large consignments of sugar are being shipped from Great Britain to the United States. Some of these shipments, it says, have recently arrived from the West Indies.

COWBOYS STRIKE

Los Angeles, Cal., June 5.—One hundred and fifty cowboys employed in a recent picture work are on strike for an increase in pay from \$7.50 to \$10 a day. The making of pictures by six companies is held up pending a settlement.

MISSIONARY TO INDIANS

Rev. W. H. Pearce, native Indian and Methodist missionary at Port Eslington, northern British Columbia, who advised Gun-A-Noot, a noted Indian and outlaw for fourteen years, to surrender himself to the police, which he did, was photographed specially for the British and Colonial Press on arrival in Vancouver recently, his first trip in many years, says prohibition is a boon to the northern tribes, one of which has installed electric lights in its village at a cost of \$5,000. IRISH "PRESIDENT" IS IN CHICAGO

Looks for Support From Both Democrats and Republicans—British Trade Union to Discuss Dock Worker's Boycott.

Chicago, June 5.—Eamonn De Valera, "President" of the Irish Republic, arrived in Chicago from New York and announced he would attempt to obtain a plank in the Republican platform in favor of the recognition by the United States of the Irish Republic.

FARMERS PLANNING TO REDUCE CROPS

Washington, June 4.—The department of agriculture is receiving numerous complaints from farmers that they cannot handle their normal acreage, or pay the higher wages demanded by labor, or make the large initial investment in fertilizers, seed and equipment with the present uncertainty concerning prices next fall.

RENT STRIKE THREATENED

New Rent Restriction Bill Meeting Opposition in British House.

London, June 5.—(Canadian Associated Press)—In the House of Commons yesterday, the minister of health moved the second reading of the new rent restriction bill which prolongs previous acts for three years, extends the provisions to larger houses and empowers landlords to increase rents by forty per cent. Speeches indicated that the bill will meet with considerable opposition, especially from the labor party, who already threaten a rent strike if the increases are allowed.

VITAL STATISTICS

HEARST MAKES STATEMENT ON PAPER MATTERS

Willing to Do Without Percentage of Canadian Paper if Canadian Journals Require It.

(Special to the Times.) New York, June 5.—H. G. Craig & Company, New York city agents of several Canadian manufacturers, among them The Donnanona Paper Company, yesterday gave out the following message which it received from William Hearst:—

"I am given to understand that some of the Canadian papers are wholly dependent upon the percentage on our paper contract which has been written by the Canadian government under war-time authority, and which may no longer be withheld after July 1st. We are certainly in desperate need of paper. But I would not like to feel that we are satisfying our own requirements at the severe injury of these Canadian papers. We have been able to get along without this percentage heretofore, and we will try to continue to do so if you feel that this percentage of our contract supply should properly be diverted to the use of their Canadian papers. In other words I will abide by the suggestion of yourself and your government in this matter regardless of our legal contractual rights."

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5,000 SCOUTS JOINED IN 1919

General Council Will Not Send Party to England This Year—Officers Elected.

Ottawa, June 5.—The Canadian General Council of the Boy Scouts today decided not to send a contingent to the scout jamboree being held in England this month. The council took this stand on account of "the need for economy in these strenuous days of high prices."

BARKER FLIES FROM NEW YORK TO TORONTO

Brings Machine in Which Prince of Wales Flew Over London.

Toronto, June 5.—In the first Sopwith-Dove machine to enter Canada, Lieut. Col. W. B. Barker, V. C., D. S. O., and Captain R. F. McRae, D. S. O., M. C., arrived yesterday afternoon after an uneventful air trip from New York. They left New York Thursday evening. The Sopwith-Dove machine in which Col. Barker took the Prince of Wales for a flight over London, England.

### A PRICELESS ASSET.

(Halifax Chronicle.)  
This is the season of the year when we are confronted anew with the danger of forest fires. The present season has been exceedingly dry and the brush in the woods is like a tinder box, when carelessness on the part of fishermen or others may easily start a conflagration which will destroy vast areas of timber-lands and cause a loss in money that

can hardly be computed. There is, therefore, imperative need for caution and care on the part of every one who goes into the woods, as well as of the utmost vigilance on the part of the forest rangers and every good citizen. There never was a time when the forest resources of the country were so valuable, not only in terms of money, but in their relation to the water-courses and vegetation of the country. Scarcely a season passes without the laying waste

of large tracts of forest lands and the consequent loss of many hundreds of thousands of dollars. It surely should not be necessary in these days to urge upon the public generally the necessity of protecting and conserving our forest wealth, but, unfortunately, it is still necessary to warn people against carelessness; and in most cases forest fires are the result of carelessness and lack of proper precaution. Every sportsman, worthy of the name,

should consider it an imperative personal duty to see that every vestige of his camp fire is extinguished and that every precaution is taken when lighting a fire in the woods to see that it is not in danger of spreading. A lighted match carelessly thrown down or live coals dropped from a pipe, cigar or cigarette, may start a conflagration which will destroy miles upon miles of timber which cannot be replaced by nature in

a generation. The forest is one of God's great gifts to man. It is the protection of our water supply, the shelter of our game and fish, and the source of materials indispensable to the life of man. Every good citizen, therefore, should recognize that he has a personal duty to perform in seeing that through no carelessness of his is its existence menaced or its protection and conservation neglected.

London Talk of Slump In High Living Cost

No One Sorry if Profiteers Are Hit—The Liberal Party Split—Royal Guests at Curzon Wedding—Death of the Bishop of Durham.

(From our own correspondent.) London, May 18.—There is every sign of a coming slump all round in the present inflated prices. It is, in fact, really happening, notably in and wool, believe—the long-suffering consumer will soon drink the joyous draught of most poetical revenge, because all acts of clever people, blissfully content that there was no exhausting the cur's profiteering El Dorado, have been giving for all they were worth and, tery regardless of anything but their wa greedy desires, holding obstinately a further rise. But now the symptoms are that the summit of inflation passing. Production begins to level up more with consumption. And the slugs have for some time been refuting the government's astute suggestion, finance these profiteering speculations, there is going to be a big rush to sell it in time. This will inevitably assist hastening the no less inevitable ump. And while the public reap the merit of easier prices all round, they will happily be some profiteering wisp a the green. I am told by city people to know what they are talking about hat very soon quite a large number of speculators may be "going bust." And on the city will not be sorry for them. Effect on Electors.

Now that the Liberal split may be regarded as an accomplished fact, politicians are asking a little apprehensively what its effect is likely to be at the next general election. All the indications are that the unfortunate victor will see a rather embarrassing chapter of imbalances to decide between. Mr. Asquith and his friends will run their men; every constituency there is a chance of winning. The Labor Party has already made arrangements to do the same. In some instances there will be not one but a Coalition candidates, and recent experiences suggest that the confusion may be further increased by "independents" entering the lists. It looks, in fact, as though the majority of the constituencies will be represented in the next parliament by candidates returned a minority vote. This is not exactly a healthy situation and the House of Commons may yet have occasion to regret its rejection of some scheme of proportional representation. It is not without significance to notice that the people who rejoice most over the Liberal split are the members of the Labor Party. They expect to win many constituencies as the result of a divided Liberal vote.

It is a considerable discussion at the present time rasing round the question whether the bonus shares to shareholders against the accumulation of reserves, by this means converted into national capital, should be treated as income. The inland Revenue view is that this money, being profit, would ordinarily be divided as dividend. It would be, in addition to paying income tax deducted as a matter of course before any division, be liable for super-tax in those where it is paid to large shareholders to whose income this tax is applicable. It is therefore contended that super-tax should be paid as though these shares were actually cash paid in the form of dividend. It is admitted, however, that in a private partnership the partners are assessed on the sole profits, whether drawn from the business or not, while in a limited company profits put to reserve and not divided among the shareholders are not assessed.

It must, however, be remembered that these company reserves do not represent the profits of one year but of many. The only fair way to collect super-tax on these profits would be at the time they are placed to reserve, and not when they are divided as bonus shares. The practical argument against this is the same as that against the collection of income-tax in the case of co-operative societies. It is obvious that the number of small shareholders in any one company who would not be liable for super-tax is enormous, and if this tax were deducted at the source a special staff would be necessitated to deal with rebate claims. Another point is that every company at the present time needs a much larger capital for the proper conduct of its business than it did in

1914, owing to the depreciation of the currency and the corresponding depreciation in the value of all assets. Thus, a company, with assets valued at and represented by a nominal capital of \$10,000 in 1914, in actual fact, owing to this appreciation, is now worth at least \$20,000, and a dividend of 20 per cent on the nominal capital of \$10,000 is equivalent to only 10 per cent on the true capital. The inland Revenue proposes to exclude the increased value of land from the proposed taxation of war wealth. It does not seem altogether logical that a limited company should not equally be allowed to take into account the increased value of stocks since it now takes double the money to carry on the same business.

Royal Guests and the Curzon Wedding. Princess Victoria, although not officially present at the Curzon-Meyrick wedding at the Chapel Royal, St. James' Palace, this week, was able to watch the proceedings from a fine point of vantage from the quarters of Hon. Harry Storer in the palace which overlooks the Chapel Royal. This entrance to the chapel was reserved for the royal guests and the bride and bridegroom and her parents. Her royal highness, I noticed, stood some time with Miss Vivian watching the progress of events. It was quite easy for the princess to reach this point without appearing much under public view.

King Albert's height—he stands six feet four inches—is not always an advantage to his majesty. The motor car placed at his disposal had one of the tip-up seats for seating four passengers, and obviously came in the way of the king's long legs. On arrival at the chapel he asked for it to be removed before the return journey, which was accordingly done. His majesty, I am told, is thoroughly enjoying himself over here and when recognized at the wedding he and his consort were given a cheer which they obviously appreciated.

The Bride on the Cinema. I was told this week by a friend who was present at a house party last week at Lickworth Park that considerable amusement was caused by photographs of Lord Curzon's guests, who included the King and Queen of the Belgians, as well as the bride and bridegroom of this week's wedding. Lord Curzon himself arranged the groups, and was as helpful to the photographers, who arrived unexpectedly, as he could be, realizing no doubt, what interest the general public was taking in this wedding. The bride, Lady Cynthia Curzon, closely questioned the cinema operator as to when his film would be ready for exhibition, and expressed disappointment when she was told that it would not be released until the end of this week. "Oh, dear!" she said, "we shall be on our honeymoon then." The bride and bridegroom are spending their honeymoon at Cannes.

Bishop of Durham Dead. The death of the Bishop of Durham remains another very distinguished and mainly churchman of the older generation. Dr. Handley Moule was the son of a fine old-world English country clergyman whom the ablest of our Victorian novelists took for the model of the attractive clerical figure in "Fosco." Dr. Moule was a native of Dorchester, where he was born seventy-five years ago, and after a Cambridge career that was not lacking in scholarly distinction became dean of Trinity College and principal of Ridley Hall. He was Norwegian professor of divinity for two years before his appointment to the See of Durham in 1901. He took a leading part in the movement for the augmentation of clerical incomes, having himself sometimes seriously contemplated resignation owing to the impossibility of making ends meet even as a bishop on his available income. Among his distinguishing characteristics was a very retentive memory for finance, facts and scriptural texts. He was neither favorable to tobacco nor alcohol, carefully rechecking both himself all his life; and his great devotion, outside the work of his Christian church, was to astronomy. He studied the stars and believed in paper pennies!

Stay-at-home English people hardly realize the financial conditions prevailing on the continent. A friend, who has recently been holidaying on the Mediterranean in Algeria, tells me that the situation is such that coined money is practically non-existent. It is all paper money right down to the smallest centime. Cigarettes are sold at the rate of eighteen for thirty-five centimes, and an English money was offered at 1/2 francs are in circulation, below which it is almost impossible to obtain change. My friend had fourteen shillings in English money still left in his pocket when he arrived at Boulogne, and only after a long argument was he allowed to retain this by the special official appointed to search travelers to see how much money they have with them. The French do not mind your visiting their country or their colonies and spending your money there, but they take very good care that you do not take it away, and as one naturally does not know of these little regulations before embarking on the journey unpleasantness is likely to result when one is relieved of any surplus cash above the minimum allowed.

Returns to the Stage. It was with real pleasure that I witnessed the return of Miss Dorothy Minto to the stage after too long an absence, and as Jenima, the little Cockney maid in "Husbands for All," at the Little Theatre, she is inimitable. The action of the play is supposed to take place some few years hence, when legislation has been passed compelling all to have two wives of go to jail. Exemption from these "lateral marriages," as they are called, is granted only on the ground of age—forty is the age limit in the first act—incurable disease, or the possession of seven children. The Controller of Reconstruction, very neatly played by Campbell Gullion, is forty-one, and so exempt. He solved the food problem by the use of tabloids, the servant shortage by prohibiting the employment of all servants, and the falling population by this compulsory Mormonism. None of these measures are very popular. Men and two wives quarrel, and mistresses get over the servant law by calling the maid a paying guest. Jenima is one of these "guests" in the house of the wife of John Eastwood. He returns from four years

of exile, and on learning of the new laws declares himself a conscientious objector. The climax comes when parliament extends the age limit to fifty, and the controller comes within its scope. He finds the matter altogether different when viewed personally. Finally he obtains the repeal of the laws, and marries Coral, the girl with whom he has really been in love all the time. Miss Edna Best certainly possesses the ability to hold her audience, and has added another to her list of recent triumphs. Perhaps the plot may be a little thin. There is not very much incident, and the greater part of the story is in the first act, but there are some delightful dialogue and some really good laughs. What more can one expect of this and delightful Miss Dorothy Minto?

Imperative Vandalism. In one not unimportant sense it is true enough that London will never recover from the great war. That calamity has wrought more grievous ruin in the capital than even relatively the great fire did. The glory of London was in its parks and green spaces of grass and trees. The imperative necessity of the war, when the very department limited the frog in the fabric in the way of inflation and expansion, has taken from London much of that charm. The parks have suffered an invasion that can never be really repelled again. Unsightly erections of the worst modern architecture have sprung up where before 1914 there was even amid the roar of London's town life "enough peace to fill a nose-bag." And we are now threatened with a gratuitous invasion in the form of a Guards' memorial in St. James' Park. Everybody in London wants to honor the Guards. But why must that entail robbing London of still more of its few and last green patches? And that is not the end of it. The city churches are doomed likewise. Some of the most ancient and famous and beautiful must now be demolished. London is overcrowded with temples of commerce. These old churches are wrecks on the unpromising beach of the city. Down must come the demurets to make room for banks and offices. The church is too poor, perhaps in more senses than one, to resist the millions offered for the sites. Less vandalism was done by the German bombs than by the economic pressure of the German war.

Life's Little Earthquakes. The "head" of a famous London art school is celebrated not only for his incomparable art technique but also, and in hardly less degree, for his judicious art criticism, on occasion. It is his habit to make the rounds of his students at their work, and to help them with kindly suggestion. He always asks them to regard him, not as a professor or master, but as a student—with wider and perhaps better experience—singly wishful to help them on the thorny path of art. He will arrive, push the student impulsively off his or her stool or "donkey," and then examine the work on the easel. Sometimes his feelings become too much for him. Recently he evicted from her seat a girl student—then at the drawing, and then at the student. Then he suddenly and without a word left the student's seat and walked away. At a distance of about four yards, as the girl seated herself again at her easel, el maestro turned on his heels hand grasping chin, and regarded her astutely. And at last he spoke. What he said was—"Can you knit?"

Picture Sales. An examination of the lists kept in the entrance hall of Burlington House shows that pictures are selling at the Royal Academy this year much more freely than was the case before the war. There is a natural disposition to attribute these sales to the war profiteers, but perhaps it would be more correct to attribute it to the desire which exists in many quarters to find some means of investing money in a way which will enable it to escape the rapacious fingers of the tax-gatherer. Pictures, it is true, yield no dividends other than the sentimental one of the joy of possession. It is a notable fact, however, that artists have not advanced their prices to an

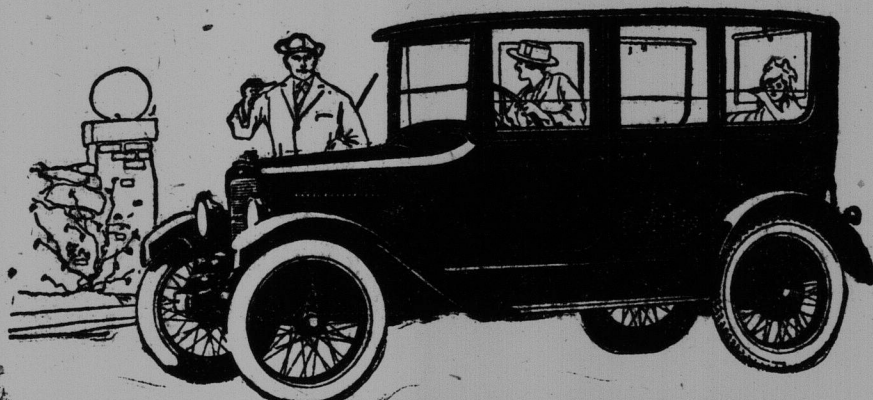

ZIONIST UNIT BRAVED JERUSALEM RIOTERS.

Nurses and Doctors Defied Menacing Arabs, Saving Wounded. The heroism of nurses and doctors of the American Zionist medical unit in saving for the wounded during the anti-Jewish riots in Jerusalem was described in New York by Emanuel Mohl of the Zionist Society of Engineers. He has just returned from Palestine, where he was engaged in Zionist engineering and reconstruction work. He said: "The riots broke out at 10 o'clock on Easter Sunday morning, and within half an hour the first wounded had been brought by the nurses and doctors into the medical unit's hospital. "I never saw such bravery and devotion to duty as these American men and women displayed. Part of them had to stay in the hospital to receive and attend the wounded. The rest were on the go constantly for two days, rushing through the streets in their trucks and ambulances, gathering up the wounded. "The red, six-pointed Star of David, worn by all members of the unit, combined with their resolute and determined courage, protected them. For not once were any of them molested by the Arab rioters. "I saw many examples where these nurses and doctors went boldly among the rioters and rescued the wounded, but

one striking case of heroism I never will forget was when three nurses walked straight through a crowd of menacing Arabs surrounding a house, and walked out with four old women, two old men and several children. "Another common sight, according to Mr. Mohl, was to see the nurses forming volunteer fire-fighting squads and pumping water from wells by hand to extinguish the blazing synagogues which the Arabs had fired. On several occasions he saw nurses enter the burning synagogues and emerge with the sacred scrolls of the law.

THE FARMER GOVERNMENT.

(Toronto Globe) Ontario's Farmer-Labor government has stood the test of its first session. Ontario has never had a government quite like it nor a session of the legislature quite like the one just finished. The old political party attack and defence has been missing. Never at any time has it been the "outs" against the "ins." Never on one single occasion have all the members of the opposition been united against the government, and it is probably equally true that never have all the members to the right of the speaker been unanimous on any of the questions which provoked wide differences of opinion. The house sat for twelve weeks, which is not a record for the province, but one

of the longest in the history of the legislature. With the experience gained during this session, the present government could do a similar amount of business again in less time. Premier Deary improved as a parliamentarian and leader in the house daily. No real crisis was reached in the house at any time. The difference with the U. P. O. bill proved a trivial affair after the premier and his cabinet had talked to the members. ## TYPES OF WINDOW GAZERS IN NEW YORK

Philosopher of the City Finds Much to Instruct Him in Observing Them.

(N. Y. Times.)  
A much-traveled commercial man who has made a study of window-gazers—persons who look out of windows for amusement—believes that New York has the possible exception of Philadelphia, has the greatest number and most varied types in the country. Some of his observations are here set forth:

"To begin with, there is the early morning type. On rising he looks out the window the first thing to take a survey of the weather. If the outlook is favorable he is likely to don his pajama ad at the window for some time, for he is sitting in the street below, and he is closely drawn shades of his neighbors in the apartment across the street. His delight is to survey the street in its country aspect of peace and quiet. He sadly reflects, will soon be rousing with urban, ear-splitting noises. A type common to upper Seventh avenue is the window-gazer who either as retired on a competence or feels that he has earned a rest by raising to manhood and womanhood a large family of good and daughters whom he permits to look after his comfort and well-being. He habitually sits at the window in such an attitude that his profile is presented to the view of passers-by. He is often in his shirt-sleeves, and in humid weather he toys carelessly with a large palm-leaf fan.

"Though he may appear disinterested, little that goes on in the street escapes him. He knows by sight, at least, the members of every family in the house and has picked up from second-hand gossip much information concerning them. He knows who the belles and beaux of the neighborhood are, and takes secret and intense delight in their love affairs. Bill collectors and B. & agents, who made his acquaintance long ago, regard him as a friend, since he is able to lead them on the track of persons they are seeking. In passing, it may be remarked that this type is an often a woman as a man, but the two sexes possess the same characteristics.

"A similar type is the woman who sits at the window, looking and smiling to acquaintances as they pass by. She usually holds a fluffy little white dog in her arms. She likes growing things, and a rubber plant does not repose nearby there is pretty sure to be a pot of ferns or a geranium on a table. There is the woman who takes her sewing, knitting or crocheting to the window, so that while she labors nothing of interest outside may escape her.

"On visiting Fifth Avenue the observer found it was particularly barren of window-gazers. He concluded that the socially prominent and wealthy were too exclusive or busy to indulge in this innocent amusement. In one imposing mansion near the park he caught sight of a housemaid waving a shy hand of greeting to a policeman, who in return gallantly doffed his cap, and in passing he saw several chess clubmen gazing intently and abstractedly at the avenue's swift moving traffic as though prohibition had taken all the charm and joy out of their lives.

"It was different on Riverside Drive. It is quite the thing there to find roomy and comfortable window seats in the big apartments which overlook the park and the river. On late afternoons these windows are often occupied by youthful and affectionate couples. A not unfamiliar sight is that of youthful couples seated at a window embrasure, taking turns feeding each other chocolates or bonbons.

"There are also to be found on the

Drive many children window-gazers to whom the warships and other craft in the river are a never ending fairyland of change and delight. On Morningside Heights, in the shadow of Columbia University, certain types of student window-gazers may occasionally be seen. They are for the most part pale youths in horn-rimmed glasses who are not true window-gazers, inasmuch as they devote their time to coming their textbooks and care little for what is going on in the street below. It is quite plain that they have sought the windows solely to get a better light by which to read and study.

The east side is not without its interesting types of window-gazers. On Summer nights one may see delightful little family groups gathered about these win-

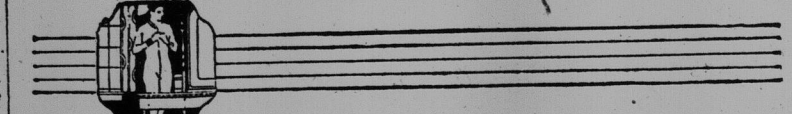

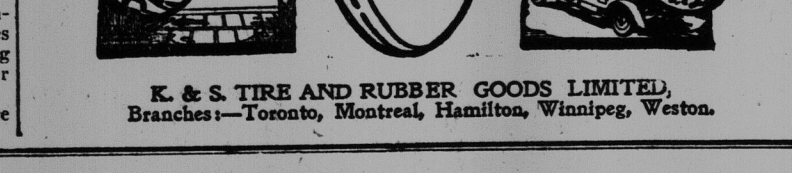

TRAVELING HOSPITAL TO TOUR NOVA SCOTIA

Out of Way Places Will Be Visited by Skilled Physicians, Surgeons, Dentists, Specialists and Nurses.

(Amherst News.)

The Red Cross has chosen two portable clinics as a way to offer a helping hand to some of the isolated rural districts of Nova Scotia. Every one knows of places that for many years have necessarily been more or less neglected from a medical and public health standpoint and where certain diseases and unhealthy conditions have flourished unchecked except by occasional emergency visits when some serious illness or epidemic has forced an overworked medical man or nurse to make a journey to these out of the way places.

Each of these two clinics will consist of motor trucks, motor ambulances and touring cars carrying medical specialists, dentists, a certain number of especially trained nurses, Red Cross representatives and others, together with equipment for a hospital of ten or a dozen beds. The hospital can be set up quickly in a school house or other suitable building. These clinics will usually stop for a day and a night at certain outlying road junctions which tap more or less remote districts. The people will be informed through the press and otherwise of the dates and places the clinics will open.

The activities of the clinics will include:

1. The teaching and improvement of local public health conditions.
2. Infant welfare work, medical inspection and in some cases if the parents desire, treatment of children, including those of school age.
3. Anti-tuberculosis work.
4. Dentistry, especially for children and emergency cases.

Who Can Help?

Medical men, dentists, nurses, welfare workers, car owners, drivers, garage men, repair men, moving picture operators, teachers, churches, Sunday schools, Children's Aid and all other societies and organizations calculated to make the word better.

It may not be possible to use all the volunteer help which becomes available but public recognition will be given to all who volunteer and as many as possible will be given a chance to share in some phase of the active work of the clinic.

A few weeks on the open road in a car with one of these clinics would be a glorious helpful way for a healthy red-blooded man or woman to spend a holiday and to help others less fortunate.

Only those resourceful owners and drivers who are fit for the road and whose roads should apply. Skilled lady drivers who can bring their own cars are acceptable. The recent war has shown what lady motor drivers can do.

The work of the clinics will be from early in July to the end of August so it is possible to estimate roughly from the suggested itinerary the approximate date the clinic will arrive in your section.


It is decided to concentrate the work of these clinics, aside from the tuberculosis aspect, on children, including those of school age. It is very desirable that arrangements be made whereby the professional men of the clinic see and inspect as large a proportion of the school children of the surrounding schools as possible. Practitioners, health officers, school teachers, trustees and school boards are requested to make special arrangements to have all children brought before the clinic during the days that it is in their part of the country. The same applies to children not yet of school age. It is intended to provide public health talks and entertainment for such children and parents as attend. You may rest assured that the time spent in visiting the clinic will not be wasted or altogether dull. Moving pictures and other instructive and entertaining features will be used.

The co-operation of medical and dental practitioners, nurses, teachers, trustees, school boards, churches, Sunday schools, Red Cross and Children's Aid societies, county, municipal and local councils and other public bodies is absolutely necessary to obtain the fullest benefit from the money expended.

A large proportion of the work with children will be done by the eye, ear, nose, throat and dental specialists as the defects of children are particularly of this character. It is intended to have these specialists so equipped that they can do minor surgical operations pertaining to their specialties.

In addition to the instructional work of the anti-tuberculosis leagues, it is proposed to carry with the clinics a trained specialist who will be able, in addition to his other duties, to consider with the local practitioners some of the doubtful and difficult cases of incipient tuberculosis. This specialist will carry with him as many of the latest important improvements in diagnosis as the capacity of the vehicles will permit. It



"That wouldn't do me any good," retorted the girl.

"Well, figure it out," urged Rogers. "There are 228,000 persons employed by the company."

"My," said the girl, "I didn't know there was that many in the world!"

"Now, fifty cents a day more for those 228,000 is \$119,000. Take seven times that, and then fifty-two times that; what do you get?"
