POPE'S LIFE THREATENED.

His Health Affected by Threatening Letters and Anarchist Plots Against His Lite.

NEW YORK, April 13.-Rumors that the Pope is ill are revived by a de-spatch from Rome which asserts that after celebrating mass at St. Peter's Monday, the pontiff spent a restless night and that he was much agitated when Dr. Lapponi reached the Vatican in response to a summons. A soothing potion was at once prescribed. The long ceremony in St. Peter's and fasting until one o'clock in the afternoon are believed to have been the cause. Some prelates of the inner circle admit, however, the correspondent asserts that the Pope has been much affected of late by reported anarchistic plots against his life. 


