





TO THE TEA TRADE OF CANADA

The year 1914 has passed, and during it we have sold the largest quantity of "SALADA" that we have in any year since it was first introduced to the public in 1892.

were able to get our stock in London, and after five weeks, the "Emden" having left the Bay of Bengal, the Admiralty permitted the resumption of sailings from Iudia and Ceylon. Thus we were relieved of our most apparent difficulties.

Last year there was imported into the Dominion 37 million pounds of all kinds of tea. We sold in "SALADA" packets nearly one-quarter of this total, viz., 8,192,063 pounds.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Jan. 26.—The total immi-ration to Canada in 1914 was 168,622 as compared with 418,838 in 1913, at decrease of 250,215 or nearly 60 per cent. The number from Great Britin was 49,831 as compared with 115,751 the year before, in 1913, from United States 68,609 as compared with 146,103. Homestead entries for the eleven months ended November 30, 1914, amounted to 24,142 as compared with 29,075 during the corresponding period of last year, a decrease of 4,933. Therr was an increase in Manitoba and a falling in Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.
