CHATHAM HAS **BIGGEST FIRE** IN LONG TIME

Four Houses, Two Barns, Several Sheds and Other Outbuildings Destroyed

FEARED FOR TOWN AT ONE TIME

Origin of Serious Outbreak is Mystery—Lumber Yards in Great Danger

Chatham, N. B., June 28—The most mysterious fire Chatham has experienced for some years occurred early this morning and resulted in the dection of four houses in Aberdee street, two large barns, several sheds and outbuildings with the greater part of their contents, besides doing comerable damage to other buildings in the vicinity. It started in a barn belonging to James Foley and by the ime the alarm was given had spread o several nearby buildings which were soon a mass of flames. When the fire department and citizens arriv ed the fire had made great headway and fanned by a strong westerly wind threatened to wipe out the entire east-ern section of the town.

Sparks and burning embers were carried a considerable distance and it required the services of a very large bucket brigade to put out the numerous fires caused by these falling on the roofs which owing to the long period of dry weather ignited very readily. On the opposite side of the street and also at some distance to the east a large quantity of lumber of various kinds belonging to the J. R. Snowball Co. was piled and had the fire succeeded in reaching this nothing could have saved the eastern portion of the town while the lumber loss would have been enormous.

to the value of \$45,000 has come into the possession of the Quebec Liquor Commission at practically no cost. The seizure was made under "the alcoholic liquor possession and transportation act," passed last session as the supplementary measure to the Quebec liquor law.

The Mquor was seized after coming from Ottawa over the bridges into Hull in motor trucks. They were allowed to pass but their destination was ascertained and subsequently the liquor was seized, some of it being found on the premises recently rented for the purpose of establishing a retail depot for the city of Hull, while cases were found in yards throughout the city.
