MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL TUESDAY

Vote to be Taken on Local Option—Fire Committee Get A Little More O'LEARY STREET

A meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. There were present: Councillors Pinault, Lunan, Alexander, Miller, Sanson, White and Ellsworth. The minutes of the previous meeting read and confirmed.

A communication from the Auditor General in charge of certifying of bonds was referred to Finance Committee.

Letter from Jas. Adams tendering his resignation as a policeman, was laid on the table.

Communication from Silas A. Perry of St. John and one from Wm. Savoy making application for position as policeman, were referred to Police and License Committee.

Communication from Mr. George Sanson requesting permit for steam laundry which referred to Fire Protection Committee and building inspector to report back to council.

Communication from Mr. D. Champoux requesting council to appoint a representative to attend meeting in New Carlisle on 19th in connection with railway and other matters. Councillor Pinault was appointed to attend the meeting.

Reports from the various committees recommending payment of accounts were received and adopted.

Councillor Pinault brought up the matter of O'Leary street widening. He informed the council that the price wanted by Mr. Ellsworth for twelve feet was \$200, and that ten day option had been secured through this price.

Twelve feet was not enough but Councillor Ellsworth was not willing to sell fifteen feet, nor anxious to sell twelve feet and the price was the lowest figure he would take.

After discussion a committee of Councillors Alexander, White and Pinault were appointed to go further into the matter and report.

Councillor Alexander read his report of the county council proceedings in January.

Town Solicitor McKenzie gave his written opinion on the legality of the liquor license petition presented at last meeting.

It was moved by Councillor Pinault, seconded by Councillor White, and carried, that arrangements be made for taking a vote on the license question at the same time as a poll is held for the election of Mayor and councillors.

The fire department requirements laid on table from last meeting were then taken up. After much discussion on these the committee were authorized to purchase a fire alarm bell and badges for the firemen.

Several annual reports were presented to council and were ordered to be printed in the town book.

The recommendation of the Police and License committee adopted at last meeting relative to Chief Hughes salary was on motion reconsidered.

On further consideration and discussion it was moved and carried that the chief's salary be increased to \$1000 per year without resigning the liquor license inspectorship. Increase to date from April 1st, 1913. The matter of the I.C.R. people not complying with the by-laws of the town, raised some interesting points, especially the blocking of crossings, which is an old offense of the I.C.R. It was arranged that the Town Clerk call the attention of the authorities to the matters complained of.

A report from the Police and License Committee recommending the appointment of Silas A. Perry as policeman, salary \$50 per month, was received and adopted. Council adjourned.

SCHOOL GIRL HAS SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Horse Running Through School Grounds Knocks Child Down Breaking Leg

On Wednesday forenoon a rather serious accident occurred at the school grounds whereby Ethel Sanson, aged 12 had her left leg broken and her hip and head bruised.

Two teams driven by Mr. Jas. Hachey were taking a short cut by driving through the school grounds, where the children were playing at recess time, and the leading horse being unattended took fright at something and bolted, knocking the girl down and inflicting the injuries. Mr. Hachey was in the rear team, and the leading horse was upon the girl before she could get out of the road. The injured girl was immediately taken to her home and medical aid summoned. She is now making satisfactory progress.

Some comment has been passed on the street as to the fact of teams crossing the school grounds, and other private property, and some notice should be taken of this.

According to law, such persons are committing trespass, and notice of driving regulations should now be made public.

VICTORIAS STILL UNCONQUERED

Campbellton Hockey Team Still Continues to Sweep All Before Them

Campbellton hockey team by consistent play have shown that they merit the highest position, and are on a plane with the best amateur teams in the provinces.

Last Friday they defeated a strong team from Laval University (Quebec), by 4 to 1, a goodly crowd viewing the match.

On Wednesday evening the strong going Marysville seven were entertained here, and went down to defeat just as the others.

The game was strenuously fought out on soft ice, and it was 1-2 minutes before Matthews made the first tally, the bell ringing before the team got back to centre ice.

After the interval Wade for Marysville, got through and notched their first point, and five minutes later, Fraser after a clever rug, and shot scored number two for the Vics.

The game was slowing down the conditions of the ice affecting the players, but the much needed tillip was given when Wade scored the second goal for the visitors which many claimed was not in the net.

WRECK ON I. C. R. AT NEWCASTLE

Newcastle, N. B., March 10.—A wreck on the main line of the I.C.R. near Derby Junction blocked traffic for about eight hours and delayed the Maritime this morning. A car on McKenzie's special, which passed here about one o'clock, left the rails at the "Y," just outside Newcastle yard, but kept its position in the train along the sleepers and across the northwest bridge till it reached the switch at the Junction. Here it rolled off the track and six cars were piled up, but no one was hurt. A wrecking crew was at once sent from here, and the track cleared by 10 o'clock.

NEW POLICY FOR THE CROWN LANDS

All Licenses to be Renewable Yearly for Long Term Periods—Re-survey Provided for

SEPARATE LEASES
(Special to Graphic)

Fredericton, March 13.—In the Legislature this afternoon Premier Fleming will introduce a bill entitled, An Act respecting the crown timber lands of the province. The bill provides a new policy for the administration of the crown timber lands in New Brunswick, and is one which carries out the promises given by the Premier to the different delegations who have waited upon the government.

In the bill there are a number of distinct innovations. The interests of the large limit holders are reasonably protected, while at the same time the so-called small operators are to be given a reasonable opportunity for successfully carrying on the operations of their mills.

The principal provisions of the bill are:

Provision for the encouragement of the establishment of pulp and paper industries in the province so that New Brunswick may have the benefit of having its raw products manufactured within its borders.

Two classes of licenses will be issued an and after August 1st next, viz:

(a) The pulp and paper license.
(b) The saw mill license.

The pulp and paper license, renewable from year to year for a period of thirty years, may be extended for a further period of twenty years subject to the payment of a bonus for a thirty years privilege and at the expiration of that time of another bonus for the next twenty years.

The saw mill licenses are renewable from year to year for twenty years, and may be extended for a further period of ten years, with bonuses payable for the privilege of each period the same as with the pulp and paper license.

Present license holders must notify the Surveyor General by June 15th next that they will come under the new licenses on August 1st, 1913, or continue under the existing licenses.

The bonuses to be paid per square mile under the new leases shall be payable as follows: Pulp and paper licenses one-third each on August 1, 1913, August 1, 1923, and August 1, 1933; saw mill licenses, one-half each on August 1, 1913 and August 1, 1923.

The power to determine the stumpage rates and make regulations governing the crown lands is affirmed in the lieutenant governor-in-council.

lands for a period of twelve years before the expiration of their leases and not cut off them but allow them to reproduce, are to have the privilege of cutting these lands ten years after the expiration of the lease without payment of a bonus and by paying only a stampage and mileage fee.

A survey, examination, and classification of the crown lands of the province is to be completed by August 1st, 1917, one year before the present leases expire.

Provision is made that in the event of the survey, examination and classification of the crown lands showing that the present license holders have a fair lease on territory producing more timber than is necessary for their needs, a portion of these lands not exceeding twenty five per cent can be taken out of the existing lease and leased to mill owners upon the application to the lieutenant governor-in-council.

A TALE OF WOE

Can't Carry Jugs, Dimes Have Taken Wings, Needs Another Mole and Things

The woes of the overburdened mail carrier since the parcel post law went into effect are faithfully depicted in a letter received today by Representative Thomas W. Hardwick who is informed by his constituent that Congress has placed the rural mail carrier in "a devil of a fix" and that immediate relief is sought.

The letter, which Mr. Hardwick regards as a gem in its line is from F. T. Deacon, of Irwinton, Ga., and reads, in part, as follows:

"I seat myself with pen in hand to write you a few lines to let you know that you have played the devil with me. I am the mill from Mc Intyre to Irwinton, and I took the contract to carry the mail three times a day, distance three and one-half miles, for \$819 a year. At that time the express company was doing a pretty good business and I got 10 cents and a drink for every jug.

"You fixed the laws so I couldn't carry the jug, and now you have fixed up a thing called the possum post and the express company does not handle any more small packages, nor do I handle any more dimes. When I made this contract I could carry the mail in a road cart and a Texas pony and haul the express on the side, now the express has shrunk and this post business has swelled so I have to get a mule and waggon.

"Now, when I made this trade to carry the mail I didn't know anything about the darn foolishness of sending live stock and farming implements through the mail. I thought that this was just campaign talk and had no idea that Congress would be fool enough to pass any such law. I ain't a man to quit his job, and I never get my bondsmen in trouble, but I tell you this thing is getting serious, and I want some help.

"You have just about ruined the express company and you have worse than ruined me. The express company has made enough to quit, but I not making a good square living at first, and now I am working for nothing and feeding myself. I wouldn't mind working three more years for nothing, but the feed is about out.

"Can't you make some arrangements about this thing? You know they should not add the express business to my mail contract. If you know of any relief, study it up and write me. I know that Uncle Sam doesn't want one of his hard-working citizens to do the express companies' business for nothing. I am willing to do the work if you will get me a pair of mules.

"See the man who handles the money up there and ask him if he will not raise my wages or cut Mc Intyre and Irwinton off from the post business."

Below we give the record of a pair of nine White Orpingtons belonging to Mr. Frank Smith, a New Brunswick farmer, who conscientiously endeavored to produce the best result possible from a small flock. The record established does not furnish anything specially remarkable, but the account is interesting. If for no other reason than that such a pullet was named, and the owner has been able to give the time, each commenced to lay and the number of eggs laid up to a certain time. Mr. Smith states that at the time these pullets started laying it was from 20 to 25 degrees below zero. In January he received 97 eggs from the five oldest birds, following is the interesting record:

BASIS OF BUSINESS

President Taft Says It is a Protective Tariff

One of the most striking features of the recent United States Presidential campaign is the tenacity with which the three candidates have adhered to the principle of moderate protection as the policy calculated to contribute materially to the national development of the country. In speaking on the tariff question last year President Taft said: "The business of the country rests on a protective-tariff basis. The public keenly realize that a disturbance of business by a change in the tariff and a threat of injury to the industries of the country ought to be avoided, and that nothing could help so much to minimize the fear of destructive changes as the known existence of a reliable source of information for legislative action. The deep interest in the matter of an impartial ascertainment of facts before any new revision was evidenced by an effort to pass a tariff-commission bill in the short session of the Sixty-first Congress, in which many of both parties united."

In his reference to the Wilson tariff of 1894 which gave manufacturers free wool but provided for duties on woollen manufactures the President said: "It is the only experience we have had for a generation of a radical revision of this schedule, and without exaggerating its importance, one pledged to a moderate protection policy may well hesitate before giving approval without full information to legislation which makes a more radical reduction in the protection actually afforded to manufacturers of wool than did the Wilson Act."

"BUY CANADIAN-MADE GOODS"

The above maxim is one that should seriously be considered by each and every Canadian citizen, for it is one of great moment and importance to the condition and welfare of our country seeks to attain. The result of purchasing abroad goods and materials which can be supplied at home is strikingly displayed by government statistics, which form sufficient evidence to prove that Canada is not in the position it should command through its trade and commerce. To purchase beyond the country's means will in time cause results of a noticeable character and this is being done at present at a rate, unsatisfactory to Canadian industry. Money expended in this way must cause a reaction sooner or later, and the credit of the country must naturally be impaired in the case of any individual who spends beyond his means. Expenditure must be concentrated and made in the country in which it is earned, before the effect of original earnings will accumulate. In purchasing goods abroad, Canadian raw material and labor must naturally become less desirable. Attached to such a condition of affairs are unsatisfactory labor conditions, poorer grades of material and other accumulated effects. It is clearly the duty of patriotic citizens of Canada to build up a country where money can be secured at any time in a desired but with expenditure being kept outside, no security can be given and conditions must deteriorate.







RELIGIOUS CENSUS IN THE DOMINION

Ottawa, March 10.—The census department has issued its bulletin on religions as enumerated in the census of 1911.

The Anglicans increased in ten years by 53,05 per cent.; Roman Catholics, 26,06; Methodists, 17,87; Presbyterians, 32,39; Baptists, 20,38; and Salvation Army, 82,71.

W.C.T.U. COLUMN

This department is conducted by the local Union, and is under the charge of an Editor appointed by them. This Editor assumes the responsibility for the statements and articles which appear in this column.

The Standard of St. John, gives the corrected figures for the recent election in Ontario. In order to change the conditions in any municipality in Ontario, 60% of the vote must be one way.

Only one municipality, that of Acton, secured the necessary majority to revert from prohibition to license. Twenty-six reached the needful per centage for doing away with license; thirty-seven gave a majority on the same side, but not one sufficiently large. The remaining thirteen voted for the retention of license.

Of the four hundred municipalities under prohibition, only twenty-two had contests. As before stated, only one reverted to license. The net result is four hundred and twenty-five now under prohibition, and fifty one still under license. It is to be remembered that thirty-seven of these rolled up a majority against license although they could not touch the 60 per cent mark.

We are counting. Ninety per cent of Ontario is dry under a law which requires three fifths of the total vote cast to make a change from license to prohibition, back to license.

PUSH FACTORY LIFE

Western Boards of Trade Want Industrial Activity Stimulated.

The people of Western Canada, particularly those in towns and cities are alive to the necessity of developing activity in manufacturing in the West. This subject was one of the chief topics of discussion at the convention in Moosejaw of the Associated Boards of Trade of Western Canada. A resolution was adopted calling upon the Governments of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta to emphasize technical education as a means of stimulating industrial activity on the plains. The resolution expressed the desire of the West to work up its own raw materials into manufactures for the local outside markets, thus conserving for the prairie most of the profits and by-products which now go to waste. The resolution recited the fact that nine-tenths of the youths of Western Canada wish to go into industrial careers. If these are to be kept at home and not lost to the United States, the establishment of manufacturing industries beyond the Great Lakes must continue to be fostered by moderate protection. In supporting the resolution, Mr. J. Chey-Whin of Moosejaw, declared that no country could become great without manufactures. "The cities," he said, "are crying for industries, and the whole (Western) country is in need of industries."

BAD FAILURE IN QUEBEC CITY

H. M. Price & Co., Lumber Merchants, Went Into Liquidation

Quebec, March 7.—Much surprise and a good deal of sympathy has been caused in local commercial circles by the failure of H. M. Price & Co., lumber merchants of this city, with liabilities to the extent of \$400,000. A few days ago the Eastern Townships Lumber Company made a demand that the firm should go into liquidation, and in accordance with this demand the company to day consented to abandon their property for the benefit of their creditors.

SUFFRAGETTES REAPING SAD CROP

The people in England have at last turned against the ultragettes, and are giving them some of their own medicine. Crowds are assembling whenever a meeting is called, and the speakers are howled down, and only escape violence because the police are on hand to protect the militants. There can only be one end to this warfare—the defeat of the sisters of destruction. For the strongest and bravest women are no match for an angry mob when it comes to rough and tumble. The suffragettes are reaping the crop they sowed.

BIRD FLEW FROM ENGLAND TO NATAL

London, March 10.—Results of great interest to bird lovers are being obtained from the "ringing" of birds which is being carried on a large scale in England. Some 32,000 of these rings have been affixed, and the bird wearers are being recaptured in places far remote from the spot where they were "ringed."

At a farmhouse on the Kooodeyand Farm, some eighteen miles from Utrecht, in Natal, was captured on December 23 a swallow bearing on its leg a metal label with the words "Whiterby, High Holborn, London," and the number B 830. The ring was sent to England, and has been identified by Mr. Whiterby as one which on May 6, 1911, was placed on an adult swallow at Rosehill, Cheadle, Staffordshire, by J. R. B. Masefield. The bird, which thus made a journey of some 6,000 miles, was one of a pair which nested in Mr. Masefield's porch, and the other bird was ringed at the same time. Mr. Masefield at the same time ringed two other birds, and one of these returned to nest in his porch in the following summer.

MOUNT ALLISON UNIVERSITY

The first graduating class of Mount Allison University obtained their degrees in 1863. It is the intention to hold in May of this year a re-union of all graduates who have passed through the university since that time, to commemorate the fiftieth graduation. Students representing practically every year are to be found scattered through Canada and it is anticipated that the proposed re-union will be one of very great interest. There is the hope, too, that at this meeting the University authorities will be in a position to announce that they have secured sufficient additional endowment to justify those extensions of the work which have been in contemplation for years. These extensions will include the establishment of a chair in Biology so that Mount Allison students may be able to place themselves on a par with those of other colleges upon entering McGill medical courses. There will, it is hoped, be some announcement of the establishment of additional chairs in Philosophy and Arts, and assistance to the present over-worked staff of instructors. These changes will however, mean a lot of money and the quarter million which it is hoped to raise in the coming forward movement will not be any too much for all that is contemplated. Yet in view of the very great importance of Mount Allison to the Maritime Provinces and to Canada as a whole, it is not anticipated that there will be any serious difficulty in securing the necessary endowment. The total enrollment in the University, Ladies College, and Academy this year is something over seven hundred, of which number three hundred and thirty are students in the University. This is in very marked contrast to the first graduating class which numbered only two.

Yet the financial growth of the institution has not kept pace with the development along other lines. It is true that the Ladies College with its able faculty in the Conservatory of Music, and its splendidly equipped Art School, has been able to carry on its work with a fair financial success, but in the University different conditions have had to be met, and in spite of the most careful system of management, the revenues of the institution have not been sufficient to meet the ever increasing cost of operation. Mount Allison white a denominational college, has never applied denominational tests, either in the case of the professor, or the student. And make the claims upon denominations, as an important factor in the educational life of Canada. Mount Allison means too much to the business and intellectual life of Canada to be allowed by her old students to drop behind in the race.

N. S. MAN SHOT WHILE SLEEPING.

How Colin M. Kelly Met Death in the Yukon.

Halifax, N. S., Mar. 12.—The body of Colin M. Kelly, of Halifax, who was killed about fifty miles from Dawson a few weeks ago arrived Monday night on the C. P. R. Some facts of the tragedy are given in the following letter received from C. W. Cash, superintendent of the Royal mail service on the White Pass and Yukon route, dated February 12th, 1912: "Your brother's remains arrived here from Dawson by stage, and I am shipping the body with a escort by tomorrow's train to Skagway. Relative to the death of your brother. The first information I received was in the form of a telegram from our Dawson agent on the 29th ult., to the effect that the north bound stage had just arrived and that the driver had reported the death of the roadhouse keeper, his wife and your brother, and that the appearances indicated a double murder and suicide. W. F. Smith, the roadhouse man. The Dawson police started immediately for the scene of the tragedy, and the verdict of the coroner's jury was simply that Smith fired rifle shots resulting in the death of his wife and your brother, and then suicided."

The probable effect of the reduction, in his opinion, will be to give a larger profit to be split between the wholesaler and the retailer. Mr. Riddell has been lumbering conditions in both Maine and New Brunswick, and regards this as an excellent year for the lumbermen.
