Mr. Editor,
If the article signed "Mentor" in your last paper was written by a friend to the cause of temperance, I can easily understand the motive which dictated the course he has adopted, and I should suppose that the very simplest could hardly be deceived as to his purpose, from the bluntness of the arguments brought forward and the direct innuendo inculcated throughout. On the other hand, if "Mentor" be in earnest, and advocate with sincerity the views which he has advanced, it is high time for the phalanx which is arrayed in defence of mankind being temperate, orderly, and virtuous, to gird on its armour, and take the field in open opposition to its avowed foes.

Encouraged by the promised support of a number of friends, it is the intention of the writer to publish a small monthly paper, dedicated exclusively to the advancement of Temperance. The want of such a periodical has been regretted publicly and privately, and it is supposed such an undertaking would be encouraged here as well as in other places. There are at present two temperance papers in the Province, and it is remarkable that in one of them an account is given of the Societies throughout the Province, in which not the slightest allusion is made to the spread of temperance in the County of Charlotte. The obvious reason for this silence is the want of any public means for the diffusion of our temperance doings, and this what I propose to supply.

The expression of these truths may be looked on by you, Mr. Editor, as an indirect censure on the Standard; but I think you will admit that papers which are not solely devoted to the furtherance of temperate habits, take an interest in the proceedings of Societies formed for that purpose, and refuse to fill their columns with such matter as the friends of temperance require. But the proposed publication will obviate this, and in consequence of the amalgamation of the several temperance bodies into one general County Society, which original matter in the shape of Essays, Speeches and Reports will require publicity, and would naturally appear in the columns of the paper I propose.

It is my design to commence the first number of the paper with an account of the rise and progress of the St. Andrews Temperance Society; and I shall employ diligent means to procure correct information of such doings throughout the County and elsewhere. The subscription I have no doubt will be well received by a large and influential number of the friends of temperance, who will zealously encourage this publication, which will be printed at a very moderate price. The first number will appear immediately after the great County Temperance meeting which will be held here in April; in the meantime prospectuses and subscription list will be handed round, in order to ascertain what number of copies should be struck off.

Those appointments are the prerogative of the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of his Council, and archbishop distinctions as well as a branch of constitutional power; but if they are to be obtained by Petition and the popular voice heard concerning them, we might as well adopt the Balfour system.

We regret to observe that a considerable number of the American papers which have of late come under our notice will continue to manifest the most anxious to make common cause with the gang of murderers and rebels who lately abandoned from this Colony. This is evident from the desire which they exhibit of making the most of every flying report, however ridiculous or improbable which tends in the least degree to lower the Royal cause, and elevate that of the rebels in the estimation of their readers. But let the gossamer editors, as Capt. Denbow would facetiously denominate them, beware how they continue to express themselves. The time rapidly approaches when they, and the unprincipled men to gratify whose appetites their pen and pencil will be compelled to lower their tone. Success may for a time attend their present unhallored efforts, but this will not long continue to be the case. An unjust cause was never yet eventually successful in either the moral or political world, and we venture to argue that they who have been officious enough to interfere in the affairs of this Colony will have ample cause of repentance. The inhabitants of the United States accustomed only to guerrilla expeditions have been led much to overrate their strength. Hence proceeds that spirit of gossaming for which they stand unrivalled in the world. Because, forsooth, they have driven with a degree of difficulty which they are unable to conceal even from themselves a few hordes of shivering savages before them into the fastness of the wilderness, they have flattered themselves into the belief that they are a match for any nation in Europe. To the laughter of the civilized world they bulled and blustered with France until the good natured King William interposed his kind offices to save them from the punishment which otherwise the fiery indignation of the Frenchmen would have inflicted upon them, and now to show their gratitude they turn round and snap at the hand of their benefactor.—Toronto Herald.
