The Fishery Question.

The prospect of trouble is increasing between the Dominion and the United States arising out of fishing disputes. The Dominion Government determined at the commencement of the season to enforce its rights, and to drive off all interlopers. "Peter Mitchell's navy" has captured a large number of American fishermen, caught within the three mile limit, or otherwise infringing the law. All this has, of course, aroused the fishing interest in the States to a high state of belligerency.

The renowned Butler recently delivered a speech, snuffing of fire and brimstone, to his constituents, in which he said to them, "fish where you please and fight the vessel that attempts to prevent you." Butler's utterances towards England are always warlike; but in this case he is the exponent of a large party in the States that believes that a fisherman has a right to catch fish wherever they are found. They claim that the pretensions that would prohibit off the great deep into fishing preserves and punish those who catch fish, to which there cannot be more exclusive title to ownership than to the sea itself, are feudal in their nature and utterly at variance with modern notions.

This doctrine finds great favor with the fishing "ring," who believe in anything meeting their grasping designs. While this free trade doctrine of fishing anywhere is equitable as regards Dominion waters, Dominion fishermen are excluded from American waters.

The more moderate and reasonable of the American papers, in discussing this question, argue in favor of some genuine reciprocity between the two countries, that will settle the matter and avert dangerous complications. Others again are jubilant at this difficulty and the irritation it produces, and propose keeping it unsettled to be another item in their open account with England. Our countrymen hope and complacently contemplate, in imagination, the time when England's army and navy will be engaged in facing some foreign foe. Uncle Sam intends then demanding the payment of his little bill, which will of course include our fisheries.

The policy adopted by the Dominion, objectionable perhaps in some respects, is not barren of good results. The American people are being pretty effectively awakened to the value of our trade and fisheries, and to the advantage of dealing in a good neighborly way with us; and the prospect of reciprocity is much greater than when we weakly yielded up valuable rights and privileges and received nothing in return.

The War.

Delays are dangerous to the Prussians. Their onward tide of victory is stayed before the walls of Paris. They have completed their circuit of works about Paris, and commenced the work of bombardment and siege, but that is all. Their guns have not a range beyond the outskirts of the city. When the shot and shell commenced to rain into the city and shattered houses began to fall about the heads of the inhabitants and the flames make devastating pathways, it was supposed the soft and pleasure seeking Parisians would become terrified and panic stricken and before this would have yielded. But that picture has not been realized yet. The fortifications surrounding Paris are of a formidable character. They are extensive, but all that engineering skill could do to make them perfect has been done. The artillery, too, corresponds with the fortifications. Three hundred thousand men, under Trochu, are drilling within the fortifications and already evince the steadiness of veterans in the sort of they make. Paris is represented to be well provisioned. The Prussians, on the contrary, are living on a country already laid waste. They have to transport all provisions and material immense distances. Their guns are not all of high calibre and as yet they have not found it possible to shell the city. Their lines are frequently broken by French attacks, and the fire from Mont Valerien has created some destruction. Trochu's policy to worry and harass his enemy; to avoid any general engagement beyond Paris, but to fight the Prussians from the cover of his fortified defences is so far very successful. Its continuing success and the prospect of a peace honorable to France depends up on the resources of Paris and the determination and united efforts of its population.

Agricultural Exhibition.

The Sackville and Westmorland Agricultural Society's Exhibition is being held today. The weather is fine and the attendance of farmers good. The interest taken in these exhibitions is yearly on the increase. The number of competitors is about ninety. The number of entries about seven hundred. The number of competitors of farming utensils, roots, grains, butter, cheese, manufactures, &c., is sixty. The show of roots was never better. We noticed fine lots of potatoes and beets. Cabbages and corn look well. Home-spun, flannels, carpets and hearth rugs are in great variety. The increasing taste and skill displayed by housewives in this vicinity in making the latter article is a matter of comment.

The number of bulls exhibited was eleven; sheep forty-five; fifteen heifers and nine milch cows; ten pairs of steers; four pairs of working oxen; sixteen draught horses of various ages; twenty-five roadsters, varying from one to four years old, and eleven roadsters of any age.

The stock brought in Canada by the Provincial Board and afterwards sold at the Fredericton Exhibition and bought in for the Sackville and Westmorland Society, was auctioned off as follows: Clydesdale Horse, T. D. Vickery, \$275; Short Horn Durham Bulls—Baron Clayton, J. D. Dixon, \$18; "Clock Mahon," Wm. Cole, \$26; Durham Heifers—Flora, Albion Fawcett, \$80; "Fair Queen," Wesley Fawcett, \$125; "Rose," Wm. George, \$135; "Jelly," T. D. Vickery, \$80; total, \$788. The sale was considered good, the stock having brought about half what it cost.

Branch Railway to the Wharves.

Great inconvenience has been experienced the present season by shippers, at this port, in the conveyance of lumber and heavy goods between the Railway Station and the place of shipment. The delay and expense attending it has injured our trade and convinced our merchants that any further delay in connecting the railway with our wharves will occasion loss to the railway as well as to our shipping interests. A petition was sometime since forwarded to the Minister of Public Works, Mr. Langvin. Since then he has visited the locality. As he has expressed himself favorably, we hope the commissioners will move in the matter at once.

DRAMATIC ENTERTAINMENT.—The Dorchester Amateur Dramatic Club gave an entertainment at Bowes Hall, last evening. The programme embraced "Solon Shingle," "A Fruitful Discourse," and "Paddy Miles' Boy." "Solon Shingle" was represented by Mr. W. M. Ross. This character was spiritedly and naturally rendered and elicited frequent bursts of applause. Howard, the People's Lawyer, was well rendered by Mr. H. J. McGrath; Winslow by Mr. W. B. Wallace; John Ellsley by Mr. H. Bronnell; Chas. Otis by Mr. E. A. Charters; and Tripper by Mr. A. T. Hicks, were all truthfully represented. All the good points in "A Fruitful Discourse" were well brought out and made very laughable by Mr. W. M. Ross. "Paddy Miles' Boy" was capably acted by Mr. H. J. McGrath. Mrs. Fidget and Miss Fidget were well acted and sustained their parts. The Hall is locally adapted for any performance of this nature and in giving it here the Club had to bear up against serious disadvantages; still the whole performance was very creditable, and parts of it could not be well excelled by professionals. The gentlemen composing the Club deserve praise for obtaining a nice outfit of scenery &c.; and for the talent displayed in their presentations. The hall was comfortably filled.

The Death of General Lee.

The great Virginia Captain, Robert Edmund Lee, is dead. He became known to the world as the unsuccessful defender of the beleaguered capital of a rebellious people; yet wherever nobility of heart is revered and genius admired, will the memory of General Lee be cherished. He was defeated, yet he retained the entire confidence of his soldiers and people. He was a rebel, yet his honesty was such as to win the respect of the most loyal. His armies were overthrown, yet as a soldier his fame stands unsurpassed among the most successful military leaders of modern times. Even after his surrender he was capable of wielding immense power—the whole South looking up to him as a father—yet he gave up all ambitious schemes.

Lee was born in Virginia, in 1807. He graduated at West Point and received a commission as second lieutenant in 1829. He saw considerable service in the Indian and border wars, in which he won distinction, until 1861, at the breaking out of the Rebellion. He was then Colonel Lee, and on the staff of General Scott, the Commander-in-Chief of the United States army. His subsequent history; how he sided with and shared the fortunes of his native State; Virginia; how he was made commander of Virginia troops and when the days of misfortune came fast upon the Confederacy, he was invested with the supreme command; how for long months and months he struggled, with a defeated and disheartened army, to fight back the Northern hosts from the fatal city of Richmond; how he and his skeleton battalions at last succumbed and surrendered—all this is fresh in the minds of our readers. Since then he has lived in retirement, and occupied himself principally with the duties of his office as President of Washington College, Virginia.

The news of his death produced a scene of mourning throughout the South seldom witnessed, showing how intense was the affection and reverence felt for him by the Southern people. The long continued depressing influence incident to responsibilities resting upon him during the last year of the war, the disastrous termination of the struggle in which all his energies were enlisted, and the afflictions of the South since the surrender of the rebel armies—or, in short, mental and physical fatigue was the cause of his death. He was first attacked with stupor, Sept. 28th, from which he never rallied.

A subscription list was opened and about \$100 volunteered. Some of the young men, who have to perform statute labor this year, are loudly complaining that they have been roughly handled by the Commissioner, Mr. Gilbert, who has put all the accounts in a mangy-trade's hands, thus compelling them to pay 80 cts. instead of 50 cts. I also understand that about 20 of them have been fined, thus adding costs.

AN Agricultural Fair takes place, we understand, in Amherst, on Saturday.

MALCOLM Ross, keeper of the Bird Island Light House, was killed last week, by the bursting of a gun.

WINSTON has produced the champagne squash—it measures six feet, and weighs 116 lbs.

A BANK of 341 tons was launched at Port Moncton, Quebec Co., N. S., last week.

"The Gazette" says Robert Donkin, Esq., ex M. P. P., for Cumberland, has been appointed warden of the Provincial Penitentiary.

HALIFAX is the headquarters of the British forces in the Dominion. Leading military officials are beginning to arrive there.

The Presbyterian Church, at Yarmouth, presented their Pastor, Rev. G. Christie, with \$112 on the 21st anniversary of his pastorate.

SPORTING.—Several Moose and Caribou have been killed this season in Cumberland County, where they are unusually plentiful.

A "MONTREALER" visited upper streets of Halifax last week. He mourns the loss of a watch and \$50. Another victim of miss-placed confidence.

BISHOP McKINNON, of Africville, blessed a new bell at St. Andrew's, Antigonish, on the 9th inst. The bell, which weighs 906 lbs., was made by Messrs. Lemery, of Troy.

GOVERNMENT ELECTION, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Governor Archibald, takes place on Tuesday, 31st Nov. Nominations, day, 1st.

The Antigonish salt works were sold in Halifax, on 14th, for \$25,200. This included 3 1/2 acres of land, 3 buildings, pump-steam engine, tools, plant, &c. This property cost \$30,000.

NEW SENATORS.—Alexander McFarlane, Esq. of Wallace, and Jeremiah Northup, Esq. of Halifax, have been gazetted Senators of the Dominion in place of the Hon. Messrs. Ritchie and McCully appointed to the Bench of the Supreme Court.

A LAD named Joseph White was detected, a few days since, at Halifax, in robbing a till in the store of John A. MacKassay. He had pushed through a small hole in the window a stick, the end of which was rubbed with soap. Coins in the open till adhered to the stick.

THREE naval deserters were arrested at Tanguar on 15th for being implicated in the Montague affair. They were not recognized by Angus Munro as the parties who robbed him and cut his throat, and were accordingly handed over to the naval authorities.

THE CENSUS.—John Costley, Esq. of Halifax, and Amos Purdy, Esq. M. P. P., of Cumberland, have been appointed Commissioners for taking the census in Nova Scotia. Mr. S. Fulton, of Wallace, has been appointed Commissioner for Cumberland.

SEIZURES of fourteen schooner have been made by Mr. Keer, Customs Detective, in the counties of King's and Annapolis, for violating the act respecting Customs, 31 Vict. Cap. 10. About \$8000 have been paid in fines. The schooner "America" 86 tons is to be sold at Cannings, on Saturday, 15th proximo.—*Mail.*

ON 4th a man named Thompson, died in the city hospital, Halifax, from the effects of a kick. He had gone into a store some days previously and the clerk told him he might take a few poms from a box, which he did. The proprietor seeing him in the act seized him and kicked him out.

FATAL AFFAIR.—Ansley Elliott, of Port George, Annapolis County, being attacked on Tuesday last by a man named Fitzpatrick, who had an old grudge against him, he turned around and fought him, and was killed by a blow on the head with a potato fork with which he was digging at the time. The blow fractured Fitzpatrick's skull, and his life is despaired of. Elliott gave himself up to the authorities.

FATAL SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—At Weymouth, on Wednesday morning, three boys were sitting on a log with a gun lying on the ground behind them. One of them, named Sanlier, got up, and in lifting the gun it went off, shooting a young man named Smith Cunningham, who, after walking a few steps and exclaiming, "Run for a doctor," fell and expired.—*Yarmouth Herald.*

ON the opening of the Circuit Court, at Amherst, last week Judge Ritchie was presented with a complimentary address by Mr. James Sproule, the Foreman of the Grand Jury, on their behalf, and one also by Hon. R. B. Riekey, signed by the Sheriff, Prothonotary, and sixteen Barristers.

HALIFAX intends getting up a boat race next summer and challenging the world. Four thousand dollars is to be the prize. The people there are already calculating how much it will pay. Fifty thousand people, it is said, would visit Halifax. Board and lodging \$10, per head, all around. Then the retailers will reap a rich harvest in supplying new clothing, boots, shoes and gloves, to the amount of say, \$1,000,000. The Halifax people are ingenious.

The fur trade in the North West is placed in quarantine. The Collector at Pembina has been ordered to refuse all furs coming from the districts of Red River where the small pox prevails.

JOHN HARRIS, Esq. of Sackville, took several prizes at the exhibition in Fredericton, this month, and sold there a cow, a two year old heifer and a calf for \$275. This proves good stock is appreciated amongst our New Brunswick farmers.

MUSICAL CONCERTS.—The announcement of Prof. Spinnery, Champion Tencer Singer, will be seen in another column. He has been on a successful tour through Nova Scotia and delivers his first concert in this Province in Sackville, next Tuesday.

"DROWNED WHILE DEAD DRINK." This is in substance the verdict of a Coroner's Jury, which inquired into the cause of the death of an Indian named John Sanotee found "drowned" at the Newswater Ferry Slip, in the Miramichi River, on Saturday week.

ON Friday night last the amora borealis lit up the heavens with unusual magnificence. From the zenith, red, white, green and orange streamers stretched to all points of the horizon. The same phenomenon was witnessed in St. John, Fredericton, Halifax and other places.

The new residence of A. L. Palmer, Esq., on the north side of Queen Square is a slightly and superior building. It is of brown stone, with French roof and two stories in height. Local and Provincial News.

The sum of £15 was realized at the Tea Meeting held at Westmorland Point, last evening.

OUR Volunteers returned yesterday from their eight day's pleasure excursion down to Sussex. They appeared well pleased with their visit.

"INQUIRER" from Bayfield states a number of parties receiving the Post were charged five cent postage. One cent is the proper charge. To compel parties to pay more is extortion.

J. EDWARD BORD, Esq., C. E., is now engaged in examining outposts in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia deemed worthy of attention as Harbors of Refuge.

GRINDSTONE QUARRIES.—A Seaman & Co., Minnie, N. S., will ship this season about 120 tons of grindstone. About 60 men find employment in quarrying there. The stone is worth from \$12 to \$15 per ton, according to the quality, delivered on the shore. A ready market is found in the States for all the grindstone made.

From the Lower Cove Quarry, about 2000 tons will cover the shipment this season. One hundred men are employed. The employment created for labor and vessels by these quarries make them an important item in the industries of Cumberland County.

THE CRIMINAL ACTION of Mr. J. W. Gray, M. P. for St. John County, against the "Globe" newspaper for libel was tried on Saturday at Toronto. Mr. Gray was severely cross-examined by Mr. Blake. Mr. Brown addressed the Jury contending in strong terms Mr. Gray for receiving government money contrary to statute. The Jury disagreeing—10 being for acquittal—were discharged.

LARGE POTATO.—The numerous voracious stories in circulation about the large size and large yield of potatoes have induced one "Obadiah" who hails from Goose Creek, to try his hand. He gives a long description of his monster potato in the "Telegraph," and concludes, "I have built a pig pen on one side of this great root and the pigs have eaten about five feet into it. Three of them sleep night in one of the eyes. The skin of the potato is about an inch and a half thick."

NEWFOUNDLAND NEWS.—Seven storms occurred the latter end of last month which did large damage. Several fishing vessels were lost to—General with large quantities of fish. The Labrador cod and herring fishing will be a partial failure.

PRESS DESPATCHES.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The defeat of the French at Orleans is confirmed. The latest report says the city is occupied by Prussians.

George Otte Trevelyan, Jr., Lord of the Admiralty, last evening made a speech to his constituents in the border boroughs, at Selkirk, Scotland. He complained of the Duke of Cambridge's army management as slow and inefficient in times so critical.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Steamer "Wisconsin," from Liverpool, fell in with ship "J. S. DeWolf" of St. John, N. B., from Liverpool for Philadelphia, Oct. 5, in lat. 50 21, long. 38 15, in a sinking condition. The boat was unable to board her on account of the heavy sea.

The captain and eighteen of the crew were taken off by means of a life-buoy and lines.

LEXINGTON, VA., Oct. 12.—Gen. Robert E. Lee died at half-past nine o'clock this morning of congestion of the brain, aged sixty-four years.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—The President has pardoned O'Neill, Starr, Donnelly and the six other Fenian leaders who have been in prison since the last Canadian raid.

An insurrection of Chinese laborers recently took place near Lima, Peru, in which 30 whites and 300 Chinese were killed; also a large amount of property burned.

The recent elections show that the Republicans will maintain their present majority in Congress.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—War reports by Cable to-day contained nothing of special interest.

At Newcastle-upon-Tyne, to-day, a large iron vessel, in course of construction, suddenly fell over, crushing some workmen.

Six bodies have been recovered thus far, and six others are visible, but not yet accessible.

Besides the killed thirty were seriously injured.

Two hundred and ninety Papal Zouaves, mostly Canadians, have arrived at Liverpool, and will be sent home next week.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—The Prince of Wales, yesterday, laid the foundation stone of the new Infirmary at Edinburg.

Appropriate speeches were made by the Prince and other notabilities. The papal protest against the annexation of Rome to Italy has been published.

Gambetta has published at Tours a proclamation denouncing a sortie from Paris, as the 14th, for which the Prussians were driven away from all their positions near the city.

A despatch from Versailles states that the French have shelled and wounded the palace of St. Cloud.

By way of Berlin there is news from Versailles to the 14th, in which reference is made to the sortie by ten battalions on that day, which was easily repulsed by the Bavarians, but no allusion is made to that great battle on the 12th proclaimed by M. Gambetta.

Toronto, Oct. 14.—The Archbishop of Quebec died yesterday afternoon.

It is reported at Ottawa that the prospect of Prince Edward Island coming into the Confederation is not hopeful.

It is not expected that the Intercolonial Railway Commissioners will decide on the tenders received recently in time to enable the contractors to do anything this fall. The Commissioners are showing their uneasiness more and more daily.

The Grand Trunk Fallban Co. came into collision yesterday morning in Montreal, smashing the car and injuring some passengers.

An Italian plaster pedlar has been arrested in Montreal for counterfeiting Canadian silver. On a search being made it was found that his house was supplied with every tool for counterfeiting.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—By balloon left Paris on the 10th, advice have been received that the city is amply supplied with provisions. There is enough on hand to last three months.

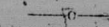
