ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP AFRICA AT NEW YORK.

The Royal Mail Steamer Africa arrived at New York on the 22d December, in fifteen days from Liverpool, bringing English dates to the 7th December.

In the produce markets there had been more activity; higher prices had been obtained for several articles, and altogether a better feeling prevailed. Money continued in demand. The Funds had risen considerably. Consols leaving off on the 6th at 97½ to 97¾ for both money and account.

At a sale of Teas on the 6th, there was little disposition to purchase shown, and only about 500 packages were sold at prices on a par with previous market rates. The Sea Vich and Oriental had arrived with the first supply of New Congo.

Sugar had improved in demand, and higher prices had been obtained. The Yarn and Cloth markets at Manchester exhibited a decided improvement, as regards the extent of business transacted, but without an advance in prices. The Germans are in the market, but still buy sparingly.

The Corn trade during week had again been characterized by heaviness—the tendency of prices being downward. Flour sells slowly from 19s. to 25s. per bbl.—Indian Corn keeps steady.

The Cotton market at Liverpool had improved—an advance of ½d. to ¾d. per lb. having been obtained on previous depressed rates.

Accounts from Bombay to the 1st Nov. state that the Dewallee holidays having commenced, business was almost at a stand still, but a brisk trade was expected on their termination. Freights had declined to £2 10s. a £3 13s. 5d. both to London and Liverpool.

At Calcutta all the tonnage available for immediate purposes had been taken up previous to the 22d Oct., and a stiff market was anticipated on the resumption of business.

The official returns of the Board of Trade for the ten months ending the 1st ult. show an increased consumption for most articles, except Coffee, which exhibits an apparent falling off of two and a half million pounds, as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

The accounts from Germany are more favorable, and hopes are now entertained that the differences between Austria and Prussia will be amicably arranged.

The English papers say, that there is no abatement of the anti-Popery excitement in England; yet, from the accounts furnished by the same papers, we should infer that if there is an abatement of the excitement produced by the first appearance of the Pope's bull in England, there is no abatement of strong feeling. Meetings continue to be held, and lectures to be given, and here and there a mob makes its appearance. The Protestant Dissenters of Liverpool have held a meeting, at which Dr. Raffles presided, and expressed their detestation of the arrogant assumptions and claims unobscured put forth in the official instrument, by which the hierarchy has been established. At the same time they avow their willingness that the Romanists should enjoy any form of Church government, and observe any religious ceremonies, which will not conflict with the rights of others and the supremacy of the Queen's authority in the land. In conclusion, they express their conviction that the Tractarian movement has contributed to embolden the Pope to this aggressive measure.

It is stated in the Legal Observer that a wealthy and influential individual in the North of England is about to commence a suit against one of the Romish Bishops for sedition, and thus bringing to the test the legal question involved in the hierarchical proceedings.

In the meantime, Archbishop Wiseman has been authorized with all due pomp and ceremony. The ceremony was performed at the Church of St. George, Southwark, on the 6th December. Notwithstanding the excitement which has prevailed, the precincts of the building, on the occasion, wore the usual aspect of Sabbath tranquillity, and the exterior calm was reflected by the most still and decorous silence inside doors. About half-past eleven o'clock the preparations were observable in every part of the edifice. An acolyte came in one direction with a thurifer—another carried a crucifix to the spot where the procession was to form. A chalice was transferred from one altar to another by a third. At length the order for forming the procession was given by the tolling of a bell, and the attendant clergy of the new Archbishop turned in regular order at the summations. The Cardinal himself, robed in scarlet and white, and wearing a small scarlet cap, proceeded from the sacristy, his flowing train borne by two train-bearers. After a brief pause, at the extreme end of the nave of the church, the choir commenced chanting the hallelujah, from Beethoven's Mount of Olives, and presently the procession moved up the nave in the direction of the central altar. Foremost was borne the cross, with lighted candles on either side. Then came the Roman Catholic clergy, subject to the new Archbishop's jurisdiction, two and two, habited according to their respective ranks and orders. At length the Cardinal himself appeared, wearing a gorgeous mitre and pallium. A graceful canopy, fringed with silk and gold, was borne over his path, by six or eight men, the "converts" exclusively. There were at least two hundred, between the secular clergy and the various religious orders, in the procession. Lastly came the very Rev. Dr. Doyle, robed in the usual sacerdotal vestments, preceded by the Very Rev. Dr. Cox, the Rev. Mr. Cotter, and the Rev. Mr. Daniel, as masters of the ceremony, deacon and sub-deacon. Having reached the screen which fronts the sanctuary, the

Cardinal was led into a small compartment at the left of the principal altar, called the Chapel of the Blessed Eucharist, whence, after a brief interval, the procession moved within the sanctuary. Cardinal Wiseman kneeling at the foot of the altar, and the celebrated clergyman ascending its steps, assisted by the deacon and sub-deacon. The customary form of prayer having been read, the mitre, which had been exchanged for a scarlet cap a short time before, was placed upon the head of the new Archbishop, whilst the crozier, emblematic of his authority, was also placed in his hands. He was then conducted to the Archbishop's episcopal chair, at the foot of which the whole body of the clergy made the usual obeisance, kissing the Cardinal's ring, in recognition of his spiritual authority. The solemnities of high mass were then proceeded with; after which the Cardinal was publicly read in virtue of which Cardinal Wiseman assumes the Archbishop's jurisdiction of Westminster. The proceedings terminated with an address, in the new "Archbishop's," and an exhortation, in which he impressed upon his clergy the duties and obligations incidental to their important mission. The strictest order and decorum prevailed throughout. (London paper.)

FRANCE.—M. Guizot had an interview with the President of the Republic. The chief topic of conversation was the state of France and present condition Europe. The prolongation of powers was not left untouched; and M. Guizot is understood to have expressed himself on this very ticklish point with frankness and patriotic feeling. The President is described as having said, in conclusion, that he was completely at the disposal of the nation. If it wished him to remain for some time longer at the head of affairs, he should obey; if not, he should still abide by the national will.

The Commercial reports for the week, notice a general falling off in French manufactures, trade and commerce, caused by the uncertainty created by the menacing state of Germany.

GERMANY.—There seems to be a disposition on the part of the King of Prussia and some of his cabinet to preserve peace with Austria, and even to make large concessions to the Austrian government, in order to avoid a rupture. In this feeling the majority of the Prussian Assembly and the great body of the people do not sympathize; still it is generally believed that peace will be preserved. On the 1st of Dec., the Austrian Government and the King of Prussia accepted the terms of an arrangement agreed upon by Baron Montecelli, the Prussian Minister, and Prince Schwarzenberg, the Austrian Minister.

The mother discussion, discussion and the Prussian Assembly, without coming to a satisfactory conclusion, and the King adjourned Parliament on the 31st of January.

The Prussian assembly still continued its preparations were being made to put several fortresses in a state of defence.

At Vienna, orders had been issued to expedite the preparations for war. No change had taken place in the affairs in Electoral Hesse.

TURKEY.—The insurgents at Aleppo have been subdued by the Sultan's forces. The former to the number of 40,000 were successfully opposed by 4000 imperial troops and great slaughter ensued—1800 having been killed.

ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday last, Mr. Rankin, of the firm of Rankin, Gilmore & Co., was in the act of entering the hold of the Princess Royal, in Brunswick Dock, the ladder by which he was descending gave way, and Mr. Rankin was precipitated below. He received considerable injury on the back and side, but we are happy to say is progressing favorably to convalescence. (Liverpool Courier, Nov. 27.)

The Industrial Exhibition of 1851.—We are pleased to learn, that the Commissioner for receiving and forwarding articles from this Province, for the Industrial Exhibition of 1851, is bestirring himself effectively, and that several persons have already intimated their intention of forwarding specimens of the products and industry of New Brunswick.

Among others, the proprietors of the Woodstock Iron Works, propose sending 8000 lbs. of their iron and steel, in the rough and also specimens of their iron and steel, in all their several grades, up to a highly finished razor, which will be manufactured in the city. Specimens of the Back Lead, Ap-halton, Alabaster, and other valuable mineral products of this Province are also in preparation.

We learn that Mr. Perley Poore, the Editor of the "American Sentinel" in Boston, has succeeded in making a complete collection of specimens of the Newspaper press of the United States to be sent to the Exhibition. Two copies of each paper in the Union have been sent to Mr. Poore; (and there are no less than four thousand) one set of the papers goes to England—and the other set is to be deposited in the Massachusetts State Library.

We suggest that each Newspaper editor in this Province should forward to Mr. Perley, the Commissioner here, two copies of the first papers published in 1851; one complete set to be sent to London, and the other to remain as a record of the State of the Press, in the beginning of the year 1851, in the Legislative Library at Fredericton.

We understand a Circular has been prepared by the Commissioner, which merely wants official approval, and will probably be issued early next week. It is not yet too late for New Brunswick to be well represented at the Exhibition, and we fully trust that it may be.

Mr. David Haywood, of Smith's Creek brought to market this week eight Pigeons, one liter, eight months old, one of which

weighed 288 lbs., and the average weight was 270 lbs.

An English brig, the Ellen Anne, was lately struck by a meteoric stone, while in the British Channel. The report was like a musket charge, and the planking of the deck was torn up and perforated in several places, as if by musket-shots. No signs of a thunder-storm were to be seen or heard, though the day was dull and lowering, with a fresh breeze.

OSWEGO AND THE CANADIAN TRADE.—The Oswego correspondent of the New York Journal of Commerce, in his report on the closing of the fall business remarks—

"The Canadian produce and lumber trade is very large, and constantly increasing. During November, over 120,000 bbls. of flour, and about 350,000 bushels of wheat were received here from Canada. This year the quantity has exceeded forty million feet! Yet with a large and growing lake trade, the United States compel the business men of this Province to keep in repair the piers by which Government is to secure nearly half a million annually for the Treasury."

This occurs at different periods in the various Counties.

STEAM FROM HALIFAX TO BRIDGETOWN.—We learn from the Halifax Recorder that a Company is about to be formed there for the purpose of running an efficient steamer from that port to Bridgetown, in the county of Annapolis, touching at Lunenburg, Liverpool, Shelburne, Barrington, Yarmouth, Westport, Digby and Annapolis. The people of Halifax appear to be 'waking up' to the importance of the trade with their Western Counties, which has heretofore flown in a different direction.

U. S. RAILROADS.—The following paragraph from the Railroad Journal, shows the feeling which prevails on the other side of the lines:—

"The construction of railroads is, probably, the most engrossing subject now occupying the attention of our people. Every portion of our country is aroused to their importance. In the West, the feeling in their favor amounts almost to a mania, and every farmer there is contriving how he shall secure one within convenient distance. Their influence, as instruments of wealth, are now thoroughly appreciated, and the social advantages which they confer, are scarcely less valued. Every person wants to live in the world, when he can hear and see what is going on; and mingle with his fellow man, as his interest or pleasure may dictate. People will have railroads, if they can raise the means to build them, even if they will not repay their cost in the shape of dividends. This is a settled fact, and their construction will go on till every section of the country is penetrated with them, and till every farmer inhabiting a tolerably fertile and densely inhabited section, shall enjoy this mode of transit."

The Legislature of Nova Scotia has been summoned to meet for the despatch of business on the 23d of January.

QUEBEC, Dec. 20.—The weather has been intensely cold since our last issue. Yesterday morning at 8 o'clock the thermometer stood at 12° below zero, in sheltered situations, and it is said that, in exposed places, at an hour earlier, the mercury marked 17° below zero. About half past 6 last night the mercury had risen to two degrees above zero and a northeast snow storm commenced; this morning it still snows a little with a wind from the same quarter and the thermometer standing at 8° above the cipher.—Morning Chronicle.

COMMUNICATION.

[TO THE EDITOR OF THE STANDARD.]

Sir,—As the port of St. Andrews is no less interested than that of St. John in any measure calculated to afford additional security to the navigation of our shores, I make no apology for endeavoring to draw the attention of your readers to an invention by Mr. Thomas Ross, of "Rockville," eminently calculated to effect this object. It consists of pneumatic machine for working one or more Fog Bells or Gongs, and so contrived as to emit sound only during fogs or snow storms, and to be silent in fine weather. It requires no attendance whatever, and a working model has now been in session for upwards of three years, during which time it has been most interesting. I am totally unacquainted with the entrance to St. Andrews Harbour, but if I am not misinformed, two or three such guides judiciously placed, would do much to facilitate the approach of vessels, and to prevent delay, as well as danger, in their passage to the Town. The completion of the Railway to Woodstock will probably cause a great increase to the trade of the Port, and render it more incumbent on the inhabitants to use every exertion for rendering it safe and easy of access.

This invention has been before the Light House Commissioners, as well as the Legislature for two successive Sessions and nothing effectual has yet been done. It can hardly be expected that an individual after expending much money, and bestowing great time and labour, in perfecting such a machine, should erect one without public aid. If one of the many shipwrecks that arise from thick weather on the Atlantic coast were prevented in one valuable life were saved—surely the expenditure necessary to give it a fair trial, would not be thrown away. And what if it should lead to the adoption of such a system of bells and gongs as would enable the mariner to determine his position in any weather, however thick, and to run boldly for his harbor, however intricate or obscure the passage. We have seen too much of the science to pronounce this impossible; the trial at any rate might be made, and the results would hardly be otherwise than beneficial.

Effect of Free Trade in the United States.—The New York Tribune, in the course of some excellent remarks upon the falsehoods sent forth by the Democratic papers about many matters, making large profits at the present time, says—

In this year of grace, 1850, we shall buy of Europe iron and iron products, cotton, woolen and silk fabrics, to the amount of not less than one hundred million of dollars. And all these goods are forced on upon us while free traders and cravens are doing their best to create and diffuse the impression that manufactures in this are yielding in the average large profits to those concerned in them. Now that those who are busy in endeavoring to diffuse the impression—"Gentlemen, what profits are you realizing from your estates, your ships, your importations, &c. &c." and they will tell you (the majority of them) "Not over five per cent." Well, gentlemen, then why don't you embark in making the fabrics at home instead of importing or buying those of Europe? Here is an immense demand in a country rapidly increasing in population and capacity of consumption, while nobody apprehends that the tariff is to be changed for the worse as respects our home interests—now if American manufactures are so profitable as you assert, why don't you embark in them?"

The Koh-i-noor diamond, or Mountain of Light, will, it is said, be placed among the collections of minerals at the Exhibition in Hyde Park.

We (the Bytown Gazette) have just learned that Messrs. Walker and Chambrlin, who built a large portion of the Ogdensburg Railroad, and have been extensive contractors in various public works in Canada and the United States, have been in town for the last day or two. They have made a most liberal proposal, offering to take the contract for building the road from Prescott to Bytown upon the lowest terms, when the survey is completed, and to take Twenty-five per cent. or one fourth of the whole stock. They propose meeting the Deposition from this place at Ogdensburg, and if the prospects of the Railroad going forward justify them, they intend sending a person upon the survey along with the Engineer employed by the Company; and upon his agreeing to the correctness of the estimates made, they will take the contracts at the rates then decided upon.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT.—A bill has been introduced into the Legislature of the State of N. York, enacting, that when any criminal shall be sentenced to death, he shall be sent to one of the state prisons, and there confined for the space of one year, in solitary confinement, and that, at the end of that time, the Governor of the State may, in his discretion, issue his warrant for the execution of the criminal.

The greatest sell of this or any other season within ten years past, is the Turkish Ambassador's sell. It seems from a letter from Constantinople, just published in the New York Express, that Amin Bey is nothing more than a young officer of the navy, enjoying the rank of Kaimakim, which is of no importance whatever, and was sent to this country to go through a course of study in the dockyards, to acquire a knowledge of the recent inventions perfected in this country. By the shrewd management of Mr. Brown, interpreter to the U. S. Legation at Constantinople, the Turk was brought out with great eclat, and several of our citizens, from Daniel Webster downwards, have feasted "his Excellency" at a great expense, and it requires a gifted imagination to "phantasy their phantasies."
