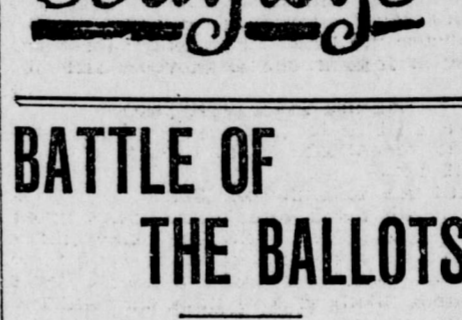

How Canada Rose to the War Emergency.

TEN PERSONS WERE HURT

By the Fall of an Elevator at Minneapolis.

Elevator Accidents at Hamilton, Berlin and Vancouver.

Young Man Killed at Sarnia While Assisting in Moving a House.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 8. — John Davidson, a carpenter, 30 years of age, employed in the Mack building, was caught between the elevator hoist and the second floor and frightfully crushed. His recovery is not thought to be possible.

Berlin, Ont., Nov. 8.—A sad accident occurred here yesterday at C. H. Dorr & Co.'s biscuit and confectionery establishment. Hugo Knell, aged 21, son of H. Knell, ex-conductor for the north ward, was coming down the elevator when the cable broke, and all went down to the bottom with a crash.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—While Bert Kilner, 203 Jarvis street, and C. Kraus, 262 College avenue, were out duck-shooting, they had yesterday morning, Kilner laid down his gun at full-cock while he rowed a few strokes to secure a better position. The oar struck the gun and both barrels went off, the charge shattering Kilner's knee-cap and blowing the tip of his right hand.

Toronto, Nov. 8. — John Jenkins, a machinist, residing at 77 Palmerston avenue, while engaged repairing some machinery in the printing house of Warwick & Ryer, yesterday, was caught in the shaft and badly crushed. His head was battered against the machinery. Jenkins, although dangerously hurt, will probably recover.

Hamilton, Nov. 8. — Mrs. Barrett, 64 West avenue, nearly lost her life the other night, a piece of a lamp chimney falling in her throat, and causing choking her. Her throat was badly cut. The glass fell into some apple-sauce when the chimney broke, and Mrs. Barrett did not notice it at the time.

Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 8.—A shocking accident happened at the north end of Christina street Monday evening, by which a young man named Wm. Smith lost his life. He was employed by Mr. McIntosh, of Bridgen, who was engaged moving a house from Point Edward to the fourth ward. Nine teams of horses were attached to the building which was being driven the team nearest to the moving house. He was sitting on the wagon truck at the time, and in some manner lost his balance and fell in front of the moving wheels.

The men who saw him fall tried to stop the horses, but it was too late, as the heavy wheels passed over the young man's body and crushed his life out. He expired in a few minutes after the mishap. Deceased was aged 22 years and came here from Bridgen. The remains were taken to deceased's home in Bridgen.

AN URGENT DEMAND FOR THE CHANGE

For three or four years past various boards of trade, led by those of Montreal and Winnipeg, have urged upon the government the necessity of just and steps as have now been taken.

The Winnipeg Corn Exchange committee, in a sequence being that a large proportion of the crop of Manitoba is shipped to Buffalo, that port thus becoming a storage point for cargoes of Manitoba grain.

No possible loss can result to Canadian boats, inasmuch as they have already contracts for their cargoes, and they can possibly handle to the close of navigation, and one is therefore forcibly reminded of the dog in the manger, by the action of the marine section of the Board of Trade in protesting against the concession which has been granted, a concession which cannot hurt Canadian lake shipping to the extent of a single dollar.
