The sub-committee of the local Board of Health this afternoon recommended the summary dismissal of Dr. Cannif, medical health officer, for neglect of duty; that Dr. R. A. Pyne be temporarily appointed to the position of medical health officer, and that applications for a permanent successor be sought at once; Drs. Oldright, Crasett and Ferguson to be a committee of experts to examine and report on qualifications of candidates.





Once married the young men about town in Heligoland are safe from judicial vengeance for past amatory indiscretions, since an action for breach of promise cannot be brought against a married man. The law is very rarely broken; there are no Irish in the Island. But in Heligoland there is not always prison for "him what steals what isn't his.". The Islanders object to the expense of boarding prisoners. Consequently the jail is usually empty. Thrice happy Heligoland — no lawyer, no breach of promise, no going to jail. No wonder the Germans covet it.

### LICHT AND SHADE.

New Yorkers consumed \$8,000,000 worth

There is one pauper in every 37 inhabitants in England and Wales.

James Casey, despondent because he could get no work and had no money, committed suicide in New York last week by throwing himself under a heavily-laden truck.

In France there were upward of 20,000 applicants for 300 vacancies in the public service in the Department of the Seine. More than 4,000 persons applied for the places of three office boys at the Hotel de Ville.

At a recent autograph sale in London \$35 was paid for a note written by Tennyson, in which he excused himself from attending a dinner to which he had been invited, and a letter of Shelley's referring entirely to personal matters, brought \$100. A letter of Lamb's brought \$95.

The Manhattan Club of New York rents the \$1,000,000 Stewart mansion for a club house, paying \$35,000 a year rent for the first five years, \$37,500 for the second five, and \$40,000 during each of the remaining eleven years of the term of 21 years. Besides this the club pays \$10,000 taxes annually. The income from dues alone is about \$60,000 a year.

A few days ago Willie Smith, 8 years old, died of starvation in the Spencer Building, on First street, Parkersburg, W. Va. For three days the child, who was too ill to beg, had nothing to eat. The father is an old man and too ill to work, while the mother, though almost a skeleton herself, takes in washing and tries to keep the family, of whom there are several members, from starving.

Gen. O. O. Howard in a recent address in Gen. O. O. Howard in a recent address in Brooklyn referred co workingmen who earn 520 per month, pay \$8 of that for rent and had only the remaining \$12 to support families of four or five persons for 30 days. The Christian Inquirer says: "It is that class of pinched, impoverished workingmen that are liable to rise like the blind Samson and hurl the State to destruction. It is impossible to make such men feel the justice of the inequalities in modern society."


