By cablegram this afternoon we learn that Right Hon. W. H. Smith, leader of the Salisbury Government in the British House of Commons, is dead. Mr. Smith was a self-made man. He began life as a news agent in a small way, but as the English railway system developed managed to acquire control of the majority of the stands on the various lines. His firm had headquarters in the Strand, London, and that division of the metropolis—always strongly Conservative—sent him to Parliament. The deceased statesman was by no means a stilliant politician, and he owed his position chiefly to his riches and conciliatory nature. It was his rise and progress which Gilbert satirized in "Pinafore." When that exquisite production was written, the industhough dull Mr. Smith was First Lord of the Admiralty-a veritable "ruler of the Queen's navee." In all probability Mr. Smith's successor will be Mr. Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland.

THE DEAD LEADER.

Last Moments of the Late William Henry Smith.

Biographical Notes-Speculations as to Who Will be His Successor in the House of Commons.

LONDON, Oct. 7 .- The death of William

London, Oct. 7.—The death of William Henry Smith, who was the Conservative leader in the House of Commons, caused the most profound regret in Conservative and other circles. Mr. Smith is popularly reputed to have had a fortune of about \$10,000,000. He had made favorable progress towards recovery unta Monday, when he became worse and suffered a great deal of pain owing to a recurrence of gout. Towards evening he recovered, and his condition was so favorable that his attending physicians left Walmer Castle, near Deal, the official residence of the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, where Mr. Smith has been seeking to regain his health since his appointment as successor to the late Earl Granville, and returned to London. Next morning Mr. Smith's condition became critical, and he died at 3 p.m.

The Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, M. P. for East Manchester and Chief Secretary for Ireland, will succeed the late Mr. Smith as Conservative leader in the House of Commons if the influence of the powerful Carlton Club and the opinion of the Conservative party as a whole rules in the decision to be made by Lord Salisbury. The Right Hon. William Henry Smith was the son of Mr. William Henry Smith, bookseller, publisher and news agent in the Strand, and was born in London on June 23, 1825. In July, 1865, he unsuccessfully contested Westminster in the Conservative interest, but his candidature was renewed with success in November, 1868, when he defeated Mr. John Stuart Mill. He continued to sit for Westminster down to 1885, when he was returned for the Strand, being again elected in 1886. He was Financial Secretary of the Treasury from February, 1874, till August, 1877, when he was appointed First Lord of the Admiralty in succession to the late Mr. Werd Hunt. He went out of office on the retirement of the Conservatives in April, 1880, and was appointed Secretary of State for War in 1885 on the formation of the Conservative Government. On the resignation of Sir William Hart Dyke in January, 1886, Mr. Smith was appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, but the Salisbury Government fell William Hart Dyke in January, 1886, Mr. Smith was appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, but the Salisbury Government fell immediately afterwards and he only held the appointment for six days. He followed the corpse to the house of the Privy Councilor, and entering with the bearers, he drew a pistol and shot himself dead, his body falling beside that of his sweetheart in the presence of the horrorstricken father of the girl.

Shipping from Booth's, Perley & Pattee's, Bronson's and Hurdman's is proceeding under the watchful eye of the police. At the meeting at Hurdman's Eddy also took on a number of the strikers for general purpose work. In the strikers for general purpose work. In all about 75 men were started by Eddy, who agrees to give the same hours as Hurd-man. The men care more for the conceded hours than for the extra 50 cents asked.

Monday afternoon the first case callet the assizes was one in which considerable ocal interest has been taken. More than at the assiges was one in which considerable local interest has been taken. More than quarter of a century ago Peter Weston, now of Chicago, purchased the northwesters corner of the square on which St. Panlis cathedral stands from the wardens of that church, and around the square he purchased were lanes leading respectively from Rickmond strest and Dufferin avenue. A WORLD CONGRESS OF METH-ODISM.

No matter how cynics may view it, the present era is affording many opportunities for the cultivation of international amity. We have international exhibitions of the products of labor, international workingmen's congresses, international scientific conventions, and ecumenical councils or conferences of prominent Christian Churches.

To-morrow in Washington, D. C., the various Methodist bodies throughout the world assemble for the second time as an "Ecumenical Methodist Conference," the been held in September, 1881. The "Ecu. branch of the Christian Church he may give menical Conference" is not an authoritative body. It is a purely voluntary meeting, through delegates of the Methodist churches of the whole world, "for the purpose of mutual stimulus and enlightenment, and thus of an increased general efficiency. Methodism is at present subdivided into what are known as the Eastern and Western sections. The Western includes the Methodist bodies of America and the Eastern those of Great Britain, Ireland, Australia and the rest of the world. In this Conference 500 delegates will have seats, of whom 300 will be from the West and 200 from the East. the from the West and 200 from the East.
The 300 representing Methodism in
America are apportioned as follows:
Methodist Episcopal Church, 126; Methodist Episcopal Church South, 64; African
M. E. Church, 18; African M. E. Zion, 15; Colored M. E., 9; American Wesleyan, 6; Union American Methodist Episcopal, 3; African Union Methodist Protestant, 9; Free Methodist, 3; Methodist Church of Canada, 24; Primitive Methodist, 3; Independent Methodist, 2; United Brethren in Christ, 7; United Brethren in Christ old constitution), 2, and B. M. E .. 8. The apportionment is based, in the

main, on the relative strength of the bodies

In England, the denominational history s composed of the Wesleyan Methodists, which is the original denomination founded by the two brothers John and Charles Wesley 150 years ago. This body has now about 450,000 members and about 7,500 places of worship. In 1797 the Methodist "New If the eviden Connection" split off from the parent body, upon a difference of opinion as to the representation of laymen in the government of the church. This denomination has 35,000 communicants. Next in importance comes the Primitive Methodists, who organized in Staffordshire, and whose separate existence dates from 1810. They have now nearly 200,000 members and about 4,500 chapels. In the "Bible Christian" section are 25,000 members. The their present organization to the amalgamation, in 1857, of three small Methodist bodies. They have now nearly 75,000 members. The "Wesleyan Reform Union" has 6,000 members and the "Independent Methodist Church" 8,000. All these seven bodies send their delegates to Washington. And in addition to these are, the "Irish Methodist Church," with a membership of 40,-000 or more, the "Australian Methodist Church," the "West India Methodist Church," and the "Methodist Church of France." Thus 29 distinct ecclesiastical organizations-seventeen belonging to the Western or American section and twelve to the Eastern or British section-will participate in this International Conference of Methodism.

It is worthy of remark that Canada is he only one of the three great territorial ivisions in which the Methodist Church chiefly labors which possesses a United Methodist Church. Time was when the Methodist body in the Dominion was divided into nearly as many sections as is embraced in the Church as found in either Great Britain or the United States, but the eaders in the various divisions, with a ingle eye to the advancement of the Church as a whole, got together, and formulated a basis of union, and a complete amalgamation was in due course carried out. As was hoped for, Methodism has been vastly strengthened by the union. As in a similar coming together of Canadian Presbyterianism, so it has been experienced in Methodism. Union has indeed been strength. The position of the Methodist Church of Canada is to-day the best proof of that, and results attained so far should go a long way to suggest what could be done for the advancement of Protestantism under a similar unity of the various Prot estant denominations. It is satisfactory to learn that both in England and the United States there is a growing tendency to the organic unity of Methodism, and that the ovement is likely to be strengthened by the Ecumenical.






