The "Diamond King" Suffered From Brain Trouble-Stock Market Stirred, But Panic Was Prevented.

His office here was besieged this morning by hundreds of eager inquirers, and even then his firm had not received confirmation of the news. Funchal, Island of Madeira, June 1 The following details have been ob tained of the suicide of Barney Barnato: Barnato, who had been in illhealth for some months past, seemed to improve after leaving Cape Town but he was never left alone, and some one was continually detailed to watch him. Yeserday, after lunch, between 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon, he seemed to be in very good spirits, and was walking up and down the deck on a passenger's arm. Suddenly Barnato asked his companion to tell him the time. Before he received a reply he wrenched his arm away and jumped

Treaty to Be Brought Before the U. S. Senate.

The Proposal Causes Anxiety in Span ish Circles, as Foreshadowing McKinley's Cuban Policy.

Washington, June 14.-A treaty for the annexation of Hawaii to the Unit-ed States will be sent to the Senate after the return of President Mc-Kinley from Nashville. The treaty provides for annexation without the exaction of conditions on the part of the Hawaiians as to the form of Government to be vouchsafed to Hawaii, leaving that question to be entirely disposed of by the Government of the United States. The United States will agree, however, to assume the debt of the present Hawaiian Government, but will come into possession of all the Hawaiian crown lands and other pos-

Wilfrid Pollock, eted as special correspondent for the London Evening Post, has just returned to London, claiming to have estabshed a new wheeling record. He passthrough the campaign practically om first to last, on a bicycle. did not take a machine out with him, as every one who has been in Greece assured him that it would be useless. But when on his arrival in Thessaly. he saw the level roads between Volo and Larissa, and made up his mind that the Greeks would soon be driven back from the mountainous frontier, he telegraphed to Athens for a bicycle. On the first day of the affair at Mati, a "second-hand, secondgrade machine duly turned up in La-rissa." In spite of this description it carried him safely through the campaign, without even an approach to a breakdown. The roads were pretty bad, but, as Mr. Pollock says, to the cycle no carriage roads are impos-ble. At times he had to walk a mile or two, and sometimes he had to carry the machine. But this was sel-dom, and never for any great distance. Many of the mountain passes even were negotiable, the zig-zag cuttings being well graded. As this bicycle was not furnished with a brake, he had to remember when riding down a pass that the corners of the twists were not banked. But as he got safely through without accident, it is certain that in future wars the correspondent will be more frequently seen awheel than on horseback, if the country is t all practicable.







Factories in London and the West.

There is much to interest the public n the ninth annual report of the inspectors of factories for the Province of Ontario for 1896, just printed. The inspectors report that the stagnation sted for some years past prevailed last exception to this. They require a permit regularly every fall a few weeks before Christmas, which is their busy season, and it is requisite to have the candies as fresh as possible. In the vestern district of the province there was only one prosecution for working women longer than 60 hours a week without permission-that of a laundry

Some employers must have queer views with regard to permits, for the nspector in Central Ontario reports a granted and one girl had been off work half a day through sickness. But, having worked half a day under the permit, and made 60 hours during the week, she was mulcted half a day's pay. The other females who worked ver 60 hours under the permit, did not receive any pay for the over-time. It is reported that the employer considered that permission to work overtime carried with it immunity for paying for the work. The inspector says the case is unique in his experience, and he suggests that in future it be ascertained whether or not payment is intended to be given before a permit is granted. In most cases, employers are too honorable to ask their help to work over-time without pay. In the

were worked by each. Inspector Barber reports that in the western district of the province there were 90 accidents last year, against 75 in 1895. The increase is, in large measure, accounted for by the change in the act, which requires that all accidents, from any cause whatever, shall be reported, if the person injured was kept from returning to his work within six days. Thus, an accident from falling, or through a machine worked by hand, is reportable if it results in six days' idleness, which was not formerly the case. the windows are closed. The eastern inspector raises a warning voice as to the manner in which young girls dress while working in factories. They do not, he says, seem to understand the great danger and risk they run by wearing loose clothes and long hair. He considers that all mills where machinery and power are matter how small the number of hands employed. As an illustration, he speaks of a small shingle mill, in which a father, son and young daughter were employed cutting shingles. While the girl was walking through the mill her loose hair caught in a shaft, her scalp was pulled from her head, she was thrown a distance of several feet, and apparently had a miraculous escape

with her life.

During the year the bakeshops of the province were inspected under the new law passed at the session of the Legislature in 1896. Inspector Barber inspected 348 of these establishments, 37 of which were in this city. Owners of bakeshops are bound to provide properly ventilated and lighted shops, but the inspector says this is difficult in those places where basement premises are occupied. It is not generally known that the working hours of bakers are limited by law to 60 hours 'Tis Thou has dower'd our queenly a week-the only instance in which the hours of men are restricted in Ontario. But there is difficulty in enforcing the law when the men are paid over-time for their work, and do not regard it as a grievance. Nevertheless, the 60-hour work-week is reported to be popular among the journeymen bakers. In most instances the bakeshops are reported moderately clean, but there are exceptions. The inspector of the central division says that men accustomed to work fifteen hours a day said they had little time or heart to keep themselves or their surroundings clean, and the moral is pointed that if the public desire food products prepared Oh teach them first by Christ to under clean conditions they will do well to aid in enforcing the 60-hour work-week in bakeshops.
