# WITH SULTAN'S FORCES IN A DRIVE UPON NATIONALIST

Aggressive Offensive Against Followers of Mustapha-Kemal in Asia Minor Is Believed To Be Under Consideration of Lieut.-General Sir G. F. Milne.

Constantinople, April 30.—British troops, it is believed, are planning to support the sultan's forces in the movement against Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor, and even join in an aggressive offensive against Mustapha Kemal. Milne, tommander of British forces here, has gone to Ismid on an inspection tour, and elaborate preparations are being made by the British along the Anatolian coast of the Sea of Marmora, where they have occupied Mudania, the port of Brusa.





They declare hat it will be done within the next few years by means of two inventions, which enable an airman to fly at a height of 40.000 feet, where, owing to the reduced air pressure, a speed of 450 kilometres (282.6 miles) an hour can be main-



## A NEW MAGIC CITY. [Boston Herald.]

Akron, Ohio, always an enterprising town, but not rated until lately as a city of any size, now counts a population well over 200,000, and at a single jump passes such cities of long standing as Dayton, Memphis, Nashville, Syracuse and Albany. In the last ten years, say the census statisticians, Akron has grown at the rate of 201.8 per cent. This report is the most suggestive return yet made by the 1920 census. For Akron's growth is to be inter preted in terms of an industry that was practically anknown until this century was four or five yours old. Three American industries nowadays reach the billion mark in their products. The first is steel, the second is the food products industry, the third is the new industry of the automobile. Most of our great industries merely repeat old stories with variations; they write a new chapter in the history of oil, or steel, or agriculture. But the motor car business is different. And Detroit no more stands for automobiles than does Akcon for one of the essentials of the motor car. For Akron is tire town, and the automobile has made that Ohio community one of the magic cities of the land. Rubber accounts for Akron, just as shoes account for Brockton and textiles for Fall River and Lawrence, and the movies for Los Angeles. Other ambitious towns may profit by the example set by such cities which had the enterprise to capture an industry and then held on to it and helped it to grow.

Trieste, April 22.—Italian military auhorities here say they have inherited from the war a lot of difficulties and tion in Istria and the region surrounding Gorizia. This territory constitutes

parts of the Adriatic question which still remains unsettled by the supreme council. It passed under Italian con-trol by the establishment of the armis-tice line at the end of the war. In this territory there are more than 400,000 Slovenes who resent the surveillance of the Italian military police. Revolting Slav elements fired with social-

ccupation.
In these districts there have been In these districts there have been within a year twenty assassinations and 1,000 arrests. Attempts have been made to set up a communistic regime at Dignano, where large stores of ammunition which belonged to the old Austrian army had been collected and hidden beneath a building used as head-quarters of a workmen's committee. The plot was discovered by the Italian police who raided the headquarters and arrested 130 Slavs. During the fighting arrested 130 Slavs. During the fighting with the communists the building was recked by bombs.

Sandy's bill restricting liquor transportation within Ontario, the measure finally receiving second reading.

Mr. Sandy, in moving the second reading of the bill, declared that it would serve to carry out the wishes of the people of Ontario, as expressed at the polls last October.

Karl Homuth, Souht Waterloo, approved the principle of the bill, but asked that certain clauses be made more lucid. He also criticized some of the penalties imposed under the Ontario penakies imposed under the Charlo temperace act, which will also apply to the Sandy bill.

Charles McCrea of Sudbury offered to support the bill, provided that clause 9 be struck out. Clause 9 stipulates that the bill is not to come into effect until after the taking of the referendum. The Government was bound by its presention pledges to enact

endum. The Government was bound by its pre-election pledges to enact whatever temperance legislation was within its power, regardless of what the Dominion might do.
"Put this act into force at once," he suggested, "and when the referendum is taken you will have a true expression of public opinion."

To Supplement Law.

Mr. Raney pointed out that the Sandy bill was designed to supplement Dominion legislation and to stop short-circuiting of liquor within the province.

# U. S. SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Validity of the prohibition amendment and portions of the enforcement act was involved in seven separate proceedings before the supreme court. Two of these were and New Jersey as sovereign states to enjoin enforcement in their jurisdicions upon the grounds that both en-

tions upon the grounds that both en-actments were unconstitutional. The other cases were direct appeals from lower court decrees.

Steps to institute the suits were taken immediately after the amendment became effective on January 16, and on motion of counsel their consideration was expedited.

motion of counsel their consideration was expedited.

In both the Rhode Island and New Jersey suits the validity of the eighteenth amendment was attacked, but the New Jersey case also alleged that even if the amendment were valid, the enforcement act was unconstitutional, because it had not been concurred in by New Jersey under provisions of the amendment giving the federal and state governments concurrent power to enforce prohibition. New Jersey also contended that if the entire enforcement act were not unconstitutional, the portions of it limiting the alcoholic content of beverages to less than one-half of one per cent, and relating to the dispensing of liquors for medicinal purposes were invalid.

The cases reaching the court on ap-

pensing of liquors for medicinal purposes were invalid.

The cases reaching the court on appeals were those of the Kentucky Distilleries and Warehouse Company; Christian Feigenspan, a Newark, N. J., brewer; the St. Louis Brewing Association, and George C. Dempsey, a wholesale liquor dealer of Boston, Mass., who lost injunction proceedings in the lower court. The other case before the court was an appeal by the Government from a decision of Federal Judge Geiger enjoining federal officials from interfering with the Manitowoc Products Company, a Wisconsin corporation, in the manufacture of beer containing 2.5 per cent alcohol.

In all the cases a general attack on the amendment was made on ground that it was revolutionary and constituted legislation in the guise of a constitutional amendment designed to regulate the private habits of individuals; that it interfered with the state's police powers; that it was invalid because adopted by two-thirds of the members of Congress present, when the vote was taken, and not by two-thirds of the membership, and that the amendment was not ratified by three-fourths of the states owing to provisions in many state constitutions requiring that amendments be submitted to a referendum.

# RETAILING ICE CREAM AT 17 CENTS AROUSES IRE OF NEW YORKERS

New York, April 23.—Retailing of the humble but necessary ice cream at 17 cents a plate has aroused the ire of the American Republic, and set on foot an investigation by the "flying squadron" of the United States department of justice, which is hunting down price-gougers in New York. A. W. Riley, director of the squad, has ruled that in the United States ice cream is a food and not one of those juxuries that can be done without by wearing overalls. Profiteers in ice cream are thus classified as profiteers in food.

Before the war ice cream retailed at 5 to 10 cents a plate, depending on the elegance of the shop vending it. In larger quantities some dealers are now charging \$1.20 a quart for ice cream that sold before the war for 40 cents. Mr. Riley says he will invoke the Lever act, under which the United States district attorney has authority to institute criminal proceedings. 




