### SUBSTITUTE FOR SUGAR

A Plant of Remarkable Sweetening Qualities Di-covered.

Washington, Sept. 16.-The agricultural department is inquiring into the statement of Consul-General Richard discovered in South America which promises to supplant the sugar cane and the sugar beet. Scientifically the plant is known as the Eupatorium re-bandium, and it contains a large amount of saccharine matter, and a high percentage of natural sugar proerties which are easy to extract.


