From these figures it will be seen that prosperity has attended the Association, that it stands well to the front of Fraternal Insurance Societies, that it has for its officers men who are recognized as leaders both on this side and the other, and we bespeak a most profitiable and enjoyable convention of the Ontario Maccabees.

The Association is of Canadian descent, having its original birth in the city of London in the year 1877. It was started on a ten cent assessment plan and spread rapidly throughout the Provinces and in about a dozen States on the other side, but on this basis could hardly be expected to thrive long. In the year 1881 it was reorganized in Port Huron, Mich., and since that time has had a growth second to none in the country. A few years ago the Supreme Tent secured permission from the Registrar of Friendly Societies in Toronto, to admit women on the same terms as men, and there are now some 70 subordinate branches of the K. O. T. M. composed of women alone, in the Province. Of course this is only a small fraction of the membership composing the Order of the Ladies of the Maccabees, but this branch, which confines its business to the United States, is a women's Order exclusively, and is the best known Association of its kind on the American continent to-day. It has for its executive officer Mrs. Lillian M. Hollister, of Detroit, who is also President of Women's Christian Temperance Union, while the Supreme Record Keepership rests upon the shoulders of Miss Bina M. West, an attractive, forceful and earnest Michigan lady, who has won her way into the hearts of thousands of Ladw

In this building nearly 200 clerks are employed to take care of the details and despatch the fast growing business which must the fast growing business which must be handled every day.



EMPIRE DAY

"Empire Day" has been set apart in

the schools of the Province for pat-riotic exercises intended to impress the children with the greatness of the British Empire, points out the London Advertiser. It is one of the phenomena of history that the greatest and most successful of the colonial powers should have been the least enterprising when the race for empire began. We Anglo-Saxons flatter ourselves that we have had always a natural vocation for discovery and colonization, but as a matter of fact our maritime supremacy is of relatively modern growth. Spain and Portugal were a whole century ahead of England in exploration, and she trailed behind France and Holland. Not till the reign of Elizabeth did England begin to exhibit her maritime genius and take up her march "on the mountain wave." This was the age of Drake, Frobisher, Hawkins and Raleigh, but these great navigators were little better than buccaneers. All through the sixteenth century England played a minor role as compared with Spain and Portugal. John Cabot, who discovered the mainland of America in 1497, was sent out by Henry VII. of England, but he was a citizen of Venice. The achievements of himself and his son Sebastian were not followed up by the English until nearly a century later. Yet before the sixteenth century opened the Portuguese Vasco Da Gama had rounded the Cape of Good Hope and planted the Portuguese flag on the soil of India, while nearly the whole west coast of South and Central America, and what is now the State of Florida, had been brought under the dominion of Spain and Portugal by Columbus and his contemporaries. In 1534 Jacques Cartier almost rounded Newfoundland. and in 1535 ascended the St. Lawrence to the present site of Montreal and laid the foundation of French power in North America. The first English colony in the new world, planted by Sir Walter Raleigh in Virginia' in 1585 was a failure, the emigrants soon returning home; and the second, founded on Roanoke Island two years later, was allowed to perish.

Not till the seventeenth century, in the reign of King James I., did England begin to become a colonial power worthy of the name, and even for the greater part of this century she was eclipsed by the Dutch and French. The Dutch had the carrying trade of the world and had established virile colonies in North America, Cape Colony and the East Indies. But before the close of the century England had wrested from Holland her maritime ascendancy and her North American colonies. Spain was still the greatest colonial power measured by the extent of her possessions; she had nearly all of South and Central America and great tracts in the southern and western portions of North America. But, like Portugal, her apogee was in the sixteenth century. Then ensued a steady decay, until in the early part of the nineteenth century her empire in the new world collapsed like a Portugal lost her greatest colony, Brazil.

At the beginning of the eighteenth century, with Holland humbled and Spain and Portugal in decline, France and England became the Supreme rivals. France could boast the greater achievements. Canada and Acadia were settled and the town of Quebec founded about the time of the voyage of the Mayflower. In 1683 La Salle had made his way from the great lakes to the sources of the Mississip-pi, descending the whole river to the Gulf of Mexico, and proclaiming French sovereignty over that vast region, which he named Louisiana. England, when the eighteenth century opened, had a thriving row of colonies along the Atlantic coast, and France had the two great rivers, the St. Lawrence and Mississippi; but while France had more territory, England had more settlement. Then came the war of the Spanish success sion, culminating in 1713 in the treaty of Utrecht, which gave Newfoundland and Acadia to England and made her the first state in the world. In India the two nations clashed with the same result. When England defeated France on the Plains of Abraham half a century later she reached relatively the highest position she even attained; for soon afterwards came the great schism of the thirteen Am erican colonies. It was a terrible blow to British imperialism, but not a fatal one, as the world then believed. There has been no more wonder ful development in the nineteenth century than the expansion of the British Empire. At the end of the

empire outside the United Kingdom was a little over 2,000,000 square miles, with a population of about 100,000,000 souls. At the end of the nineteenth century the Empire, including Egypt and the Soudan, contained upwards of 13,000,000 square miles with a population of about 450,-000,000, or over a fourth of the population of the world. Since then the Transvvaal and the Orange River Colony have been painted red on the

Great Britain gave her American colonies freedom in everything but trade: This was the fatal weakness of her colonial policy, though it was mild and benevolent compared with that of other nations. The American revolution taught her this lesson, but she had still a great deal to learn, and only after a long and bitter struggle did the Canadian Provinces acquire their political liberties. Great Britain has succeeded as a colonizing power because she has abandoned the theory that colonies are mere possessions-estates to be worked for the benefit of the mother country. The British Empire is still undergoing an evolution, and he is a very wise man who will predict the end. Will Turgot's saying that colonies are like fruit and only cling till they are ripe, be verified? Or will some higher organization that the present one be developed which will keep the selfgoverning colonies within the circle of the Empire? If the latter is to be the solution, there must be absolute equality of all parts which are fitted for self-government.



LONDON'S OLD BRIDGE

STORIES WHICH ARE TOLD ABOUT THE WELL-KNOWN: STRUCTURE.

its Origin Lost in the Misty Past—Remans Likely Had One-The Second Stone Bridge-The Norwegian King Olaf's Peat-No Tradition of a London Forry -Later Bridges.

The approaching opening of the new footways across London Bridge turns one's mind to that famous spot, and one wonders whether ever spot, and one wonders whether ever before a London bridge has been widened. I believe that this never has happened before, and that it has waited for the engineers of the twentieth century to hang footpaths on the outside edges of the bridge. But it is impossible to say; for who, indeed, can tell with certainty how many bridges there have been over old Father Thames at this point, let alone what may have happened in the cases of the early ones. Some think that there was no London bridge at all until about 1,000 years ago. For my part, I like better, where it is quite impossible to get at the actual facts, to try to believe that all the old traditions and legends of London are true.

and legends of London are true. Trejan's Story.

To me, old Brutus, whom the god-dess promised that he should "raise a second Troy" here and "found an Empire which time should ne'er de-stroy nor bounds confine," is as real as he is delightful; and when, after his captain, Corineus, had wrestled with and hurled the Albion giant Gogmagog into the sea, Brutus hit upon the site of London city for his upon the site of London city for his new Troy, I feel quite sure that so masterful a gentleman must also have built a bridge across the Thames. Of course, in reality, I doubt the old boy's existence just as much as that of Diana, the prophetic goddess, herself. But it pleases me to imagine these old folk as genuine, and, after all—well, there is at least the Empire as proof of the prophecy!

In Roman Times.

In Reman Times.

Then the Gallic and Belgic tribes that came over long centuries before Caesar were cultured enough to know about bridges; and if Caesar preferred marching all the way up to Wallingford to cross the river, instead of using London bridge, is it not just as clear that he knew the bridge was not wide enough for him as it is that there was no bridge? At least we may be certain that the Romans built a London bridge. Dion Cassius gives one the belief that the Emperor did build a bridge. London at that time was so large a city that Queen Ecadicea in her rising could kill several thousand Romans there. It is hardly likely that Garner this morning from the West.

King Olaf's Feat.

Now, I hear water is valuable in Blenheim, but, in St. Louis the hotels, boarding houses, restaurants and saloons are charging five cents for a glass of water. No matter how shallow the glass you can't see the bottom till you've scraped the water out. Admission to tellet rooms costs five cents. Use of comb and brush, another five cents. Coffee costs ten cents the cup, 'pony' beers' ten cents, car fare to fair grounds is ten cents, and chairs at band concerts. Your hand gets weary pulling the dimes and nickels out of your pockets. You can't side-step any of these luxuries very well, so a fellow ought to go there with the goods and be able to deliver them in small bunches." Some years ago the head of a huge bronze statue of a Roman Em huge bronze statue of a Roman Emperor was found in the mud near the bridge. It is now in the British Museum. The body has not yet been discovered. How it came to be in the Thames none can tell. But I imagine that a band of old heathen Saxons rushed into the deserted streets of London, and, mistaking that statue for the god of the Britons, tore it down, and, carrying it along to the bridge, flung it into the along to the bridge, flung it into the river as a base opponent of Gowoden. I like, too, to believe in that fine

old Norwegian King Olaf, who, find-ing the bridge in his way, tied his ships to it, set sail, and tore the structure down. That plan strikes structure down. That plan strikes me as much more kinglike than the method of the Danish monarch who dug a trench all round by Southwark, so that he could sail by: I always doubt that story; it is not picturesque enough, and, moreover, I believe Londoners would have objected to having their streets "up" in that way.

Never a Ferry.

It is odd, though, if London bridge is not of extremely 'ancient date, that there is no tradition of London ferry. "Old Moll's" father, John Audery, was, I fancy, only a ferryman in an interval between the destruction of one bridge word the John Audery, was, I fancy, only a ferryman in an interval between the destruction of one bridge, and the building of another. What a pity it would be not to believe in Old John the ferryman and his beautiful daughter, Mary! He was very rich. But he was so mean that one day, to save the cost of a day's food, he pretended to be dead. But when he heard his servants carousing in joy at his death he returned to life, and one of the servants, thinking he was the devil, hit him on the head with a broken oar so heavily that he was killed. Mary's lover, hearing that the obnoxious parent no longer lived, galloped so furiously to his fair mistress that his horse fell and he broke his neck. So Mary gave all the old man's money to found a convent, St. Mary Overies, Bankside, and the priests who subsequently had the house were the first to build a bridge.

That bridge, we may fancy, was the one which replaced that torn down by Olaf. It was itself destroyed by a flood storm in 1090. The next bridge was also of wood. It was burned down in 1135.

Later Bridges.

Then came London's first stone bridge, which was erected at the cost of a special tax on wool. It was started in 1176, finished in 1208, and burned down in 1212, together with some 3,000 people who were on it watching the sight.

The second stone bridge was built on the wooden piles of the first at the cost of taxes on alien importers and alms begged throughout England! This was the famous London Bridge. It was over this one that Simon de Montfort rode, over this one that were set the heads of the great Scotsmen, Wallace and Simon Fraser, and, later, many others, both political and religious reform-

ers. It was this one that was the centre of many a battle and of many a festivity. In 1632 a servant upset a warmpan in one of the houses on the city side; forty-two houses were burnt down as the result. In the great fire of London it suffered severely again. A hundred years later the houses on it were removed, and it survived with many repairs until 1825, when the present bridge was begun.—E. T. T., in London

ENGLISH PRACTICAL EDUCATION. Girls Will Be Taught How to Care for

The proposal made at the confer-The proposal made at the conter-ence held by the London Women's In-dustrial Council to establish schools for training girls in the care of children will probably be carried out on a wider scale than was anticion a wider scale than was anticipated by the promoters. The scheme has met with exceptional favor among British educationists, and when the London County Council elections are over and the new educational authority is at work, a resolution on the subject is to be brought forward. The idea of the council was that such training should be for girts of the working classes, but the general feeling of the meeting was that some provision ought to be made for those of the upper and middle classes. The opinion among school authorities is strongly favorable to making it compulsory for all girls, and it is on these lines that the resolution will be framed. be framed.

these lines that the resolution will be framed.

A member of the council, of which, it may be remarked, Mrs. Mandell Creighton is president, was interviewed with regard to the scheme.

"I am sure you will not require any arguments in support of these schools," she said. "It has been recognized for a very long while that the modern girl is wofully deficient in her knowledge of home duties, particularly affecting the care of children. Cookery classes, lessons in household management and sewing are excellent things in their way, but it is time practical education went further. Supposing we can secure that at the day technical schools all girls shall receive twelve months' training in the care and upbringing of children, such education will be carried out on entirely practical lines. The scholars would be provided with Indian-rubber babies of life-size, wicker cradles and complete outfits of clothes appropriate to the two stages of what I will call of life-size, wicker cradles and com-plete outfits of clothes appropriate to the two stages of what I will call baby's dress era, that is, the long-clothes and frock stage. This will constitute the scholar's equipment, and she will be taught how to nurse, feed and clothe the 'child,' how to doctor its allments; in fact, she will just play at being mother during her just play at being mother during her "Has such a system ever been tried

Despite his religion, he was a friend and admirer of Dr. Manning, to whom he presented a testimonial on his silver-jubilee, earned by the Cardinal's services to the persecuted Jews of Kussia. 
