Powers Scon Again to Be Addressed on the Subject.

Roosevelt Won't Be Happy Till He Gets It-Last Winter Every Power Addressed Except Russia Responded Favorably, and the Czar Accepted the Principle Then-So Far the Prospects Seem to Be Bright.

Washington, Sept. 18.—According to a statement made by an official of the State Department yesterday it is practically certain that President Roosevelt will soon address the powers again on the subject of an international peace conference at The Hague. The step may be take within a week, but it is more likely that nothing will be done until the President returns to Washington and confers with Secretary of State Root regarding the matter.

When Mr. Roosevelt does call the attention of the powers to the matter again, taking up his plan where it ended last winter, when the Russian Goverment spoiled the chances of a conference by refusing to participate until the war in the east had come to an end, the first step will probably be a circular note to the powers, suggesting that the time is now opportune for a discussion of the subjects which shall come before the conference. When the plans become partly defined, the Government of the Netherlands will issue a call for the conference. Such was the plan outlined last December, and it is not likely that it will be changed to any great extent. to any great extent.

Every power addressed ten months ago by Secretarp Hay on the subject responded favorably with the exception of Russia. The St. Petersburg Government, however, accepted the principle of the conference, but said that under the existing circumstances—the war—it was not practicable for Russia to enter into a peace conference. Japan consented to participate, at the same time making a condition that none of the questions of the war then existing be discussed. It is believed here that it will take some weeks for the various powers to reach an understanding as to the subjects to be discussed by the conference and it is not cussed by the conference and it is not thought probable that the meeting can be convened before some time next

year.
There have been many questions brought to prominence by the Russo-Japanese war just ended, and these will undoubtedly be set forth by either Russia or Japan for discussion.

TELEPHONE TALKS.

TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC,-

During the almost continuous discussion of telephone matters which has been going on in Canada for a number of years, no country has been so frequently referred to as Sweden, and it may be added, regarding no other country have the conditions been so little comprehended.

Sweden has been the scene of the keenest telephone contest that has probably ever been witnessed-a contest absolutely unique, inasmuch as it is between the general Government operating a complete local and long distance system, and a private company operating practically a local system only. The usual conditions are therefore reversed. This will render a study of the results particularly interesting.

The contest has centred about Stockholm, the capital and chief commercial centre of the country. The Company charges in Stockholm a flat rate of \$27.00 or a partial service rate of \$21.60 and \$16.20, under which the subscriber pays \$13.50 as installation fee. The Government charges in Stockholm a flat rate just one half of the Company's rate.

With all the prestige of the Government, with the advantage of a general connection by its long distance lines with its exchanges throughout the country, it would naturally be expected that the Government exchange in Stockholm would greatly outnumber its competitor in the number of subscribers. Not so, however. The Company has 34,000 subscribers to its exchange and the Government but 11,000. The fight has been going on for a number of years with little advantage on either side, but organized administration and good service is seemingly at last giving the Company the

That the Government recognizes that its rate in Stockholm is an artificial one is shown by the fact that it charges a higher rate in its small exchanges where it has no competition than it does in Stockholm.

The conditions for service in Canada cannot fairly be compared with conditions in Sweden. The purchasing power of money is more than double in Sweden what it is in this country. Labor, material, everything, is cheaper there. When the fight is over and normal rates and other conditions resumed, it will be time enough to draw lessons from that

The development of the telephone in Sweden has been enormously exaggerated. It was stated before the Special Committee to be one telephone for 14 of the population of the country, but it now transpires that this average applies only to Stockholm, which is not as great as the development at Winnipeg and not much higher than Montreal and Toronto.

We have not a great deal to learn even from much-misrepresented Sweden.

In St. Petersburg there is a strong impression that the English companies should be adequately compensated for their losses. The Baku Workmen's Alliance, which disapprove of violent measures, has recommended that the revolutionaries issue a proclamation deprecating rarecommended that the revolutionaries issue a proclamation deprecating racial feuds. The Russian workmen present a united front to the owners, and in a proclamation demand compensation for losses, free food and full

and in a proclamation demand compensation for losses, free food and full pay for three months.

The Governor-General assures me that order will be restored and maintained. He intends to deport to their homes the unemployed Armenians. He holds the educated Armenians largely responsible for the outbreak, especially the members of the Technical Association. Independent Russian and foreign opinion also blames the Armenian extremists.



VIGILANT'S 30 SHOTS

Riddle Big Erie Fish Poecher, the Barnhurst.

But Capt. Nick Fassel's Vessel, After An Eight-Mile Chase, Manages to Crawl Into Harbor With Upper Works In Ruins-Capt Dunn Was Generous and Left the Tug Above

Water—His Busy Week.
Erie, Pa., Sept. 18.—The fourth of
the fish tug incidents of the past week
took place in mid-lake Erie yesterday,
when the Canadian cruiser Vigilant

when the Canadian cruiser Vigilant riddled the big steam tug Harry G. Barnhurst with small shells from the rifie on the patrel boat.

Capt. Nick Fassel of the tug admitted after he escaped that the Vigilant could have sent her to the bottom if Capt. Dunn had so desired. They ran more than eight miles under full head of steam before they crossed the boundary line and escaped from the Canadians.

dary line and escaped from the Canadians.

More than thirty shots struck the vessel, and of these fifteen of the small shells landed with telling effect on the upper parts, so the boat careened to one side with the mass of wreckage when she came into port.

Having been used for merely a pleasure steamer the Barnhurst is of large size and well fitted with steam equipment.

Fireman Fainted.
The fireman, Magnus Johnson, fainted in the hold from over-exertion in keeping the steamer going ahead. He was reported killed, but revived after reaching shore. Two fishermen were cut in the face

Two namermen were cut in the lace by splinters shot away by the bullets. The Barnhurst, according to Capt. Fassel, was about five miles over the line drawing nets when the Vigilant appeared. The other Erie tugs the Vallant and the Boyd, were also over the line and yen away when the chase the line and ran away when the chase

started. Čapt. Dunn ordered the Barnhurst to stop, but instead of doing so Capt.
Fassel put on full steam and started
for the line. He took a southwesterly direction and could not be headed by the Vigilant.

It has become quite the custom for

the Erie fishermen to cross the line, regardless of strict orders from the companies employing them, and having exciting brushes with the Vigilant.

Japan Has One Like His Counterparts

In Europe.

Japan, like Austria, Russia and Bavaria, has a Prince of the blood who devotes himself almost entirely to scidevotes himself almost entirely to selentific pursuits; and the oriental counterpart of the learned Grand Duke Constantine of Russia, president of the Imperial Academy of Sciences at St. Petersburg. of Archauke Leuis Salvator of Austria, whom I portrayed in these letters a few days ago under his incognito, "Prof. Neufeld," and of the eminent orulist, Duke Charles Theodore of Bavaria, is to be found in the imperial Prince Kikumaro Yamashina, who, at 33 years of age, is in the line of succession to the throne of the Mikado, says the Marquise de Fontenoy.

Indeed, it may be questioned whether it is not the finest in the world, being furnished with all the most recently invented instruments, not merely for the recording of meteorological changes but also of those seismic movements which are so

ments, not merely for the recording of meteorological changes but also of those seismic movements which are so frequent and so severe in Japan.

Indeed, Dai Nippon is the land of earthquakes par excellence. No better spot could have been found for the establishment of this station than Mount Tsukuba, which, according to Japanese legend and national tradition, was set up by the divinities, Izanaga and Izanami, the creator and the creatress of Japan, as a bulwark against the tremendous waves of the Pacific ocean. It is a curious fact, and in a line with Japanese traditions, that this bulwark, along with the entire eastern coast of Japan, has been rising gradually higher and higher from the sea for centuries past. Geologists have verified this.

Near the summit of the mountain, which commands a superb view not only of the Pacific ocean but also of the entire plain and city of Tokio towards Mount Fujiyama, there is an ancient and most picturesque temple dedicated to Izanagi, which is the bourn of many pilgrimages.

FIRE FROM MIDST OF SEA.

Sicily's Herror - Submarine Fissure Formed Near Eolie and Surface Was Covered With Clouds of Steam.

Rome, Sept. 18.-Another earthquake ccurred Saturday in the Province of Messins, Sicily, and in the Islands of Stromboli, Lipari and Eolie. The erup-tion of Stromboli is still very violent, and lava is flowing into the sea on the side of the Island opposite Sicily, caus-

ing a terrific noise.

Between the Island of Eolie and Milazzo, Sicily, the sea suddenly rose up and flames and smoke issued from the midst of the waters, which were covered with dense steam for a distance of two kilometres. Geologists say that this is due to the opening of a sub-marine fissure, and that it shows the seismic disturbances are not yet finish-

ed.

M. Capitelli, prefect of Messina, has
left for Lipari and Stromboii, and the
population is completely terrorized
and is sleeping in small boats, fearing
to pass the night ashore.

Vesuvius, too, is very active, and
there is a strong flow of lava, accom-

panied by subterranean rumblings.

There were also freek shocks of earthquake at Catanzaro, Monteleone and Cosenza. The Cathedral of Monteleone threatens to fall and will have to be demolished. At Scigliano during the earthquake the earth opened and the river Sarruto was swallowed up, but afterward reappeared. At Pizzo the water of the streams turned hot.

CZAR AIDS OIL MEN.

Calls Conference and Orders Troops to Affected Anea.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 18.—The Emperor has ordered the convening at the end of September of a conference of oil men, industrial representatives of Central Russia, representatives Volga Steamship Co., and those persons in Government Departments intereste to examine into the situation and to

report to the Minister of Finance.
The Emperor also ordered the immediate concentration in the vicinity of the oil fields of a sufficient number of troops to guarantee order and the formation of a police force, recruited from reservists, for the protection of

the works. Acing on an Imperial mandate, the Solsky commission will commence next week the elaboration of plans for a Ministerial Cabinet, the work to be completed before the meeting of the

National Assembly.

THERE IS NO MORE LAND

Premier Whitney's Answer to Northwest Veterans.

Says Their Request For Recognition By the Government Will, However Be Considered With Favor-Volunteer Land Grants a Blunder as the Recipients Do. Not Benefit-Speculators Stealing the Timber.

Toronto, Sept. 19.—"It is absolutely mpossible for the Government of On-arlo to give you any land, because here is no more land to give."

This was in part Premier Whi ney' Ims was in part Freeher Wil neys inswer to a deputation of nearly 100 nembers of the Northwest Field Force Association which waited upon the Government yesterday and asked for and grants similar to those given to he veterans of 1866, 1870 and of the south African war. The Premier added that in the fu-

ure the Government would have to nost earnestly consider if there was most earnestly consider if there was no other way of carrying out its obligations to those who had been called apon to defend the counry than by making grants of land. So far as the leputation was concerned, the request hat something should be done would, he said, be considered "by the Government with a leaning towards you." But they need have no more ideas thout land grants: the land was not about land grants; the land was not

Recipients Do Not Benefit.

The Premier during the course of his remarks reiterated his previously exremarks reiterated his previously expressed disappoval of the volunteer and grants act as conceived and put nto operation by the former Administration. Its working out had led to a great series of blunders, resulting in disadvantage, both to the men who deserved a reward for their services and to the Province. A portion of the land ad already found its way into the hads of speculators, who, in order to defeat the law in regard to settlement duties and so on, were leasing the locations for the purpose of stealing the limber, and as soon as the timber was gone they would leave the land. Very few of the men entitled to such land grants ever received any benefit from them. Many of them has no intention of settling on their locations, and could not, owing to the restrictions, sell at a fair price. If the Government had given a cash grant of, say, \$40 to each man, everyone concerned would have been better off, the men would have got something and the Government would have the land.

It will take ten years to survey townships enough to allot the applications that have already been put in by the yeterans of 1866.

The Deputation's Spokesmen. President Lieut.-Col. C. Greville Har-

sten in outlining the request of the association, said that personally he thought a mistake had been made in misking the land grants, but since they had been made the men who fought in 1885 were as much entitled to a share as any others. Brief addresses were also made by Alderman S. Alfred Jones, Privates Lionel Dent and W. J. Urquhart, Staff-Sergt. Bewley, Sergt.-Major Tilley, Sgts. Lewis and Fowler, Mr. B. Cairns and Capt. T. Burke, Peterboro'. Several of the spokesmen, while frankly admitting that they received scrip from the Dominion Government, pointed out that the conditions requir-

ed settlement within one year. was impossible for many of them, and their scrip was sold cheaply, the land speculators being the only persons to benefit.

BIG FIRE AT NOME.

Some Twenty-Five Buildings Destroyed—Loss May Be \$500,000.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 19.—Despatches received in Seattle tell of a distrous fire that swept the heast of the business section of Nome on the night of Seattenberg 19.

From the mesgre information given, it is believed that twenty to twenty-five buildings were destroyed in the vicinity of Lanesway, and that the fire area covered from two to three blocks. If the fire burned in both directions from Lanesway, it is estimated by Seattle persons familiar with the class of business houses in that vicinity that the loss will reach \$500,000.

Advices received yesterday say sixty buildings were destroyed by fire at Nome, Alaska, on the night of Sept. 13, causing a loss of \$200,000. The city hall was destroyed, but the records were saved. No loss of life is reported
