



Was intimidation a factor in Editor's apology?

Recent editorials of Argosy Editor Don Gorman have raised accusations of defamation from VP Administration David Stewart. Gorman's January 16 editorial, "Ahh ... Another Hot Year of Slander," commented on former VP Finance Sharon MacFarlane's scruples and on Stewart's approach to student security. It resulted in a phone call

"Our situation is driven by two numbers - our \$12.9-million accumulated deficit and our \$3.9million operating deficit for this year." explained Carleton President Richard Van Loon during the meeting. "That leads to a process that is faster than anyone i n this room would like, but that's life."

All of Carleton's programs will be put under the microscope by the academic planning committee over the next month.

"For staff and faculty it's going to be tense," says Jeff Jakobsen, the Carleton University Students' Association's vice-president academic and a member of the committee. "Their obs are on the line. This is people's livelihood and future in question here." The planning committee will report their findings to senate Feb. 20 and senate will make final decisions on what stays and what goes by March 21

Services plebiscite

Beside each of the over 24 items, there will be space for a yes/no and a fourpoint qualitative scale, running from "very unsatisfied" to "very satisfied." The plebiscite will be approximately one standard sheet long, and will be treated like a survey, Chief Returning Officer, Matt Tingley told the UNB SU Council this past Tuesday.

Council revisited the notion of a non-binding plebiscite this Tuesday. Last week, Engineering Representative, and UNBSU Student-of-the-month, Darren Thompson Council put forward a simplified version of the current question, which asked "Which services of the UNB Student Union do you use?" and "Are you satisfied with the UNB SU?"

Arts Representative Sarah Mullaly spoke out this Tuesday in favour of a more ive approach.

comprehensive approach. "If we have a plebiscite, a simple yes/no will tell us nothing," she said bluntly. "We don't learn anything, we just waste paper." Vice-President (Student Services) Trish Davidson, decried the length of the

Business Rep Matt Hanrahan concurred with Mullaly, "It is a large undertaking," he conceded, "but we should take the time to do it properly." Both Mullaly and Hanrahan are reoffering for their respective Council

President Joie Hellmeister weighed in, saying she opposed last week's version of the plebiscite because it would not tell the Union how to improve services, only whether students used them or not.

Darren Thompson, who originated the idea of a plebiscite as part of the General Election, wholeheartedly endorsed Mullaly's suggestions to change the question. Further, he volunteered to help in the compilation of the results. The new question was approved with only Trish Davidson in opposition, and

Vice-President (Student Services) Trish Davidson reported on the Paper Trail, a new price list, which re-worked the prices in order to keep the cost of photocopies down to 10 cents was passed. The new prices will go into effect on April 1, 1997.

The Health Plan's loss ratio is 100%. This means that students are claiming as much as they are paying in premiums. The result is a loss for both the Student Union and the Health Plan provider, Morneau and Associates. There are two options: raising premiums or reducing coverage.

Davidson favours keeping the fee the same and reviewing the Health Plan. Some alternatives: reducing the co-payment from 80% to 70%, removing onents of the plan, or enrolling in managed care.

Managed Care would mean that a list of certain experimental drugs would not be covered by the SU plan. Many of these drugs, according to Davidson, are treatments for cardiac disease or cancer and are not used by students very often. This would also mean a mandatory substitution of a generic brand, unless explicitly prescribed by the physician.

Davidson told Council she favours an examination of the use of various components of the Health Plan and removing options which are very expensive and/or are under used. One example would be the international travel insurance, which alone contributes to \$12,96 of the \$95 Health Plan fee. According to statistics in Davidson's possession, only 4.8% of the students in the plan have used this option. She also noted that if the \$13 portion was removed from the standard health plan, a student in the SU plan could pay \$15 to receive that additional coverage.





She also noted that Campus Entertainment, which showed a loss of \$18,000 was, in fact, closer to break-even, but that the deposits for recent concerts had not been made.

Vice-President (External) Anthony Knight told Council that there will be a protest for the Board of Governor's meeting on Thursday, February 13. The Board will receive the report of the Task Force on University Fees. Knight said he was very heartened by the initiative of the many students who had done a lot of the leg work, which "the Student Union doesn't always do as

Knight reported that the meeting with the Graduate Students Association went well, and he looks forward to working with this organization in the

Knight remarked that he attended a meeting at CHSR over the weekend. He commented that there were indications that there would be "positive, progressive change" at the station and "they've got good people."

President Joie Hellmeister told Council the Festival of Cultural Diversity went really well. The closing ceremonies, last weekend, were very spectacular. The Roaring Girl is collection of 12 short stories. running from riske' to up front seriousness. This was a very readable book, though sometimes the stories were, to me, a little to deep. Much of the writing was such that one has to search for the meanings behind the words. However, hidden meanings or not, I believe that this book was very well written, and literary, without being

The characters were realistic and presented in a believable manner. Their descriptions and dialect easily conjure up pictures of what they look like and who they are; people who we all might know. In fact, most of the protagonists were fighting battles that many of us have fought

Account of case puts idealism to the test in tale of true human drama by two industries (a tannery owned by the huge chemical giant W.R. Grace). When Schlictmann filled with compelling characters-even the conglomerate Beatrice, and a plant run by and his associates first take them to court, they lawyers who initially represent the defendants

are quite confident of victory- so confident that, at one point, they speak of nine-figure verdicts that will punish the companies for their neglect. Yet by the end of the trial, Beatrice has somehow been absolved of liability, and the families have been forced into a much smaller settlement with Grace that hardly makes a dent in its coffers. The families never even get an apology they wanted, and Schlictmann's goal of making a real difference lies in ruins.

If this was fiction, it would be compelling enough- certainly more so than any of John Grisham's hackwork-but this is all true, and that makes it even more affecting. Schlictmann emerges as a real tragic hero, a man who insists on meeting the huge defendants on their own turf, regardless of the cost. By the end, he has lost almost everything, his firm and associates (who dedicated themselves almost exclusively to the Woburn case) are crippled by debt, and Schlictmann lies perilously close to insanity. The message is a depressing one-try to change the system, and have the system crush you. A lesser book would have concentrated

Gender-related beliefs and myths: you'll hear or think at least one every day. For some time, though, I've suspected that dichotomies like "Men are from Mars, Women are from Venus" weren't quite getting to the truth of the matter. Sometimes, when I'm alone at night with the lights turned out, I wonder if men and women are really that different. Feminism, a movement aimed at equality for women, at times simply manages to exacerbate the itchy problem of

gender differences. I consider myself a feminist, but I also think that at times, feminism means vilifying men and casting women in the role of victim, and this makes for a difficult model for most people to live within. The real story, of course, is much more complicated.

All of this is why I was really relieved to discover Kate Fillion's book, Lip Service, a cautionary tale for the young runaway feminist nition for those who want to believe that the world isn't divided so neatly into categories of Men versus Womyn. A journalist from Saturday Night and The Globe and Mail, Fillion presents a mixture of academic research and interviews with real people in a very readable, lively book that will be interesting to anyone involved in the gender struggle. Fillion doesn't reject feminism, but she does attempt to look at it without blinders, a much-needed

Fillion starts by disputing "the myth of female superiority," arguing that the end result of choosing to believe that females are innately morally superior is to deny women power. She begins with the perception that women have a unique and pure ability to bond over shared experience and super-sensitive intimacy skills, then breaks down such beliefs by depicting-as thoroughly as Margaret Atwood does in her fiction-the subtle cruelties that can exist between women. Still more illuminating, though, is her depiction of the 'kindnesses' women do for each other: white lies, too-easy forgiveness and habitual self-deprecation. The dynamics of friendships between women, Fillion argues, can be crippling simply because women feel bound by the stereotypes of feminine nurturing, sharing and sensitivity

By providing a different perspective on this and other topics, Fillion encourages her reader to be critical of the ways in which their beliefs have been formed. For example, the belief that boys are more aggressive than girls is offset by the suggestion that girls develop and employ sophisticated methods of "psychological warfare." Still more surprising, though, are the ways that current thinking have led us astray. What has developed, as Fillion demonstrates, is a crack between traditional stereotypes and dictates for behaviour, and more advanced, equality-based thinking; men and women fall through the cracks

"There is a difference between blaming the victim and questioning what, exactly, constitutes victimization," Fillion points out. "This is the real danger: women are being coached to misperceive their own sexual 'nature and experiences, which has implications for

virtually every aspect of their lives." It's not a politically correct approach to the issue of date rape, but the point Fillion is making is that when we chose to interpret sexual encounters in this way (giving into persuasion, a skilled "mental attack"), it not only undermines more serious experiences of rape, but also absolves women of responsibility for the choices they make. Reading the situation through Fillion's eyes, I saw for the first time that people who are crying foul about the current sexual climate just might have a point. It's an important message about the familiar No Means No system that is now so ingrained in our thinking. The author questions whether a No that means 'convince me' is equivalent to a No that means 'absolutely not,' and argues that a woman does bear some responsibility for making her actions consistent with her words." Finally, Fillion's interviews with men are

particularly revealing. More of this information about the effects of gender stereotypes on men is needed in any fair-minded debate about gender issues (I've always thought that the assumption that only women are opressed by traditional expectations is egocentric and too easy). The effect of societal pressure on men to be masculine, particularly in the bedroom, is

argued that it must be taken as a whole rather than as the sum of its threatening parts. As a whole, it is educational and important for anyone who wants to better understand gender relations. After finishing Lip Service, I gave it to my mother. "I wish I'd had this book twenty years ago," she said. Fillion is admirably resolute, making no apologies for being the bearer of the message that the Empress is naked, convinced that the knowledge will be good medicine for all of us. At the most, it is liberation for all; at the least, it is a little more relaxing than feeling totally opressed

It goes on to elicit memories of losing people to circumstance, only to find them later, yet they are not the same person at all.

The story I liked least in this collection is called The Naked Man. The main reason I didn't particularity like this is due to the fact that I just didn't understand it. Maybe this was just an example of intentional obtrusiveness or the part of the author, trying to make the reader look between the lines, but I found it very confusing, thus making it uninteresting to me. It was filled with hints and off the wall things happening, but I just did not have the time or the faith in the story to go looking for meaning. All in all, I really enjoyed reading this book and would recommend it to anyone who would like to get away for a little bit into someone else's world.

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

Let's hope that there is an outbreak of good health next year, because the UNB Student Union is counting on it, desperately.

Nominations for the UNB Student Union general elections are over, and there are only 17 members available for a 31 member Council. Whatever any person might try to tell you, the Companies Act clearly defines quorum as at least 50%+1, and no less than 3, members of a Board of Directors which is under 50 members. Not of the seated members, but of the available seats. Otherwise, there would be no point in quorum. According to the logic of this, four people could offer for Council and spend \$1,000,000 of student money anyway they pleased.

I think it's high time that the Union re-evaluate the entire election process. It's not the first time that things have been so dire, either. It is a perennial problem. The Union should take the initiative and launch a study.

There is at least some chance that one of the candidates will lose a yes/no ballot (unlikely, but possible) and there is a good change that at least one will leave over the summer. Let's just hope that not one person gets sick. Given that this past week, only 22 of 31 elected members of the Council showed up, it looks pretty grim for next year.

And then what? Council is empowered to meet at one-third quorum between May and September, and the Executive would be able to make decisions until Council could meet, but the entire question of democracy and natural justice will go out the window.

There are few things which have been happening over and over, at every election. Once again, there is no candidate for Education or Nursing. Why? Might this have something to do with the fact that the third and fourth year students are on work terms during elections? Or, that if elected, they would miss at least a third of the Council meetings because of this work term?

Other things are relatively new, such as having only one engineering candidate. Last year, we had 11. What happened? Does anybody care? Maybe it's time that the Union look at empowering the Faculty Clubs to elect members to the Council. What if the Union had the executives of each Faculty Club sit on Council? That would mean a direct accountability, instead of the two or three hands. And the elections could be cheaper by having

smaller, punctuated, Faculty-by-Faculty elections. And why are there so few candidates this year? One of the reasons may have something to do with the "policy" of requiring candidates for faculty representatives to acquire the signatures of 25 people. A look at the Student Union's Bylaws, however, points out that faculty representatives require only 10 signatures. When confronted with this evidence by Arts candidate Mark

Harvey, who has taken photos for The Brunswickan, the officials in the Student nion office said that the precedent has been for the past several years. Harvey eventually found the additional 15 signatures, but it raises an important question in my mind: don't the Bylaws of the Union explicitly state that the Union is not bound by precedent, and can a Bylaw of the Union be overridden by a policy passed down by word of mouth from year to year?

One person I was talking about this said, "they just didn't want to make another form." That may be a bit too harsh, but there is certainly something wrong when an unwritten policy may prevent people from offering themselves as candidates for Council.

The real issue is not really whether there are 10 or 25 signatures, but why they are needed at all. Ostensibly, candidate forms reduce the number of people who would run for the "wrong" reasons. But clearly 25 names can't prevent that. Why not a \$5 deposit? Do 25 names imply that you are 'outgoing" or merely willing to go out and find people you don't know sign your form.

Somebody please take some notes: signatures are pointless, low voter (and candidate) turnout should indicate something else is going on (and you should want to find out what), and having a by-election which is larger than your General Elections make the Union look pretty silly.

If the Union found a way to ensure representation from each Faculty, what could possibly be the down side? Too many nurses and teachers on Council?

And if the rules for candidacy were relaxed, what would be the worst outcome, 10 candidates for each seat?

Is the cure so much worse than the disease?

Conference held in Montreal by the McGill Institute for the Study of Canada. It was intended to be a forum for discussion on the recently published mendations of RCAO for students, academics, professionals, and, of course, Aboriginal peoples.

A three-day conference, it consisted of numerous panel discussions and plenary sessions where leading authorities, academics, Native leaders and commi presented their opinions on a variety of specific topics. Now, it was all very well-intentioned but, as a woman, it was difficult not to notice that the conference was tially being dominated by the white, male opinion. In fact, the only female panel discussion was held on the role of Aboriginal women in the governing process which included Andrea Bear Nicholas (STU) and Patricia Monture Angus (USask) and a third Inuit woman. While it was refreshing to see that the panel concerning issues affecting Aboriginal women consisted exclusively of Aboriginal women-that was, to a large extent, IT for female representation. In fact, that was basically IT for female voices! In all the other panel discussions female representation and participation was markedly absent and a growing frustration among woman participants was obvious. In traditional Aboriginal society, women have a strong voice in their community. But no one, particularly the white men dominating the panel discussions, listened to what these women, or any women, really had to say. Sure they heard our voices when we were allowed to speak but they did not Sure they heard our voices when we were allowed to speak but they did not listen-especially not to the Aboriginal women. Sure women managed to ask a few questions but, in one session I attended, after listening to a white man and several others question I finally stood up, after having been passed over by the moderator and said: "I am tired of sitting here listening to what white men have to say about everything. Women make up 50% of the population but one would never know this from this conference. Moreover, this conference is not about us as white/nonNative people but about Aboriginal peoples-so it is time for us to stop talking and to start listening to those who are affected by the recommendations of this Con

Imagine if the commission were on what to do with white men in society-h a imagine it the commission were on what to do with white men in society-how would they feel if their voices weren't heard? Essentially, my point is: what womyn say is important and valid! Women have a lot to say-the problem is, we are never heard. Men must learn to listen-and womyn must be listened to. Though this conference was not expressly about women, and I do not wish to detract from its purpose, it was about oppression and the perpetuation of that oppression-upon Aboriginal peoples. But, as Patricia Monture Angus once said: To be a Mohawk Woman is to face double oppression.

The Ephesian church leaders had a way of rooting out people who didn't follow the rules, who disagreed with their way of doing things. John did not regard this as a virtue. He reminds them of Jesus' great command "to love one another," the very thing that initially drew them together. His reprimand is rather severe. He states that a failure to return to a loving community will result in the removal of the "lampstand." What did he mean?

The early church was called to be a "light in a dark world." That is, its beliefs, teachings and love of others were intended to be a new way of living - in a world beset by competition, power, and decadence. This is what attracted so many to this new movement. As the new movement became institutionalized, as all movements tend to become, the emphasis shifted from an outward emphasis -reaching out to others in

love and acceptance - to an inward focus - protecting what we have and excluding those we dislike.

There is a time when drawing a line is necessary; not all teaching is acceptable. But the manner in which this linedrawing is done is most crucial. Love is at all times to govern these matters. With the little group in Ephesus this had slipped dangerously. Another kind of love appeared to gain the upper hand: the love of putting other people in the wrong, of patronizing and backbiting, of power and hating. A big reason that Fluffy was so special was that he would wait for me to come home every night. He'd sleep in front of Jim and Rachel's chimney (our next door neighbours), and would get up to greet us when we pulled into the driveway. He was always predictable. I could impress people by telling him to "roll over," "stand up" and "follow me" - and our ritual

(which he instigated himself) made it seem like he was trained. He loved his spot in front of that

chimney, so although Rachel placed flowers around her house, she refused to plant any in "Fluffy's Spot." He slept there so much that he put a permanent indent in the ground.

The only problem we ever had with Fluffy was his fur colour: white. His hair half-hour for him but he didn't show up. showed up on every item of clothing and any dark material that we owned. The next morning he wasn't seated on the railing as he usually was. I tried to read and I kept thinking that he would All my shirts were decorated with millions of white cat hairs. If anything was left laying on the bed or floor, he'd purposely sleep on it, as if he had some secret mission to cover everything in our house with his fur.

He had an attitude, too. Whenever we would leave for the weekend, he would sulk when we returned. Fluffy would just turn his back, walk a few feet away and then ignore anybody when they called to him. But he would quickly forgive us, especially once we turned on the electric can opener to feed him. Then we would be his best friends again. We used to try to trick him by opening different items, but he could always distinguish between

soup and cat food cans. He was a great source of laughter. He hated the cold of the winter months, and the snow was always too deep for him. When he trekked out to the woods, he would often try to retrace his "pawprints" back to the house. But he ld always start off with the wrong paw in the wrong print, so he would approach the house continuously crossing one leg in front of the other as he walked. Then he'd be wet, so he'd be as stubborn as possible while I dried him. But once he finished eating he would jump onto my bed and curl up behind my knees to go to sleep.

Fluffy's major activities were eating and sleeping. He liked french fries, cheese and any piece of turkey, ham or roast beef. But he always loved his cat food. He would often wait on the deck railing to be let in, and I'd then hear him crunching away on his dry food. The last time I saw him was on a Saturday afternoon in the summer. He was sleeping on a neighbour's trailer and I patted him goodbye before I went out for the day. Since we have very few photos of Fluffy, I also took a picture of him. "Just so I'll have to something to remember you by when you're gone," I said to him. Sadly enough, that was the last time I saw him.

When I got home after midnight on that Saturday, Fluffy wasn't waiting outside for me. Nor was he indoors. I

appear anytime, strolling nonchalantly across the lawn as he had done for the past nine years. But he wasn't anywhere. My dad soon came to my room, and I felt very sick. He told me he had found Fluffy - or what was left of him. I had never seen my dad with tears in

his eyes before. My mom, dad, brother and I ventured out into the forest to see what had happened. There really wasn't anything left. The area was scattered with white tufts of fur but little else. I don't know what attacked him.

We returned to the house, where my dad and I built a small, wooden box so I could at least pick up what remained. The soft white fur that had decorated so much of my clothing was caught on the tiny ferns, and his beloved dry food that he had eaten the night before was strewn about the forest floor. The flies continuously buzzed about, and I started to cry as I picked up small remains of my longtime friend and placed them in a crude, tiny box. A box that, twentyfour hours earlier, would have made me laugh to think Fluffy could fit in it.

Fluffy was my best friend. He never yelled at me, he never lied to me, he never even asked me for anything other than some food and a space on my bed. He was always there when I turned around, on my bed or under my desk or looking out my window. But his claws don't click on the kitchen floor anymore. I don't hear the weight of his body his the floor in the middle of the night when he would leap off my brother's bed and then come downstairs to see me. And he doesn't curl up against my legs and fall asleep while I'm reading anymore. But today is Valentine's Day, and you're

supposed to remember your loved ones. We never ever gave Fluffy anything for Valentine's Day; despite the fact that my family and I loved him so much, we didn't even know his birthday. But I don't need any day of the year set aside to remembe Fluffy. He was my best friend.

These are the best words that could be used to describe Kathleen Scherf and her attitude towards her job as Associate Dean of the Faculty of Arts.



The Pressures To Be Thin

February 3-8 was declared National Eating Disorder Awareness Week. Were you able to visit any of the booths set up in Fredericton? With the help of UNB nursing students, the Eating Disorder Advisor Committee on campus was able to increase awareness amongst adults and children about eating disorders. With the week now behind us, the committee hopes to continue to educate and inform the public on the dangers of disordered eating

The incidences of eating disorders continue to increase, along with an "epidemic" rise in the fear of fat and body shape distortions. This all stems from the increasing pressure to be thin. Messages all around us tell us that in order to be accepted, attractive, able to succeed, and even to be loved we must have the ideal thin body. Mass media, in cooperation with business industry, sells us the perfect body on a regular basis. "Use this kind of toothpaste, exercise on this particular machine, read this diet book, send for these diet pills and you can have the perfect body, too!"

The desire to be thin is a growing \$30 billion market. When we think of our daily acquaintances; classmates, workmates, professors, fellow athletes, schemes to lose weight and the obsession to be thinner is a topic discussed regularly. Are any of these people buying "gimmicks" to assist in weight loss?

It is interesting that a 30 year survey of Miss America contestants and Playboy centrefolds revealed the women were/are becoming thinner each year. Many, at 13-19% below their expected weight, are viewed as being at anorectic levels. For both groups, weights have levelled off because, as researchers have suggested that to go

religion and legal system (among others) all derived from British thought. The difference lies primarily in everyday life. Stuart arrived here last September from London with two other peop ple.The three of them are here on an exchange trip. Prior to studying here Stuart was furthering his life options at the University of Swansea in Wales.

"We came over around ten o'clock at night. The three of us were looking out of the plane to see what we had gotten ourselves into 'cause none of us had been to Canada before. We couldn't see a thing. We were expecting to see the lights of all these houses or a big city. We were also expecting snow but we ended up wearing shorts our first day here. It was a bit of a shock at first because we were told all these things by exchange students who were here last year that didn't exactly ring true."

The education system differs in that in England, specific grades, for example grade one or grade four within an elementary school, do not exist. There is Primary school, Middle school and dary school. Then after Secondary school you go on to A-level. Some of my avid Cultures column readers might recall that in St. Lucia there is also A-

level. A-level is basically grade twelve and thirteen. After A-level you go on to university. There are no distinguishing grades in each of the four levels of schooling. Speaking of university, tuition is free in England. "I don't agree with the system over here at all," says Stuart. "Education should be free. You're here to better yourself and I can't believe that you would have to pay so much to further your education. I find the standards for grading and the way that professors teach over here are different. In university back nome, a seventy percent is one of the best marks you can get. If you get over a seventy percent you're doing really well. The grading system is a bit harsher in England. I find the way that professors teach over here a lot better. Classes back home take place in these big theatres that hold between two and five hundred people."

UNB's On-Line Registration System

INTRODUCTION

Undergraduate students on the Fredericton Campus of the University of New Brunswick are able to register for their courses using computers available on campus or through the Internet. This on-line computer-based system is intended to make registration easy. By having direct access to UNB's Student Information System, you will be able to both register for courses and to make any subsequent changes necessary.

You will receive an On-Line Registration Handbook from your faculty. If you still have difficulty using the system, come to the main registration centre in the IUC Science concourse or to the Registrar's Office during business hours.

Preparation for Registering in the Winter 1997-98 Session

TIMETABLE INFORMATION

Before you begin the registration process, you must be clear as to the courses for which you will register. You should take a copy of this timetable with you for your session with your advisor. Be prepared to construct your timetable for the Winter 97-98 session.

An updated timetable, with classroom assignments, will be mailed to all students during the summer.

CONFLICTS

If you try to register for two courses in the same time slot, a warning message will appear on the screen. Faculties will be advised if a student has registered for two courses in the same time slot, and they have the right to delete one of the courses. Therefore you should discuss all potential conflicts with your advisor.

ADVISING

We recognize that students need to discuss their academic programs and plan to ensure that their course selection is appropriate to meet graduation requirements as well as future goals. All students in degree programs are required to meet with an advisor prior to registering.

Returning students in degree programs, both in full-time and part-time studies, should contact their department office (or Dean's office for faculties with no departments) for information regarding advising procedures. Part-time students in degree programs, returning after one or more year's leave of absence are advised to meet with the faculty to review their program. Full-time students in No Degree programs are advised to review their programs with Judith Potter in the Department of Extension and Summer Session.

Students transferring into a degree program from another post-secondary institution, will be able to access the on-line registration system as soon as they have been accepted, and advised by their Faculty.

PRE-REQUISITES

You are required to honour prerequisites and corequisites attached to courses. Courses selected for which you have not satisfied prerequisites or other requirements can be deleted by your faculty. It is your responsibility to check your status concerning courses for which you do not have the prerequisite or corequisite. Some courses have restricted access. You should consult your advisor if you want permission to register for a course so designated.

PERSONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (PIN)

You will need an active personal identification number and your student identification number to register for Winter 1997-98 courses. You will be given a new 1997-98 PIN once advising has been completed. This personal identification number is for your use only and gives you access to the registration system. For the security of your record, it is important that you not share your PIN with others, and that you exit properly from the registration system once you have completed your entry.

If you already have a current PIN, you may continue to use it for registering in courses for Intersession or Summer Session 1997. However, you will require a new PIN from your advisor to register for Winter 97-98 courses. Once you have activated your new PIN by going into the Winter 97-98 session, it will then become your current PIN for entry to any session. Your previous PIN will be deactivated. (For some other services like access to your information via the WEB, your PIN will not be valid until the next day-after a nightly update has been made to some of the computerized systems). Full-time no-degree and part-time and full-time visiting students may get their PIN from the Registrar's Office.

Exchange students will get their PIN from the faculty that houses their program of study.

Part-time no-degree students may get their PIN from the Department of Extension and Summer Session, or from the Registrar's Office.

Students in the Concurrent Bachelor of Education programs will first be advised by their non-Education faculty advisor, then be advised and get their PIN from the Faculty of Education. New students in the BA/BSc program will be advised by the Arts faculty first, then be advised and get their PIN from the Science faculty.

Students in the Concurrent BA/BSc program will be advised by the Arts faculty first, then be advised and get their PIN from the Faculty of Computer Science

If a course is cancelled, students will be notified by the faculty. It is the student's responsibility to select another course with the advisor and to register for it.

AUDIT AND "EXTRA TO DEGREE" PERMISSION

Students wishing to audit a course or to declare a course to be extra to their program must obtain permission from the instructor and the program advisor and have the course recorded on a course change form.
