## Womyn's voices must be heard in all forums

| Recently I attended the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples (RCAP) Conference held in Montreal by the McGill Insitute for the Study of Canada. It was intended to be a forum for discussion on the recently published recommendations of RCAO for students, academics, professionals, and, of course, Aboriginal peoples. <br> A three-day conference, it consisted of numerous panel discussions and plenary sessions where leading authorities, academics, Native leaders and commissioners presented their opinions on a variety of specific topics. Now, it was all very wellintentioned but, as a woman, it was difficult not to notice that the conference was essentially being dominated by the white, male opinion. In fact, the only female essentially being dominated by the white, male opimion. In fact, the only female panel discussion was held on the role of Aboriginal women in the governing process which included Andrea Bear Nicholas (STU) and Patricia Monture Angus (USask) and a third Inuit woman. While it was refreshing to see that the panel concerning issues affecting Aboriginal women consisted exclusively of Aboriginal women-that was, to a large extent, IT for female representation. In fact, that was basically IT for female voices! In all the other panel discussions female representation and participation was markedly absent and a growing fustration among woman participants was obvious. In traditional Aboriginal society, women have a strong voice in their community. But no one, particularly the white men dominating the panel discussions, listened to what these women, or any women, really had to say. Sure they heard our voices when we were allowed to speak, but they did not Sure listen-especially not to the Aboriginal women. Sure women managed to ask a few questions but, in one session 1 attended, after listening to a white man and several others question I finally stood up, after having been passed over by the moderator and said: "I am tired of sitting here listening to what white men have to say about everything. Women make up $50 \%$ of the population but one would never know this from this conference. Moreover, this conference is not about us as white/nonNative people but about Aboriginal peoples-so it is time for us to stop talling and to start listening to those who are affected by the recommendations of his Commission!" <br> Imagine if the commission were on what to do with white men in society-how would they feel if their voices weren't heard? Essentially, my point is: what womyn as is important and valid! Women have a lot to say-the problem is, we are never heard. Men must learn to listen-and womyn must be listened to. Though this conference was not expressly about women, and I do not wish to detract from its purpose, it was about oppression and the perpetuation of that oppression-upon Aboriginal peoples. But, as Patricia Monture Angus once said: To be a Mohawk Woman is to face double oppression. And that is what womyn say. |

## UNB's On-Line Registration System <br> Introduction

INTRODUCrion
Undergraduate students on the Fredericton Campus of the University of New Brunswick are able to register for their courses using computers available on campus or through the Internet. This on-line computer-based system is intended to make registration easy. By having direct access to UNB's Student Information System, you will be able to both register for courses and to make any subsequent changes necessary.
You will receive an On-Line Registration Handbook from your faculty. If you still have difficulty using the system, come to the main registration centre in the IUC Science concourse or to the
Registrar's Office during business hours.
Preparation for Registering in the Winter 1997-98 Session
-
Before you begin the registration process, you must be clear as to the courses for which you will register. You should take a copy of this timetable with you for your session with your advisor. Be prepared to construct your timetable for the Winter 97-98 session.
An updated timetable, with classroom assignments, will be mailed to all students during the summer.
Confucts
If you try to register for two courses in the same time slot, a warning message will appear on the screen. Faculties will be advised if a student has registered for two courses in the same time slot, and they have the right to delete one of the courses. Therefore you should discuss all potential conflicts with your advisor.

Advising
We recognize that students need to discuss their academic programs and plan to ensure that their course selection is appropriate to meet graduation requirements as well as future goals. All students in degree programs are required to meet with an advisor prior to registering.
Returning students in degree programs, both in full-time and part-time studies, should contact their department office (or Dean's office for faculties with no departments) for information regarding advising procedures. Part-time students in degree programs, returning after one or more year's leave of absence are advised to meet with the faculy to review their program.
Full-time students in No Degree programs are advised to review their programs with Judith Potter in the
artment of Extension and Summer Session.
Students transferring into a degree program from another post-secondary institution, will be able to access the on-line registration system as soon as they have been accepted, and advised by their
Facult
Pre-Requistres
You are required to honour prerequisites and corequisites attached to courses. Courses selected for which you have not satisfied prerequisites or other requirements can be deleted by your faculty. It is your responsibility to check your status concerning courses for which you do not have the prerequisite or corequisite. Some courses have restricted access. You should consult your advisor if you want permission to register for a course so designated.

Personal Identification Number (PIN)
You will need an active personal identification number and your student identification number to register for Winter 1997-98 courses. You will be given a new 1997-98 PIN once advising has been
completed. This personal identification number is for your use only and gives you access to the registration system. For the security of your record, it is important that you not share your PIN with others, If you already have arly from the registration system once you have completed your entry.
