Bible Society, France, lately held, M. Guizot delivered an address, in the course o

which he said :-"In 1857, two hundred Protestant parishes or churches in France were not con nected with the Bible Society; but in 1858 sixty, and in 1859, fifty joined it. There are now only about one hundred Protestant parishes which are not in connection with our Society, and we have reason to hope that all of them will soon give us their hearty cooperation. Our receipts, which in 1857 were 43,000f., feil in 1858 to 37,000f., but in 1859 they rose to 45,000f. The battle of Montebello scarcely admits of The battle of Montebello scarcely admits of description. It was a series of dreadful deeds of daring, hand-to-hand fights, of sanguinary encounters, of desperate charges and assaults.
