"Rumors and reports have been received at the Admiralty from various sources of a naval battle having occurred off the Chilean coast. The Admiralty has no official confirmation of this, and such accounts as they have received rest admittedly on Ger-man avidence No other news of the fight is available up to date, according to the despatch and there is no news of the Glasgow, Good Hope or man evidence.

The battleship Canopus, men-tioned by the Admiralty as hav-ing been sent to reinforce Ad-miral Cradock's squadron, has four 12-inch, twelve 6-inch, ten 12-pounder and six smaller guns. Thus her fighting strength is pro-bably superior to the combined armament of the Gneisenau and Scharnhorst, which consists of sixteen 8 2 inch, twelve 6-inch and 68 smaller guns. 


