Conservative Leaders are all Shelved by Late Dominion Election.

**LAURIER MOST NOBLY SUSTAINED.**

**Clifford Sifton Defeats Hugh John McDonald in Manitoba.**

**LOCAL PARTISANS JUBILANT.**

**What Leading Dawson Men Think of the Result—The Corrected Returns.**

Ottawa, Nov. 8, via Skagway, Nov. 13.—Sir Charles Tupper, Foster, Hugh John McDonald, Bergeron, Caron and Montague, are all defeated. The Conservative leaders are practically wiped off the face of the earth.

The overwhelming victory achieved by the Liberals led the Nugget to seek an expression of feeling from men of both political faiths, but after a careful search during the time at disposal, no Conservatives willing to express themselves on the subject could be found. The foregoing telegram shows Mr. Wade, who said:

"It was difficult to anticipate any other result than the overwhelming victory achieved by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party. Never in the history of Canadian politics has a party gone to the country under better auspices. For the first time since confederation a government was able to show a surplus of eight millions in the treasury, which would have been much greater but for the expense of the South African war. During the term of the government the Dominion enjoyed prosperous times. The commercial, mining and railway policies of Mr. Fielding and Mr. Blair in the maritime province had rescued trade from a state of stagnation and induced the greatest possible prosperity. The immigration policy of the minister of the interior advanced settlement to a wonderful extent throughout Manitoba and the Northwest territories. The organization of all the departments of the government was made complete and thorough for the first time in the history of Canadian institutions. With all these advantages and led by Sir Wil-

frid Laurier, who is certainly the greatest personality in Canadian public life, and actuated by common enthusiasm for imperialism and a closer union with the mother country, defeat was impossible.

"While the Liberals went to the country under such auspices as these, the Conservatives were almost without a platform or a cry and still suffered from the heavy hand of the Tupper. The attempt to save the party by bringing in Hugh John McDonald at the last moment to deodorize it from the Tupper influence was too late. The defeat of Sir Charles will probably rid the party of the Tupper incubus. The slaughter of Tory leaders is, if anything, too extensive. The defeat of Foster removes from the house of commons the chief critic of the opposition. Hugh John McDonald was best his father's son and sought political support and preferment not on his merits but on political memories. Bergeron, Caron and Montague were also chiefs of the party and their presence will be greatly missed by their supporters. The only danger to the Liberal party in the future is from lack of opposition and lack of criticism in the house.

"Mr. Sifton's victory over Hugh John McDonald is probably the most striking feature of the campaign. The leader of the Conservatives of Canada was brought into the list against the minister of the interior. Although a Manitoba man himself and carrying with him all the prestige of premier of the province, and although backed by all powers of the Conservative party, he failed to defeat the most maligned man in public life in Canada. Mr. Sifton's success will be particularly gratifying to Sir Wilfrid Laurier who has never made any secret of the fact that he considers him his ablest minister. It will, of course, be gall and wormwood to the Conservatives to feel that their chief has been beaten by the man whom they so cordially hate for his ability and statesmanship. By seeking to destroy him they have succeeded in making him far more influential in the campaign and in the public affairs of Canada than ever before."

**Corrected Returns.**  
Ottawa, Nov. 8, via Skagway Nov. 13.—The Laurier government was returned to power by an overwhelming majority and the London papers express warm approval of the result.

Election returns up to date are as follows (Liberals first):

The above telegram was received shortly after 1 p. m. today, and as a result of that and the victory which called it forth the wine corks are chasing each other to the ceiling in the room back of Lewin Bros.' office this afternoon, and one needs no searchlight to discover that there are Liberals in the land. The telegram in question came to Sheriff Ellbeck from his old time friend Jim McGregor of Brandon. The same gentleman also sent a wire to F. C. Wade which reads as follows: "If Billy White had made a few more speeches here Hugh John McDonald would have lost his deposit."

The reading of this telegram called to mind the performance of Mr. White during the last campaign, when he stumped Eastern Assinibia in the interests of Windy McDonald. McDonald's deposit was barely saved to him then and Billy White earned the title of Jonah of the West, and it would appear from this that he is not apt to loose the sobriquet. In the ranks of the Liberals here there is harmony and what may naturally be termed a love feast. The only differences of opinion heard expressed are by Mr. Lithgow, who takes exception to Mr. Wade's classification of the elected minister inasmuch as he insists that Mr. Fielding's name should be placed next that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier instead of that of Mr. Sifton. Mr. Wade, however, is true to his convictions and refuses to yield the point.

**Direct From Nome.**  
The following letter contains the latest news from Nome, it having arrived in this city today via San Francisco. The letter is from Dennis Horgan, who is in charge of the grocery department of the Ames Mercantile Company at Nome, and was forwarded to Cashier Jas. L. Gray, of the company here.  
Nome, Oct. 8.  
"To enjoy sausage thoroughly you must have confidence," says an "ad" in the store, and let me whisper a word on the same strain. If you want to en-

joy No. 3 California street you want to go up against this "slower-than-the-wrath-of-God" hole. It's about three months since I saw you in the flesh, but it seems even longer.

The place isn't as bad as the newspapers make it out, although it would not support the drove of poor suckers that were lured here by the steamship pamphlets. The beach this year was a rank failure and it is now strewn for ten miles with all kinds of steam plants in disuse and abandoned, while a month or so ago they were running at full blast and sandwiched in with men, women and children at work with rockers, but the majority only averaged a couple of dollars a day, and with this surplus population thrown on the town made things look blue for awhile. The majority of the creek claims are very rich (those that are being worked) while a great number more are tied up in litigation which when opened up will help to push the place ahead. Whatever the future of the camp will be, and those who know predict that from now on it will go ahead rapidly, we have been doing a big business which seems to increase every day as the season draws to a close.

At the present writing we are outfitting quite a number bound for a new strike about 70 miles up the coast; and the rains which we are getting enable a number of claims on dry creeks to be worked, and altogether things are brightening. The discoverer of the first claim here told me the other evening that last year he took out \$800,000, and expects to triple it this; and has such faith in the richness of the country that he is going to take a party out to prospect further in anticipation of richer diggings.

We're at present living in a vacated restaurant, which is a paradise to the tent life we had for a month. We are about to move into our permanent quarters over our auxiliary warehouse which is under construction and there are many funny jawing matches among the boys when they try to get together and figure out peacefully whom they will room with in our last resting place.

I would continue, as I have lots to tell you, but must close as it is 12 o'clock and I am off at my bunkhouse in order to rise at 7 with the rest of the hoemen. It's a regular army life. One fellow is now snoring like a pig in his bunk, and I'll have to wake him in order to get an even break to get asleep. Remember me, as the Irish man says, "to all inquiring friends."

Carlo Tilly, well known to all the old timers, has opened up his claim, No. 2 on Last Chance, and has been rewarded by finding a rich pay streak. He will operate steadily this winter and expects to be able to add largely to the circulating medium of exchange when the gentle spring time comes.

**More Dogs Poisoned.**  
Night before last a valuable dog of the husky variety of C. B. Simms died as the result of carbolic acid poisoning. Only a few days before this Mr. Powle lost two dogs by the same means. The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will probably take the matter in hand and there is little doubt but what if the guilty party or parties are caught an example will be made which will go far toward making such matters of rare occurrence in the future.

## THE REWARD OF VIRTUE.

The Daily News was the victim of another severe case of hysterics last evening. The poor thing is having these fits so often of late that it seems not unlikely that fatal results will some time ensue. The occasion of the outburst of yesterday was the fact that the Nugget on Monday evening published two special editions covering all the essential points relating to the presidential election, scoring a "scoop" on the News by fully sixty minutes.

It will not be forgotten that the News, according to the News, owns an exclusive telegraphic franchise reaching from Dawson to the farthestmost points of the world. We well remember how in days gone by it was no uncommon thing for the News to purchase steamboats, charter a railroad, buy a balloon or hypnotize a telegraph operator, or do any other old thing—on paper—just for the sake of making a scoop. Now, why the News should get so mad and call mean names just because the Nugget, without doing any of the wonderful things noted above, succeeded in laying the news of the presidential election before the people of Dawson sixty minutes ahead of the News, is something we cannot understand. In fact when all the circumstances are taken into consideration we call it not only very unfriendly on the part of the News, but decidedly ungrateful as well.

If it had not been for the Nugget it is quite likely that the News would still be looking for that expected but slow coming wire, and wondering if those skyrockets would not freeze before the time came to set them off.

When the Nugget's first extra was on the street and it had become evident that our good neighbor's "exclusive franchise" was, as usual, out of order when it was most needed, the spirit of generosity which is so essentially a part and parcel of our make-up rose mightily within us. We pictured to ourselves the gloom and despair which at that minute pervaded the sanctum of our contemporary. In fancy we could see the preparations made in grim silence to warn the country by skyrockets—if only that message would come. In our mind's eye we beheld match after match scratched on the editorial pants and held in readiness to set off the rockets—but the matches burned out one after another and still no message came. Who but one with a heart of stone could be aware of such silent agony and not go with relief, if the ability to give relief lay within his power?

The picture was too much for us. We could not resist it. We tried our best to stifle the rising feeling of sympathy, but it would not be stifled, and so to satisfy that feeling we went to the telephone, rang up the News office and told them the glad tidings that McKinley was elected, that Uncle Sam had declared for four years more of the full dinner pail and that it was time to shoot off the fireworks. We went even further than that. Once started we would not allow the matter to stop with being half done. We sent a special

messenger to the News office with a copy of our first edition and thirty minutes later sent a copy of the second edition in with special instructions to offer the News the free use of all telegrams therein contained. We do not care to sound the praises of our own good deeds, but we submit that examples of greater generosity are rarely to be found in this world.

Now, in what manner are we repaid? We have acted the part of the Good Samaritan. We have given our neighbors help when we found them in trouble and despair. We have congratulated ourselves upon the fact that we were enabled to extend a helping hand to one who was deserving, although unfortunate, and our conscience has been comforted with the thought that we were able to bring sunshine where dark night prevailed.

But alas, for perverse human nature. We had expected the News to devote at least a column in sounding the praises of our generosity, and they have fulfilled our expectations by calling us names. We have given out bread and been returned a stone. We have cast our pearls before swine and seen them trampled in the mire. Our belief in human gratitude has been shattered and all the ideals of our youth have been smashed into smithereens.

O, di immortales! Can such be the reward of virtue?

### LAURIER RETURNED.

The Laurier government has been returned to power, as was predicted in these columns some weeks ago would be the case. As we have previously pointed out, we believe this result of the general elections will contribute far more to the promotion of the interests of this territory than would have been the case had the election ended in a Conservative victory.

After a matter of three years the present government has at length become sufficiently posted about the requirements of this territory to be able to pass regulations for its government which are adapted to the situation. A change at this time when matters are just beginning to be conducted in a satisfactory manner, would be most unfortunate and undesirable.

The present laws with the modification contemplated in the near future will make the Yukon a well governed district. That is what we have all been striving for for the past three years. A change of government at Ottawa would have meant the necessity of doing over again much of our previous work.

The Nugget, for one, is glad that the necessity has not arisen, and the Nugget ought to be able to speak on this matter for it has been in the thick of the fight since the very beginning.

## RICH MEN OF THE WORLD

Millionaires Found in Almost Every Known Land

Germany and Austria Prominent in the Golden Book—Russia, China and Africa Represented.

Germany is not generally regarded as a land of rich men, and yet the golden book should have a very large section devoted to Germany and Austria-Hungary. It is true that most of the names would have prince before them, but being of royal blood does not alter the fact of wealth. Without counting the private properties of the sovereigns, who ought not to be included, there are a dozen or so Teutonic highnesses whose wealth, not merely in lands, but in money, is enormous. For example, that of the father of the present Prince of Bulgaria was counted by many millions sterling. Many of the dethroned monarchs, again, are very rich, for royal exile has ceased to be a synonym for poverty. No one, of course, knows the exact wealth of the Orleans family, but it is very great, and even the Bourbons are well off. Don Carlos, in spite of the money he has spent on Spanish and other adventures is a millionaire.

The Russian empire would also make a good show, for although the great landed proprietors have suffered of late years, many of the merchants and financiers have done exceedingly well. If rumor is to be trusted, some of the officials are also very rich. Fabulous sums are attributed to one in particular. The millionaires of Africa would, we suppose, be confined to Kimberley and the Rand; but possibly there are some large fortunes in Cairo among the L'entaine colony. Asia will probably make a very respectable show in the golden book. It is true that in the Turkish and Persian empires millionaires are never long-lived, and this fact tends to their non-existence; but for that, some of the Smyrna Greeks and Damascus Jews ought to be able to gain admission. India, on the other hand, if the native princes who do not possess sovereign rights are counted, as they must be, contains a great number of extremely rich men.

### The Mail Arrives.

The first mail to arrive since the close of navigation got in last evening from the river by dog team.

There was 500 pounds of the matter and it has been a long, hard trip on men and dogs to get it here. The trail, from the account given of by the men who brought the mail, promises to be a splendid one this winter, as all the way from Sixtymile to Selkirk they say is glare ice and as level as a billiard table. The ice just above Sixty-mile is rough, but after the trail is once fairly broken that will not matter. The worst part of the whole of the trail at present is between here and Ogilvie, where the route is very wet. The water overflows the shore ice and freezes over in a thin crust, or mush ice which breaks when weight is put upon it, and last evening when the team arrived dogs and men were both thoroughly wet. At some places where the water was deepest the dogs got wet all over, and the water froze on them before it could be shaken off, leaving them a mass of ice. The dogs of the team were all huskies or malamutes, and stood the trip all right, but it is very doubtful if an imported animal could have stood the trip and lived afterwards. This morning the driver is sick.

There are reported to be three more mails each of the same weight as this one, so close behind that they may be expected to arrive in a short time.

Superintendent of Mail Service Stillman has resigned his position with the C. D. Co., and is filling the place merely till his successor, Mr. Burleigh, arrives. He is said to be at Stewart river.

There is a large bundle of letters in the C. D. Co.'s office awaiting delivery, and anyone whose mail may have been sent in the care of the company may find it worth while to call and look over the mail there.
