SEE-KEEPERS ANNUAL MEETING.
The thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Ontario Bee-keepers Association was held in the county council chamber in the town of Walkerton on 10th, 11th and 12th of Jan. Addresses of welcome were delivered by Mr. Richardson, mayor of Walkerton, and Mr. Sinclair, registrar of county of Bruce.
The first subject taken up for discussion was "The best method of preparing honey for shipment to the Chicago Exposition." The conclusion reached was, that it should be shipped in tin cans, and that samples of both granulated and liquid should be made and exhibited. The Canadian government will furnish a supply of glasses in which to display the honey and Mr. Allen Pringle, Selby, Ont., has been appointed as supt. of honey exhibit.

Among the papers which were read and discussed was the following: "How I prepare bees for wintering and care for them in spring," by Wm. McEvoy, of Woodburn. He laid great stress on the value of dry forest leaves as packing, which is, by the way, not entirely new in this district, as a number of beekeepers are following the above-named method and find themselves individually and collectively indebted to Mr. W. S. Hough for beneficial results, as he has for some time advocated and practiced the use of forest leaves as packing.
A very valuable paper was read by Mr. Cornell, of Lindsay, on "the density of honey and the best means of curing it to a given weight." He contended that no honey should be marketed at less than 14 lb to the gallon.
A paper by J. K. Darling, of Almonte, on "Why is it?" set forth in very plain terms the contrast between the picture presented by dealers in bee-keepers supplies and the dark experience so often realized by those embarking therein.
