In some rare instances stripes are used for skirts, in combination with plaided goods of the same kind. But this is scarcely ever seen except in cambrine of lineas.

Black lace, with white patterns, is much used for coilettes, fichus, mantles, &c. Mantles of cream lace are very numerous; these mantles are all rather short at the lack, and crossed in front, so as to veil the figure, while leaving most of the toilette visible. Black lace mantles my be worn in the same way.


